PHOENIX PD APP

The Phoenix Police Department has a mobile APP, bringing a variety of resources and information to one place. Users can use the app to access online reporting, crime statistics, precinct locations, phone numbers, career opportunities, virtual block watch, victims' rights information, and more. Users can also turn on notifications from the precinct they live in to receive news updates and information on events in their area. The APP is now available both in the Apple Store for iOS and in the Google Play Store for Android.

Report graffiti on the Phoenix PD app! Graffiti can now be reported on the Police Department APP released in January 2021. Studies show that if graffiti is removed within 24 hours, there is a 90% likelihood that the graffiti will not use the app to have it removed! #GraffitiFreePHX

WHEN YOU CALL 911 - KNOW THE 10 W'S

- **What** - is your location? GIVE EXACT LOCATION
- **What** - happened? WHAT TYPE OF CRIME?
- **When** - did this happen?

These questions will determine if it is a priority call. Give as much of this necessary information as you can.

- **Was** - anyone hurt?
- **Weapons** - are there weapons involved?
- **What** - manner did they leave or arrive – foot, vehicle, bicycle...?
- **Who** - did it? –Suspect description
- **Where** - did the suspect go? – What direction
- **What** - did the suspect obtain? – type and amount
- **Who** - is calling? – Give your name location and phone number (You can remain anonymous. If you do give your name, the info is redacted from the public record access.)

TEXT 9-1-1 "Call if you can. Text if you can't." After months of collaboration between numerous public agencies and advocates for the disability community (or advocates for the disabled) if you are in imminent danger and are unable to talk to a 911 operator, you now have for the first time in Phoenix the ability to text to 9-1-1.

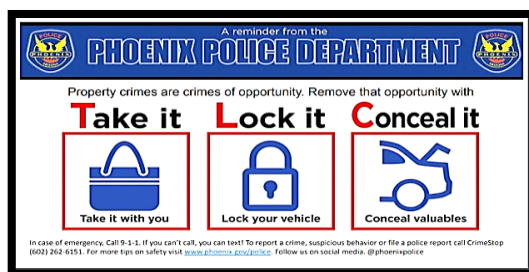

TEAM PHOENIX TOUR DE FORCE

As I write this the day before Thanksgiving, I would like to take this opportunity to express a little reflection and gratitude. As many of you know, I participate as a member of Team Phoenix in the annual Tour de Force NY charity bike ride every year in September to honor officers killed in the line of duty. During this year's ride, Scottsdale PD Detective Ryan So was one of the officers honored by the Tour de Force. Unfortunately, after we finished the first day of the ride, we received word that Phoenix PD Officer Zane Coolidge had succumbed to the injuries he sustained a few days prior. In honor of Officer Coolidge, Assistant Chief DeCastro was able to say a few words before the start of day 2 and Team Phoenix led the group of riders for the first 5 miles. Last week, I was honored and privileged to join other members of Team Phoenix as we met with the widows of Detective So and Officer Coolidge. We were able to present both families with checks from the Tour de Force and spend some time with them. During the conversation with both families, while the events of this year were tragic and nothing can ever replace the loss of a loved one, the amount of support and love from other officers and members of the community has been incredible. I mention all of this to say that while there have been difficult times and challenges for law enforcement across the country, we realize how fortunate we are to have the overall support of the community. The men and women of the Phoenix Police Department are committed to providing the highest levels of service to the best of our abilities. The officers of the Black Mountain Precinct are extremely grateful for the love, support, and compassion shown by the community. 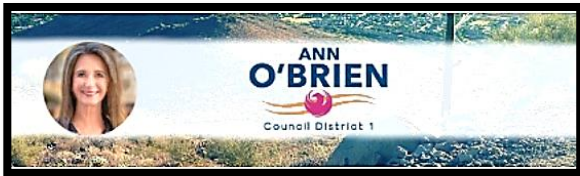

Message from Councilwoman Ann O'Brien

This week marked a huge milestone for District 1 with the beginning of the Metrocenter demolition. Metrocenter was more than just a shopping mall. It was the place where birthdays were celebrated, where family traditions began and continued for years, where friendships were made and grew, where parties started and ended, especially at the midnight movies, and where many people worked and created livelihoods. It has for decades been a hub for Phoenix bus transportation.

While I will always remember Metrocenter as part of the foundation to my childhood and teen years, it is time to remake this area into the crown jewel it once was, so kids, families, and community members may create new memories and traditions, celebrate milestones, and create their perfect lifestyle. I was proud to take the first swipe of the excavator taking down the old and ushering in the new era of our community.

I'm thrilled to announce the rebirth of this iconic space, with its new name, The Metropolitan. This will be a vibrant community where families can grow, young adults find their first homes, and families can thrive. The Metropolitan will be the valley's largest transit-oriented development with over 1,000 townhome residences with an array of price points and finishes to accommodate any residence at any stage of their life. It is so important to me that this community be a place where our young adults can get their starter home, where our local schoolteachers and nurses can live in the community they serve, and where our aging population can downsize. The retail will be culinary & entertainment driven with a public parking garage, and a programmed park plaza that will host music events, movie nights, holiday festivals, and a seasonal weekly farmer's market.

I want to thank the Mayor, my fellow Councilmembers, City Staff, and I especially want to thank my predecessor, former Mayor and Councilwoman Thelda Williams – who kissed a lot of frogs so that I could have my fairytale ending with The Metropolitan. Although she's not here with us to celebrate, how fitting it is that the Thelda Williams Transit Center will be the lifeline to this future development. After her many decades of service, Phoenix will finally be a Metropolitan!

BLIGHT AND ZONING LAWS

STRUCTURES: The maintenance of a home is the responsibility of the property owner. Any wood, siding, shingles, roof covering, railings, fences, walls, ceilings, porches, doors, windows, screens, and other exterior parts of any structure on the property must be maintained in weather tight, sound condition and in good repair. The property owner is responsible for making sure there are no doors or windows left open and not secure to the outside. *FOR HELP call the Preservation Division of the Neighborhood Services Dept. at 602-495-0700 to see if you qualify for a free Grant!*

OUTDOOR STORAGE: All outside storage that can be seen from the street should be inside sheds or cabinets. Items should not be set in car ports in view of the street. Please use enclosed areas or backyards.

JUNK, TRASH & DEBRIS: Junk, trash and debris cannot be left in the yard or car port and must be properly disposed of. This includes junk auto parts, appliances, furniture, building and/or landscaping material, trash such as discarded papers, cardboard, plastics, etc. including tree trimmings and fallen limbs or any other items that appear to have been discarded. The only exception is during the Bulk Trash Collection weeks four times a year.

PARKING: Parking is only permitted for passenger cars and motorcycles on residential streets, on driveways or in garages. A driveway or parking area must be constructed with an approved dust free parking surface. The stone must be 1/4 - 3/4 in size with a permanent border holding it in. 1/4 minus size stone is not allowed for parking. There are limits to the amount of front yard area that can be used for parking. Only 35% of the front yard may be converted to driveway or dust free parking.

GRASS AND WEEDS: Grass and weeds must not be allowed to grow over 6 inches high due to fire hazard, allowing the weeds to go to seed and spreading throughout the neighborhood and insect infestation.

ELIMINATE GRAFFITI: Keeping the neighborhood graffiti free is something we can all do. If there is graffiti on your property, please remove it as soon as possible. The Graffiti Busters Program provides paint, supplies and training to assist groups with eliminating graffiti. The City will also remove the graffiti from private property with written permission from the property owner. Call 602-495-7014.

The Transit PD has a new dedicated email address for complaints specific to bus stops and light rail platforms. Please email ppd.comm.eng@phoenix.gov describing the location, issue and criminal activity observed. The on-duty Transit Unit Sergeant will be responsible for looking into the complaint, addressing concerns, and following up with the reporting party to explain the action was taken. Please feel free to share and pass the information along.

CRIME TIPS:

PROTECT YOUR DONATIONS DURING THE SEASON OF GIVING

As the year winds down, many Americans embrace the 'Season of Giving,' and contribute to causes close to their hearts. In 2023, individual Americans gave a record \$374.4 billion to charity, according to the Giving USA Foundation's annual report on U.S. philanthropy. A significant portion of these donations occur in the final months of the year. While this surge in generosity supports many amazing organizations, it also creates opportunities for scammers to steal from well-meaning donors.

Here's how to help make sure your money is getting to people in need and not the hands of criminals.

HOW IT WORKS

You get a phone call, an email, a direct mail piece, or even door-to-door solicitation collecting money for veterans, animals, children in need, victims of natural disasters, or other causes. You may receive a "Thank you" email, letter, or phone call making you think that you have contributed to a particular cause in the past.

You feel pressured to contribute on the spot.

WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW

Sham charities also proliferate when big crises appear in the news — whether it's war, famine, climate disaster, or other tragedies, all of which happen to be in abundance today. Many fake charities have legitimate-looking names and websites, making them hard to discern as fraudulent. While some charity scams are outright fake, others are registered nonprofits but devote little of the money they raise to the programs they raise funds for. Legitimate charities are not going to ask for gift cards, wire transfers, or cryptocurrency as a form of payment and will not pressure you to contribute right away.

WHAT YOU SHOULD DO

Research the charity on sites such as [Give.org](#), [CharityNavigator.org](#) or [CharityWatch.org](#) to ensure its legitimacy and to find out how much of the donations are actually used to serve its stated mission versus overhead and fundraising.

Pay attention to the charity's name and web address. Criminals often mimic the names of familiar, trusted organizations to deceive donors.

Be wary of links in unsolicited email, text, and social media fundraising messages; they can unleash malware on your device.

Don't give personal and financial information like your Social Security number, date of birth, or bank account number to anyone soliciting a donation.

Use a credit card when making your contribution — it's easier to keep track of it and, if your card is misused, you have protection from loss.

SHOPPING SCAMS SPIKE DURING THE HOLIDAYS

Unfortunately, scams have become part of daily life, and during the holidays, criminals are especially active with package delivery, online shopping and other seasonal schemes.

An AARP survey revealed that over 80% of adults have faced some form of fraud, yet many of us are unaware of the tactics criminals use—especially in online shopping. With nearly a quarter of us planning to shop online even more this year, here's what to know.

Package Scams—fake notifications abound from the likes of UPS and FedEx about an alleged shipment issue.

Criminals send out droves of texts, claiming a delivery is on hold because of an issue with your address, insufficient postage, nobody was home to receive it or some other "problem". You're asked to click a link or call a given number to address the alleged issue.

Avoid clicking on links from texts, even from senders you think are legitimate; rather, type the web address into your browser directly, use your app if that's an option, or contact the shipping company using a verified phone number (for example, look up the number at [UPS.com](#) vs. "googling" it; you may come across a listing that a criminal paid for).

Online Shopping Scams—making a purchase through an online ad may lead to fraud.

Fraud criminals set up professional-looking websites offering popular items at a deep discount. When consumers purchase these supposed deals, they find the product they receive is not what was advertised, or they receive nothing at all.

Be suspicious of any online offer that offers a deep discount over what other retailers offer. Do your online shopping with trusted retailers.

Gift Card Graft—giving or receiving a gift card that has no value on it isn't uncommon.

Criminals manipulate cards on store racks or use electronic means to scan for activated gift cards online and drain the value off the cards.

Consider purchasing gift cards directly from the retailer online and register it if that's an option. Use the card sooner than later to improve odds that you'll get to spend the balance before a criminal can.

Knowledge gives you power over scams. The [AARP Fraud Watch Network™](#) equips you with reliable, up-to-date insights and connects you to our free fraud helpline so you can better protect yourself and loved ones. We also advocate at the state, federal and local levels to enact policy changes that protect consumers and enforce laws.

Use Approved Batteries

Only purchase and use devices with a reputable testing agency mark, such as UL. These show the product has been safety tested.

Use Supplied Charger

Follow the manufacturer's instructions for charging and storage. Only use the correct cord and power adapter made for the device.

Use The Wall Outlet

Always plug directly into a wall electrical outlet for charging.

Make Sure You Can Get Out

Never block your primary way in or out of a room/apartment.

Store In Open Space

Batteries should be stored away from anything flammable. (Ex. Pillow, bed, or couch)

No Overnight Charging

Do not leave devices unattended while charging them or charge them overnight.

Keep Away From Heat

Keep batteries and devices at room temperature. Keep away from direct sunlight and any heat source.

Dispose Of Batteries Safely

Do not place lithium-ion batteries in the trash or recycling bin. Find an approved battery recycling center near you.

MCAO's *Report, Don't Repost* campaign is in full swing! It remains critically important to report videos of teen violence to law enforcement.

- **For Context:** The Maricopa County Attorney's Office is seeing more cases of violent crime involving teen offenders.

Why it matters: Videos of violence can encourage more conflict, retraumatize victims, and cause fear within communities.

What can you do to help?

1. Report videos or incidents of teen violence when you see them.

Talk to your teens, family members, and neighbors about Reporting, not Reposting!



Using advanced DNA testing funded by MCAO's Sexual Assault Kit Initiative (SAKI) grant, the [Phoenix Police Department has identified a suspect](#) in a 1986 kidnapping and assault case.

The details: The incident occurred on July 6, 1986, when a toddler was abducted from a home in Phoenix during a burglary. When the child was located shortly after, police learned of the assault.

- Earlier this year, officers used [investigative genetic genealogy](#) to identify the suspect of the assault as David Mundt.
- Last month, a Grand Jury indicted Mundt on one count of sexual conduct with a minor, one count of kidnapping, and one count of burglary in the first degree.

Why it matters: A key component to achieving justice for survivors of sexual assault is DNA evidence. This case demonstrates the critical role of modern technology and the impact SAKI funding has in bringing justice to victims of sexual assault.

TODAY'S KEY MESSAGE

Stay Healthy for the Holidays

The signs and symptoms of [flu](#), [COVID-19](#), and [RSV](#) are similar and can make it difficult to tell which you have.

Symptoms may include but are not limited to chest discomfort, chills, cough, decrease in appetite, diarrhea, fatigue (tiredness), fever or feeling feverish, headache, muscle or body aches, new loss of taste or smell, runny or stuffy nose, sneezing, sore throat, vomiting, weakness, wheezing.

Testing is the only definite way to know whether you have flu, COVID-19, or RSV. Testing is available at retail pharmacies (in the pharmacy or home kits), doctor's offices, urgent cares, and emergency departments. There are new at-home testing kits available in stores that can test for both flu and COVID-19 at the same time.

If you have flu or COVID-19, treatment may be an option to make your symptoms less severe and shorten the time you are sick. Treatment needs to be started within a few days of when your symptoms begin.

Want to make our community a healthier place for everyone?

Join Maricopa County Air Quality's "Burn Cleaner, Burn Better" campaign, which encourages residents, visitors, and businesses to refrain from burning food for the fall and winter seasons, and instead opt for

cleaner burning alternatives.

Each year during the holiday season, local hospitals observe a notable increase in patients with respiratory ailments due to smoke from fireplaces, fire pits, and open outdoor fires.

Residents interested in making the switch to cleaner-burning options can take advantage of two Air Quality programs: [Maricopa County Fireplace Retrofit](#) and [Maricopa County Propane Fire Pit](#). These programs provide vouchers or discounts for retrofitting wood burning fireplaces with a natural gas log set or purchasing propane fire pits to eligible residents.

COMMUNITY CATS

Helpful Information and Tips for the Community

A Community Cat is a catch-all term often used to describe any outdoor cat that may appear to not have an owner. Feral cats, which are under- or not socialized, fall under this umbrella, as do free-roaming, friendly cats.

In Maricopa County, cats are not subject to the same licensing and leash laws as dogs. Because of this, Maricopa County Animal Care and Control (MCACC) cannot pick up stray or feral cats or take action against those feeding cats in their neighborhoods.

Many times, members of the community act as colony managers to ensure that a feral cat colony is a managed colony. Cats in these communities are usually fed, watered, vaccinated, spayed, or neutered, and monitored for overall health. Other times, the cats are self-reliant and can survive in the neighborhood on their own, without any direct assistance.

TNR (Trap-Neuter-Return) is a long-proven and effective method for humanely addressing community cat populations across the world.

Trap: The cats are humanely trapped and brought to a clinic.

Neuter: The cats are fixed, vaccinated, and their left ear is "tipped" to indicate they have been fixed.

Return: The fixed cats are safely returned to their colony.

Benefits of TNR

- Cats become better neighbors as it reduces or eliminates unwanted mating behaviors (e.g., yowling, fighting, spraying).
- Cats will be healthier when treated with this humane solution and typically are less likely to wander from their food source.
- Halts the breeding cycle which allows community cat populations to stabilize and eventually decline.
- Protects and respects cats' lives.

How to Help Keep Community Cats Away from Your Property

- Remove or secure all potential food and water sources from your property, including dog food.
- Spray concentrated orange juice or hang orange or lemon peels in areas where cats are spraying — cats do not like the citrus scent.
- Keep all trash and recycle bins tightly closed as cats are considered opportunistic feeders/hunters.
- Use a motion-detecting device that turns on a sprinkler or bright light in response to motion on your property, such as ScareCrow™.
- Remove or secure potential shelter areas — secure access under houses, sheds, decks, porches, and buildings with wire fencing.
- Use plastic carpet runners spike-side up and covered lightly in soil to prevent cats from digging in your garden.
- Keep landscaping trimmed to avoid creating hiding/nesting spots.
- Spread dried wild animal manure in the areas you notice feral cats in your yard; wild animal urine also may work to deter the cats.
- There are also many commercial cat repellants (chemical and non-chemical options) available in garden stores, pet shops, and online.

ADOT honored for supporting employees who serve in Guard, Reserve

Agency recognized for being flexible with employees who serve in military



TUCSON – On weekdays, they serve the public working on Arizona's highways. On weekends and when called to duty, they serve the country through the National Guard and Reserves.

This double duty can be challenging for service members who also work at the Arizona Department of Transportation, but it's something ADOT works to ease by being

supportive and flexible with employees who serve in the military. That commitment was recognized this week by the Department of Defense's Employer Support for Guard and Reserve (ESGR), which honored ADOT and two Tucson-area supervisors for supporting employee and National Guard Specialist Ariel Platt. Platt nominated Jeremy Moore and Anthony Torres for supporting his service with flexible schedules, time off for training and an appreciation for the skills he brings back to ADOT.

"If I'm gone on military orders, I'm not exactly having time off. I'm training. I'm serving," Platt said. "That understanding means a lot." Platt nominated his supervisors for ESGR's Patriot Award, an award supervisors can only receive through being nominated by one of their employees. According to ESGR, ADOT employees have honored nine supervisors in the past two years for their support of service members.

Platt is a construction inspector who has worked at ADOT for more than two years, serving in the National Guard for 12 years.

ADOT Director Jennifer Toth said the agency has actively recruited and hired military veterans because of the skills they've developed while serving their nation.

"We believe their skills are very valuable, especially from a leadership standpoint at the agency," Toth said. "The adjustments you have to make for the time away are well worth the leadership skills they bring to the agency."

PHOENIX – A new research partnership between the Arizona Department of Transportation and the state's three public universities will help keep ADOT at the forefront of innovation, nurture a new generation of transportation professionals and support Arizona's economy.

ADOT has entered into an agreement with the newly formed Arizona Transportation Institute (AZTI) to leverage the expertise of University of Arizona, Arizona State University and Northern Arizona University faculty and students to propose and conduct research. The ADOT Research Center administers state planning and research funding that the Federal Highway Administration of the U.S. Department of Transportation provides to state departments of transportation and subrecipients.

"We're tremendously excited to partner with talented faculty and students in a way that can improve the lives of Arizonans, support

our state's economy and promote transportation engineering as an exciting and essential career," ADOT Director Jennifer Toth said. Through the Arizona Transportation Institute, based at the University of Arizona, faculty at the three universities will submit proposals to conduct transportation research, with the Arizona Transportation Institute encouraging collaboration among universities. This collaboration aims to foster innovative transportation technologies, planning methods and engineering approaches that can improve Arizona's transportation system and create better communities.

"Arizona will benefit tremendously from establishing this coordinated structure for the brightest minds at the three universities to optimize transportation, a huge quality-of-life issue for every resident," said Arizona Transportation Institute Director Yao-Jan Wu, a University of Arizona professor of civil and architectural engineering and mechanics. "I'm grateful for this investment and eager for the institute to assess, develop and implement the researchers' ideas."

University researchers have already begun work on a number of research projects requested by ADOT. For example:

- Researchers at the University of Arizona, Arizona State University and Northern Arizona University will look into the impacts of heavier and oversize vehicles on roads and bridges compared to other vehicles in terms of construction, maintenance and repair costs.
- Northern Arizona University and University of Arizona researchers will develop Arizona-specific factors to aid ADOT's decisions on the location and types of safety countermeasures intended to reduce the frequency and severity of crashes.
- Arizona State University and University of Arizona researchers will explore whether landscaping and vegetation management that encourages recovery of native plants following wildfires can reduce repair and maintenance costs for roadways.

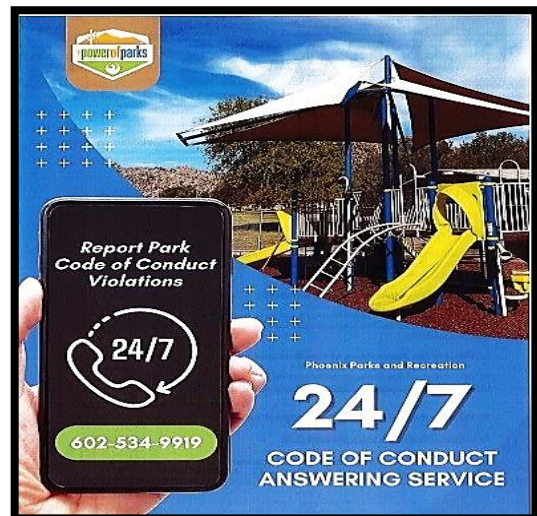

FAQs
Frequently Asked Questions

Q: How long will it take for a Park Ranger to respond?

A: Calls will be assessed by a Park Ranger who will prioritize them based on other calls and needs for all 167 City of Phoenix parks.

Q: Will the public be able to talk to a Park Ranger?

A: Park Rangers are typically occupied serving the parks. The 24/7 Code of Conduct Answering Service is the most efficient method to relay concerns to Park Rangers.

Q: Will I receive a callback?

A: A callback will not be made unless additional information is needed from the caller. We will record the caller's name and email address in case we have any follow-up questions.

Q: What rules can Park Rangers enforce?

A: Park Rangers have the authority to enforce the Parks Code of Conduct and any violations of Phoenix City Code they have observed. Their jurisdiction is only within park boundaries.

Q: What is the Parks Code of Conduct and what are the trespassing policies?

People experiencing a mental health crisis have a new way to reach out for help in the U.S. They can simply call or text the numbers 9-8-8.

Modeled after 911, the new three-digit [988 Suicide & Crisis Lifeline](#) is designed to be a memorable and quick number that connects people who are suicidal or in any other mental health crisis to a trained mental health professional.

"If you are willing to turn to someone in your moment of crisis, 988 will be there," said Xavier Becerra, the secretary of the federal Department of Health and Human Services, at a recent press briefing. "988 won't be a busy signal, and 988 won't put you on hold. You will get help."

The primary goal of the new number is to make it easier for people to call for help. Lawmakers and mental health advocates also see this launch as an opportunity to transform the mental health care system and make care easily accessible everywhere in the United States. The Biden administration has invested more than \$400 million in beefing up crisis centers and other mental health services to support the 988 system.



Suicide Warning Signs

These signs may mean someone is at risk for suicide. Risk is greater if a behavior is new or has increased and if it seems related to a painful event, loss, or change.

- ♦ Talking about wanting to die or to kill oneself.
- ♦ Looking for a way to kill oneself, such as searching online or buying a gun.
- ♦ Talking about feeling hopeless or having no reason to live.
- ♦ Talking about feeling trapped or in unbearable pain.
- ♦ Talking about being a burden to others.
- ♦ Increasing the use of alcohol or drugs.
- ♦ Acting anxious or agitated; behaving recklessly.
- ♦ Sleeping too little or too much.
- ♦ Withdrawing or feeling isolated.
- ♦ Showing rage or talking about seeking revenge.
- ♦ Displaying extreme mood swings.


