Claire representing Michigan, California, Arkansas, and North Carolina, and even Boys Nation, iust to name a few.



DEPARTMENT ORATORICAL REGIONAL AND FINALS CONTEST DATE SET

The Department Oratorical Regional and Finals Contest date is set for March 28, 2026, beginning with opening ceremonies at 9:00 a.m. at Todd Wehr Hall on the Ripon College campus.

Talk to your Legion friends and schedule your post, county, and district contests. Be sure the dates of your contests are well advertised. Posts should be scheduling their contests to be held in January; the contest should be scheduled a week or two prior to the county contest. The District contests need to be held in February as the certification of their winner needs to be received at Legion Headquarters no later than March 2. Posts, counties and districts need to work together to schedule their contest dates. Posts are encouraged to recruit contestants for their contest. Contact your local high school forensics coach or guidance counselors. Students in 9th, 10th, 11th and 12th grades are eligible. Now is the time to promote the program with schools, youth programs, and community events. One of the biggest reasons I hear for young people not participating is "I never heard of the program." The oratorical contest is a great opportunity for students to win scholarship funds. Potential contestants can be directed to our website, https://wi-

Suring American Legion Post 283 proudly recognizes a remarkable legacy of service—one that spans three generations of the Spreeman family, each answering the call to serve their country and their fellow Veterans.

It began with William "Willy" Spreeman, who served in the United States Army from October 22, 1959, to July 26, 1961. Willy has remained active in his support for fellow Veterans as a proud member of The American Legion for the past 28 years.

Following in his father's footsteps, William "Alex" Spreeman joined the United States Navy, serving from July 10, 1988, to May 14, 1992. His commitment to military service extended into civilian life with 23 years of continuous membership in The American Legion.

Now carrying that torch into a new generation is William "Max" Spreeman, who began serving in the Army on June 22, 2020, and is currently deployed to Kuwait. He, too, joined The American Legion—already six years into membership—demonstrating that his commitment to country and community extends beyond his active-duty service.

While it's not uncommon to see military service span multiple generations, it is notably rare to have three genera-



FREDONIA POST 410 MEMORIAL DAY SERVICE



WATERTOWN POST 189'S HISTORIC INITIATIVE

FUNDRAISING FOR MOBILE VIETNAM VETERANS MEMORIAL

Watertown Pitterle-Beaudoin Post 189 of The American Legion Commander, Stephen Zillmer, is driven to see the largest midwestern replica, north of St. Louis, Vietnam Veterans Memorial installed in Marine Corps League's Aero Park. Legion, League, and other military organizations are closely collaborating, galvanized to build a place that honors the valor and histories of Vietnam era Veterans. A place where Veterans and their families may share fellowship, healing and remembering in the presence of a poignant memorial. For Zillmer, it's about serving Veterans first, the whole purpose of Post 189's efforts.

Watertown's own, Vietnam Marine Corps Veteran and Purple Heart recipient, Barry Lawrence, engraved the replica. His passion for art and illustration led to him opening his own advertising business where he began honing his engraving skills. In 2010, American Veterans Traveling Tribute enlisted his help for their first replica project. For Lawrence, its been "a tremendous honor."

While the original Washington, D.C. memorial is made of Indian black granite, this replica utilizes 320 feet of quarter

inch anodized aluminum, with 144 panels ranging from 2 to 8 feet in height. The 80% scale replica features over 58,000 names of those classified as dead, missing, or prisoners of war. Lawrence's 2nd created replica, it's traveled to over 350 cities across the nation. Inscribed names are fashioned after the original Optima typeface. Lawrence said it was a painstaking process of aligning the names, making countless adjustments over eight months.

For Lawrence, it has been a labor of personal meaning and legacy. "In the next 100 years," he said, "they won't be remembered." He views the memorial as essential to keeping society's collective memory alive. "I have seven good friends on that wall, two from Watertown," Lawrence said. He said that while working on the wall he would "get tight in the chest" thinking about his friends.

Lawernce isn't alone. Vietnam Veterans Larry Schultz, Air Force, and Richard "Red" Walter, Marine Corps, also mourn lost friends. Schultz called it a "heartbreaking" visual. VA BENEFITS AND CHAPTER 61 RETIREES

long been a source of confusion and frustration for Veterans, particularly those medically retired with fewer than 20 years of service. While

multiple programs aim to compensate for service-related injuries, laws against "double-dipping" have historically prevented many Veterans from receiving their full retired pay alongside Veterans Affairs (VA) disability compensation. The ongoing battle to rectify this injustice highlights the significance of Combat-Related Special Compensation (CRSC) and the proposed Major Richard Star Act.

Chapter 61 retirees are service members who are medically retired due to a service-connected disability rated at 30% or greater. Unlike those who serve 20 or more years, these Veterans often have fewer than two decades of service. Before recent legislative changes, they faced a significant financial penalty: a dollar-for-dollar offset of their military retired pay for any amount received in VA disability compensation. This system effectively denied them the full benefits they earned through their sacrifice and service.

The justification for this offset was the argument that receiving both VA disability pay, and military retirement pay constituted "double-dipping" from federal funds for the same purpose. However, The American Legion has long argued that these are two separate benefits earned for different reasons-retired pay for service and VA compensation for a service-connected disability.

In response to the inequity of the offset, Congress established in Combat-Related Special Compensation (CRSC). This program provides tax-free payments to

Military disability benefits have eligible military retirees with disabilities designated as 'combat-related". To be eligible, Veterans must apply to their branch of service and have a combat-related disability rated at 10% or more by the VA.

> For a Chapter 61 retiree, CRSC offers a way to possibly recoup some of the retired pay that is offset by their VA disability payments. The amount of CRSC cannot exceed the amount of retired pay withheld. However, CRSC has its own limitations. The benefit is calculated based on a formula that often leaves medically retired Veterans with less compensation than they would receive if they could collect both benefits without penalty.

> Enter the recent legislation before congress. The Major Richard Star Act is a bipartisan legislative effort aimed at closing the gap left by CRSC. Named for Major Richard Star, a combat-wounded Veteran who advocated for disabled Veterans until his death in 2021, the act seeks to eliminate the offset for Chapter 61 retirees with combat-related disabilities. If passed, the legislation would extend full "concurrent receipt" to this group of Veterans, allowing them to receive both their full military retirement pay and VA disability compensation without reduction.

> As the bill progresses through Congress, advocacy groups continue to push for its inclusion in legislation like the National Defense Authorization Act. To support the Major Richard Star Act, The American Legion has a "GRASSROOTS ACTION CENTER" page with a link to send a message to your Congressional Representatives. It only takes a few minutes to show your support.

THE IMPORTANCE OF **CORRECT INFORMATION**

The staff at headquarters have come across entirely too many errors for member records. This includes:

- Post, County and District Officer forms with the incorrect phone, email addresses or position titles
- Members calling only to have been told or to have found themselves as deceased in the Badger Legionnaire
- Post Data Forms not accurately reflecting mailing addresses or physical

What problems do these issues cause?

- Incorrect phone calls hamper Buddy Check efforts. Commander Bond says he frequently runs into wrong numbers, disconnected numbers or numbers of people who have nothing to do with the Legion.
- Wrong email addresses cause communication breakdowns in the chain of command.
- Wrong position titles or not updated position titles do not get members the access needed in myLegion.org. Remember, this ONLY goes to Commanders and Adjutants. Others can get permission by approval of the Commander.
- When members are being reported or they are finding themself deceased in the Badger Legionnaire, they lose access to the Badger Legionnaire, the Legion magazine and other Legion benefits. Going forward, any Last Bugle requests will need to be received with the accompanying obituary.
- We are charged for every piece of mail returned. Verify the address you are sending is the correct one for mail! If dues get sent to a different location, identify that as well. Identifying your physical building location or where you meet for meetings if you don't have a building, is important to let potential members know how to find you.




DEPARTMENT HISTORIAN

ALABGS ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT: ISA KILLIAN

The following excerpts are from a report by Isa Killian, a delegate at the 2025 ALABGS session, to her sponsors in Cross Plains.

Hello, my name is Isa Killian and I'm super excited to share my experience at ALA Badger Girls State.

In the beginning, it seemed like most of the people who thrived were the outgoing kind who gained energy from social interaction and could connect with their peers in a single conversation. Although I see myself as a leader in many rooms, and I feel comfortable voicing my opinion to a crowd, I'm not ashamed to admit that making fast friends through small talk is a skill I'm still working on. In a room with hundreds of strangers, it's easy to feel lonely at first, and I started to wonder if there wasn't a place for me.

Halfway through the week, I was sitting in the cafeteria and feeling a little discouraged. I regretted spending my first day slowly processing the system rather than seizing an opportunity, and I worried I'd lost my chance to make an impact.

I sometimes spend too long ruminating on time I could've used differently, but as I ate my lunch I decided I wasn't going to let my hesitation limit my potential when I was experiencing such a special opportunity. I visited every table in the dining hall and polled hundreds



of delegates about the meal selections for a newsletter article. Although the effect was infinitesimal compared to inspiring an entire generation of Wisconsin youth or winning an election by a landslide, it gave me a role and a reason to be there. In just hours, the way I fit into the state of Badger transformed and the only thing that had changed was me.

And when Badger Girls proved to me that my voice did in fact matter, I became truly invested. I listened to the contrasting ways my peers viewed the world. I watched how American Legion Family members treated the U.S. flag and I absorbed the air of respect that surrounded it. I was even selected

as one of ten acts among 500 delegates in the end-of-week talent show. By Friday, I felt like I'd experienced months of growth as a leader and a person in just six days.

After coming home, I expected my life to completely return to normal. Instead, as I told people about my experience, I was shocked to hear so many of them share that they, too, were Boys or Girls State alumni. My voice teacher, family friend, and even great-grandpa had each participated in a similar week during different summers decades earlier, and when I discovered this, I felt like I shared a unique secret with them — a connection that transcends generations.

Two months ago, I learned that change begins with caring. And a grand, daunting gesture toward thousands of people doesn't need to be the first step. Start by looking around and asking yourself, "What can I do to make this room better? This classroom? This office?"

I'm honored to carry on the Badger Girls State legacy as a brand-new alum, and I am incredibly grateful for the lessons I learned, the people I saw shine, and the long-standing program that I can proudly say I contributed to just a little. Thank you so much for sponsoring me this summer and thank you all for your investment in my generation.

One of the core programs of The American Legion Auxiliary is our service to Veterans—but what does that mean, and how can you participate? Service to Veterans is anything you do to enhance the lives of our Veterans who are not in a VA medical center!

Do you know a Veteran who needs a helping hand to remain independent? Helping a Veteran with housework, yard work, taking a Veteran to an appointment, taking a Veteran out to eat, or just visiting a Veteran and bringing them cheer, qualifies as Service to Veterans. Many Veterans, especially those who find it more difficult to get out of their homes due to age or physical limitations, really appreciate visits from others. Taking the time to visit a vulnerable Veteran can have a very positive effect on that person's spirit. I have known many elderly Veterans who

feel abandoned and depressed so they begin to contemplate suicide as a way to end their emotional suffering. Imagine the profound effect that you could have on that Veteran if you would just show up and ask, "How can I help you?"

Do you know a caregiver of a Veteran who needs someone to stay with their Veteran while they go grocery shopping or have a doctor's appointment of their own? This time also qualifies as Service to Veterans. Family caregivers are also able to report Service to Veterans hours for time spent providing care and assistance to Veterans within their families if they do not receive compensation for doing so. Ten hours per week can be reported if you live with the Veteran and up to five hours per week can be reported if you do not live with the Veteran. Hour pins/bars can be earned by reporting those hours on the Service to Veterans Award form. This is a separate form to be used only by those people who wish to receive these pins/bars.

For more information on how and where your hours should be reported, please see the program information on the department website.
