n the past year, we have made significant strides as an organisation. We have built upon the strong foundation established by our programs, enabling our beneficiaries and ourselves to grow.

The Community Health Entrepreneurs (CHEs) are at the heart of our work. For over a decade, they have risen to the challenges presented and worked diligently to transform the mindset of those living in their communities. The CHE program has given a voice to over 6,000 previously marginalised women in rural India, equipping them with knowledge and empowering them to take charge of their lives.

We have expanded our program and enhanced the skills of our CHEs. Through the Telehealth program, 167 CHEs have been trained to utilise mobile applications, including telehealth and data collection apps, which connect them with 44 healthcare centres and 14 network hospitals. As a result, these communities now have access to the medical attention thev may otherwise lacked. This year, we have expanded our Telehealth program to 248 villages in UP, Bihar and Jharkhand.

The CHEs have played a crucial role in data collection, developing grassroots solutions, and ensuring a continuum of care.

With the support received by Healing Fields, we have uplifted these women CHEs and helped them realise their potential as health catalysts. We are grateful for the tremendous commitment the CHEs to their work and of communities, as well as the dedicated efforts of the Healing Fields team, which consists of over 90 members who work tirelessly alongside them. We would also like to express our gratitude to our collaborators—Swaasa Pathshod and Devices—as well as the government frontline health workers and the network hospitals. Our heartfelt thanks go to our esteemed Board Members and the generous donors who make our work possible. To all stakeholders, we extend our best wishes.

INTRODUCTION



ealing Fields Foundation is a 23year-old Ashoka Fellow-led NGO. Our vision is to build an ingenious, community-first community-based, ecosystem that ensures access to affordable and quality healthcare for all, especially women from resourcepoor communities. Healing Fields Foundation provides training and support for women as health change agents in their communities. Healing Fields works in rural areas of poorer states to impact change in the areas with the greatest need. Our approach is comprehensive - working to prevent health problems through education; facilitate access to health services, entitlements from the government and health products; and treat minor health concerns and follow up with care.

To build an ecosystem that ensures access to affordable and quality healthcare for all, especially women from resource-poor communities.

PROGRAMME OVERVIEW

COMMUNITY HEALTH ENTREPRENEURS PROGRAMME



Community Health Entrepreneur Programme is Healing Fields flagship programme that harnesses the power and passion of women to be catalysts for change. CHEs are selected from resource-poor communities in rural India. They are trained in basic first-aid, prevention of illnesses, entrepreneurship, and educated on health and hygiene measures. They act as first responders to minor health concerns, working as health agents of change, enabling an ecosystem that ensures access to quality and affordable healthcare.

CHEs facilitate access to government entitlements and earn a steady income by promoting sanitary napkins, nutritional powders, pregnancy kits, Kitchen Gardens and facilitating teleconsultations by equipping them with digital literacy to monitor and evaluate local registries and use data as evidence to provide feasible solutions to health issues.




Fig. no. 1 Data vegetables cultivated

This chart displays the vegetables commonly cultivated in kitchen gardens facilitated by our CHEs.

Technology helps us intensify our efforts, streamline our operations and allow scaled implementation without sacrificing quality.

CHEs are provided with digital literacy training and support in order to anchor digital forms for surveys and reporting. This has helped the CHEs in maximising their potential and reporting their work better. This generates accurate, real-time data for not just monitoring but also generating evidence for programme improvement. CHEs use these digital tools for a Community Registry, which captures data on socio-demographics, access to entitlements, health behaviour, and pre-existing conditions. Data is anonymised, aggregated and shared with collaborators like frontline functionaries and government decision-makers to build a strong health ecosystem.

In order to facilitate telehealth consultations, CHEs use an application to capture patient history and vitals. This information is available to the doctor during the consultation, and the next steps are available in the application so CHEs can follow up with patients.

Platforms like Zoom and ECHO India prove essential to disseminate knowledge to the CHEs during situations where in-person training is not feasible, such as the COVID-19 pandemic and heat waves.

TELEHEALTH PROGRAMME



A ccess to healthcare in rural India is often limited; at Healing Fields Foundation, we believe affordable and quality healthcare should be accessible to everyone. Therefore, we launched the Telehealth programme in Muzaffarpur, Ballia, Gaya, Aurangabad and Hariharganj to provide healthcare facilities through digital mediums.

By leveraging our vast network of CHEs and the power of technology, we connect doctors with patients in the remotest parts of India through the Telehealth App.

- 248 villages have access to telehealth, quality consultations, and a continuum of care
- 5,520 teleconsultations facilitated
- In Ballia and Muzaffarpur, the Swaasa App was adopted to provide lung health assessments for those with respiratory illnesses.
- We partnered with CMAI, where 16
 Healing Fields' staff enrolled for
 Master Trainer Certificates in First
 Aid, and 350 CHEs enrolled to
 receive First Aid Training with the
 institution.
- We have MoUs with 44 healthcare facilities, including 14 hospitals and tertiary care facilities for teleconsultations with doctors and pharmacies.

Age Vs Gender Distribution




Fig. no. 2 Age Group

Women often encounter greater obstacles when attempting to access healthcare, such as the expenses associated with travel or the freedom to leave their villages in order to seek medical treatment.

Based on our data, an increasing number of women are opting for teleconsultations, constituting 65% of all patients. Furthermore, the largest age group among our patients falls within the 21-41 years old range.

Conditions Treated Through Teleconsultations




Fig. no. 3 Associate Symptoms Data

Based on our findings, fever and associated symptoms, as well as non-communicable diseases (NCDs), are prevalent conditions treated, constituting 21.3% and 17.8% of cases, respectively.

CHE FELLOWSHIP PROGRAMME



his year marked the launch of our CHE Fellowship Programme, dedicated to empowering women leaders to collaboratively establish and sustain model villages where individuals, households, and communities flourish. Our goal is to bolster the local ecosystems of support for these grassroots women leaders, establishing them as role models for village councils and community influencers.

Selected CHEs undergo comprehensive training in leadership and capacity building exercises tailored for their villages. This training comprises of workshops, brief field assignments, Master Classes conducted by esteemed grassroots changemakers from diverse regions, and engaging dialogues with local mentors and influencers.

Through forging connections with village councils and other influential decision-makers united in the shared vision of cultivating model villages, CHEs can present impactful ideas and secure seed funding to propel their villages toward model status.





SCHOOL HEALTH CHAMPIONS

he School Health Education programme trains adolescent girls and boys attending government and affordable private schools on health. The training covers hygiene, nutrition and menstrual hygiene, with a special focus on adolescent health. These students become leaders of change in behaviour and practice within their schools and communities. During the COVID-19 pandemic, 540 students were trained in the preventative measures of the disease, i.e. the importance of masks, distancing, handwashing, cleanliness and the isolation of the sick. These School Health champions participate in health camps held in their schools and are essential in spreading information about health and wellness to their families.

To date, we have worked with 160 schools in Bihar and Telangana.











FACES OF CHANGE: STORIES FROM OUR HEALING FIELDS

Our Community Health Entrepreneurs are shining examples of the profound impact health agents can make within communities. We can observe this through the work of Anjani Kumari, a Telehealth CHE from Palamu, Jharkhand

Since joining Healing Fields Foundation, Anjani has become a health change agent in her village through her involvement in various activities such as community interactions, health sessions and discussions on awareness of women's health. Her efforts have made her a respected community member, and people in the village now recognise her as a go-to person for health issues.

One such instance was in March 2023, when Meera Devi, aged 35, was suffering from a skin infection. Despite taking medication prescribed by another doctor for 15 days, Meera's infection had not improved. In search of some relief, she approached Anjani for assistance.

Anjani's first task was to collect all of Meera's information to approach the telehealth team to book an appointment with a doctor. Anjani facilitated a consultation through a video call for Meera and sent the doctor photos of the infected regions upon his request. The doctor prescribed new medications for Meera, which helped reduce her symptoms from the first day she began using them. After a second consultation, the doctor prescribed her medication for another 15 days. Meera's skin infection improved significantly with the new treatment plan and follow-up check-ups facilitated by Anjani. As advised by the doctor, she continues to take precautions to reduce the chances of a re-infection.



Meet ANJANI KUMARI

"I WANT TO ADDRESS THE WATER SCARCITY ISSUE IN MY VILLAGE BECAUSE I BELIEVE THAT INADEQUATE SOURCES OF DRINKING WATER ARE CONTRIBUTING TO THE POOR HEALTH OF THE RESIDENTS."

The success of Meera's treatment has generated interest in telehealth consultations among the community. Although some are still hesitant and prefer physical visits to the doctor, Anjani believes that with more successful treatments, people in the village will become more comfortable with telehealth as a reliable option for healthcare.

Meet SANJU DEVI

"I FIND IT VERY INTERESTING TO EDUCATE WOMEN IN THE VILLAGE ABOUT HEALTH ISSUES, AND I BELIEVE IT HAS MADE ME MORE AWARE OF VARIOUS ASPECTS OF HEALTH."

Sanju Devi, from Ballia, Uttar Pradesh, began her work with the Healing Fields Foundation in 2014, dedicating herself to uplifting her village and creating a disease-free community. During her surveys, Sanju discovered that open defecation was a significant cause of uncleanliness on her village's roads and open spaces. She found that 70 households lacked access to toilet facilities, forcing members to defecate in public areas.

After identifying this issue, Sanju immediately brought it to the attention of the Pradhan and requested that the government grant funds to build toilets in the homes that lacked them under the Swachh Bharat Mission. Once the funds

were granted and the toilets were constructed, Sanju conducted another survey to ensure their functionality. To her surprise, she found that some households used the toilets for purposes other than sanitation.

Sanju then held sessions to educate the community on the benefits of using toilets and the detrimental impact of open defecation on health and cleanliness. This helped raise awareness and bring change to people's behaviour. Sanju's dedication and hard work have resulted in a cleaner and healthier village, and her efforts serve as an inspiration for others to follow in her footsteps.

Meet RENU DEVI

n 2022, Renu Devi, a Community Health Entrepreneur from Sanahpur village in Darbhanga, Bihar, joined Healing Fields. When she conducted a household survey in her village, she discovered many community members were suffering from various untreated illnesses, as the nearest hospital was 15 km away.

With Healing Fields' support, Renu raised this issue with her Gram Pradhan, and together, they approached the local Community Health Centre (CHC) to organise a health camp in the village. Collaborating with the Pradhan, MOIC, and the CHC, they successfully organised a health camp.

Managed by CHEs and Healing Fields staff, the camp registered 170 individuals for checkups. Medical staff, including female doctors, provided training on self-checkups for breast cancer screening and conducted tests for diabetes and blood pressure and check-ups for expectant mothers. COVID-19 vaccinations were administered, and many patients received referrals to their local district hospital.

Renu Devi's ability to problem solve earned her the respect of ASHA and ANM representatives. The village Pradhan encourages Healing Fields and Renu to continue organising health camps to ensure community members receive medical attention for a healthier life.

PARTNERS AND COLLABORATIONS

RCRC

Healing Fields is a part of RCRC, which offers us opportunities for partnerships, advocacy, and cutting-edge research. We participated in RCRC's comprehensive household survey with IIM Ahmedabad. Within the RCRC network, Mukti Bosco is a member of the Working Committee, and Gayathri Prashanth is a part of the Gender and Research Committee.

JEEVIKA

Our collaboration with Jeevika has extended our foundational training programmes to Imamganj and Gaya, Bihar, where 60 CHEs have been trained, and to Muzaffarpur, UP, where another 60 CHEs underwent training.

DISTRICT COLLABORATIONS

We are making meaningful connections with DDC officers and District administrations that help acquaint local representatives with the purpose and impact of Healing Fields. In Muzzafarpur, we sought the support of DDC officers to conduct surveys.

HAQDARSHAK

With the Haqdarshak application, our CHEs have been able to upskill, screen community members for entitlements, and facilitate access while earning an income.



SWAASA

The Swaasa app facilitates remote screenings for coughs, enabling lung health assessments for patients. We have implemented this app in Ballia and Muzaffarpur, UP for Telehealth CHEs to conduct lung health assessments for individuals with respiratory illnesses.

DATAOGRAM

Through Dataogram, CHEs can use their survey and database tools to collect data for to create family profiles in their community registry. They use the application to conduct simple surveys and call log systems to test telehealth data fields and build CHE skill sets.

GRAAMVANI

With Graamvani, we developed an interactive voice recognition system that gives information, collects feedback on key health services, and allows requests for help.



JPAL

We have partnered with JPAL researchers to conduct a randomised control trial evaluating the impact that Community Health Entrepreneurs and the Telehealth Programme have on their communities.

NATIONAL INSTITUTE FOR NUTRITION (NIN)

We have an MoU with NIN, where we are currently working on formative research for a bio-behavioural study aimed at preventing non-communicable diseases through changes in lifestyle and behaviour.

BRIDGESPAN'S NONPROFIT DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

In partnership with Bridgespan, Healing Fields is participating in their Achieving Strategic programme. We have had the opportunity to establish our impact goals and utilise tools to map out the strategies to achieve them.
