2010 HOA Annual Meeting: Fun in Florida

The 2010 Horse of the Americas Annual
meeting, held at Sacred Horse Ranch, Inverness, FL, started out with typical balmy Nature
Coast weather - clear skies and a gentle breeze.
Friday night's gathering included a pot luck dinner with lots of good eats and great company.
The mid 70's temperature during the day gradually cooled to a chilly 45 degrees overnight, taking some attendees by surprise. Fortunately,
things warmed back up again quickly for Saturday's activities.

The first demonstration of the day was of primitive fire making in the 1830's Rocky Mountain Fur Trappers camp, Two Coons Running (aka Mike Brannin) and Stone Bird (aka Curtis Stone) showed various methods of producing spark, and thereby flame, using flint and steel and a firebow. Later in the day, the two put on an equally interesting demo on early musket ball molding, musket handling safety (even for those of us modern folk who might come across great grandpa's black powder musket in the attic), and firing.

"The Horses of the DeSoto Entrada into La Florida, 1539" was strikingly illustrated by "Conquistadors" Bill Boston and Judi Allison, mounted on their Florida Cracker Horses, Dixie Girl and Sprite. Spectators were engrossed with their historically accurate portrayal of Hernando DeSoto's mounted adventurers and their equally accurately equipped equine companions.

Carlton Dudly spoke on different breeding lines of Cracker Horses, using posters of various horses to illustrate this. In addition, he brought a number of horses of different lines, which was especially helpful to the crowd. Carlton's grey stallion, Harvey's Dun Dealin, was one of only two horses that had made the entire 300 mile trip from Tampa Bay to Tallahassee two years ago. The trek was part of a successful endeavor to have the Cracker Horse named the official state horse. The route taken approximately followed the one which Hernando De Soto had taken in 1539.

As the afternoon light began to wane, I gave a brief explanation on the function of various parts of a driving harness, as well as cart balancing and harness fitting.

Saturday evening's catered dinner of flavorful Cuban marinated shredded pork, black beans with yellow rice and fried plantains was greeted with epicurean delight and surprise, as many expected it to be spicy. It was generally considered a hit, with few leftovers to clean up. The actual meeting then ensued, with Kathy Peacock's award announcements being met with the usual degree of enthusiastic applause. The traditional culmination of the evening then began with the auction of donated items benefiting the HOA. A virtual library of interesting books, a number of lovely quilts, and a fabulous Colonial Spanish T-shirt in vibrant colors along with many other items, produced frenzied competition between bidders.

The next day, a caravan of vehicles left for a tour of a Cracker Horse ranch in Bushnell. Mike Knight graciously provided the guided tour, detailing the various colors and lines in his pedigrees, and sharing his thoughts on Florida's State Heritage Horse with members of the group.

Our Award program has kept the interest going. We had 4 new people get awards this year, three adult HOA Logo Awards and one Buckaroo Award. We have held up sending out the Buckaroo Award (a certificate has been sent) as we are trying to have a new award designed. Hopefully it will be ready in the very near future. Kathy Peacock and her daughter Hanna have done a wonderful job as always handling the Awards Program. They deserve a great round of thanks from all the members.

There was a very vigorous discussion regarding the possibility of a Part Breed Section. The membership was pretty well split on it, but it was voted down. Over all it was handled by the membership very nicely except for a few that seemed to have to inject derogatory comments. Such comments have no place in this type of discussion.

Linda Gasparini with oversight from Fred and Becky Fulcher counted the votes for us.

The Horse of America Registry has joined the American Livestock breed Conservancy, effective 1-1-2011 as the first Breed/Registry Member. This is a new type of membership being offered by the ALBC, and as far as I know, we are the first registry to join as a member. There are some benefits for all of us in this. More information will be coming as soon as it is available. It is important for all of us to support the ALBC in their programs.

At the HOA meeting in Fl, we had a chance to look at a number of Florida Cracker Horses. There are some very nice ones. We have decided that they will have to be individually inspected for registration in the HOA due to the variances seen in conformation. This is not meant to imply that they are not Colonial Spanish Horses. We are looking forward to seeing more of these horses.

We are considering an inspection trip to New Mexico to look at the El Rito horses, the horses from the Navajo's Enchanted Mountain. We will have a full report if we are able to put this together. We are making some small changes in our inspection process. If there are any members that would like to be involved in this, please contact me or Vik.

Again, thanks to the membership. Without you and your support, we could not keep this endeavor going. It does show what can be done when we come together for the horses.

Vik wrote the following in the 2001 Newsletter, and I feel it's a important message for all of us: "The Horse of Americas is a dream. Not only my dream, not just the dream of the four incorporators. In fact, HOA is more than the dream of Robert Brislawn and Jeff Edwards, who founded it so many years ago and more than the dream of John Fusco who bought the registry and re-

turned it to the hands of the people who needed it the most. Certainly each of those people plays a role in the dream but it isn't exclusive property of any of us. This dream belongs to each of you-- and to America's First True Horse."

Let us come together to enjoy the common bond of our Spanish Horses and be big enough to over look our minor differences.

PZP is a vaccine that acts as birth control on the mares. It is good for one year, providing a natural method of herd management; the boys stay in the herds, providing guidance and protection of the mares and foals.

Erma received a scholarship from WHOA to attend the PZP training the beginning of November in Montana. She is now certified to deliver the PZP vaccine, making her a bigger asset to Monero Mustangs.

We are currently in the market for a professional dart gun to deliver the vaccines.

Founding of the European Spanish Mustang

In the summer of 2009, a handful of breeders and enthusiasts came together to form the ESMS. Initially an unincorporated association, a committee was formed out of the desire to be independent in preserving, protecting and promoting Spanish Mustangs in Europe and to support and unite breeders and owners in Europe.

One of the main goals of the society is to gain government recognition for the breed first in the UK, and then with the EU Commission.

In order to gain this recognition, a number of criteria have to be met, including the running of a daughter studbook to the mother studbook based in the country of breed origin.

The ESMS committee decided that the HOA was the best suited and most progressive registry to associate with. Not only were they very supportive of the proposal, but it also opened up many more breeding and purchasing opportunities for European SM owners and enthusiasts.

The Association agreement was finalized and signed in the fall of 2010. The ESMS has since incorporated and become a company limited by guarantee, not for profit,

registered with Company's House in England.



Our Hopes for the Future

Since the first Spanish Mustang returned to Europe in 2004, the numbers have risen exponentially. Today, in 2010, there are now over 40 Spanish Mustangs in Europe, most of them registered with the ESMS, and more waiting to be exported from the USA. They have found an as yet small, but loyal following in Europe. They are considered to be a special breed horse, and quite an exclusive breed to own. In Europe a Spanish Mustang is considered much more valuable than in the USA, mainly because of the high cost of import, but also because of the small numbers, the rarity and uniqueness of the breed.

We hope, as our stock here in Europe matures and begins to compete and show itself to the public more frequently, to attract a greater number of deserving owners and enthusiasts to the breed. We do however not want to mass-market them. The market in Europe, as in the US, has a glut of neglected mediocre back yard horses and ponies of low value. We do not want the Spanish Mustang to become one of those. In our marketing, we try to sell the romance of the Old West as well the heritage of the horse that conquered America. We aim to attract committed passionate owners, as our horses deserve nothing less.

Even if times are tough as they are now, we feel it is better to try to hang in there and wait for the right person, who is committed to a SPANISH MUSTANG above any other breed, rather than sell at rock bottom prices, and make a loss not only personally, but also for the breed as a whole.

We are all very excited at recent developments and the association with the HOA, as that marks a milestone for Spanish

Mustangs in Europe. The association has opened up many more breeding opportunities for us in Europe, and it will be exciting to see a variety of other strains be imported in the future. With this in mind, we are happy to offer free advertising space on our website for HOA breeders and members wishing to offer their sales stock to the European market.

European Spanish Mustang Society

Rules of the Society:

- To preserve, protect and promote the rare breed of the Spanish Mustang, the Spanish Colonial Horse and all the various strains thereof.
- To be a point of contact and provide support and advice for breeders and owners of Spanish Mustangs/Colonial horses.

The European Spanish Mustang Society (ESMS) operates as a "daughter studbook "of the Horse of the Americas Registry (HOA) in Europe and follows the same rules and guidelines, pertaining to registration of horses.

BREED STANDARD

Size:

The Spanish Mustang/Colonial horse is a medium sized horse ranging from 13 2 to 15 hands with an average size of approximately 14 2 hands with proportional weight.

Body:

They are smooth muscled with short backs, rounded rumps and low set tails. Coupling is smooth and the overall appearance is of a

well balanced, smoothly built horse. The girth is deep, with well laid back shoulder and fairly pronounced withers.

Head:

They possess the classic Spanish type head with a straight or concave forehead and a convex nose which is in contrast to the straight forehead and nose of most breeds. Ears are medium to short and usually notched or curved towards each other. Necks are fairly well crested in mares and geldings and heavily crested in mature stallions. Chests are narrow but deep with the front legs joining the chest in an "A" shape rather than straight across.

Feet and Legs:

Chestnuts are small or missing altogether, particularly on the rear legs. Ergots are small or absent. Feet are extremely sound with thick walls, many having what is typically known as a "mule foot" which resists bruising due to the concave sole. Canons are short, upper foreleg is long with the canon bone having a larger circumference than other breeds of comparable size and weight. Gait:

Long-strided, many are gaited, with a comfortable gait such as the amble, running walk or single foot. Some individuals are laterally gaited and do a very credible "paso" gait though without extreme knee action. They are remarkably hardy animals and tend to be less prone to injury, particularly of the legs and feet, than other breeds.

Colour:

Colours are extremely varied, the inheritance of the early Spanish horses who came in many colours and patterns, including dun, grulla, buckskin, overo and sabino paints and appaloosa, as well as the more common colours of bay, chestnut, black and white.

Temperament:

They have a very different mentality than "domesticated" horses. They are NOT push button horses and will not abide abuse, however they bond well with their owners and once bonded, become very attached to that person. Highly intelligent with an innate sense of self-preservation, they are not prone

to put themselves into any situation which may be destructive or dangerous. They retain a great many of the instincts that allowed them to survive in the feral state. They are thinking horses and have their own opinions of things. The owners that learn to outsmart them do very well with this breed. HOA on-line resource

REGISTRATION

The ESMS will register all horses holding HOA registration, and all horses eligible for HOA registration such as those registered previously with, or eligible for, Spanish Mustang Registry (SMR) and, or Southwest Spanish Mustang Association (SSMA) registration. All horses registered into the main studbook of the ESMS will also hold a registration in the HOA studbook.

Separate from the HOA, the ESMS will register part-bred Spanish Mustang/Colonial Horses up to 25% in the Appendix Studbooks A & B, these Part-bred will at this time not be eligible for entry into the studbook of the HOA.

MEMBERSHIP

Being a preservation Society, we do not require grading for breeding purposes. Where it is a requirement for stallions for instance participating in various disciplines, we recommend grading with an impartial body such as: ZFDP

The Society acknowledges the fact that many of the Spanish Mustangs/Colonial

many of the Spanish Mustangs/Colonial horses in Europe are purely breeding animals, pleasure horses, or not yet of an age to compete. Where an intended breeding individual is competing in any of the numerous disciplines, the owner is required to complete the on-line Performance Report for each horse and each event. Results of each performance event will be added to the individual studbook pages of each horse, so that informed breeding choices can be made.

Selection for breeding should be subjective, following the breed standard as laid out by the HOA and on our website.

Conformation, true type, and temperament should be the main deciding factors for any breeding choice.

Registrar's Report— January, 2011



For the past few years, I have been collecting and building a database of all known Colonial Spanish Horses/Mustangs which is now available on CD-ROM disc to our HOA members from the HOA Online Store. The database currently contains the names of 6,203 horses and is by no means a finished product but has enough information to help breeders and members look up names, colors, bloodlines, strains and other known facts. I would like to thank everyone who contributed to the database.

2010 was a slow year for registrations with only 47 horses being recorded. To make registration easier, HOA added payment by PayPal and the online application which can be emailed along with the registration photos.

Please submit pictures in one of three formats: regular photographs; digital scans on photographic paper or via email. I would like to stress that digital pictures must be printed on glossy paper. I cannot use pictures that are printed on regular copy paper.

If you send pictures via email, they should be no larger than 800 kb and should be saved as a .tif or .jpg. Picture files saved as a .gif extension have been compressed and do not reproduce well. If you send pictures by email, please notify me in advance that you will be sending picture file attachments.



An example of a good registry shot from profile. This is Tiger Eye as recorded by Jeff Edwards at the old Horse of the Americas in Porterville, CA. A good shot needs to be attractive, clear and all markings as visible as possible. It does not have to be posed, but it should show the horse's balance and conformation. The profile shots should be centered with both hip and shoulder at the same distance from the camera.

All photos should be taken in open space, preferably in the morning or early afternoon. Pictures with

lots of shadows do not scan well, and the horse's true color is difficult to reproduce. Trees or other busy landscape should be out of the background whenever possible.
