#### PHOENIX PD APP

The Phoenix Police Department has a mobile APP, bringing a variety of resources and information to one place. Users can use the app to access online reporting, crime statistics, precinct locations, phone numbers, career opportunities, virtual block watch, victims' rights information, and more. Users can also turn on notifications from the precinct they live in to receive news updates and information on events in their area.

The APP is now available both in the Apple Store for iOS and in the Google Play Store for Android.

Report graffiti on the Phoenix PD app! Graffiti can now be reported on the Police Department APP released in January 2021. Studies show that if graffiti is removed within 24 hours, there is a 90% likelihood that the graffiti will not use the app to have it removed! #GraffitiFreePHX

#### WHEN YOU CALL 911 - KNOW THE 10 W'S

- What is your location? GIVE EXACT LOCATION
- What happened? WHAT TYPE OF CRIME?
- When did this happen?

These questions will determine if it is a priority call. Give as much of this necessary information as you can.

- Was anyone hurt?
- Weapons are there weapons involved?
- What manner did they leave or arrive foot, vehicle, bicycle...?
- Who did it? -Suspect description
- Where did the suspect go? What direction
- What did the suspect obtain? type and amount
- Who is calling? Give your name location and phone number (You can remain anonymous. If you do give your name, the info is redacted from the public record access.)

**TEXT 9-1-1** "Call if you can. Text if you can't." After months of collaboration between numerous public agencies and advocates for the disability community (or advocates for the disabled) if you are in imminent danger and are unable to talk to a 911 operator, you now have for the first time in Phoenix the ability to text to 9-1-1.

#### **HAPPY NEW YEAR!!!**

I hope everyone had a wonderful holiday season surrounded by family and friends. As 2024 comes to an end and we prepare to ring in the New Year, I would like to provide a little recap of the efforts conducted by the men and women of the Black Mountain Precinct through the end of November.

First, I would like to mention that in a year over year comparison, violent crimes in the precinct are down over 8% and property crimes are down almost 20%. Even though the population within the Black Mountain Precinct boundaries continues to grow, the precinct has the largest decrease in both violent and property crimes in the City. This can be contributed to any number of factors, but I believe it is the partnership between the officers and the community that has had the biggest impact.

During the year, the Community Action Officers continued to support Block Watch and Phoenix Neighborhood Patrol groups by attending meetings while assisting in establishing 8 new Block Watch organizations in the precinct. In 2024, the Community Action Officers attended 220 meetings and participated in 57 events, 11 community clean-ups, and 12 collaborated outreach and crime suppression programs. Combined, the precinct's Neighborhood Enforcement Team and Community Action Officers made 234 felony arrests, conducted several lengthy investigations, and provided numerous shifts of bike patrols in the retail areas during the holidays.

While the Resource Team has been busy conducting investigations, locating and apprehending outstanding suspects, and attending meetings and events, the patrol officers continued to respond to calls for service and conduct self-initiated activity, such as traffic and subject stops.

Year to date, through the end of November, the officers of the Black Mountain Precinct responded to almost 59,000 dispatched incidents. Additionally, officers conducted nearly 14,500 self-initiated incidents

including just under 8,500 traffic stops. While navigating the incidents, the officers of the precinct authored more than 21,500 reports, arrested over 2,700 subjects, and issued over 3,000 citations.

As 2025 rolls in, the dedicated members of the Phoenix Police Department will continue to serve and collaborate to successfully navigate any challenges that may arise. We wish you a year filled with health, happiness, and safety. With a new year comes new opportunities, grab hold of the opportunities that present themselves, strive to be the best version of yourself you can be, take care of each other, and be safe!



#### Message from Councilwoman Ann O'Brien

I wanted to take the opportunity to discuss the many successes we've had over this past year.

In 2024, we officially opened the Thelda Williams Transit Center, finally connecting Metrocenter and West Phoenix to Downtown Phoenix, Tempe, and Mesa. Speaking of Metrocenter, we officially began demolition, where I got to take the first two swipes of the old mall building and revealed the name of the new development to come in the next few years - The Metropolitan! In the same vein, we also officially announced the name and launched the new development coming in around the TSMC facility - Halo Vista! Halo Vista will feature 2,300 housing units and provide a commercial and tech park center for primary and secondary users of the TSMC chips rolling off the conveyor belts. Related to TSMC, in 2024, we saw the historic investment of TSMC continue to grow to \$65 billion, becoming the nation's largest foreign direct investment in history! Chips have started to roll off the factory belts in Fab 1 and are yielding a 20% higher rate of production than anticipated, making it more productive than the facilities back in Taiwan! We're so thankful to the Taiwanese families that have moved here to help get TSMC off the ground and train the American employees who will eventually be operating the proprietary machinery. To show our continued thanks, my office, in coordination with Phoenix Sister Cities and ASU West Valley, hosted our third annual and largest Double Ten Day celebrating Taiwanese Independence Day! We had close to 50 vendors and about 5,000 people in attendance, with the Mayor joining for the closing fireworks show!

On the political and policy front, I ran unopposed and won a second term in office this election year. Thank you to all those who have supported me and continue to trust in my ability to lead Phoenix in the right direction! In January, we launched the Community Court, which I fought to create and has already shown great numbers. Showing that when we provide an option of getting the help needed to get back on their feet or face the traditional judicial system for the unhoused populations who are committing crimes, they're choosing to get out of their environment and back on their feet successfully with low recidivism rates to start. We took major steps forward in reducing bureaucracy and cutting red tape for homebuilders to go from shovels in the ground to keys in the door – but there's still more we can do.

Prop 479 also passed on the ballot, meaning we will continue to have the funding needed to make our roads and highways more driver-friendly! Thanks to the continuation of this dedicated funding, District 1 will see continued work done along the 101 and I-17 interchange, as well as the I-17 spine over the next coming years. We passed a camping ban within 500 feet of our schools, parks, and shelters to ensure our most vulnerable populations don't have to walk through encampments on their way to learn and better themselves. And lastly, we began work on a shopping cart ordinance to ensure shopping carts remain where they belong and not in our neighborhoods.

Throughout this past year, Phoenix and District 1 have celebrated so much and continue to celebrate our growth and diversity! This year, we celebrated the opening of Barrio Brewing in the Deer Valley Airport's restaurant space – replacing the beloved diner that closed as a result of Covid. Deer Valley saw Phoenix's second Tesla dealership open up, offering a diversity of vehicle options to current and future drivers. We celebrated the opening of Someburros off Jomax with a proclamation from the Mayor welcoming their newest location in North Phoenix. This year, we continued to celebrate the expansion of a North Phoenix staple with their new concept, Valle Luna's Lunatic off Happy Valley.

I excitedly cut the ribbon at Sunlit Chemicals, welcoming TSMC's first supplier to the Deer Valley area. We also continued to celebrate the growth and revitalization of The Metropolitan when cutting the ribbon at the new Optum Health facility in the old College America building. After working closely with outgoing County Supervisor Bill Gates and Deer Valley Unified School District Superintendent Dr. Curits Finch, we announced a new location for the North Phoenix County Library! And guess who else got a new location? The City officially entered into an agreement with the old Frye's Electronic building off Cactus and the I-17 to serve as the new home for the Cactus Park Police Precinct in years to come!

Phoenix also had its share of celebrating major events and milestones. This year, Phoenix hosted the NCAA Men's Final Four Tournament and unveiled the logo for the 2026 NCAA Women's Final Four Tournament. We also hosted

the WNBA All-Star Game and were officially announced as the 2027 location for the NBA All-Star Gamel But the celebrations didn't stop there! Earlier this year, we celebrated the inaugural flight from Paris to Phoenix, officially marking the direct connection between the City of Love and the Valley of the Sun. AirFrance recently announced the high success of this route and increased their flights to 5 days a week, starting in 2025!

This year has been full of ups and downs, but it's because of constituents and supporters like you that I wake up every day honored and happy to represent the City of Phoenix and the people of District 1!

I hope you all have a safe and happy New Year, and I'll see you in 2025!

#### BLIGHT AND ZONING LAWS

STRUCTURES: The maintenance of a home is the responsibility of the property owner. Any wood, siding, shingles, roof covering, railings, fences, walls, ceilings, porches, doors, windows, screens, and other exterior parts of any structure on the property must be maintained in weather tight, sound condition and in good repair. The property owner is responsible for making sure there are no doors or windows left open and not secure to the outside. FOR HELP call the Preservation Division of the Neighborhood Services Dept. at 602-495-0700 to see if you qualify for a free Grant!

**OUTDOOR STORAGE:** All outside storage that can be seen from the street should be inside sheds or cabinets. Items should not be set in car ports in view of the street. Please use enclosed areas or backyards.

JUNK, TRASH & DEBRIS: Junk, trash and debris cannot be left in the yard or car port and must be properly disposed of. This includes junk auto parts, appliances, furniture, building and/or landscaping material, trash such as discarded papers, cardboard, plastics, etc. including tree trimmings and fallen limbs or any other items that appear to have been discarded. The only exception is during the Bulk Trash Collection weeks

PARKING: Parking is only permitted for passenger cars and motorcycles on residential streets, on driveways or in garages. A driveway or parking area must be constructed with an approved dust free parking surface. The stone must be 1/4 - 3/4 in size with a permanent border holding it in. 1/4 minus size stone is not allowed for parking. There are limits to the amount of front yard area that can be used for parking. Only 35% of the front yard may be converted to driveway or dust free parking.

GRASS AND WEEDS: Grass and weeds must not be allowed to grow over 6 inches high due to fire hazard, allowing the weeds to go to seed and spreading throughout the neighborhood and insect infestation.

**ELIMINATE GRAFFITI:** Keeping the neighborhood graffiti free is something we can all do. If there is graffiti on your property, please remove it as soon as possible. The Graffiti Busters Program provides paint, supplies and training to assist groups with eliminating graffiti. The City will also remove the graffiti from private property with written permission from the property owner. Call 602-495-7014

### CRIME TIPS:

### RISE IN REPORTS OF FAKE PAYPAL INVOICE SCAMS

In 2023, PayPal was the third most-impersonated brand reported by consumers, according to the Federal Trade Commission. While phishing attempts using the names of well-known companies are not new, the AARP Fraud Watch Network Helpline has seen a rise in reports of PayPal scams involving cryptocurrency.

Here's a closer look at how some PayPal scams work and steps to safeguard yourself.

#### **HOW IT WORKS**

You receive an email from PayPal with an invoice for a highvalue purchase, such as cryptocurrency or anti-virus software, that you never made.

To dispute the transaction, you're urged to call the customer service number provided on the invoice.

When you call, you may be asked for personal or payment information to verify your identity and warned that your account has been compromised.

#### WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW

Unexpected emails urging you to act fast, click a link or call a number are often phishing scams.

Their goal is to connect you with a spoofed website or fake customer service representative so criminals can steal your personal and financial information, or worse, access information to take over your online accounts, including financial accounts. Delivery of fake invoices may also come via PayPal's system, so they appear in the recipient's PayPal account and email inbox. This makes the scam look more convincing.

#### WHAT YOU SHOULD DO

Be cautious of urgent messages claiming to be from PayPal, pressuring you to call quickly to resolve an alleged account issue.

If you receive a suspicious invoice or money request, don't engage with it in any way.

To report a potentially fraudulent invoice, log in to your PayPal account directly through its verified website or app and use its official customer service channels.

#### **TRENDING SCAMS OF 2024**

The <u>AARP Fraud Watch Network Helpline</u> is a free service where you can report suspected fraud, get help determining if something is legitimate, or get help if you or someone you love has become a victim. Each year, we receive around 100,000 calls. Here's a look back at some of the trends we saw in 2024.

If you learn something new by reading this alert, please share it with your friends and loved ones. Awareness is a big part of curtailing these insidious crimes.

#### **Impostor Scams**

Impostor scams once again come in among the most common scams this year.

These scams often begin with an unsolicited call, email, text or social media message posing as someone you trust — your bank, a business you know, a friend or loved one, or even a government agency.

Criminals seek to get us into a state of fear or excitement — your Social Security payments have been paused, there is a problem with your bank account, or you just won a big prize. They know that if they can get us into a heightened state of emotion, our brains go right to solving the issue at hand, casting logic aside.

We can't put much trust in incoming and unsolicited communications these days — whether by phone, text, email, or social media. If you are concerned there may be an issue, contact the entity at a number or site you know to be legitimate.

#### **Investment Fraud**

<u>Investment scams</u> continued to remain prevalent, often involving human trafficking to enslave frontline "workers" in these fraudulent operations.

This fraud relies on initiating friendships online or through a text message that appears to be sent to you by mistake, using the interaction to gradually build a trust relationship.

Then comes the pitch: They've shown you their luxurious lifestyle and offer to teach you how to invest and make a lot of money, too (whether it's cryptocurrency or some other commodity).

The investments are completely fraudulent, as are the investment exchanges they convince you to access, and the victims only know this when they are unable to withdraw their investment earnings.

Anytime you are interested in a new investment opportunity, investigate it first. Ask friends what they know and then read up on how to validate opportunities at the SEC's site, investor.gov.

#### **Tech Support Scams**

<u>Tech support scams</u> have been around a long time, but new twists have allowed the crime to flourish.

This scam typically starts with a pop-up message and possibly a blaring sound on your computer warning there is a critical security issue and to call the provided tech support number. The "tech support" person claiming to be from Microsoft or some other big tech company, promises they can help by asking you to provide remote access to your device.

Once inside, they can plant login-stealing malware designed to expose your usernames and passwords to all of your accounts, including financial ones.

More complex fraud attacks begin with tech support, then evolve into bank and government impersonation schemes that end with criminals wiping out the victim's financial accounts.

If you get this kind of frightening pop-up, exit out of your browser. If that doesn't work, press the power button down on your device until it shuts down. After a few minutes, turn it back on and the scary stuff should no longer appear.

If you're concerned about your device, take it to a big-box store or a trusted technician to scan for malicious software.

Knowledge gives you power over scams. #### **SAFETY TIPS**

- Keep spectators at a safe distance- Data shows fireworks related injuries where Phoenix Fire responded to treat a patient were a result of someone standing too close or being hit with a firework as it went off.
- Choose a safe location- Data shows that fire calls
  where it was noted fireworks were a potential
  ignition source also noted the area was dry or
  sparks traveled away from the original area and
  ignited grass, brush, debris, buildings, etc.
   Additionally illegal aerial fireworks are typically
  associated to tree fires, which can spread to other
  trees, properties, and structures.
- Dispose of fireworks properly- Fire investigations and other calls for service during times when fireworks sales are permitted are most likely the result of careless discarding of fireworks in dumpsters, especially those city dumpsters that are kept near the house or in the garage. When the fireworks re-ignite and the dumpster is on fire, it could extend to the garage and residential structure. It is important to soak them for at least 24-hours prior to putting them in the trash can. Even then it is important to not have the trash can against the house, in the garage, or near dry brush that would allow a fire to extend.
- Secure your pets- Not only do they get spooked by fireworks and run away from your property, but there have been several instances where dogs have bitten people while the fireworks were going off.

Residents interested in making the switch to cleaner-burning options can take advantage of two Air Quality programs: Maricopa County Fireplace Retrofit and Maricopa County Propane Fire Pit.

These programs provide vouchers or discounts for retrofitting wood burning fireplaces with a natural gas log set or purchasing propane fire pits to eligible residents.

#### MCACC SERVICES MISSION MICROCHIP

MCACC is offering free microchipping services for dogs in Maricopa County through the end of the year.

For now, the free service is only available at the West shelter at 2500 S 27th Avenue in Phoenix. Registration is required ahead of time. #### **COMMUNITY CATS**

#### Helpful Information and Tips for the Community

A Community Cat is a catch-all term often used to describe any outdoor cat that may appear to not have an owner. Feral cats, which are under- or not socialized, fall under this umbrella, as do free-roaming, friendly cats.

In Maricopa County, cats are not subject to the same licensing and leash laws as dogs. Because of this, Maricopa County Animal Care and Control (MCACC) cannot pick up stray or feral cats or take action against those feeding cats in their neighborhoods.

Many times, members of the community act as colony managers to ensure that a feral cat colony is a managed colony. Cats in these communities are usually fed, watered, vaccinated, spayed, or neutered, and monitored for overall health. Other times, the cats are self-reliant and can survive in the neighborhood on their own, without any direct assistance.

TNR (Trap-Neuter-Return) is a long-proven and effective method for humanely addressing community cat populations across the world.

Trap: The cats are humanely trapped and brought to a clinic.

Neuter: The cats are fixed, vaccinated, and their left ear is "tipped" to indicate they have been fixed.

Return: The fixed cats are safely returned to their colony.

#### Benefits of TNR

- · Cats become better neighbors as it reduces or eliminates unwanted mating behaviors (e.g., yowling, fighting, spraying).
- Cats will be healthier when treated with this humane solution and typically are less likely to wander from their food source.
- Halts the breeding cycle which allows community cat populations to stabilize and eventually decline.
- Protects and respects cats' lives.

#### How to Help Keep Community Cats Away from Your Property

- · Remove or secure all potential food and water sources from your property, including dog food.
- · Spray concentrated orange juice or hang orange or lemon peels in areas where cats are spraying — cats do not like the citrus scent.
- · Keep all trash and recycle bins tightly closed as cats are considered opportunistic feeders/hunters.
- Use a motion-detecting device that turns on a sprinkler or bright light in response to motion on your property, such as ScareCrow™
- Remove or secure potential shelter areas secure access under houses, sheds, decks, porches, and buildings with wire fencing.
- · Use plastic carpet runners spike-side up and covered lightly in soil to prevent cats from digging in your garden.
- Keep landscaping trimmed to avoid creating hiding/nesting spots.
- · Spread dried wild animal manure in the areas you notice feral cats in your yard; wild animal urine also may work to deter the cats.
- There are also many commercial cat repellants (chemical and non-chemical options) available in garden stores, pet shops, and online.



#### LOOKING FOR A NEW YEAR'S RESOLUTION? ADOPT A HIGHWAY! Join hundreds of volunteer groups helping ADOT keep Arizona grand

PHOENIX – If keeping AZ grand is your bag, then the Arizona Department of Transportation has your perfect New Year's resolution.

ADOT's Adopt a Highway volunteer program, with information available at azdot.gov/adoptahighway,

has hundreds of miles of state highways available for adoption statewide. It's a great way to give back by picking up roadside litter



Civic-minded individuals, families, religious groups, clubs and others taking part in Adopt a Highway receive two-year permits to clean up roadside litter on their highway segments, usually a mile in each direction. They agree to pick up litter at least once a year and preferably three or more times a year. ADOT provides reflective vests, litter bags and safety training.

Each stretch has a recognition sign bearing the Adopt a Highway group's name. Many groups' signs pay tribute to loved ones and other reasons they decided to get involved.

If you aren't ready for a two-year commitment but want to see what Adopt a Highway is all about, you're welcome to join a pickup Saturday, Jan. 25, along all 45 miles of State Route 286 between State Route 86 (Three Points Junction) west of the Tucson area and Sasabe at the Arizona/Mexico border. This annual event is organized by longtime Adopt a Highway volunteer Melissa Owen.

To participate Jan.25, please complete an Adopt a Highway Volunteer Permit Application by Jan. 10 and send it to southcentralpermit@azdot.gov. ADOT will assign you a mile of SR 286 where you will head after a safety briefing to begin the day.

Adopt a Highway volunteers make a big difference in Arizona. During 2023, nearly 9,000 people in 850 Adopt a Highway volunteer groups filled more than 15,000 bags with roadside litter, mainly outside of metropolitan areas. The dollar value of these volunteers' work: \$674,000.



#### ADOT TO USE FEDERAL GRANT TO STUDY LOW-CARBON PAVING MATERIALS

\$27 million grant allows research on sustainable pavements

The Arizona Department of Transportation is gearing up for a study of low-carbon transportation materials after the award of a \$27 million grant from the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA). ADOT will use the grant to develop a research program on the use of





The FHWA selected ADOT for the grant as part of the federal Inflation Reduction Act, which includes a Low-Carbon Transportation Materials Program. ADOT is one of 39 state transportation departments to recently receive grants under the federal program.

The research will allow ADOT to follow up on its experience with integrating environmentally supportive processes into highway pavement projects. That includes the use of recycled pavement material, such as reclaimed asphalt and recycled concrete pavement, on a number of projects.

ADOT's research plan will include the creation of a steering committee to guide the planning and administration of a low-carbon materials implementation program. The agency anticipates working with representatives from FHWA, the construction industry and universities on researching low-carbon materials and any program processes to get them to a test phase.

A key goal will be to work with highway builders, including pavement plant operators and pavement contractors, to establish a process for analyzing pollution reduction, energy efficiency and the production of longer lasting pavements with low-carbon benefits.

Federal grant funding is expected to be available starting in 2025.

People experiencing a mental health crisis have a new way to reach out for help in the U.S. They can simply call or text the numbers 9-8-

Modeled after 911, the new three-digit 988 Suicide & Crisis Lifeline is designed to be a memorable and quick number that connects people who are suicidal or in any other mental health crisis to a trained mental health professional.

"If you are willing to turn to someone in your moment of crisis, 988 will be there," said Xavier Becerra, the secretary of the federal Department of Health and Human Services, at a recent press briefing. "988 won't be a busy signal, and 988 won't put you on hold. You will get help."

The primary goal of the new number is to make it easier for people to call for help. Lawmakers and mental health advocates also see this launch as an opportunity to transform the mental health care system and make care easily accessible everywhere in the United States. The Biden administration has invested more than \$400 million in beefing up crisis centers and other mental health services to support the 988 system.

#### Suicide Warning Signs

These signs may mean someone is at risk for suicide. Risk is greater if a behavior is new or has increased and if it seems related to a painful event, loss, or change.

### SHANNON'S LAW – THE UNLAWFUL DISCHARGE OF A FIREARM: A.R.S. 13-3107

In 1999, fourteen-year-old Shannon Smith was struck in the head by a stray bullet while in her own backyard in central Phoenix. The bullet was estimated to have been fired from a half-mile away, as reported by 12 News. Shannon died as a result of her injury. As of 2023, the case is cold, with the individual who fired the bullet having never been located.

The <u>Maricopa County Attorney's Office</u> reported that Shannon's parents worked in cooperation with local organizations, law enforcement, politicians, and attorneys to make firing a gun into the air a felony. At the time of Shannon's death, it was only a misdemeanor.

In 2020, "Shannon's Law" was passed, making firing a gun into the air a class 6 felony according to the new A.R.S. 13-3107. As Officer Kristopher Babros, of the Peoria Police Department, stated, "Don't shoot a gun into the air. Because whatever goes up has to come down." Shannon's Law hopes to prevent accidental deaths like that of Shannon Smith and serves as a reminder that even celebratory gunfire around holidays such as the Fourth of July or New Year's Eve has serious consequences.

According to this statute, a person who, with criminal negligence, *discharges a firearm within or into the limits of any municipality* is guilty of a class 6 felony.

### ACCESSIBILITY COMPLIANCE ENFORCEMENT PROGRAM

The Accessibility Compliance Enforcement aide is a volunteer who has committed to serve a minimum of four hours each week to assist the community and the Phoenix Police Department. Volunteers patrol the city of Phoenix, writing disabled parking citations. The mission of the ACE Program is to provide safe and accessible parking spaces for the disabled community through enforcement and education. Directed patrol is accomplished by responding to locations identified through the disabled parking violation hotline, **602-534-SPACE**.

The City of Phoenix has created the Save Our Space Campaign to educate the public about the importance of saving disabled parking spaces for those people who really need them. Recently, the City of Phoenix has more than doubled the fine for illegal use of designated accessible parking spaces. The fine for this violation is \$296/\$565.

The authority granted to accessibility compliance Volunteers is limited to non-law- enforcement functions. ACE volunteers will not engage in any activities that would place them in the role of a sworn law enforcement officer, and/or subject them to unreasonable and unnecessary hazards.

#### **MOTORIST ASSIST PROGRAM**

The Motorist Assist aide is a volunteer who has committed to serve a minimum of four hours each week to assist members of the community and the Phoenix Police Department. Serving as a uniformed civilian, the volunteer assists motorists who have encountered vehicular problems while using city streets. Assistance provided may include, but is not limited to, pushing vehicles; starting vehicles; opening vehicle doors; providing fuel, air, or water; assisting with changing a tire/s; arranging transportation; or other assistance reasonably required to aid the temporarily stranded motorist.

Volunteers also work closely with sworn police personnel and may be called upon to assist at vehicular accident scenes for traffic control or other duties. In addition, the volunteer may be requested to assist at special events. The philosophy of the Motorist Assist Program is service as opposed to enforcement. The authority granted to Motorist Assist aides is limited to non-law-enforcement functions. Motorist assist aides will not engage in any activities that would place them in the role of a sworn law enforcement officer, and/or subject them to unreasonable hazards.
