History . . .

Company 1940 was formed at Camp San Clemente Beach, San Clemente, California, on April 1, 1939, by Captain Guyle E. Shurte. Lt. Jackson Dougherty, Junior Officer, Lt. A. G. Hughes, Camp Surgeon, Claude V. Wilson, Educational Adviser, were assigned.

On June 1, 1939, the company moved to Camp Rubicon Point, Lake Tahoe, Sacramento District. Before the move, Lt. Frank J. Nagle replaced Lt. Dougherty, and Dr. Hughes was transferred. Upon arrival at the summer camp, Dr.

Thomas H. Boone was assigned as Camp Surgeon. The work project at Lake Tahoe consisted of State Park development.

The company moved to Camp Mount Tamalpais, Mill Valley, California, on October 16, 1939. Lt. Kenneth H. Baker assumed command on November 1, 1939. On January 6, 1940, Mr. Ulric H. Reynolds replaced Mr. Nagle. Dr. J. Louis Freibrun replaced Dr. Boone as Camp Surgeon. The work project includes State Park development on Mt. Tamalpais, and in the Muir Woods State Park.

HISTORICAL SKETCH

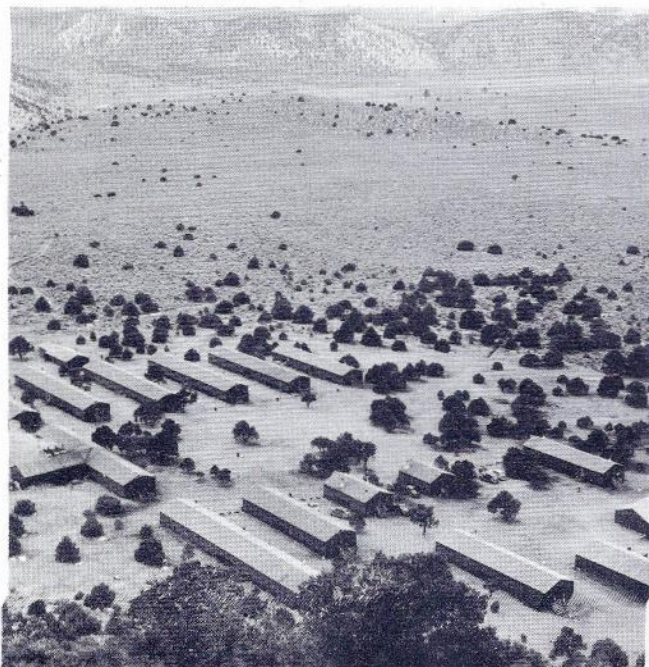
Sacramento DISTRICT CCC

On May 9, 1933, the Sacramento District came into being. With headquarters in Sacramento, the State Capitol, it took in the rich "mother lode" mining district of north central California; a district rich in the lore of pioneers and famed in the stories of Mark Twain and Bret Harte; and a major portion of the Sacramento Valley, the second richest valley in the world, being exceeded in fertility only by the valley of the Nile in Egypt and in diversity of its crops by none.

The army had been made the surprised and rather bewildered foster parent of a quarter of a million young men who were being enrolled in the newly organized Civilian Conservation Corps. With a bustle akin to that of the mobilization days of 1917, telegraphs and radios buzzed and army personnel moved about with a new found celerity. Major Raymond E. McQuillen, 11th Cavalry, proceeded from his station at the Presidio of Monterey and assumed command of the Sacramento District as its first commander, while Major Charles E. McCarthy, Infantry, Regular Army National Guard Instructor at Sacramento, moved his desk and became Executive Officer and Adjutant.

On April 1, 1934, Major McQuillen was transferred to the General Staff of the Hawaiian Department and Major Charles E. McCarthy, Executive Officer, assumed command of the District.

Typical Camp Site



On May 1, 1934, the Marysville District was disbanded, five camps being transferred to the Sacramento District and the remainder to the Redding District. The district was gradually spreading out, a portion of west central Nevada already having been assigned to the Sacramento District in the fall of 1933. It now included an area embracing all of the rich mother lode mining district and extending from San Francisco Bay to the Naval Ammunition Depot at Hawthorne, Nevada. Enrollees from the East, hearing stories of gold that had been picked up and was still to be picked up merely by panning, developed a miniature gold rush during their times off the work project and were to be seen daily, industriously panning streams and tailings at old abandoned mining shafts. Many of the men actually did find small quantities of gold and became the plutocrats of the camps. Upon the departure of Major McCarthy, Major T. E. Haley, F. A., assumed command on August 16, 1935.

The work projects of the Sacramento District have been varied and numerous. Among the projects at various times have been National Forest Service, State Division of Forestry, National Park, State Park, Division of Grazing, and Soil Conservation Service camps, Division of Grazing laboratory projects, National Park Service laboratory projects, municipal water works projects, Bureau of Reclamation camp, Biological Survey camps, and work at Regular Army posts and at the Naval Ammunition Depot at Hawthorne, Nevada.

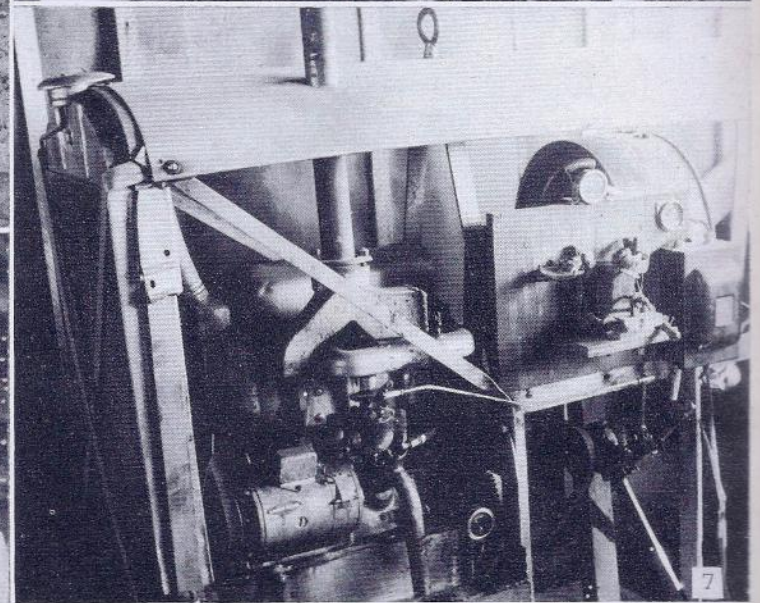
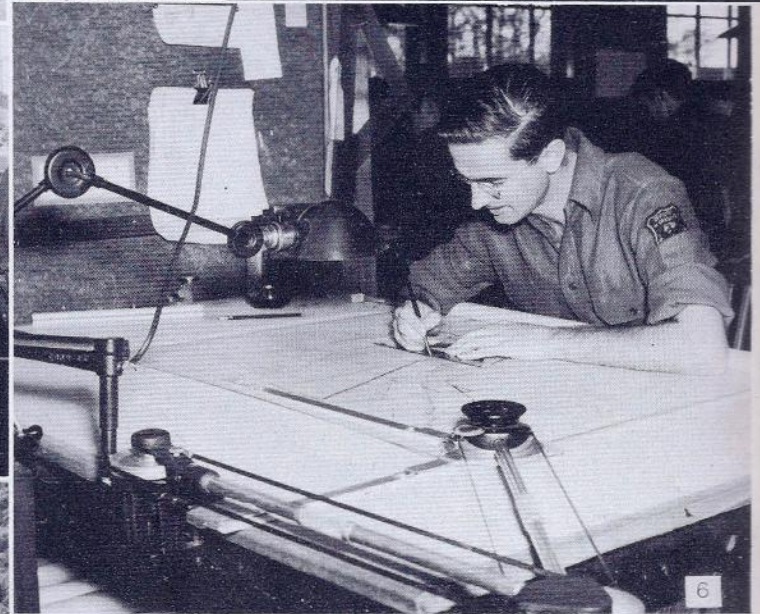
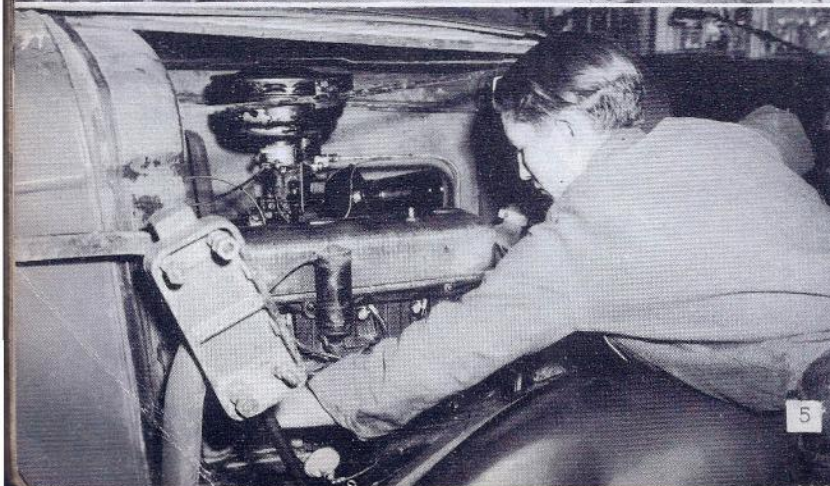
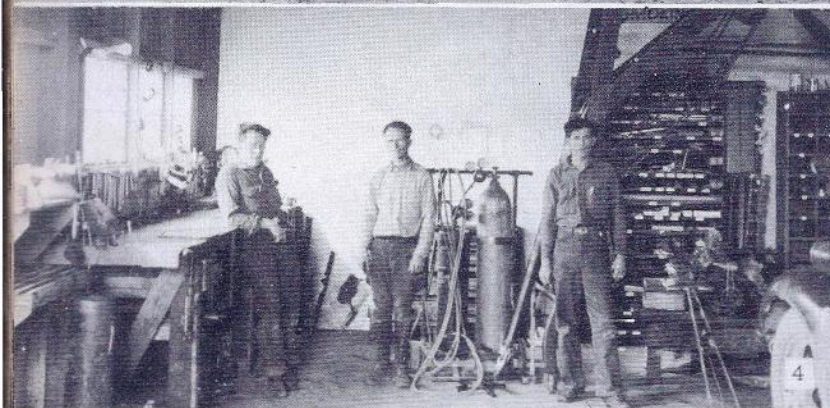
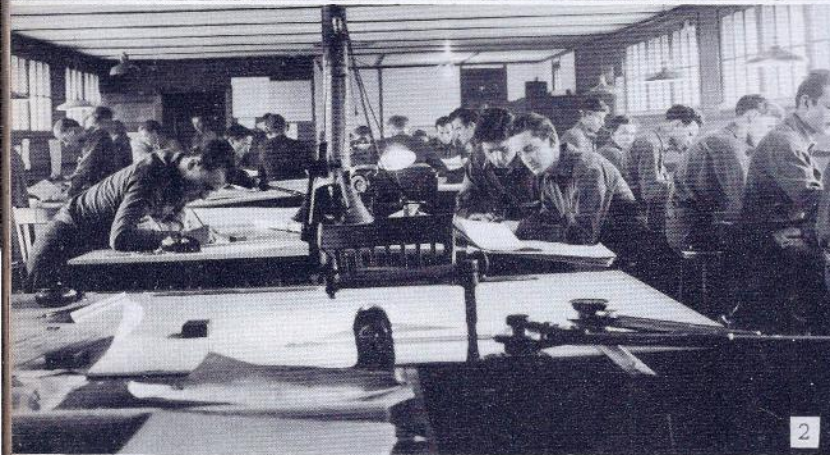
On April 1, 1936, the Eureka District was disbanded and the Sacramento District again increased its geographical limits, taking in four more widely separated camps. At the same time, Major Haley left the district and was replaced as District Commander by Major Martin S. Chester, 30th Infantry. Major Chester's ill health forced him to enter Letterman General Hospital for an extended period and he was replaced by Major Paul D. Carter, 30th Infantry.

Again on November 1, 1937, the Sacramento District increased in size when it took over three camps of the disbanded Redding District and one camp from the Fort Douglas District and assumed its present extended proportions, a strip 225 miles wide extending from the Pacific Ocean on the west to Central Nevada, a matter of some 500 miles.

Major Carter was relieved on August 26, 1939, and was replaced by Major Lewis F. Kosch, Field Artillery, (D. O. L.), who at present is District Commander. At the time of this writing, the 7th Anniversary of the C. C. C., the Sacramento District comprises 37 camps, the second largest District in the 9th Corps Area.

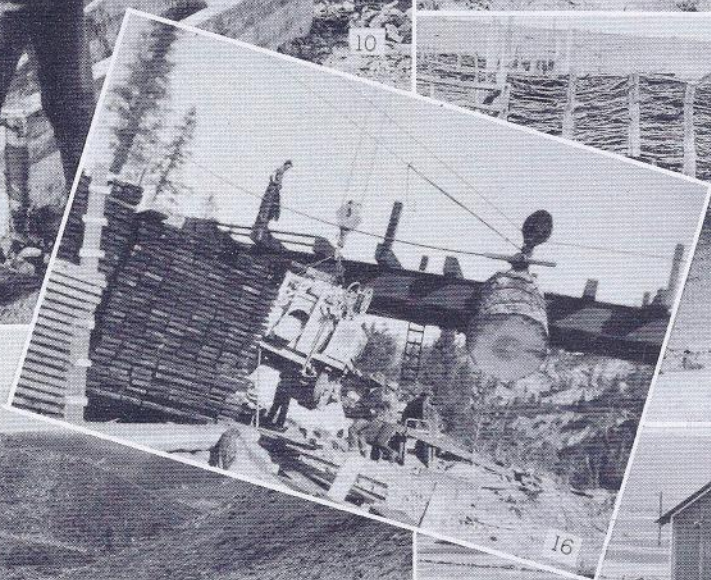
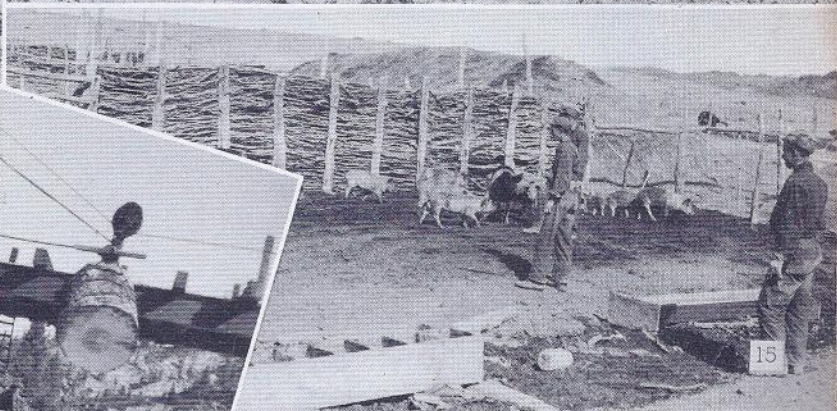
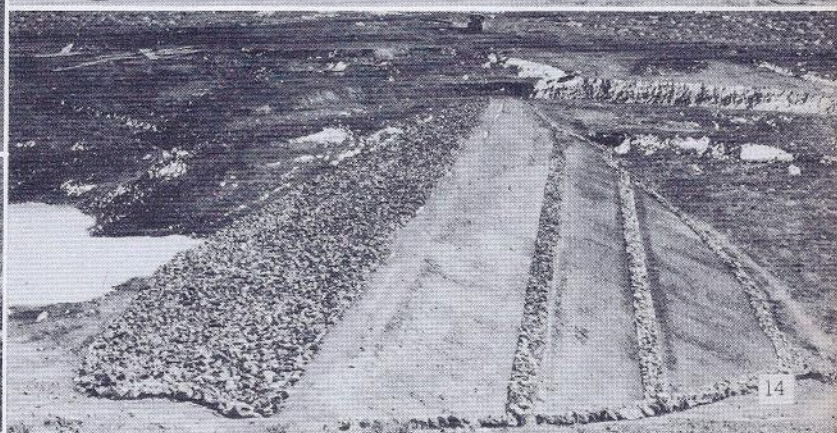
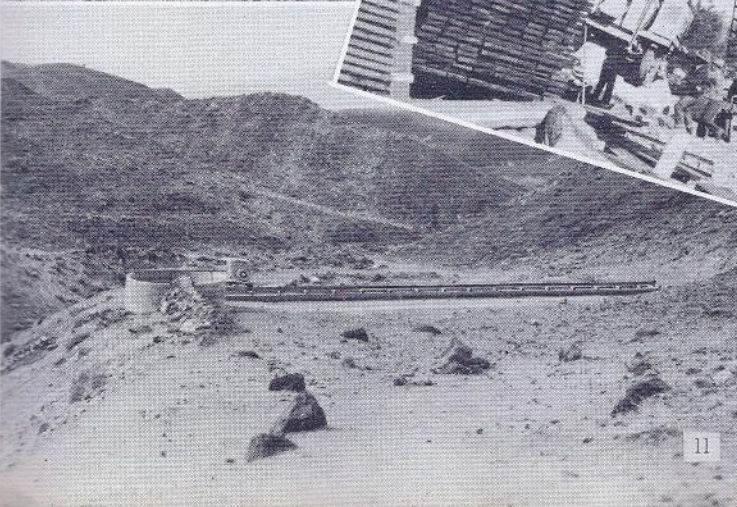
