Black Mountain Precinct Updates by Commander Tom Van Dorn

Cmdr. Van Dorn introduced himself and stated as a community and as a Commander we couldn't be successful without the 230 men and women assigned to Black Mountain Precinct. The Cmdr. reported some leadership changes and some new officers. A new Community Action Officer Kelsey Commisso, she will be in 23 Area with CAO Tim Tewers. Sgt. Scott Cain will be leaving his position to be promoted as Lieutenant. Lt. Paul Taylor replaces Lt. Brian Thatcher who is full-time working for Sergeants and Lieutenants labor



organization. Paul has been with the department for 20 plus years, he left Black Mountain for two years and he's come back to the precinct Professional Standards (Internal Affairs) Investigations. The Cmdr. thinks it's important that we know the men and women that serve approximately 182 square miles in the Black Mountain Precinct boundaries.

PRESENTATION: SPECIAL ASSIGNMENT UNIT (SWAT)

with Officer Billy Steele

Candice introduced Officer Billy Steele of Phoenix Police Department, Special Assignment Unit (SAU) / Special Weapons Assignment Team (SWAT).

He has been with SWAT for three years, the Phoenix Police Department for 10 ½ years. A few years he was one of the NET officers at Black Mountain Precinct serving warrants and prior he was on patrol third shift at Maryvale Precinct.



His current job is a Breacher which is to break into

people's houses. Officer Steel had a slide show presentation. He described SAU Mission Statement, job positions for the team, examples of missions, application testing process and physical fitness testing, and types of resources needed for tactical support. They carry out pre-planned special operations such as serving high risk warrants and searches, raids on drug dens, hostage rescue usually a domestic violent situation, negotiation with suicidal individuals and dignitary protection. They do intelligence gathering and surveillance. After the presentation attendees were permitted to physically pick up and handle the equipment.

CAO Report with CAO Tim Mitten, CAO Sgt. Rachel Warren and CAO Kelsey Commisso



Changing things up, Sgt. Warren, CAO Tim Mitten and CAO Kelsey Commisso will be taking questions and concerns from the group instead of the Break-Out period. Tim talked about Sgt. Scott Cain being promoted today with family and friends attending, Councilperson Stark was there too. Lt. Cain will be working in the Mountain View Precinct #700 on

third shift. Laura R asked about any updates on the attempted child abductions. There have not been any further updates. Tim give more general information about encampments, trespassing state trust or private land, and the process to clean up encampments. There was a question concerning a disabled vehicle parked in the street for several days inside of a gated community. CAO Tim reply was to contact the HoA property manager will take care of it. Summertime is coming up there will be an increase in thefts, burglaries and vacations. CAO Tim encouraged everyone to contact the precinct for a vacation watch, get to know your primary neighbors on each side of you and across the street. Someone asked is there an area of town I shouldn't drive in? CAO Tim said each person should take personal precautions, keep aware of your surroundings, and know where you are day or night. CAO Kelsey reminded people not to leave purses and other valuables out in plain sight. Many people forget to hide the garage door opener which can be used to get into our home. Someone suggested blackening out the home address on the vehicle registration form kept in the glove compartment. CAO Tim doesn't have a location or date yet for the Active Shooter training

PRESENTATION: HEALTHY GIVING COUNCIL with Pastor Jerome Parker



Candice introduced Pastor Jerome Parker. Pastor Jerome is a community pastor at First Christian Church and part of the Healthy Giving Council. Pastor Jerome admits being a street feeder and street giver while working with a non-profit organization that served urban kids at summer camps. He thought by taking these kids down to the Human Services campus downtown Phoenix at 12th Ave and Madison area with sack lunches they could feed people. While handing out the

lunches trash was thrown on the ground, there were no restrooms, and some complained about the type of food serviced. Pastor Jerome's wife explained that wasn't the best way due to some individuals are registered or unregistered sex offenders. You put them in jeopardy by having kids around them. Street feeding puts trash on the streets. After they eat or drink, they have to "go" somewhere, it goes into the street. These are by-products of street feeding which Pastor Jerome was totally unaware. Don't stop giving, don't stop being good hearted. Ask yourself "Is what I'm doing helping this situation?" There was no incentive for a person to move past homelessness. To get a housing voucher or get an I.D. to so they can start the process to get a job and getting on their feet. Pastor Jerome realized I'm part of the problem not the solution. He wasn't helping; he was crippling them. What we can do instead of being a street feeder or street giver is partner with the varies agencies and organizations. Give in a way to help agencies bottom line when you donate. WHAT TO EXPECT IF INVOLVED IN AN INJURY ACCIDENT

Traffic accidents are sometimes the unavoidable reality of driving. You can take steps to help minimize the probability you'll be involved in a collision, like eliminating distractions; however, even the best drivers are susceptible. If involved, you'll likely be stressed and confused. In order to help you navigate these stressful situations we are going to walk you through what to expect should you be involved in an injury accident.

First and most important is the well-being of everyone involved. Are you or anybody else injured? If someone is injured, immediately call 911 and notify the operator of your location and the injuries you perceive. The operator does not expect a medical diagnosis, just let them know what you see. Provide first aid to the injured if you are capable and comfortable in this role. First responders will be there shortly. In the meantime do not move your vehicle or anyone else's vehicle.

The first priority of responding officers will be to provide aid to the injured. If you are already aiding an injured person, follow the officer's instructions. If you are not providing aid, stay in your vehicle or wait on the nearby sidewalk (if it's safe to do so). These initial minutes are often the most hectic as the responding officers are coordinating aid and disseminating information to other first responders and supervisors. Do not be surprised if you see officers stopping traffic flow and/or shutting down intersections. More severe traffic collisions require street and intersection closure in order to facilitate a thorough investigation.

After the initial response, expect an officer to speak with you. They will request your driver's license, proof of insurance and vehicle registration. Additional biographical information will also be requested as well as a description of the chain of events leading up to the accident. Here are a few common questions to expect:

> What direction were you facing? What lane were you in? How fast were you going? Did you see the other involved vehicle/s? Were you wearing your seatbelt?

If you don't know the answer to these or any questions the officer asks, please don't speculate. "I don't know" is a perfectly acceptable response.

The Phoenix Police Department investigates all traffic accidents professionally and thoroughly. More severe traffic accidents require the expertise and experience of specialized officers/detectives. Based on the severity of injuries you may be asked to remain at the accident scene while these detectives are summoned. The fact that these detectives are summoned should not be misconstrued that a crime has been committed. These specialized teams investigate criminal and non-criminal traffic collisions.

Once the accident scene investigation is completed by the responding officer or summoned detectives, if sufficient evidence exists, a citation will be issued for all moving violations and non-moving violations. All citations will have a court date/time associated with it to allow the citation recipients the opportunity to dispute the citation later (defensive driving school may also be an option). The investigating officer will also provide accident exchange information to the involved parties. This accident information will contain an accident report number as well as additional information for your vehicle insurance provider. Dissemination of this information typically signals the conclusion of the investigation.

It's important to note that accidents involving severe injury take longer to investigate. In these instances, please be patient with us. A meticulous investigation takes time, equipment and experienced investigators. WHAT TO EXPECT IF INVOLVED IN A PRIVATE PROPERTY ACCIDENT

In last month's article we reviewed police response to injury accidents and what you should expect should you be involved. As these are typically more serious events that often require investigators with advanced officers/detectives and being patient during the lengthy investigation. With minor traffic accidents you have more options depending on the accident location and vehicle damage value. Minor traffic accidents on private property have the ability to add an additional layer of uncertainty as, in some cases, police officers are not needed.

Private property accidents basically include collisions occurring in parking lots and driveways outside the traffic way. Accidents which occur in parking lots do not regularly require police contact. In fact, in many cases, police do not respond unless serious injury or death, impairment of any kind or significant damage to vehicles or property is present. Most of these cases are investigated by insurance companies. If the incident is minor and does not involve one of the above exceptions, drivers should merely exchange information. If you are ever uncertain how to proceed, you can always call the police, and with the help of our dispatcher's we will determine if police response is necessary.

One common, private property accident occurs when vehicles back into each other. In most cases this is a minor collision with minor damage and typically does not require police assistance. Both parties are required to exchange information which includes: name, address and vehicle registration number. It's also a good idea to take photographs of both vehicles, any property damaged and the general area the private property In the event one of the vehicles is parked and accident occurred. unattended, your requirements do not change, you are still required to leave your information in a conspicuous location.

For those of you curious of the laws governing information exchange, check out these related Arizona Revised Statutes: 28-663. Duty to give information and assistance

28-664. Duty on striking unattended vehicle

Finish up any business on your phone, double check your blind spots and be mindful of your surroundings before you commit to backing out of your parking space. A few preventative steps may save the stress of an unwanted private property collision. If you have any questions or concerns, I'm here to help.

COMMUNITY RESOURCE TEAM IN THE BLACK MOUNTAIN PRECINCT

The Black Mountain Precinct officers are working very hard to accomplish our goals and to help serve you in the best possible way. One way we do this is through the Neighborhood Policing Unit. Many of you have heard of the plethora of acronyms that we use here at the City of Phoenix Police Department, such as CAO, NET, BMP, MROP, PNP and that is just the tip of the iceberg.

The Black Mountain Precinct or BMP as we are called has a Community Resource Team just like all the other police precincts. It is comprised of three NET squads or Neighborhood Enforcement Teams and one CAO or Community Action Squad which is also divided down even further into more specific duties. All of these officers are well trained in the community policing philosophy of our department, the specific aspects of our assignments, are assigned here through a selection process and generally have many years of patrol experience before they come here. As a specialty squad within the patrol division we are in marked police vehicles and in uniform most times but depending on the type of investigation may not be in uniform. Since we are assigned to the patrol division, our first responsibility is to be a support function for patrol and assist them in any way needed, so many times we are answering radio calls or enforcing on view situations. Each NET and the CAO squad are supervised by a Sergeant and these four Sergeants report to the Resource Lieutenant.

The Black Mountain Precinct is one of seven police precincts that cover the City of Phoenix and it is broken down further into three squad areas. It is labeled numerically for our Communications Bureau as 200 or 2 and so the squads are then broken down into the 21, 22 and 23 squad areas. Each squad area then has 4 beats within them. I have attached a map of our precinct showing the various squad and beat areas.

The NET squads or Neighborhood Enforcement Teams are assigned each to a particular squad area although they have precinct wide responsibilities as well depending on the crime category assigned to them for follow up. One of their job duties is to follow up, assist Detectives and apprehend suspects for the violent or property crime category assigned to them. The NET squads also assist the CAO's with enforcement plans in the assigned squad areas for ongoing neighborhood issues, look for any wanted felons in the area, serve or assist in search warrants, assist in any tactical projects as TRU (Tactical Response Unit) in the precinct or city or any other projects deemed necessary by the precinct Commander.

The CAO squad or Community Action Officer Squad has two CAO's assigned to each squad area, and two officers responsible for Misdemeanor Repeat Offender Program and homeless encampments.

The CAO's are assigned by squad area to serve that area. Within our areas, each CAO is responsible for solving ongoing or other issues within that area, liaison with neighborhood groups, businesses or HOA's, form new Block Watches and assist existing ones, teach Crime Prevention, direct needed resources into their area to address ongoing issues and take enforcement action on problems in their area. CAO's are also part of the precincts TRU or Tactical Response Unit to respond to precinct or city wide civil disturbances/protests. CAO's also assist in executing search warrants as needed, supporting patrol officers through answering calls, special event security planning and whatever else the precinct Commander deems necessary for us to do. One of the CAO's is also assigned duties as the precinct Liquor License officer. This responsibility includes the review, investigation and approval of all new liquor license establishments, liquor license transfers and special event permits.

The Misdemeanor Repeat Offender Program officers (MROP) work on identifying career criminals that are repeat offenders for misdemeanor crimes that impact the quality of life in the neighborhoods of the precinct. This program works with the City Prosecutors office to get enhanced sentencing for these offenders for arrests on crimes they are continually committing, these can include but are not limited to assault, trespassing, shoplifting, and many more.

The CAO Sergeant coordinates the many precinct wide functions for our neighborhood groups such as Coffee with a Cop, Block Watch events, Public Safety roundtable events, coordinates and assists residents who participate in the PNP Program (Phoenix Neighborhoods on Patrol), works with businesses to execute Authority to Arrest for trespassing issues, liaisons with the downtown Community Response Bureau and assist CAO's with any ongoing neighborhood concerns.

This is just a brief overview of what we do at the Black Mountain Precinct as it relates to Community Resource Team. On page 4 is a list of assignments and contact information of the officers and areas for the CAO squad. Thank you for all your support and your continued partnership with the City of Phoenix Police Department.



TECH SUPPORT CALLING YOU OUT OF THE BLUE? IT'S PROBABLY A SCAM!

Computer viruses are scary, and for years scammers have sought to exploit this fear by convincing people that their computers were infected. Now that scammers have adopted robocall technology to support their schemes, victimization by phone is on the rise. A favorite tactic of scammers is the "tech support" scam.

HOW IT WORKS:

You get an automated phone call with an ominous-sounding warning from a well-known tech company. It may be that your computer has been hacked and your personal or financial information is vulnerable, or that your computer has a virus. But simply return the call, or press 1 to be connected with tech support for help solving the issue. Once you are on the phone with "tech support," they will ask for remote access to your computer, and will proceed to show you all the problems on your system. But worry not! They can fix it all for a fee, and a monthly subscription for ongoing support.

WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW:

- Tech companies (Microsoft, Apple and the like) are not going to call you
 out of the blue to tell you there is a problem with your computer.
- All the problems they show you on your system are hype real files that look menacing but are just ordinary files.
- The "fix" is no fix at all, and the monthly subscription gets you absolutely nothing but a recurring charge.

WHAT YOU SHOULD DO:

· Hang up if you get an unsolicited call for tech support.

- Make sure to stay current on software updates and run anti-virus scans regularly.
- Never allow someone who calls you out of the blue to access your computer, or give them your usernames or passwords.
- Contact your credit card company and request a reversal of the payment if you've been victimized.
- If you have been targeted by this scam or have fallen victim, call the AARP Fraud Watch Network Helpline at 1-877-908-3360 for guidance and support.



VIRTUAL BLOCK WATCH

Virtual Block Watch is one of the Phoenix Police Department's contemporary crime prevention and investigation tools that showcases our partnership with the community. Virtual Block Watch utilizes your security cameras to help solve crime. This exciting new program is now live and like all new programs, there are always new questions. Officer Martin took the time to answer these questions.

Q: How will Virtual Block Watch assist the Phoenix Police Department?

A: VBW will assist the PPD by collaborating with the community efforts to retain the theory of "being the eyes and ears" for a safer neighborhood. The recorded video will be an additional document/digital evidence of the crime for prosecution.

Q: What type of security/computer system is required in order to participate? A: A DVR with a 30 day retention capability is preferred. This is usually a 1TB of storage capacity. It is recommended that the camera's are at a resolution of 1080p for a clearer picture but a 720p system can still be registered with Virtual Block Watch.

Q: Do you recommend any specific security/computer or camera system? A: This will be completely up to the homeowners discretion (cost, resolution and availability of system) with the functionality and comfort level of the purchase.

Q: Does the Police Department have remote access to my security/computer system? A: NO. Virtual Block Watch will not have any type of streaming capabilities or live feed from your CCTV system. The PPD will have the address of the registered system along with the locations of the camera placement.

Q: If my security system captures a criminal or crime, will I be required to testify in court? A: NO. Once the PPD captures/copies the portion of video needed for prosecution, Forensic Imaging Tech (a city of phoenix representative) will testify on the digital evidence.

Block Watches come in all sizes. They can be a few houses in a cul-de-sac to a whole square mile neighborhood organization. They help to develop a "sense of community" and strengthen and sustain neighborhoods by bringing residents/neighbors together with a common interest.

Every Block Watch starts with one person and their concern for the safety and well-being of themselves and their families. Their motivation may be to meet or get to know their neighbors to protect the children, to keep property values up by eliminating blight and graffiti, to stop speeding on the streets by installing speed humps to protect the children, to have peace of mind by discouraging barking dogs and loud parties, and to be safe from crimes like burglary, theft and assault.

We all want to live in a safe and secure environment. Our homes should be a safe haven. By rights there should be several "Layers of Protection" around our homes starting with National and State Governments controlling our Borders, then State and City Police Departments with local precincts and City Governments that provide education and resources, then Community Member Groups providing Phoenix Neighborhood Patrollers and PNP signs posted on neighborhood streets and then a Block Watch on our own street with neighbors watching out for neighbors and then our own home security alarms and lighting from burglary prevention education.

If you have an alley, please take the time to be sure your address is visible on your fence also. Also, make sure the address numbers are visible after dark! Solar LED Spotlights work great!

No more expiration dates for portable permanent MVD disability placards

Change comes with new state law

Motorists who qualify for a permanent disability placard no longer need to worry about the portable credential expiring.

Qualifying Arizona Department of Transportation Motor Vehicle Division customers with a disability are now being issued blue permanent placards that have no expiration date. A new state law eliminated the previous fiveyear renewal requirement.

The portable blue placard is designed as a convenience for disabled motorists who may use more than one vehicle or for family members, friends or caregivers who drive a disabled person in a vehicle without a disability plate. The red temporary disability placard that's valid for six months is unchanged.

Blue placards with an expiration date should eventually be exchanged for a permanent placard, which can be done at any time regardless of the expiration date. Customers should go to <u>ServiceArizona.com</u> and click on the

"Permanent Placard Replacement" link. There is no charge. There are no changes to the underlying requirements for qualifying for a permanent or temporary disability placard or license plate. For more information: <u>azdot.gov/mvd</u>

BLIGHT AND ZONING LAWS

STRUCTURES: The maintenance of a home is the responsibility of the property owner. Any wood, siding, shingles, roof covering, railings, fences, walls, ceilings, porches, doors, windows, screens and other exterior parts of any structure on the property must be maintained in weather tight, sound condition and in good repair. The property owner is responsible for making sure there are no doors or windows left open and not secure to the outside. *FOR HELP call the Preservation Division of the Neighborhood Services Dept. at 602-495-0700 to see if you qualify for a free Grant!*

OUTDOOR STORAGE: All outside storage that can be seen from the street should be inside sheds or cabinets. Items should not be set in car ports in view of the street. Please use enclosed areas or backyards.

JUNK, TRASH & DEBRIS: Junk, trash and debris cannot be left in the yard or car port and must be properly disposed of. This includes junk auto parts, appliances, furniture, building and/or landscaping material, trash such as discarded papers, cardboard, plastics, etc. including tree trimmings and fallen limbs or any other items that appear to have been discarded. The only exception is during the Bulk Trash Collection weeks four times a year.

PARKING: Parking is only permitted for passenger cars and motorcycles on residential streets, on driveways or in garages. A driveway or parking area must be constructed with an approved dust free parking surface. The stone must be1/4 -3/4 in size with a permanent border holding it in. 1/4 minus size stone is not allowed for parking. There are limits to the amount of front yard area that can be used for parking. Only 35% of the front yard may be converted to driveway or dust free parking.

GRASS AND WEEDS: Grass and weeds must not be allowed to grow over 6 inches high due to fire hazard, allowing the weeds to go to seed and spreading throughout the neighborhood and insect infestation.

ELIMINATE GRAFFITI: Keeping the neighborhood graffiti free is something we can all do. If there is graffiti on your property, please remove it as soon as possible. The Graffiti Busters Program provides paint, supplies and training to assist groups with eliminating graffiti. The City will also remove the graffiti from private property with written permission from the property owner. Call 602-495-7014.

SIGN UP FOR REVERSE 911 *IN CASE OF EMERGENCY*

Getting an emergency message out to those living near a catastrophe can be difficult. In Arizona, there is a reverse 911 system.

The Community Emergency Notification System helps those managing a disaster send a message to potential victims, alerting them to stay away and stay safe.

The Community Emergency Notification System is a robo-voice message alert going straight to your phone.

The system automatically dials the landlines in the area of the active scene, but with landline phones nearly extinct, you must register you cell phone if vou want to get the message

The Police can only post information and events, they cannot see any posts by you or your neighbors unless the posts are directly responding to the Police post. When you or your neighbors talk about suspicious activity, burglaries, etc. on the neighborhood list, the police cannot see it. So, you need to call the information in to CRIME STOP 602-262-6151 or to be anonymous, call SILENT WITNESS 480-WITNESS.

A REMINDER: PLEASE REMEMBER ON COLLECTION DAYS TO PUT YOUR GARBAGE AND RECYCLE CANS IN THE STREET WITH THE WHEELS AGAINST THE CURB AND NOT ON THE SIDEWALK WHERE OUR KIDS RIDE THEIR BIKES, ETC.

BULK TRASH PICKUP

The next date for our neighborhood (Area 12) to start putting out bulk trash will be on **Saturday**, **AUGUST 3**rd. Pick up begins on **Monday**, **AUGUST 12**th.

Remember, there is a **ONE WEEK RULE**, so don't put the trash out too early.

Bulk trash consists mainly of materials that cannot be placed in your green/black garbage container or recycled in your blue Phoenix Recycles container.

Unacceptable Materials

Our Bulk Trash crews will not pick up the following:

- More than 20 cubic yards per residence, or a pile the size of a SUV
- Loose debris and litter
- Loose grass, leaves, weeds, twigs and hedge clippings
- Household hazardous waste (HHW), such as antifreeze, pool chemicals, oil, batteries and paint
- Community piles
- Materials placed in the Bagster bags
- Materials such as bricks, concrete, dirt, rocks, asphalt and roofing shingles/tiles
- Construction materials in excess of 25 pounds or over four feet long
- Metal or car parts in excess of 20 pounds or over four feet long
- Tires, any shape or size
- Glass such as windows, shower doors, patio doors, mirrors, fluorescent tubes, etc.
- Tree trunks or stumps larger than 12" in diameter
- Appliances that use refrigerants such as freezers, refrigerators and air conditioners

(Remember that the trash needs to be 5 feet away from any object, behind the curb, and no larger than a pile 10 feet long, 9 feet wide and 6 feet high. If the pile runs up into your driveway expect to clean the area above the sidewalk yourself.)
