### Black Mountain Precinct Updates by Cmdr. Darren Viner:





Commander Darren Viner introduced our new CAO Thomas McKee. Welcome!

The PD is preparing for the upcoming Inaugural Week. The FBI is coordinating with local Police. Violent Crimes in our Precinct in 2020 were up 19.2% and Property Crimes were down 8.45% because so many more people were home due to Covid 19, Total Misdemeanor Arrests in Black Mountain were 1,721 and Felony Arrests were 1,623. The Bell Road Corridor has been a main focus along with the Walmart on Happy Valley and I-17. The Precinct Thanksgiving Food Drive served 46 families and our Christmas Gift Drive served 5 families. The Bus Stops on the 2300 block and 1900 block of Bell Road have removed the benches and replaced them with two chairs and have also added trash cans.

### PRESENTATION: VACCINE PROCESS with Maricopa County Supervisor Bill Gates:



An excellent presentation on the ongoing Pfizer and Maderna Vaccine Process and the Prioritization Schedule. Bill announced that on January 19<sup>th</sup> the Vaccines will be available for all those 65 years and up. He also discussed Election Integrity in Maricopa County. A question about how to control the fireworks being set off was asked. The County is responsible for air quality and on January 1<sup>st</sup> the quality was as bad as it gets because of the fireworks. Changes will have to be addressed by the State Legislature. There was once a program to help residents on converting wood-burning fireplaces to gas or propane, hopefully it will come back.

### Black Mountain Precinct Updates by Lt. Brian Rimsza:



Lt. Brian Rimzsa talked about the Enforcement program on Thursdays around 17<sup>th</sup> Avenue and Bell Road. Chairs have replaced the benches at the bus stops. No Trespassing Signs are being posted around Motel 6. The new Area 23 CAO is Officer John McClellan and he will be starting in the near future.

### PRESENTATION: 911 COMMUNICATIONS with Jake Thompson:

An excellent presentation on 911 Communications! Jake has been with the bureau and department for 9 years. He works over the training of 911 Operators. It takes 9 months to train an operator with Priority 1, 2 and 3 calls, Crisis Management and the 10 W's. There are 250 Operators at this time who



work four different shifts and are cross-trained between 911/Crime Stop and Dispatch. They take an average of 200 calls per shift. There are 4,000 to 5,000 calls per day. In 2020 there were almost 2,000,000 calls. Occasionally, citizens have had to wait on the Crime Stop line for many minutes due to priority calls taking preference. ### **PATIENCE IS A VIRTUE**

In these trying times we have all been put to the test personally, professionally, and spiritually. The uncertainty which has been bestowed upon us this year with the pandemic and more recently the election debates has many of us stressed out. As we moved through the holiday season still dealing with these issues, I write this as a reminder to myself and others that we are all in this together and everyone has been affected in one way or another.

As we maneuver our way into this new year, I ask everyone to exercise patience. We have all been through a lot already and most are still trying to find our paths to normalcy. Patience is a virtue because it requires self-control. It takes a conscience effort to control one's words and actions. I must remind myself of this all the time. The holidays are supposed to be the happiest of times and bring us hope for what is to follow. I hope they were, even during all the modifications or changes everyone had to make last year. A virtue is a desirable trait or quality which is in all of us. It is that which helps us make ethical decisions and do what is morally good. Patience is a virtue because it demands that we control ourselves even in the face of adversity. It also requires us to think logically before acting or speaking and to think about others as they should be thinking about us.

Remember, although we all have different lives and daily routines which make us unique, as previously mentioned we are still in this together. No matter your faith, gender, ethnicity, or political party, we are humans first. We must take care of one another, which includes providing our patience to others when they may be struggling. We have made it this far and we can make it even further but only if we ALL dig deep and stay patient. Keep in mind today or even tomorrow you could be talking to someone who is trying their best not to fall apart. So, whatever you say or do, do it with patience and kindness from your heart.

**CHILD SAFETY SEATS** 

I know everyone has heard the saying "children are the future of our country." The safety of our children is paramount for creating a great future. As our population grows the days of bouncing around in the back seat of the car while dad drives to church are long gone. It is not a surprise as our community grows so does the number of vehicles on the road. Statistics show that vehicle collisions are the number one killer of children ages 1-12. This is an alarming statistic that can be greatly reduced by knowing how to properly place a car seat and laws regarding age requirements for child safety restraints.

The placement of a car seat can be quite a challenge. According to studies approximately 80% of child seats and restraints are installed incorrectly. Car seats should never be placed in the front seat with an airbag, as the airbag can cause additional injury to a child during a crash. The safest placement for a car seat is the middle position in the back seat if possible, as the majority of collisions are front impact in nature. Most of the newer vehicles and car seats are equipped with posts and latches to helps secure the restraint. My recommendation would be to purchase a car seat which can be latched into the posts and tethered with a seatbelt. The more levels of safety there are, the better. All seats will have some sort of angle indicator like a sticker with a line or a bubble with a specific range. Some seats have different levels to choose from depending on the age of the child. There are two mustreads when installing your car seat. First, read your vehicle owner's manual and second, read your child restraint manual regarding seat placement. This will help with properly installing the seat in your vehicle. installed child restraints reduce the risk of injury during a collision by 54% if installed correctly. The Traffic Bureau with the Phoenix Police Department has Officers who are trained to install car seats. They can be reached at Northern Command Station, located at 302 E. Union Hills Dr., (602)495-5001.

As our children grow they are given more responsibility and they want to be treated like "big kids." Studies show that 40% of children who should be in some type of child restraint are not. Arizona State law requires all children under 8 years old and under 4'9" tall be properly secured in a child safety seat. Child safety seats include infant seats, forward facing seats, boosters, and any federally approved safety device for children. It is also recommended anyone under the age of 13 should be properly seated in the back seat of the vehicle. Anyone 16 years old or younger must be properly seat belted while in a vehicle. The Arizona State law for child safety restraints can be found in Arizona Revised Statue 28-907.

The safety of our children is a huge responsibility. Protecting them while in a vehicle can greatly help with this responsibility. Education on seat placement and child restraint laws can help to protect our future.



### GIFT CARDS ARE CONVENIENT BUT CAN COME WITH RISKS

Gift cards have become one of Americans' favorite ways to mark birthdays and holidays, and — in light of COVID-19's impact on this shopping season — they likely will be popular once again. A recent survey by AARP reveals that nearly two-thirds of U.S. adults plan to purchase gift cards as presents this holiday season. But be forewarned of potential scams.

#### **HOW IT WORKS:**

Scammers have come up with novel ways to drain the value of gift cards, or to convince us to buy them at a discount.

### WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW:

A common trick is for thieves to compromise gift cards hanging on store racks. Often, they expose the PIN on the back and then cover it back up with easy-to-obtain replacement stickers. When someone buys and loads a compromised card, the scammer is notified and drains the value from the card.

Fraudsters also lurk on resale or auction websites, ostensibly offering items at an attractive discount. Once they get you interested in buying, they'll ask you to pay with a gift card. As soon as they get the card number and PIN from you, they vanish, and so does the money on the card.

Scammers send emails or text messages, supposedly from a familiar store or organization saying you've won a gift card. To claim it, you just need to provide contact information, click through to a website or answer a few survey questions. Their goal may be to unleash malicious software on your device to access sensitive information, or use your data for identity theft or to sell it to marketers.

#### WHAT YOU SHOULD DO:

Examine gift cards carefully for signs of tampering before you buy them. Keep the activation receipt with the gift card. You can also register your card with the retailer if the option is offered. This makes it easier to track and quickly report any issues.

Be wary of cards hanging on racks that are easily accessible. See if you can purchase gift cards that are protected behind the counter — or better yet, buy them online directly from the retailer or restaurant that issues them.

Delete any unsolicited email or text message offering you a gift card, without responding. And never give your personal information to anyone in exchange for a gift card.

### TECH SUPPORT CALLING? NOT SO FAST

With much attention focused on COVID-19 scams and stimulus payment scams, it's easy to lose sight of some scams that just never go away. One perennial favorite of scammers is tech support. This scam often earns the criminal the ability to load malicious software onto your device to harvest credentials.

#### **HOW IT WORKS:**

You get an unsolicited phone call or email from a big tech company like Microsoft or Apple, or you see a pop-up message on your screen warning that a virus or other malicious program has infected your device, and you need to call the number on the screen right away.

A "technician" asks for remote access to your device, and once in, shows you some files that "prove" you have a major problem.

The "technician" says they can fix your problem for a fee, and then may offer you a monthly subscription to keep your device safe.

### WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW: Warning Signs

Big tech companies like Microsoft or Apple say they don't call customers out of the blue to warn them of problems on their devices.

The concerning files the "technician" may show you on your device are completely benign.

The scammer may ask you to pay by purchasing a gift card and providing the account number and PIN — a sure sign that it's a scam, as is a request for payment by wire transfer.

The scammer may call back months later and offer you a refund for some phony reason, asking for your bank account information to deposit the money; this is a ruse.

Here's  $\underline{\text{audio of a tech support scam call}}$  as recorded by the Federal Trade Commission.

#### WHAT YOU SHOULD DO:

Screen incoming calls with an answering machine or voicemail, and once you listen to the message, decide if it warrants a callback.

If the caller claims you have a problem with your computer or the software on your computer, it is a scam, so don't engage or return the call.

If you get a pop-up that freezes your screen, shut down your computer and restart it.

Keep your security software, browser and operating system up to date.

If you think your device is infected, get it checked out by a reputable source; most big-box electronics retailers offer tech support services.

If you realize you've fallen victim to this scam, and you've paid by credit card, contact your financial institution to dispute the charge and to cancel any monthly fees you may have agreed to.

Report scams to the Federal Trade Commission at ftc.gov/complaint.

### SOME SCAMMERS AIM FOR YOUR HEART ... AND YOUR WALLET

The pandemic has many of us being apart from those we care about. Some of the most heartless scammers seek to take advantage of this aloneness by tugging at heartstrings as a way to steal money. But be warned — "romance" scammers don't limit themselves only to dating sites.

#### **HOW IT WORKS:**

Scammers troll all online social venues — from Facebook to Words With Friends, and from dating sites to your neighborhood Listserv — looking to build personal rapport.

What begins as a friendly encounter becomes something more, and soon your conversations move to text or another platform.

Your new friend — even love interest — claims to be abroad with the military or perhaps working in another state or country.

#### WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW:

Plans to meet in person always fall through — and the pandemic offers a believable excuse.

Eventually, following weeks or even months of regular contact, there will come an urgent plea for financial help — perhaps to help deal with a business or medical emergency.

You may be asked to send money by wire transfer or to buy gift cards and share the information off the back; you may even be asked to open a joint bank account or to send and receive money or packages on your love interest's behalf.

Eventually, the "relationship" ends — either by the love interest disappearing or when you realize it's a scam.

#### WHAT YOU SHOULD DO:

Be on your guard when meeting new friends online; it's too easy for impostors to pretend to be someone they aren't.

If you have a photo of them, use your browser's image search feature to see if it shows up as someone other than who you believe it to be.

Cut off contact immediately if you suspect the person is a scammer.

Notify the platform (Facebook, dating site, Listserv, etc.).

Report it to the FBI's Internet Crime Complaint Center and the FTC.





### BLOCK WATCH IMPROVES THE QUALITY OF LIFE WITHIN OUR DEER VALLEY PARK NEIGHBORHOOD!

Block Watches come in all sizes. They can be a few houses in a cul-de-sac to a whole square mile neighborhood organization. They help to develop a "sense of community" and strengthen and sustain neighborhoods by bringing residents/neighbors together with a common interest.

Every Block Watch starts with one person and their concern for the safety and well-being of themselves and their families. Their motivation may be to meet or get to know their neighbors to protect the children, to keep property values up by eliminating blight and graffiti, to stop speeding on the streets by installing speed humps to protect the children, to have peace of mind by discouraging barking dogs and loud parties, and to be safe from crimes like burglary, theft and assault.

We all want to live in a safe and secure environment. Our homes should be a safe haven. #### **BLIGHT AND ZONING LAWS**

**STRUCTURES**: The maintenance of a home is the responsibility of the property owner. Any wood, siding, shingles, roof covering, railings, fences, walls, ceilings, porches, doors, windows, screens and other exterior parts of any structure on the property must be maintained in weather tight, sound condition and in good repair. The property owner is responsible for making sure there are no doors or windows left open and not secure to the outside. *FOR HELP call the Preservation Division of the Neighborhood Services Dept. at 602-495-0700 to see if you qualify for a free Grant!* 

**OUTDOOR STORAGE:** All outside storage that can be seen from the street should be inside sheds or cabinets. Items should not be set in car ports in view of the street. Please use enclosed areas or backyards.

**JUNK**, **TRASH & DEBRIS**: Junk, trash and debris cannot be left in the yard or car port and must be properly disposed of. This includes junk auto parts, appliances, furniture, building and/or landscaping material, trash such as discarded papers, cardboard, plastics, etc. including tree trimmings and fallen limbs or any other items that appear to have been discarded. The only exception is during the Bulk Trash Collection weeks four times a year.

**PARKING:** Parking is only permitted for passenger cars and motorcycles on residential streets, on driveways or in garages. A driveway or parking area must be constructed with an approved dust free parking surface. The stone must be1/4 -3/4 in size with a permanent border holding it in. 1/4 minus size stone is not allowed for parking. There are limits to the amount of front yard area that can be used for parking. Only 35% of the front yard may be converted to driveway or dust free parking.

**GRASS AND WEEDS:** Grass and weeds must not be allowed to grow over 6 inches high due to fire hazard, allowing the weeds to go to seed and spreading throughout the neighborhood and insect infestation.

**ELIMINATE GRAFFITI:** Keeping the neighborhood graffiti free is something we can all do. If there is graffiti on your property, please remove it as soon as possible. The Graffiti Busters Program provides paint, supplies and training to assist groups with eliminating graffiti. The City will also remove the graffiti from private property with written permission from the property owner. Call 602-495-7014.

### ADOT officers combat human trafficking through training, awareness

Fighting the practice is a year-round mission at ports of entry, elsewhere



PHOENIX – Human trafficking is a growing worldwide problem and one of the most powerful enforcement tools to combat this crime is part of the essential mission of the Arizona Department of Transportation Enforcement and Compliance Division.

This division is comprised of certified law enforcement officers many of whom are assigned to the various ports of entry on the state's borders. While operations at these ports focus on commercial vehicle safety, collecting fees and enforcing weight limits, it turns out these ports are a vital and strategic line of defense against human trafficking.

Commanders and their staff from the Enforcement and Compliance Division at ADOT's commercial vehicle ports of entry are trained to identify warning signs of human trafficking. These can include things such as unusual tattoos, a person's unwillingness to speak and carrying large amounts of cash without explanation.

Since 2019, this training, which explains the demand for human trafficking and how this crime is perpetrated, has become part of the standard training for ADOT officers. The enforcement division is developing online training so ADOT highway workers will also be ready to spot the signs of human trafficking.

"As the state's transportation agency, ADOT is in a critical position to help stop human trafficking and we take that role very seriously," said ADOT Director John Halikowski. "ADOT's commitment to transportation safety includes not only drivers, but the victims of this horrible practice."

Meanwhile, dozens of vehicles driven by officers with ADOT's Enforcement and Compliance Division have bumper stickers aimed at directing those who need help or who see signs of trouble to <a href="mailto:EndSexTrafficking.AZ.gov">EndSexTrafficking.AZ.gov</a> or 888.373.7888, resources offered through the Governor's Office of Youth, Faith and Family.

Capt. Dave Curry of ADOT's Enforcement and Compliance Division is a member of the Arizona Human Trafficking Council created by Governor Doug Ducey to help make Arizona a leader in combating this crime.

"ADOT takes several approaches to do our part to end this heinous practice here in Arizona," Curry said. "From comprehensive training of officers and employees to raising awareness through bumper stickers on our vehicles, ADOT is serious about stopping human trafficking and saving lives."

### ADOR Searches for Maricopa County Unclaimed Property Owners

The Arizona Department of Revenue's (ADOR) Unclaimed Property program has identified more than \$45 million that belonged to over 159,000 people with last known addresses in Maricopa County reported last year.

The agency is seeking potential property owners and their families to attempt to return the funds. The largest property due to a single owner being over \$596,000.

Unclaimed property generally consists of money due to an individual from sources like old bank accounts, uncashed payroll checks, tax refunds, credit balances, rebates, returned deposits and dormant safe deposit boxes. Often property becomes unclaimed because the company that holds the funds has an outdated or the wrong forwarding address for its customer and in some cases, a person passes away with no family members aware of the assets.

ADOR returns property to owners who provide documentation showing their right to claim the assets. Claimants must include with their claim form a valid photo ID, such as a driver's license or other applicable identification, and documentation linking them to the owner's last known address. Claimants must also provide documentation demonstrating a legal right to claim any property listed in another name.

ADOR's Unclaimed Property program returned \$48.4 million to rightful owners in fiscal year 2020 (July 1, 2019 to June 30, 2020). ### Guidance on Unemployment Benefits Identity Theft

The Arizona Department of Revenue (ADOR) advises taxpayers who receive a Form 1099-G from the Arizona Department of Economic Security (DES) for unemployment benefits they did not receive to contact the <a href="Arizona Department of Economic Security"><u>Arizona Department of Economic Security</u></a> for a corrected form.

Form 1099-G for Arizona Unemployment Insurance (UI) or Pandemic Unemployment Assistance (PUA) benefits are sent to the taxpayer and the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) as the compensation is taxable income. Since the amount is reported on the federal income tax return, which is the starting point for Arizona income taxes, taxpayers also report the amount on the state individual income tax return.

Unfortunately, some taxpayers have fallen victim to fraudsters stealing personal information and filing fraudulent claims for unemployment benefits. States across the nation have seen a significant surge in unemployment benefit fraud, largely in association with identity theft. There has not been a breach of information stored by DES. Rather, criminals are using phishing scams, previous corporate data breaches and other tactics to collect information from individuals across the country and file for UI and PUA benefits in their name.

Taxpayers who receive an incorrect Form 1099-G for UI or PUA benefits should contact DES to request a revised Form 1099-G showing they did not receive these benefits. DES will send a corrected 1099-G to the IRS and the taxpayer to adjust the unemployment compensation income. A corrected Form 1099-G showing zero unemployment benefits in cases of identity theft will help taxpayers avoid receiving an unexpected tax bill. The IRS advises that taxpayers who cannot obtain a timely, corrected form should still file an accurate tax return, reporting only the income they received. ### SIGN UP FOR REVERSE 911 IN CASE OF EMERGENCY

Getting an emergency message out to those living near a catastrophe can be difficult. In Arizona, there is a reverse 911 system.

The Community Emergency Notification System helps those managing a disaster send a message to potential victims, alerting them to stay away and stay safe

The Community Emergency Notification System is a robo-voice message alert going straight to your phone.

The system automatically dials the landlines in the area of the active scene, but with landline phones nearly extinct, you must register you cell phone if you want to get the message.

The system will be able to send text messages out and not only to those who are registered but also to anyone who is near a cell tower where the situation is ongoing.

Have bushes grown and now obscure or is there an RV parked in such a way that the house numbers are not easily seen? DO NOT rely on the painted curb because a parked vehicle can cover it up. If you have an alley, please take the time to be sure your address is visible on your fence also. Also, make sure the address numbers are visible after dark! Solar LED Spotlights work great!

Whether you're a prospective buyer or a seller – or both – the Arizona Department of Transportation Motor Vehicle Division wants consumers to know steps they can take to protect themselves when selling or purchasing a used vehicle.

First, go to AZMVDNow.gov and activate your AZ MVD Now account. Everything needed to complete a typical private-party sale of a vehicle can be completed at AZMVDNow.gov, even the transfer of a vehicle title via the convenient eTitle Transfer. Every person with an Arizona-issued driver license or vehicle registered in Arizona already has an account and more than 1.5 million accounts have been activated since AZMVDNow.gov launched last spring.

If you're a buyer, you'll want to ensure that there are no surprises in the vehicle's history. An unscrupulous seller might tamper with the odometer, sell a stolen vehicle, attempt to cover up water or collision damage that wasn't properly repaired or not disclose a lien. ADOT offers a number of tools customers can use to gather information about a vehicle they're interested in purchasing.

While buyers do most of their leg-work prior to purchase, the work for sellers in a private-party transaction comes after a price has been agreed upon. After receiving payment, a seller should sign-in to their account at AZMVDNow.gov and complete a "sold notice." There is no cost to complete a sold notice and it can protect the seller if the car sold is involved in a crash or crime, is ticketed, or becomes abandoned, which carries a fine.

Transferring the title comes next and some titles can be transferred at <u>AZMVDNow.gov</u> via <u>eTitle Transfer</u>, saving a trip to an MVD office. A seller should be aware that if their vehicle was titled and owned in another state prior to moving to Arizona, it's probable that the Arizona MVD will not have a copy of the vehicle title because it didn't issue the title. In this case, the seller can sign the back of the title and have the signature notarized.

Before giving the car to the buyer, remove the license plate. The seller might be eligible to <u>receive credit</u> for registration fees previously paid on the vehicle, too.

Buying and selling a vehicle is a big purchase. If a deal seems too good to be true, it probably is. Take your time and consult this <u>car-buying checklist</u> to protect yourself.

### BULK TRASH PICKUP

The next date for our neighborhood (Area 12) to start putting out bulk trash will be on **Saturday, MAY 1**<sup>st</sup>. Pick up begins on **Monday, MAY 10**<sup>th</sup>.

Remember, there is a **ONE WEEK RULE**, so don't put the trash out too early.

Bulk trash consists mainly of materials that cannot be placed in your green/black garbage container or recycled in your blue Phoenix Recycles container.

#### **Unacceptable Materials**

Our Bulk Trash crews will not pick up the following:

- More than 20 cubic yards per residence, or a pile the size of a SUV
- Loose debris and litter
- Loose grass, leaves, weeds, twigs and hedge clippings
- Household hazardous waste (HHW), such as antifreeze, pool chemicals, oil, batteries and paint
- Community piles
- Materials placed in the Bagster bags
- Materials such as bricks, concrete, dirt, rocks, asphalt and roofing shingles/tiles
- Construction materials in excess of 25 pounds or over four feet long
- Metal or car parts in excess of 20 pounds or over four feet long
- Tires, any shape or size
- Glass such as windows, shower doors, patio doors, mirrors, fluorescent tubes, etc.
- Tree trunks or stumps larger than 12" in diameter
- Appliances that use refrigerants such as freezers, refrigerators and air conditioners

(Remember that the trash needs to be 5 feet away from any object, behind the curb, and no larger than a pile 10 feet long, 9 feet wide and 6 feet high. If the pile runs up into your driveway expect to clean the area above the sidewalk yourself.)
