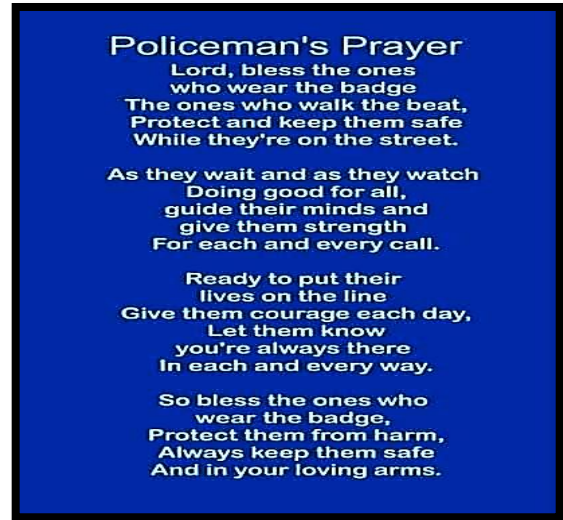

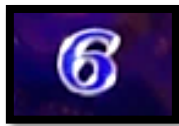

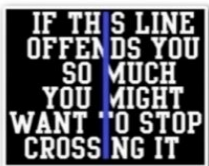

PHOENIX PD APP

The Phoenix Police Department has a mobile APP, bringing a variety of resources and information to one place. Users can use the app to access online reporting, crime statistics, precinct locations, phone numbers, career opportunities, virtual block watch, victims' rights information, and more. Users can also turn on notifications from the precinct they live in to receive news updates and information on events in their area. The APP is now available both in the Apple Store for iOS and in the Google Play Store for Android.

Report graffiti on the Phoenix PD app! Graffiti can now be reported on the Police Department APP released in January 2021. Studies show that if graffiti is removed within 24 hours, there is a 90% likelihood that the graffiti reporter will not have to use the app to have it removed! #GraffitiFreePHX City of Phoenix Neighborhood Services Department.

WHEN YOU CALL 911 - KNOW THE 10 W'S

- **What** - is your location? GIVE EXACT LOCATION
- **What** - happened? WHAT TYPE OF CRIME?
- **When** - did this happen?

These questions will determine if it is a priority call. Give as much of this necessary information as you can.

- **Was** - anyone hurt?
- **Weapons** - are there weapons involved?
- **What** - manner did they leave or arrive – foot, vehicle, bicycle...?
- **Who** - did it? –Suspect description
- **Where** - did the suspect go? – What direction
- **What** - did the suspect obtain? – type and amount
- **Who** - is calling? – Give your name, location, and phone number. (You can remain anonymous. If you do give your name, the info is redacted from the public record access.)

TEXT 9-1-1 "Call if you can. Text if you can't." After months of collaboration between numerous public agencies and advocates for the disabled, if you are in imminent danger and are unable to talk to a 911 operator, you now have for the first time in Phoenix the ability to text to 9-1-1.

New Fireworks Code Changes

What's Changed:

- No fireworks at city-owned property, including parks
- Use of all fireworks is banned within one mile of mountain preserves
- Stage 1 fire status can trigger additional restrictions
- Violators face civil fines up to \$2,500 or criminal misdemeanor charges punishable by up to six months in jail
- Repeat violators could face escalating enforcement
- City can recover costs from violators for emergency response, storage, and disposal related to illegal fireworks incidents
- Police have stronger authority to seize and destroy illegal fireworks

Professional fireworks shows are still allowed

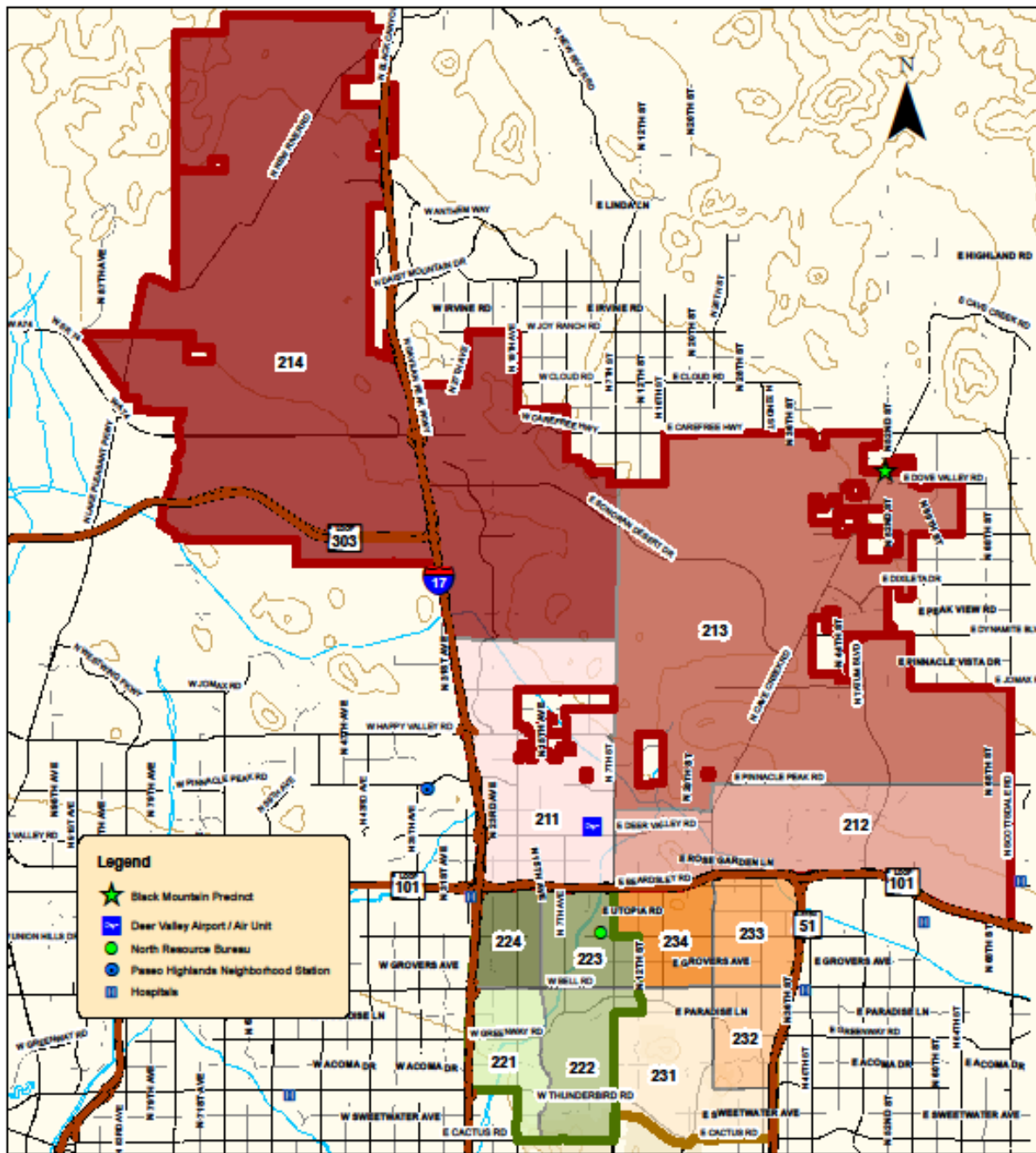

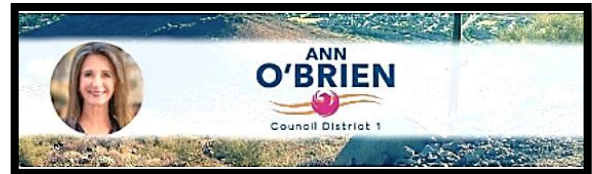

Message from Councilwoman Ann O'Brien

For the first time, we will have retired Phoenix Police Officers serving as School Resource Officers this fall! This historic change is a result of me working with state leaders to craft legislation that allows retired Arizona police officers to return to service in our schools without jeopardizing their pensions or creating additional liability for taxpayers. This week, I joined my colleagues on the Public Safety and Justice Subcommittee to recommend agreements for 69 School Resource Officers across 20 school districts. That includes two formerly retired officers. I'm hopeful the numbers will grow now that we have a system in place that invites retired officers to return and support our students and teachers.

The Council has approved an architectural services contract for Fire Station 93 to be built at 28th Drive and Sahuaro Drive, just off Interstate 17. The new single-story station will improve response times, support residents and businesses, and provide our firefighters with the resources they need to serve the community effectively. As Northwest Phoenix continues to grow, with major developments like The Metropolitan and the TSMC employment corridor, we must ensure our public safety infrastructure grows with it. The design process will include public input, and I'll be sure to keep you in the loop!

Phoenix Firefighters have already responded to nearly 75 mountain rescues this year. [The Trails Heat Safety Program restricts certain trail access](#) from 8am to 5pm on days that the National Weather Service issues Extreme Heat Warnings. The issue is not just about protecting hikers, but also our firefighters and rescue personnel. When someone becomes stranded or suffers a heat-related illness on a mountain trail during extreme temperatures, our first responders must carry more than 145 pounds of equipment up steep terrain in dangerous conditions. Every unnecessary rescue places those men and women at risk. When we make smart decisions, we protect ourselves and our families, and we help ensure our first responders can return home safely at the end of their shift.

NATIONAL MOSQUITO CONTROL AWARENESS

How Maricopa County Protects Communities, And How You Can Protect Yourself

As the temperature rises, the summer heat isn't the only thing to worry about. Mosquito season is here, and for National Mosquito Control Awareness Week and beyond, please ensure you have proper protection if you are outside for any prolonged amount of time.

Mosquitoes aren't just a nuisance or a tickle on your skin, but they can be a serious health risk, particularly certain ones that come after storms and are active at night. A small number of this mosquito population can be infected with diseases such as encephalitis and West Nile Virus (WNV). Current reports of infection are outpacing last year's totals, as there have already been [17 instances of WNV this year](#) in Maricopa County, including one death.

What MCESD's Vector Control Program Does

The Maricopa County Environmental Services Department (MCESD) Vector Control Program helps protect public health by reducing the risk of mosquito-borne diseases. It's important to know that this is not a general pest control service — our work focuses specifically on preventing mosquitoes that can spread disease, not on controlling nuisance insects that don't carry illnesses. County residents may contact MCESD at (602) 506-6616 to report increased mosquito activity or breeding. When mosquito activity increases, MCESD gets many complaints. Staff investigate each complaint in the order received. During these times, you can help by submitting one complaint per concern. If you have questions or want to learn more, please click the button below. There are steps you can take to protect yourself from these pesky insects. Remember the Four Rs:

- **REPEL** mosquitoes using an EPA-registered insect repellent
- **REMOVE** standing water from your home and yard
- **REPAIR** or replace damaged windows and door screens
- **REMIN**d your family, friends, and neighbors about mosquito safety.



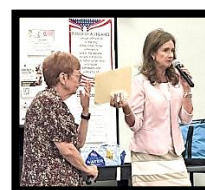
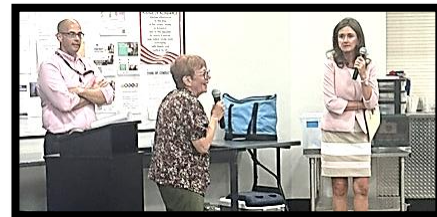
PROPOSED FAA FLIGHT PATTERN CHANGES

BLIGHT AND ZONING LAWS (Updated!)

VEGETATION: Property owners are responsible for their properties and the adjacent rights-of-way free of dead or dried vegetation (weeds, tall grass, tumbleweeds, shrubs, trees, palm fronds, etc.) All dead or dried vegetation must be removed and disposed of properly. Property owners also are responsible for assuring that grass and weeds on their property and in the adjacent rights-of-way do not exceed six inches in height and that the lawn grass is maintained at six inches or shorter.

GRAFFITI: Graffiti must immediately be removed from all sidewalks, walls, fences, signs, and other structures or surfaces visible from beyond the property line. This is the responsibility of the property owner. Free paint and graffiti removal supplies are available. Assistance is available for those unable to physically remove graffiti themselves. Remember, graffiti is a crime. Call 911 if you witness graffiti in progress.

NON-DUSTPROOF PARKING: Designated parking and maneuvering areas must be dust-proofed according to specifications. Parking or maneuvering vehicles anywhere other than these designated areas may be a violation. No more than **50 percent** of the required front yard of a single family or duplex residential property may be used for parking or maneuvering.

INOPERABLE VEHICLES: Inoperable vehicles must not be visible from beyond the property line. An inoperable vehicle is one that is not equipped with all parts that are required to legally and safely operate on public streets and/or cannot be driven under its own power. Tarps, shade screens, and other similar materials are not acceptable screening.

FENCES IN DISREPAIR: Fencing and screening walls must be structurally sound and made from the same materials. They also must be maintained so that they are free from deterioration and blight. Fences in residential zones cannot be higher than 40 inches in the required front yard and 6 feet in the required rear yard.

VACANT & ACCESSIBLE STRUCTURES: Property owners are responsible for maintaining structures and grounds of a property. All vacant structures must be kept secure, so they cannot be opened from the outside. A property owner may be required to board up a structure to City specifications if it becomes vacant and is not secure. Accessory structures on the property, such as storage sheds and garages, also must be secured to City specifications. Boarding up a structure is a one-time, temporary securement option. Rehabilitation or demolition of a structure may be required under certain conditions.

JUNK, LITTER & DEBRIS: Junk, litter and debris cannot be left on the property. It must be disposed of properly. This includes discarded or broken auto parts, furniture, building and/or landscaping material and tires, litter such as discarded paper, cardboard, plastics, etc., debris such as tree trimmings and fallen tree limbs or any other items that have been discarded.

OUTSIDE STORAGE: Outside storage on residentially zoned properties that can be seen from beyond the property line is not allowed. Generally, any equipment, building or landscaping materials, parts/auto parts, appliances or any scrap items may not be visible. Boats, campers and other similar personal items may be stored in a limited area of the rear yard of residentially zoned properties. There are specific regulations that apply to outdoor storage and use on properties zoned for other than residential use.

ABANDONED SHOPPING CART RETRIEVAL PROGRAM

The City of Phoenix Abandoned Shopping Cart Retrieval Program strives to remove empty, abandoned shopping carts found off-premises city-wide, from public right of way, sidewalks, and City streets within 2 business days of the complaint.

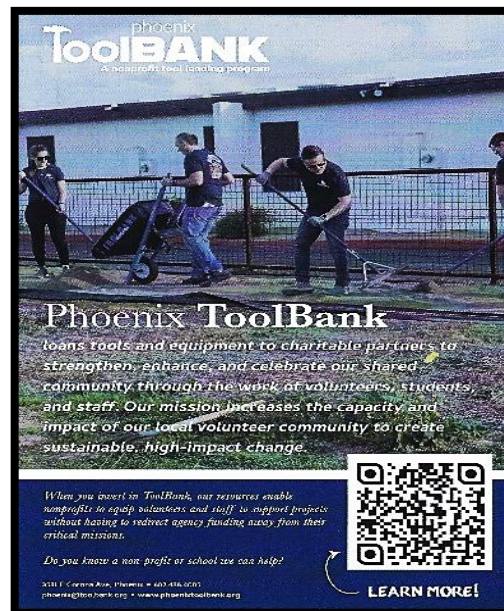

CRIME TIPS:

HELP PROTECT LOVED ONES FROM SCAMS

The scourge of elder financial abuse takes two forms—known perpetrators abusing the trust and needs of older adults and criminal perpetrators seeking to make them believe something that isn't true to steal from them. Both types of this crime are vastly under-reported. However, the [Federal Trade Commission](#), accounting for underreporting scams, estimates that criminals stole as much as \$81.5 billion from adults age 60 and over in 2024 alone. Let World Elder Abuse Awareness Day on June 15, remind us to be proactive to deter financial crimes.

Protect Financial Accounts

Bank online. It is safer than traditional banking in that it gives account holders 24/7 access to review activity and allows for real-time alerts to flag suspicious transactions. It can also prevent criminals from setting up online access to our accounts if we haven't already done so. Add a trusted contact to financial accounts. This person can't make transactions but can be alerted to suspicious activity or if the account holder can't be reached.

Monitor and Freeze Credit

Review your credit reports for unauthorized activity. You can request [free credit reports](#) from each of the three credit bureaus—Equifax, Experian and TransUnion—at [annualcreditreport.com](#). Place a [credit freeze](#) with each bureau to help prevent new financial accounts from being opened using stolen information.

Block Unwanted Calls and Text Messages

Check with your phone carrier or a trusted third party for free or low-cost call and text blocking services to keep the spam and scam robocalls at bay.

Add all your numbers to the FTC's Do Not Call Registry ([donotcall.gov](#)). While it won't stop scammers, it can reduce legitimate telemarketing calls and texts.

If your smartphone has a "Report Spam" option, use it to flag the message to your carrier.

A BIG WIN—OR A BIG SCAM?

[Sweepstakes scams](#) have been around for decades, and they continue to work because they tap into something powerful: the excitement and emotions that come with the possibility of winning big. Right now, the AARP Fraud Watch Network™ Helpline is seeing a spike in reports of these scams.

Before you or a loved one celebrates a big win, know the warning signs of this scam.

HOW IT WORKS

You receive an unexpected call, text, email, or letter claiming you've won a sweepstakes, lottery, or other prize.

Before you can collect your winnings, you're told you must pay fees, taxes, shipping costs, or other charges.

You may be asked for personal information and directed to pay a specific way via wire transfer, a payment app, gift cards, or cryptocurrency.

WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW

To appear legitimate, criminals often impersonate government agencies or trusted organizations, such as [Publishers Clearing House](#) (which is now in bankruptcy).

Some scammers even use video calls, fake badges, and official-looking documents to convince you that the prize is real.

You can't win a contest you never entered, and legitimate prizes don't require payment to claim them.

Like many scams, sweepstakes scams share three key red flags: unexpected contact that leads to a surge of emotion and contains urgency.

WHAT YOU SHOULD DO

When you notice these three red flags together, take what AARP calls an "active pause"—an intentional step back to think through the situation, and consider what you know about it. That brief pause can help you spot the scam before you have money or personal information stolen.

If you're not sure about a contest or company, search their name online with terms like "review," "complaint," or "scam" to see what others are reporting.

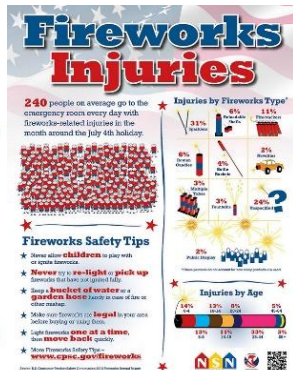

Your information and the code to the lockbox is provided only to firefighters in the event there is an emergency call to your home. You will need to provide the appropriate key or keys to put in the lockbox at the time of the delivery.

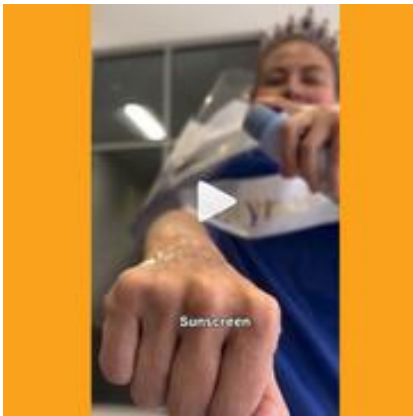

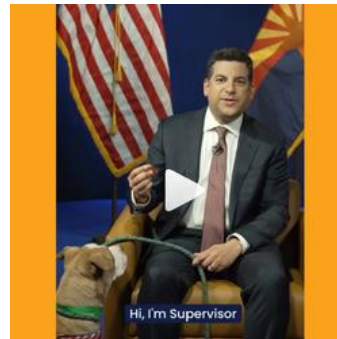

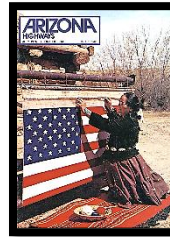

The Yard Sign Pilot Program aims to influence safer driver behavior on neighborhood streets where children and other pedestrians are likely to be walking, jogging or bicycling. Residents and businesses are encouraged to plant a free sign on their property. You can pick up your sign in person at any one of five designated Parks and Recreation Department community centers:

People experiencing a mental health crisis have a new way to reach out for help in the U.S.

They can simply call or text the numbers 9-8-8.

Modeled after 911, the new three-digit [988 Suicide & Crisis Lifeline](#) is designed to be a memorable and quick number that connects people who are suicidal or in any other mental health crisis to a trained mental health professional.

"If you are willing to turn to someone in your moment of crisis, 988 will be there," said Xavier Becerra, the secretary of the federal Department of Health and Human Services, at a recent press briefing. "988 won't be a busy signal, and 988 won't put you on hold. You will get help."

The primary goal of the new number is to make it easier for people to call for help. Lawmakers and mental health advocates also see this launch as an opportunity to transform the mental health care system and make care easily accessible everywhere in the United States.

Suicide Warning Signs

These signs may mean someone is at risk for suicide. Risk is greater if a behavior is new or has increased and if it seems related to a painful event, loss, or change.

 SHANNON'S LAW**



Shannon's Law refers to specific changes in [Arizona statutes](#), enacted in 2000, making it a [felony](#) offense to discharge [firearms](#) randomly into the air.^[2]

History
 Shannon's law is named after Shannon Smith, a fourteen-year-old [Phoenix](#) girl killed by a stray bullet in June 1999. Smith's parents, after being informed that the assailant's activity constituted, at most, a [misdemeanor](#) offense, advocated stronger penalties, to prevent future incidents of this kind.^[3]

The City of Phoenix uses a humane, effective approach to manage feral cat populations through Trap-Neuter-Return (TNR); a proven method that helps both community members and cats thrive.



- ✓ Cats are safely trapped
 - ✓ Spayed/neutered and vaccinated
 - ✓ Returned to their original location
- Ear-tipping shows a cat has already been fixed and vaccinated

Why TNR matters:

- Reduces fighting, spraying, and loud yowling
- Keeps cats healthier and closer to their food source
- Prevents new, unaltered cats from moving in
- Humanely reduces the overall cat population over time
