Issue:

UDO Text Amendment: City staff has drafted an amendment to Section 5.04 of the UDO to allow the keeping of female chickens (hens) as an accessory use for single-family detached residences in all zoning districts subject to specific standards and conditions.

Background:

The City's current zoning regulations prohibit the keeping of any livestock including chickens inside the city limits. Livestock including chickens may be kept in the R-20 and R-7A zones in the ETJ subject to specific standards and conditions. City staff receives inquiries on a regular basis regarding the keeping of chickens inside the city limits. In discussions with citizens, the interest is primarily based on the desire to have fresh eggs from a known local food source, which are also much cheaper than those purchased in the grocery store.

The proposed text amendment was originally drafted by City staff in October of 2012 and presented to the Planning Board in response to multiple inquiries from residents interested in keeping hens for egg production. At that time the Board was uncomfortable allowing the keeping of hens in the City, so the amendment was not presented for City Council's consideration.

In the years following, code enforcement activities related to the keeping of laying hens gradually became a low priority – staff had more pressing issues. Code Enforcement staff did not issue notices of zoning violation if neighbors were not complaining, if chickens were not free-ranging and properly contained in an enclosure; there were no roosters present; and there were not an excessive number of chickens.

To the best knowledge/recollection of City staff, there have only been two complaints received regarding the keeping of chickens during the last decade. One was a citizen who had accumulated over 50 chickens, which he promptly reduced to less than 10 after a conversation with the Code Enforcement Officer; and the second was a citizen who simply did not like the fact the neighbor had a few laying hens.

City staff has no official count on the number of backyard chicken coops in the City; however, a reasonable estimate by Code Enforcement staff is two dozen. City staff decided to revisit the proposed text amendment because of the recurring interest/inquiries from citizens; and the fact that multiple citizens are currently keeping chickens with little if any detrimental consequence to adjacent neighbors.

Staff Comments:

1. A copy of Section 5.04: Keeping of Non-household Animals – is included in the agenda packet for the Board's reference. The proposed amendment adds the red, underlined text.
2. The proposed amendment also includes the addition of three terms to Section 15.01: Definitions (chickens, chicken coop, and chicken pen).
3. As a point of reference, during the initial research to draft this amendment, City staff found that every municipality in Wake County had some allowance/accommodations for laying hens in

residential zoning classifications with varying conditions/standards. The Town of Southern Pines allows up to 10 laying hens in all residential zones.

4. The issues of urban agriculture, community gardens and the promotion of healthy, sustainable, local food sources are the topics of several recent Planning Advisory Service Reports from the American Planning Association (APA) and session topics at recent years annual NCAPA conferences.

Staff Recommendation:

City staff recommends the Board review and discuss the proposed text amendment. This is not a time sensitive issue, so if the Board wants some time to consider it, please do so.

Planning Board Recommendation:

The Planning Board reviewed the request at their January 6, 2026 regular meeting and recommended unanimously that the City Council amend Section 5.04 and Section 15.01 as proposed.

Amend Section 5.04 as proposed by the red, underlined text below:

Section 5.04: Keeping of Non-household Animals

- (A) The keeping of non-household animals including but not limited to horses, cows, hogs, and fowl shall be prohibited inside the corporate limits of the City of Rockingham except as provided in subsection (D) below.
- (B) The keeping of non-household animals including but not limited to horses, cows, hogs, and fowl shall be permitted on property zoned R-20 and R-7A in the City's extraterritorial jurisdiction provided the following requirements are met.
- (1) Non-household animals shall be associated with a bona-fide farm operation or on property of a sufficient size to properly accommodate such animals.
 - (2) Non-household animals shall be contained on the property by a fence or other acceptable means. Fences shall be of an appropriate height to protect the non-household animals and the neighboring properties.
 - (3) The property shall not be used as a breeding facility, except in the case of a bona-fide farm operation.
 - (4) The property shall not emit any obnoxious smells, odor, noises, or other conditions that constitute a nuisance.
 - (5) The property shall be maintained regularly for the safety and health of both the animals and the public.
 - (6) Upon receiving a written and signed complaint from any resident or property owner within two hundred (200) feet of the property on which the non-household animal is located, the Board of Adjustment and Appeals shall review the complaint and conduct a properly advertised public hearing to determine if the non-household animal is in violation of the above criteria. After the public hearing, the Board may dismiss the complaint; order the removal of the non-household animals; or place reasonable conditions in order to satisfy the above criteria.
- (C) The keeping of horses shall be permitted on property zoned R-12 in the City's extraterritorial jurisdiction provided such property is a minimum of ten (10) acres in size and subject to the requirements set forth in the above subsection (B)(1) through (6).
- (D) The keeping of chickens shall be permitted as an accessory use in conjunction with detached single-family residence uses in all zoning districts in the corporate limits and extraterritorial jurisdiction provided the following requirements are met.
- (1) The maximum number of female chickens (hens) allowed shall be six (6) per lot. No roosters shall be permitted.
 - (2) The chickens shall be for personal use only. Eggs, chicks, adult chickens, and processed chickens shall not be sold. Chicken manure and compost using chicken manure shall not be sold or otherwise distributed.
 - (3) A chicken coop and pen shall be provided, and such coops and enclosures shall not include residential structures or garages. Chickens shall be secured in the chicken coop during non-daylight hours. During daylight hours, chickens may be located in the chicken pen.

- (4) Chicken coops (whether stationary or moveable) and pens shall only be located in rear yards and shall be located a minimum of ten (10) feet from any adjoining property line.
- (5) The chicken coop and pen shall be properly designed and constructed to provide adequate security from rodents, wild birds, and predators; sufficient ventilation; and suitable shelter for the chickens.
- (6) Chickens shall have adequate access to feed, clean water, and bedding at all times. The chicken coop, chicken pen, and surrounding areas shall be kept in a neat and sanitary condition at all times to preclude odors and aesthetic nuisances. Chicken feed shall be stored in a secure container.
- (7) Chicken manure shall be disposed of or composted. All stored manure shall be completely contained in a waterproof container. Any compost using chicken manure shall be produced in an enclosed backyard composter.
- (8) The on-site slaughter of chickens shall be prohibited. If a chicken dies from causes other than slaughter, it shall be promptly placed into a plastic bag, which shall be closed securely and disposed of with household waste.

Amend Section 15.01 of the UDO to add the following definitions:

- Chicken: Any of the common domestic birds or fowl of the species Gallus gallus domesticus whose eggs or flesh are used for food. Also referred to as "poultry". The female bird is called a "hen".
- Chicken Coop: An enclosed structure for housing or sheltering chickens which contains nesting boxes for the chickens to sit in while laying their eggs as well as perches for the chickens to use while sleeping. Also referred to as a "henhouses".
- Chicken Pen: An open-air, outdoor area connected to or surrounding the coop which is surrounded with wire or mesh screening to cage and protect chickens from predators as they range outside the coop.

Re: Demolition Ordinance for Dilapidated Dwelling located at **205 S. Brookwood Avenue**

City staff recommends the City Council approve a demolition ordinance for the dilapidated dwelling located at 205 S. Brookwood Avenue and identified as Richmond County PIN 7473-14-34-6170. A copy of the demolition ordinance and photographs of the property are included in the agenda packet.

As background information, City staff initiated minimum housing proceedings in October of 2025. The property owner, the Beulah C. Crenshaw Memorial Trust c/o Bessie Young and all parties of interest were notified of a hearing with the Code Enforcement Officer regarding the condition of the dwelling. The notice was sent via certified and regular mail; published in the Richmond County Daily Journal; and posted on the subject property. Bessie Young attended the hearing with the Code Enforcement Officer. The Code Enforcement Officer issued his findings of fact and directed the property owners to either repair or demolish the dwelling by January 13, 2026. Again, the notice was sent via certified and regular mail; published in the Richmond County Daily Journal; and posted on the subject property. The property owners have taken no action to date to address the dilapidated dwelling.

AN ORDINANCE DIRECTING THE BUILDING INSPECTOR TO REMOVE OR DEMOLISH THE PROPERTY HEREIN DESCRIBED AS UNFIT FOR HUMAN HABITATION AND DIRECTING THAT A NOTICE BE PLACED THEREON THAT THE SAME MAY NOT BE OCCUPIED.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Rockingham finds that the dwelling described herein is unfit for human habitation under the City Housing Code, and that all the procedures of the Housing Code have been complied with; and

WHEREAS, this dwelling should be removed or demolished, as directed by the Building Inspector, and should be placarded by placing thereon a notice prohibiting use for human habitation; and

WHEREAS, the owners of this dwelling, the Beulah Crenshaw McRae Memorial Trust c/o Bessie Young have been given a reasonable opportunity to bring the dwelling up to the standards of the Housing Code in accordance with G.S. 160D-1203 pursuant to an order issued by the Building Inspector on October 15, 2025 and the owners have failed to comply with the order;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Rockingham, that:

- Section 1. The Building Inspector is hereby authorized and directed to place a placard containing the legend "*This building is unfit for human habitation; the use or occupation of this building for human habitation is prohibited and unlawful.*" on the building located at 205 S. Brookwood Avenue and identified by Richmond County PIN# 7473-14-34-6170.
- Section 2. The Building Inspector is hereby authorized and directed to proceed to remove or demolish the above-described dwelling in accordance with his order to the owner thereof dated October 15, 2025 and in accordance with the Housing Code and G.S. 160D-1203.
- Section 3. (a) The cost of removal or demolition shall constitute a lien against the real property upon which the cost was incurred. The lien shall be filed in the office of the City Tax Collector and City Clerk, and shall have the same priority and be collected in the same manner as the lien for special assessments in Article 10 of G.S. Chapter 160A.
- (b) Upon completion of the required removal or demolition, the Building Inspector shall sell the materials of the dwelling and credit the proceeds against the cost of removal or demolition. The Building Inspector shall certify the remaining balance to the Tax Collector. If a surplus remains after sale of the materials and satisfaction of the cost of removal or demolition, the Building Inspector shall deposit the surplus in the Superior Court where it shall be secured and disbursed in the manner provided by G.S 160D-1203.

Section 4. It shall be unlawful for any person to remove or cause to be removed the placard from any building to which it is affixed. It shall likewise be unlawful for any person to occupy or to permit the occupancy of any building therein declared to be unfit for human habitation.

Section 5. This ordinance shall become effective upon its adoption.

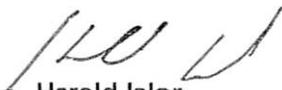
