Black Mountain Precinct Updates by Cmdr. Tom Van Dorn



Cmdr. Tom Van Dorn introduced his staff from Black Mount Police Precinct. He started with city wide issues for the department. He talked about the most recent police involved shooting. Chief Williams and the entire department believe in transparency. Bodyworn cameras are now equipped on every police officer, first-responder and others

involved. Phase II is the special assignment that will have body-worn cameras shortly. The communities concern we're hearing is the unsheltered homeless and Traffic.

CAO REPORT with CAO Tom

Owsley: Officer Owsley talked about the Crime Stats. Several neighborhood issues were discussed, including the homeless problem in Deer Valley Park, current crime trends in and around our neighborhood and burglaries.



PRESENTATION: Homeland Defense Bureau with Det. Ron Gillpatrick





Candice introduced Detective Ronald Gillpatrick. He is a 12-year veteran of the Phoenix Police Department. He is currently assigned to the Homeland Defense Bureau as a Terrorism Liaison Officer and Significant Incident and Special Events Planner and concurrently he is the Crisis and Hostage Negotiator with the Phoenix Police Special Weapons Assignment Team (SWAT, trained by the FBI, the Midwest Counter Drug Force and the United States Department of Defense. He is also a 22-year veteran of the U.S. Army as an Infantry First-Line Leader and as a Military Commissioned Officer.

Det. Gillpatrick asked for a moment of silence in remembrance of those whose lives were touched by 9/11/2001.

He started with the YouTube "8 Signs of Terrorism." He explained his career development that has brought him up to date with Phoenix Police Department.

He answered questions from the audience.

Black Mountain Precinct Updates by Cmdr. Tom Van Dorn

Cmdr. Tom Van Dorn announced he is retiring from the Phoenix Police Department. His last day with the City is November 1, 2019. Current Lt's. will take a Commander test for the vacancy. If the position hasn't been filled prior to his leaving Lt. Bryan Knueppel will be the acting Commander until the new Commander is selected. Cmdr. Van Dorn has been invited by the newly-appointed Maricopa County Attorney Allister Adel to join her transition team. The group has been tasked by County Attorney to develop high-level strategic priorities to guide her as she creates a meaningful and measurable vision of the county attorney's office. His new title will be County Attorney Special Assistant First Responder Liaison. He will be the liaison to all seventeen agencies in Maricopa County between them and County Attorney Adel. He reminded everyone he has a dual degree, other being in law. He wanted to thank everyone for our support and being a partner.

The Police Department couldn't do their jobs if it wasn't for community and business partnerships. Cmdr. Van Dorn did a quick precinct update. He talked about the homicide in the Deer Valley Park in the early hours this morning. He reports thanks to our officers and the Neighborhood Enforcement Team (NET) from Black Mountain Precinct there are no outstanding suspects, everybody has been arrested less than a twelve-hour period. This was possible with the cooperation from the community and the cooperation from others that were involved.

G.A.I.N. Event is coming up. Getting Arizona Involved in Neighborhoods (GAIN) event will be October 19th. This is a day for Arizona to join forces and promote awareness, safety and neighborhood unity and it showcases the importance of police, fire and first responder community partnerships and citizen involvement in our fight for a safer Arizona.

Candice introduced Detective E Geiger. The Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) is an innovative first-responder model of police-based crisis intervention with community, health care and advocacy partnerships.



Our Mission is to provide law enforcement-based crisis intervention by assisting individuals with a mental illness, and improve the safety of patrol officers, consumers, family members, and citizens within the City of Phoenix.

The Phoenix Police Department has several hundred CIT trained officers working as 1st responders. In addition, there are two full-time CIT squads who collaborate with behavioral health partners to connect members of the community to the proper crisis services.

If you or someone else is in immediate danger, including a person in crisis or who is suicidal, please dial 911. For any crisis situation where a police officer is not needed, you can contact the Crisis Response Network at 602-222-9444.

MENTAL HEALTH AND THE HOLIDAYS

Happy Fall !!! We are now entering in the best few months that Arizona has to offer. Hopefully you can get out and enjoy this weather. I thought since I have been your abatement detective for the last year, I should properly introduce myself

In May of 2000 after spending 4 years in **THE United States Marine Corps**, I began my career on the streets of Phoenix out of the Desert Horizon Precinct for the next 10 years.

In Aug of 2010, I was privileged to be on one of the first NET teams in (the brand new) Black Mountain precinct. In June of 2015, I took a position on the department's Employee Assistance Unit (EAU), where the motto is "Serving those who serve others".

So, what is EAU? This is the unit devoted to the mental health and welfare of all the police department's employees, both civilian and sworn. Our role during critical incidents is to assist officers involved with Critical Incident Stress Management (CISM). This allows an officer to process what happened when they are involved in such an event. CISM is not an investigation, but is simply meant, as we like to say, to bring the officer back down to earth. These incidents can be anything involving great stress to the officer(s) on scene. Officers are often the first to arrive on scene and these incidents can leave a lasting effect in a person's mind. Part of my job was to help provide resources to the officers or their families in the event they needed help.

Mental health if left unchecked, can ruin an individual's life before they even notice that they have a problem. Getting treatment for a mental health concern has had a negative stigma for years. EAU is trying to change that. Mental health doesn't just affect public safety, it can affect anyone of us in the community. If you suspect someone you know is suffering and needs help, I encourage you to help get them the resources they need.

For some, the holidays can be a tough time of year. I ask that you look out for those around you pay close attention to not only what they say, but (probably more important) HOW they say it. Body language can speak volumes. And if you notice something, say something. It's better to ask the questions or tell someone who can help, than to stay quiet.

HERE ARE SOME TIPS ON HOW TO CELEBRATE SAFELY THIS HOLIDAY SEASON:

Turn on lights and a radio or TV so it looks like someone's home. Be extra cautious about locking doors and windows when you leave, even if it's just for a few minutes. Don't display gifts where they can be seen from outside. Stay alert and be aware of what's going on around you.

When shopping with young children, teach them to go to a store clerk, police officer, or security guard if you get separated.

Loading up on all those gifts is a sign of progress in holiday shopping, but if those packages are left out in the open after they're in the car, your car has become a likely target for thieves. Remember the old cliché "Out of sight, out of mind?" The same idea applies to items in your car. Breaking into an empty car isn't worth a thief's time. However, anything left in plain view like to spare change, sunglasses, tablets, cell phones, or briefcases may tempt a thief.

Help prevent your vehicle from being stolen by always locking your car and using anti-theft devices. Never leave your vehicle running while you run inside a store even if for only a minute or two. Park in a well-light space, and be sure to lock the car, close the windows, and hide shopping bags and gifts in the trunk.

Avoid carrying large amounts of cash and pay with a check or credit card whenever possible. Be extra careful with purses and wallets. Carry a purse close to your body, not dangling by the straps. Put a wallet in an inside coat or front pants pocket.

It's not uncommon for people to try to take advantage of others' generosity during the holidays by going door-to-door for charitable donations. Ask for identification and find out how the funds will be used. If you aren't satisfied, do not donate. Help a charitable organization you know and like instead.

Burglars know that many households have new, and oftentimes expensive, items in their homes following the December holidays. In too many cases, residents make it easy for burglars to figure out which homes to target by putting boxes that identify their new gifts in plain view with their other garbage. Avoid becoming an easy target for post-holiday burglars by not leaving boxes for new electronics and other items in the alley or other garbage pick-up locations for several days at a time. Instead, break down any boxes you are throwing out, put them in garbage bags and place them inside a trash can.

If you see someone suspicious casing your alley, or if you see a burglary in progress, call 911. The holidays are a good time to update your home inventory sheet. Take photos or make videos of items, and list descriptions and serial numbers. If your home is burglarized, having a detailed inventory can help identify stolen items and make insurance claims easier to file. Make sure things like TVs, VCRs, stereo equipment, cameras, camcorders, sports equipment, jewelry, silver, computers, home office equipment, and power tools are on the list. Keep track of online deliveries. Sign up for email notifications to track your packages from initial shipment to its arrival at your home, or the recipient's address if you have the gift delivered directly. If you know a family member or neighbor will be home, ask them to pick up the packages as soon as they are delivered. Switch delivery location to work where it can be received by someone and not left on the porch. See if the post office or store the product is being shipped from can hold the package for pick up. The post office will allow your package to remain safe and secure for up to 30 days.

BLOCK WATCH IMPROVES THE QUALITY OF LIFE WITHIN OUR DEER VALLEY PARK NEIGHBORHOOD!

Block Watches come in all sizes. They can be a few houses in a cul-de-sac to a whole square mile neighborhood organization. They help to develop a "sense of community" and strengthen and sustain neighborhoods by bringing residents/neighbors together with a common interest.

Every Block Watch starts with one person and their concern for the safety and well-being of themselves and their families. Their motivation may be to meet or get to know their neighbors to protect the children, to keep property values up by eliminating blight and graffiti, to stop speeding on the streets by installing speed humps to protect the children, to have peace of mind by discouraging barking dogs and loud parties, and to be safe from crimes like burglary, theft and assault.

We all want to live in a safe and secure environment. Our homes should be a safe haven. By rights there should be several "Layers of Protection" around our homes starting with National and State Governments controlling our Borders, then State and City Police Departments with local precincts and City Governments that provide education and resources, then Community Member Groups providing Phoenix Neighborhood Patrollers and PNP signs posted on neighborhood streets and then a Block Watch on our own street with neighbors watching out for neighbors and then our own home security

alarms and lighting from burglary prevention education.

CRIME TIPS

IT PAYS TO BE CAREFUL AND TAKE PRECAUTIONS WHEN USING PUBLIC WI-FI

Wi-Fi is everywhere today, with cafes, libraries and even laundromats offering access to free Wi-Fi networks. And a lot of us take advantage of this, with an AARP survey showing that about 4 in 10 U.S. adults use free Wi-Fi at least once a month. And while it's a great modern convenience, it does come with risk

Many public networks lack strong security protections, which makes it easy for tech-savvy scammers to break into them and take advantage of unwary users — many of whom are doing a lot more than just looking up restaurants or checking the weather. That doesn't mean that you should never use public Wi-Fi, but it pays to be careful and follow some basic precautions.

HOW IT WORKS:

 One way scammers try to get your data in a place with public Wi-Fi is by setting up an "evil twin" network. This Wi-Fi network has a similar name to the one you are expecting to use, and the scammers hope that you will mistakenly connect to it. Once you do, the scammer can access all of what you access within it. Typing in a password? The scammer can grab

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that. Shopping online? The scammer can nab your credit card details.

 Another ploy scammers use is a "man in the middle" attack. In this setup, the scammer sits between you and the Wi-Fi access point to try to intercept your data. As with the evil twin scheme, the goal is to steal passwords, credit card information or anything else of value.

WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW:

If a public Wi-Fi network does not require a password, it probably isn't secure.

If you are prompted to enter a credit card to access the public Wi-Fi network, be wary. This could be a scammer trying to get you to enter your credit card information to steal it.

WHAT YOU SHOULD DO:

Avoid using public Wi-Fi to conduct online banking or make purchases. Also, avoid checking email or social media where your passwords or data can be exposed. Stick to browsing news, sports, weather or traffic.

If you access public Wi-Fi more than occasionally, look into installing a Virtual Private Network, or VPN, which will help protect your data.

Make sure your device is set so that it does not automatically connect to available public Wi-Fi access points.

FREEZING YOUR CREDIT CAN FREEZE OUT WOULD BE SCAMMERS

Guarding your identity and credit doesn't have to be expensive. In fact, one of the most effective ways you can help protect yourself is with a free credit freeze.

A credit freeze safeguards your credit and is the most effective way to protect against identity fraud. With a credit freeze, an identity thief is unable to obtain credit in your name, thereby greatly minimizing the potential damage that identity theft can cause.

HOW IT WORKS:

Fraudsters can use information gathered from data breaches to establish credit in another person's name, posing significant financial liability on the unsuspecting consumer and negatively affecting the consumer's credit rating. With a freeze in place, no one can open a line of credit in your name.

A credit freeze restricts access to your credit file, so you will need to lift the freeze before applying for new credit, and then refreeze it. (These steps are free.)

You can freeze your credit by phone, online or by mail with all three credit bureaus: Experian, Transunion and Equifax.

WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW:

In most states, credit freezes remain in place indefinitely, and are only lifted when you ask for it to be. But in a few states, they expire after seven years.

A credit freeze does NOT affect your credit score.

WHAT YOU SHOULD DO:

If you are not planning to request a credit line anytime soon (say for a car purchase, mortgage or credit card), set up credit freezes today to protect against identity fraud.

Parents should also consider freezing their children's credit. With a Social Security number and a clean credit history, identity thieves can apply for credit cards, loans, utility service or even government benefits in your child's name — or attach any name and date of birth to create a false identity under that Social Security number.

BEWARE THE "GRANDPARENT" SCAM

The special bond grandparents share with their grandchildren is used as leverage among the worst types of scammers. The "grandparent scam" has been making the rounds in various incarnations for years, and losses victims suffer are among the highest of all scam types.

HOW IT WORKS:

A person claiming to be your grandchild in an urgent situation calls in a frantic state and asks you to send money immediately, most likely by purchasing gift cards or wiring money.

The impostor offers just enough detail about where and how the emergency happened to make it seem plausible, and perhaps turns the phone over to

another scammer who pretends to be a doctor, police officer or lawyer and backs up the story.

The call may come late at night. Scammers figure targets may get confused more easily if they call then.

WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW:

The scammer will try to rush you into a fast decision — take a pause before taking action.

Scammers fish for facts they can use to make the impersonation believable. For example, if the caller says, "It's me, grandpa!" don't say your grandchild's name. Wait for the caller to say it.

Scammers can use phone tricks to make it appear that they're calling from a trusted number, so don't rely on caller ID. Fraudsters have also been known to play this trick by email, text message and social media.

WHAT YOU SHOULD DO:

Set the privacy settings on your social media accounts so that only people you know can access your posts and photos. Scammers search Facebook, Instagram and other social networks for family information they can use to deceive you.

Ask questions someone else is unlikely to be able to answer, such as the name and type of your grandchild's first pet.

Say you'll call right back, then call your grandchild's usual phone number. With luck, he or she will answer, and you'll know that the call is a scam.

Contact other family members or friends and see if they can verify the story. Scammers plead with you to keep the emergency a secret precisely so you won't try to confirm it.

ADOT's I-17 wrong-way alert system wins national safety honor

National Roadway Safety Award recognizes system

being tested in Phoenix

PHOENIX - The Arizona Department Transportation has received a 2019 National Roadway Safety Award for the wrong-way vehicle alert system being tested on Interstate 17 in Phoenix.



ADOT's project is one of seven nationally to receive the awards, in which the Federal Highway Administration and Roadway Safety Foundation recognize roadway safety achievements that move the United States toward a goal of zero deaths and serious injuries on the nation's roadways.

"This award acknowledges a key part of Arizona's aggressive, coordinated response to reduce the risk of serious crashes caused by wrong-way drivers and make our roads safer," Governor Doug Ducey said. "In addition to innovative engineering that's leading the nation, we've increased penalties for those who drive the wrong way while impaired and invested in having more state troopers patrolling during nighttime hours, when wrong-way driving occurs most. We have more work to do, and improving safety for all our road users will continue to be a priority.'

This first-in-the-nation, \$4 million system installed along 15 miles of I-17 uses thermal cameras to detect and track wrong-way vehicles while also immediately alerting ADOT and the Arizona Department of Public Safety. This can save state troopers valuable time in responding to incidents rather than waiting for 911 calls from other motorists, while also allowing ADOT to quickly alert other drivers via overhead message boards.

Since ADOT installed it in early 2018, the I-17 system has detected more than 90 wrong-way drivers, nearly all of whom turned around on off-ramps.

The system's 90 thermal cameras are positioned to detect wrongway vehicles entering off-ramps or traveling along I-17. A detection also triggers an internally illuminated wrong-way sign with flashing red lights aimed at getting the attention of wrong-way drivers.

ADOT is completing an evaluation of the I-17 system to determine which elements should be used on other freeways, including the Loop 202 South Mountain Freeway.

BLIGHT AND ZONING LAWS

STRUCTURES: The maintenance of a home is the responsibility of the property owner. Any wood, siding, shingles, roof covering, railings, fences, walls, ceilings, porches, doors, windows, screens and other exterior parts of any structure on the property must be maintained in weather tight, sound condition and in good repair. The property owner is responsible for making sure there are no doors or windows left open and not secure to the outside. FOR HELP call the Preservation Division of the Neighborhood Services Dept. at 602-495-0700 to see if you qualify for a free Grant!

OUTDOOR STORAGE: All outside storage that can be seen from the street should be inside sheds or cabinets. Items should not be set in car ports in view of the street. Please use enclosed areas or backyards.

JUNK, TRASH & DEBRIS: Junk, trash and debris cannot be left in the yard or car port and must be properly disposed of. This includes junk auto parts, appliances, furniture, building and/or landscaping material, trash such as discarded papers, cardboard, plastics, etc. including tree trimmings and fallen limbs or any other items that appear to have been discarded. The only exception is during the Bulk Trash Collection weeks four times a year.

PARKING: Parking is only permitted for passenger cars and motorcycles on residential streets, on driveways or in garages. A driveway or parking area must be constructed with an approved dust free parking surface. The stone must be1/4 -3/4 in size with a permanent border holding it in. 1/4 minus size stone is not allowed for parking. There are limits to the amount of front yard area that can be used for parking. Only 35% of the front yard may be converted to driveway or dust free parking.

GRASS AND WEEDS: Grass and weeds must not be allowed to grow over 6 inches high due to fire hazard, allowing the weeds to go to seed and spreading throughout the neighborhood and insect infestation.

ELIMINATE GRAFFITI: Keeping the neighborhood graffiti free is something we can all do. If there is graffiti on your property, please remove it as soon as possible. The Graffiti Busters Program provides paint, supplies and training to assist groups with eliminating graffiti. The City will also remove the graffiti from private property with written permission from the property owner. Call 602-

When - did this happen?

These questions will determine if it is a priority call. Give as much of this necessary information as you can.

Was - anyone hurt?

Weapons - are there weapons involved?

What - manner did they leave or arrive - foot, vehicle, bicycle...?

Who - did it? -Suspect description

Where - did the suspect go? - What direction What - did the suspect obtain? - type and amount

Who - is calling? - Give your name location and

phone number (You can remain anonymous.

If you do give your name, the info is redacted from the public

record access)

SIGN UP FOR REVERSE 911 *IN CASE OF EMERGENCY*

Getting an emergency message out to those living near a catastrophe can be difficult. In Arizona, there is a reverse 911 system.

The Community Emergency Notification System helps those managing a disaster send a message to potential victims, alerting them to stay away and stay safe.

The Community Emergency Notification System is a robo-voice message alert going straight to your phone.

The system automatically dials the landlines in the area of the active scene, but with landline phones nearly extinct, you must register you cell phone if you want to get the message

The system will be able to send text messages out and not only to those who are registered but also to anyone who is near a cell tower where the situation is ongoing.

The Police can only post information and events, they cannot see any posts by you or your neighbors unless the posts are directly responding to the Police post. When you or your neighbors talk about suspicious activity, burglaries, etc. on the neighborhood list, the police cannot see it. So, you need to call the information in to CRIME STOP 602-262-6151 or to be anonymous, call SILENT WITNESS 480-WITNESS.

BULK TRASH PICKUP

The next date for our neighborhood (Area 12) to start putting out bulk trash will be on **Saturday**, **FEBRUARY 1**st. Pick up begins on **Monday**, **FEBRUARY 10**th.

Remember, there is a **ONE WEEK RULE**, so don't put the trash out too early.

Bulk trash consists mainly of materials that cannot be placed in your green/black garbage container or recycled in your blue Phoenix Recycles container.

Unacceptable Materials

Our Bulk Trash crews will not pick up the following:

- More than 20 cubic yards per residence, or a pile the size of a SUV
- Loose debris and litter
- Loose grass, leaves, weeds, twigs and hedge clippings
- Household hazardous waste (HHW), such as antifreeze, pool chemicals, oil, batteries and paint
- Community piles
- Materials placed in the Bagster bags
- Materials such as bricks, concrete, dirt, rocks, asphalt and roofing shingles/tiles
- Construction materials in excess of 25 pounds or over four feet long
- Metal or car parts in excess of 20 pounds or over four feet long
- Tires, any shape or size
- Glass such as windows, shower doors, patio doors, mirrors, fluorescent tubes, etc.
- Tree trunks or stumps larger than 12" in diameter
- Appliances that use refrigerants such as freezers, refrigerators and air conditioners

(Remember that the trash needs to be 5 feet away from any object, behind the curb, and no larger than a pile 10 feet long, 9 feet wide and 6 feet high. If the pile runs up into your driveway expect to clean the area above the sidewalk yourself.)
