Black Mountain Precinct Updates

Cmdr. Darren Viner reported that violent crimes are up 5% from July to August this year. In general, the rates are low. The In-Person GAIN Kick-off Event is on Saturday, October 2nd at Christown Mall from 10 am to noon. There is a 911 Event at Amped Coffee in Anthem. The Precinct will be doing Homeless Outreach on September 15th & 16th in the I-17 corridor between Bell Road and Cactus Road. Next In-Person Coffee with Cops is on Thursday, September 23rd 8:30 am at Times Square, 7th Street and Union Hills Drive.

PRESENTATION: CRISIS INTERVENTION TEAM with Det. Jason Toth



Great presentation by Det. Jason Toth who has been with the PPD for 34 years. He said that 1 in 4 persons are dealing with mental health concerns. There are too many calls for service that involve behavioral crisis and not crime. There is now crisis counselor

training in the Academy. There are also many resources that are now available to help. The Crisis Intervention Team navigates people to the services they need instead of a police situation. There have been a million calls to 911 so far this year. The Dispatchers are trained to gather the information needed to best handle the response and they redirect 60% of these 911 calls to Crisis Management. The 8 detectives on the CIT handle the whole City. There is now a 40 hour course on crisis management for all Police Officers.

Sgt. Linda Miller reported on the Crime Suppression Project along the I-17 Corridor. There was a new owner at the Victory/Ocotillo Inn and everything was going good with an 80% decrease in crime. Now, there is a new manager and now there is a mix of transitional housing causing problems due to not enough staff at the facility. Code Enforcement has done a full inspection of the property and we hope things will improve. Fencing has been an issue. Lt. Brian Rimsza joined the meeting and talked about upcoming Events, a car wash benefiting Boys & Girls Clubs starting on Monday for a week at Desert Ridge Marketplace, several G.A.I.N. Events, the DEA Drug Takeback is also on October 23rd, and CWC is on October 28th. There may be a Shred-a-thon in Cave Creek in November.

Awesome and very interesting presentation by Jody Wolf on the Phoenix Crime Lab! No, crimes are not solved in 60 minutes like on TV. There are many experts doing the forensic investigation.

There are many expensive machines for analyzing specimens from crime scenes. Special lighting is used to detect bodily fluids. Evidence storage is vast and well maintained which helps with cold cases. The Phoenix Crime Lab is the largest in the state of Arizona, one of the best in the country and is the most complete.

The civilian forensic scientists assist with crime scene investigations, firearms, latent prints, DNA, controlled substances, toxicology, medical examiner, digital forensics and trace & arson. Tours of the Crime Lab are still on hold due to Covid.

BLOCK WATCH IMPROVES THE QUALITY OF LIFE WITHIN OUR DEER VALLEY PARK NEIGHBORHOOD!

Block Watches come in all sizes. They can be a few houses in a cul-de-sac to a whole square mile neighborhood organization. They help to develop a "sense of community" and strengthen and sustain neighborhoods by bringing residents/neighbors together with a common interest.

Every Block Watch starts with one person and their concern for the safety and well-being of themselves and their families. Their motivation may be to meet or get to know their neighbors to protect the children, to keep property values up by eliminating blight and graffiti, to stop speeding on the streets by installing speed humps to protect the children, to have peace of mind by discouraging barking dogs and loud parties, and to be safe from crimes like burglary, theft and assault.

We all want to live in a safe and secure environment. Our homes should be a safe haven. By rights there should be several "Layers of Protection" around our homes starting with National and State Governments controlling our Borders, then State and City Police Departments with local precincts and City Governments that provide education and resources, then Community Member Groups providing Phoenix Neighborhood Patrollers and PNP signs posted on neighborhood streets and then a Block Watch on our own street with neighbors watching out for neighbors and then our own home security alarms and lighting from burglary prevention education.

BLIGHT AND ZONING LAWS

STRUCTURES: The maintenance of a home is the responsibility of the property owner. Any wood, siding, shingles, roof covering, railings, fences, walls, ceilings, porches, doors, windows, screens and other exterior parts of any structure on the property must be maintained in weather tight, sound condition and in good repair. The property owner is responsible for making sure there are no doors or windows left open and not secure to the outside. *FOR HELP call the Preservation Division of the Neighborhood Services Dept. at 602-495-0700 to see if you qualify for a free Grant!*

OUTDOOR STORAGE: All outside storage that can be seen from the street should be inside sheds or cabinets. Items should not be set in car ports in view of the street. Please use enclosed areas or backyards.

JUNK, TRASH & DEBRIS: Junk, trash and debris cannot be left in the yard or car port and must be properly disposed of. This includes junk auto parts, appliances, furniture, building and/or landscaping material, trash such as discarded papers, cardboard, plastics, etc. including tree trimmings and fallen limbs or any other items that appear to have been discarded. The only exception is during the Bulk Trash Collection weeks four times a year.

PARKING: Parking is only permitted for passenger cars and motorcycles on residential streets, on driveways or in garages. A driveway or parking area must be constructed with an approved dust free parking surface. The stone must be1/4 -3/4 in size with a permanent border holding it in. 1/4 minus size stone is not allowed for parking. There are limits to the amount of front yard area that can be used for parking. Only 35% of the front yard may be converted to driveway or dust free parking.

GRASS AND WEEDS: Grass and weeds must not be allowed to grow over 6 inches high due to fire hazard, allowing the weeds to go to seed and spreading throughout the neighborhood and insect infestation.

ELIMINATE GRAFFITI: Keeping the neighborhood graffiti free is something we can all do. If there is graffiti on your property, please remove it as soon as possible. The Graffiti Busters Program provides paint, supplies and training to assist groups with eliminating graffiti. The City will also remove the graffiti from private property with written permission from the property owner. Call 602-495-7014.

CRIME TIPS

CATALYTIC CONVERT THEFTS

Across the nation, law enforcement is reporting a dramatic increase in the theft of catalytic converters from personal vehicles. According to the National Insurance Crime Bureau (NICB), there were fewer than 1,300 such thefts reported in 2018. That number jumped to more than 14,000 in 2020. We want to make you aware of this emerging trend and share some tips on how you can help protect your catalytic converter from theft.

What is the Catalytic Converter? The catalytic converter is a device that helps control your vehicle's emissions, by converting hazardous exhaust to less harmful gasses. It's part of your exhaust system, and usually located between the engine and your muffler. Catalytic converters contain precious metals, which thieves can sell to scrap metal recyclers.

Are some types of vehicles more susceptible to catalytic converter theft? Hybrid vehicles, trucks and SUVs are popular targets. Because a hybrid car doesn't use the gas engine as often, the catalytic converter retains more of its precious metals. Trucks and SUVs can also be targets as it's easier for thieves to slide underneath the vehicle where the converter is located.

WHAT CAN I DO TO HELP PREVENT THE THEFT OF MY CATALYTIC CONVERTER?

• If you have a home garage, park your car inside and keep the garage door shut. If you can't park inside, install motion sensing lights in your driveway.

• No home garage? Consider a parking garage or other type of secured parking area. When garages are not an option, park in locations that are well-lit, highly visible and/or have security cameras, all of which may help dissuade would-be thieves.

• If you have a high-riding vehicle (truck, SUV) back into parking spaces near lower profile cars, fences, bushes or other obstacles to make it more difficult to access underneath.

• If you have a car alarm, set it to respond to vibrations.

• Several specialized clamps and shields are now on the market to protect catalytic converters. Talk with a trusted mechanic or dealership to determine if one is right for your vehicle(s).

• Talk to your local body shop about etching your vehicle's VIN on the catalytic converter. VIN etching can help police identify the owner, aid in a criminal investigation, and alert metal recyclers that the catalytic converter may have been stolen. What should I do if my catalytic converter is stolen? Report the theft to the police and then contact your insurance company. You may be covered for the theft if you carry comprehensive coverage on the vehicle. Catalytic converter thefts are a growing issue, but with some simple steps you can better avoid becoming a victim.

MOVING? BEWARE THE ROGUE CARRIER

Moving to a new home, whether down the road or across the country, produces stress and anxiety for even the hardiest of humans. Make sure your long checklist includes closely researching your moving company options, lest your life's possessions be held hostage for more money by a sham mover.

HOW IT WORKS:

Enticing ads for cheap moving options abound online and in print.

The "affordable" mover will give you an estimate without coming to your home to assess the work effort. (This is a tough one during the pandemic because some companies avoid home visits, so it's not always the sign of a scam.)

The mover requires a large deposit or full payment in advance.

Once their truck is loaded with your possessions, they jack up the price and may even refuse delivery (known as a "hostage load").

WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW:

Once a sham mover has your belongings, they hold all the cards — so researching before signing on is critical.

Tells that the mover may not be legit include its website not listing a local address or providing information about its registration and your insurance options.

Every moving company must register with the US Department of Transportation's Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration; you can look up whether the company you are considering is registered <u>here</u>. No registration, no contract.

WHAT YOU SHOULD DO:

While cost is an important consideration, try not to let it be your driving force.

Research your options — beyond looking up the mover's registration status, do a web search of the company name with words like "scam" or "sham" and see what comes up.

Always get a written estimate before any work begins — and if there are any changes, insist on a revised estimate before any packing or loading begins.

Apparent developer selected for Interstate 17 improvements north of Phoenix

23-mile construction project anticipated to begin in 2022

Department of Transportation has entered into negotiations with the apparent preferred developer to design, construct, operate and maintain improvements to Interstate 17 between Anthem Way and Sunset Point, a major stretch of highway that sees more than one million travelers every year.

After an extensive review process, Kiewit-Fann Joint Venture has been selected as the preferred developer. Key members of the development team include Kiewit Infrastructure West Co.; Fann Contracting Inc.; Kiewit Engineering Group Inc.; DBI Services LLC; CONSOR Engineers LLC dba Apex Design; T.Y. Lin International; Lee Engineering; Terracon Consultants

For years, Arizona motorists, businesses and tourists have voiced their support for widening and improving I-17 north of the metro-Phoenix region to alleviate congestion and improve traffic flow. This project will improve 23 miles of I-17, including 15 miles of roadway widening, two bridge replacements, one bridge deck replacement, 10 bridge widenings, and the installation of an eightmile flex lane system - a new feature for Arizona's highway system. Flex lanes are proven technology to help reduce congestion on I-17 during peak travel times and allow for traffic movement during emergency situations.

ADOT sought proposals from qualified developer teams interested in reconstructing the 23-mile section of this key commerce corridor. Three finalists were selected earlier this year to advance through the selection process. All three finalists were

encouraged to use innovation and develop alternative concepts to deliver the best possible design, construction, operation and maintenance strategy for the project.

The final cost will be determined after extensive contract negotiations.

"Arizonans are excited to see major improvements to Interstate 17 coming soon, and today's news is an important step forward," said Governor Doug Ducey. "I-17 is a critical link to northern Arizona communities and a vital economic corridor. Expanding this section of I-17 will reduce congestion, improve traffic flow and strengthen public safety. Millions of Arizonans will benefit from I-17's improved connectivity and reliability when this project is completed."

ADOT has begun contract negotiations, and, pending a final contract, anticipates design and construction will begin in 2022. Construction is expected to take approximately three years. Construction crews are aiming to minimize impacts to the traveling public while work is underway. On busy days, this stretch of Interstate 17 can see more than 50,000 drivers a day.

"The vision of the Arizona Department of Transportation is moving Arizona to become the most reliable transportation system in the nation," said ADOT Director John Halikowski. "The I-17 project represents that vision and is a profound step toward enhancing the safety and efficiency of one of Arizona's most iconic highways. ADOT is committed to innovative solutions to improve our highways, and this unique and creative project is a perfect example. It supports ADOT's True North of getting everyone safely home."

The I-17 flex lanes will operate as a separate, two-lane roadway carrying one direction of traffic at a time depending on the greatest need along the steep, winding eight miles between Black Canyon City and Sunset Point. For example, the flex lanes will be able to carry heavier northbound traffic on a Friday or heavy southbound traffic on a Sunday. Similarly, ADOT will be able to open the flex lanes to accommodate traffic anytime if a crash or other incident causes long delays. The flex lanes will be next to, but physically separated from southbound I-17 using concrete barriers. Access to the flex lane traffice by gates.

In February, Governor Ducey announced \$40 million in funding for the I-17 project from higher-than-anticipated revenue amid Arizona's strong economic recovery and federal COVID-relief funds. Additional project funding sources include \$130 million of state highway funds appropriated by the state legislature in 2019; a \$90 million Infrastructure for Rebuilding America (INFRA) grant; \$50 million programmed by the Maricopa Association of Governments (MAG) for the Maricopa County portion of this project; and \$52.3 million from federal aid with matching state highway funds.

Litter Hotline offers options for Arizonans helping to 'Keep Arizona Grand'



ADOT issues reminder about website for reporting litter incidents

The state's Litter Hotline program offers

even more convenient ways for travelers to reach out when they see motorists trashing state highways.

The Arizona Department of Transportation's Litter Hotline website Litter.AZ.gov makes it possible for witnesses to input a litter report. People also can call 511, the Arizona Traveler Information phone line, and provide a report via the "Litter Complaint Line" option.

ADOT processed 1,306 Litter Hotline reports of littering over the past year, slightly down from the 1,714 processed in the same period of 2020.

"State highways provide a first-glance impression to residents and visitors to Arizona," said Mary Currie, who manages ADOT's Adopt a Highway programs. "We appreciate that travelers are sending a strong message that littering is not okay. It is a sign that Arizonans want to help Keep Arizona Grand."

Litter Hotline reports require the license plate number of the vehicle from which someone was spotted littering. ADOT then sends the registered owner a reminder that littering is illegal and costly to clean up, as well as unsightly. It can result in a \$500 fine if an incident is spotted by law enforcement. The reminder letter sent out following a Litter Hotline report is accompanied by a small litter bag suitable for use in a vehicle.

ADOT spent more than \$7 million over the past year removing trash and dangerous debris from along state highways.

Complementing the efforts of those making Litter Hotline reports, ADOT's nearly 5,000 Adopt a Highway volunteers last year cleaned up tons of litter on 1,700 miles of state highway – more than 7,800 bags in all. Volunteer participation plummeted 49% in 2020, yet volunteers saved the agency \$236,000 that can be put to other uses.

SIGN UP FOR REVERSE 911 *IN CASE OF EMERGENCY*

Getting an emergency message out to those living near a catastrophe can be difficult. In Arizona, there is a reverse 911 system.

The Community Emergency Notification System helps those managing a disaster send a message to potential victims, alerting them to stay away and stay safe.

The Community Emergency Notification System is a robo-voice message alert going straight to your phone.

The system automatically dials the landlines in the area of the active scene, but with landline phones nearly extinct, you must register you cell phone if you want to get the message.

The system will be able to send text messages out and not only to those who are registered but also to anyone who is near a cell tower where the situation is ongoing.

VISABLE HOUSE NUMBERS

Have bushes grown and now obscure or is there an RV parked in such a way that the house numbers are not easily seen? DO NOT rely on the painted curb because a parked vehicle can cover it up. If you have an alley, please take the time to be sure your address is visible on your fence also. Also, make sure the address numbers are visible after dark! Solar LED Spotlights work great!

If you see a police helicopter or other police activity in your area, go to <u>www.radioreference.com</u> and you may be able to follow police dispatch reports. Click on Live Audio, AZ, Maricopa, Phoenix Police and speaker

BULK TRASH PICKUP

The next date for our neighborhood (Area 12) to start putting out bulk trash will be on **Saturday, JANUARY 29th**. Pick up begins on **Monday, FEBRUARY 7th**.

Remember, there is a **ONE WEEK RULE**, so don't put the trash out too early.

 Bulk trash consists mainly of materials that cannot be placed in your green/black garbage container or recycled in your blue Phoenix Recycles container.

Unacceptable Materials

Our Bulk Trash crews will not pick up the following:

- More than 20 cubic yards per residence, or a pile the size of a SUV
- Loose debris and litter
- Loose grass, leaves, weeds, twigs and hedge clippings
- Household hazardous waste (HHW), such as antifreeze, pool chemicals, oil, batteries and paint
- Community piles
- Materials placed in the Bagster bags
- Materials such as bricks, concrete, dirt, rocks, asphalt and roofing shingles/tiles
- Construction materials in excess of 25 pounds or over four feet long
- Metal or car parts in excess of 20 pounds or over four feet long
- Tires, any shape or size
- Glass such as windows, shower doors, patio doors, mirrors, fluorescent tubes, etc.
- Tree trunks or stumps larger than 12" in diameter
- Appliances that use refrigerants such as freezers, refrigerators and air conditioners

(Remember that the trash needs to be 5 feet away from any object, behind the curb, and no larger than a pile 10 feet long, 9 feet wide and 6 feet high. If the pile runs up into your driveway expect to clean the area above the sidewalk yourself.)
