GENERAL JAMES T CONWAY

James Terry Conway (born December 26, 1947) is a retired United States Marine Corps four-star general who served as the 34th Commandant of the Marine Corps. Among his previous postings were Director of Operations (J-3) on the Joint Chiefs of Staff, Commanding General of 1st Marine Division and I Marine Expeditionary Force, taking part in the 2003 invasion of Iraq and the First Battle of Fallujah.

Early life and education

Conway was born in Walnut Ridge, Arkansas. He graduated from Roosevelt High School in St. Louis, Missouri, and then attended Southeast Missouri State University, where he was a member of the Sigma Phi Epsilon fraternity, graduating in 1969 with a Bachelor of Science degree in psychology. Conway is a graduate of the Infantry Officers Advanced Course, the Marine Corps Command and Staff College, and the Air War College. He was commissioned as an infantry officer in 1970.

LEGISLATIVE NEWS

Hey everyone, it's Cletis here with some interesting information.

We, as United States Marines, and fellow FMF Corpsmen, Chaplains, and Auxiliary members, must use the most important asset to make a change - YOUR VOICE. Your voice matters and we want you to let your local, state, and national representatives know how YOU FEEL about certain subjects that effect Active Duty, Reserve, National Guard, and you - the Veteran.

The Marine Corps League is one of several Veteran Service Organizations (VSO) that lobby to protect and preserve our rights and benefits. Other VSOs include but are not limited to, American Veterans (AMVETS), Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW), American Legion, Military Officer Association of America (MOAA), the Noncommissioned Officer Association of America (NCOA).

The Marine Corps League National Legislative Committee website has a very broad and general website that points the member to a link called "The Military Coalition". The Military Coalition is made up of 35 plus VSOs. The next link will take you to the Military Coalition Members page. From here, you can see and click on individual VSO links should you desire to seek additional information. TMC Members - The Military Coalition

REMEMBER WHAT I SAID - Knowledge is power. The best thing about the links I am sharing with you is that they DO NOT require you to be a member in order to read or click on their links.

In April 2025, I participated in the Advocacy In Action campaign with the Military Officers Association of America organization for three days in Washington, DC. Our mission was to lobby 5-7 position papers which were goals established by MOAA to every single representative in the US House and every Senator. I was fortunate to meet at least a senior staffer in each officer and by luck was able to talk with Congressman Comer directly.

The agenda included the following topics:

Military Spouses Can't Wait - Add Them to the Work Opportunity Tax Credit

Military spouses face a 21% unemployment rate, five times the national average, due to frequent moves and challenges tied to military life. Congress must incentivize employers to hire military spouses by adding them as a target group under the Work Opportunity Tax Credit (WOTC) program.

Stop the 34-Year Wait - Deliver Toxic-Exposed Veterans the Care They've Earned

Veterans exposed to toxic substances like Agent Orange, chemicals released by burn pits, and radiation should not have to fight for decades to prove their illnesses are service-connected. Yet according to a recent report from MOAA and DAV, toxic -exposed veterans wait over 34 years on average before receiving presumptive service connection and the care they've earned. The PACT Act was a historic step forward, but its work isn't complete.

Congress must pass legislation to bolster the legal framework for establishing presumptive conditions, creating clear timelines and processes to move from exposure acknowledgment to the delivery of earned benefits. This commonsense reform will cut through red tape, improve VA accountability, and end the long wait faced by millions of veterans.



Conway's first assignment was command of a rifle platoon with 3rd Battalion 1st Marines, based at Camp Pendleton. He also served as the battalion's 106mm recoilless rifle platoon commander. Later, he served as Marine detachment executive officer aboard the aircraft carrier USS *Kitty Hawk* (CV-63) and as commanding officer of the Sea School at Marine Corps Recruit Depot San Diego.

After graduating with honors from the Army's Infantry Officers Advanced Course, Conway commanded two companies in the 2nd Marine Regiment's Operations and Security section. As a field grade officer, he commanded two companies of students and taught tactics at The Basic School. He then went on to serve as operations officer for the 31st Marine Amphibious Unit, with sea duty in the western Pacific and in contingency operations off Beirut, Lebanon.

Returning to the United States, Conway was assigned as Senior Aide to the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff for two years. After graduating from Marine Corps Command and Staff College with honors, he took command of 3rd Battalion, 2nd Marines through its eight-month deployment to Southwest Asia during the Gulf War.

It was during this time that then, Marine Sergeant Cletis Evans, a radio repairman with 2nd AA Bn, Alpha Co, was assigned to the AAVC7A1 vehicle that then LtCol Conway rode on. An incident occurred in which LtCol Conway was profusely mad that Sgt Evans was just laying around the amphibious assault vehicle taking it easy when the Colonel suggested he make some coffee. Ask Cletis about this incident and he will tell you what happened in November 2007 when the 34th Commandant made a surprise visit to see the Marines in Fallujah for Thanksqiving.

After the war, he was promoted to Colonel and assigned command of The Basic School. In 1992–1993, he attended MIT Seminar XXI. Promoted to Brigadier General in December 1995, he again was assigned to the Joint Chiefs and later served as president of the Marine Corps University.

After being promoted to Major General, he served as commander of the 1st Marine Division and as Deputy Commanding General of Marine Forces Central. He was promoted to Lieutenant General and assumed command of I Marine Expeditionary Force (I MEF) on November 16, 2002. He commanded I MEF during two combat tours in Iraq, with 60,000 troops under his command, including Marines, soldiers, sailors, and British forces. In the book *The Iraq War*, Conway was described as, "big, buff, well read and well educated ... he represented all that was best about the new United States Marine Corps, which General Al Gray as the commandant had set up."

On June 13, 2006, Conway was nominated by President George W. Bush to become the 34th Commandant of the Marine Corps; the nomination was confirmed by the Senate on August 2, 2006. On November 13, Conway was promoted to the rank of General at Marine Barracks, Washington, D.C., and became the 34th Commandant of the Marine Corps. He was the first Commandant in nearly 40 years to have not served in the Vietnam War.

On October 22, 2010, Conway turned the position of Commandant over to General James F. Amos, his Assistant Commandant, at a ceremony at Marine Barracks, Washington, D.C., Defense Secretary Robert Gates presented Conway with his third Defense Distinguished Service Medal during the change-in-command. He then retired on November 1.

Conway is married to Anette Conway and together they have three children, two sons, currently serving in the Marine Corps, and a daughter

Black Sheep Squadron Begins Marine Aviation Involvement in Korean War

On August 3, 1950, eight Corsair fighter planes launched from the USS Sicily and carried out the first Marine aviation mission in the Korean War. The raid targeted enemy installations with incendiary bombs, rockets, and strafing runs near Inchon, Korea. The Corsairs were with VMF-214, more famously known as the "Black Sheep" squadron of World War II. (Pictured is 4 USMC Vought FSU-1 fighters armed with Bombs.)



U.S. Troops and Aircraft Sent to Saudi Arabia

On August 7, 1990, President George H.W. Bush ordered U.S. military troops and aircraft to Saudi Arabia as part of a multinational force to defend

that nation against possible Iraqi invasion. The following week, the Marine Corps announced that it had committed 45,000 Marines to the Persian Gulf area as a part of Operation Desert Shield, which would become the largest deployment of U.S. forces since the Vietnam War. Marines Return Home from Lebanon

On August 23, 1984, the last Marines to serve on peace-keeping duty in Lebanon arrived back in Ameria. The 24th Marine Amphibious Unit (MAU)

arrived off the coast of Lebanon on 9 April to relieve Marines of the 22nd MAU, who were guarding the U.S. Embassy in Beirut. The 24th MAU left Beirut on 31 July, marking the end of U.S. combat troops in Beirut for the first time since Marines had entered the city almost two years earlier.
