LESSONS IN MAKING CHANGE AT BBS

BADGER BOYS STATE

With five pennies, you have a nickel. Five of those gets you a quarter. Four quarters and you have a dollar. While this is a lesson which we hope our citizens already know when they arrive at Eau Claire, Badger Boys State brings a whole new meaning to making change to the citizens who spend the week with us. Our program teaches young citizens of Wisconsin the practical side of government, among other things. We teach about the three equal branches of government, and the various levels of governing bodies, from local all the way up to federal. The citizens can run for offices, give speeches, and vote for their desired policies through the candidates who support them. Sure, while several of our alumni go on to seek public office, we recognize that the vast majority do not. This brings us to the lesson we instill within every citizen to set them up for success in the future: different ways to make change.



Andrew Blount, a 2024 Badger Boys State citizen and member of the Color Guard, has been accepted at the Air Force Academy. Our American system of government that so many fought to establish and protect allows each citizen to make for themselves a better life, a better community, state, and world. It is our job to teach

them the power they've been granted. It is surprising to many that a lot of these things can be accomplished without getting elected to public office. What's more—it doesn't need to be inherently political. Just as pennies gathered can make nickels, and so on, citizens gathered can make bigger change, too.

Writing your legislators, signing a petition, attending and speaking at public meetings, displaying a campaign sign, and the simple act of voting are all great examples of bringing about change at the individual level. With a few individuals put together, a nonviolent protest, picking up trash, volunteering at

an animal shelter, and a host of other group activities can make tremendous community change—and bring some fun along for the ride.

At the state and national levels, getting involved

in any number of organizations—either nonprofit or political—that align with one's own beliefs. Lobby policy makers, share perspectives with others, and advocate for your positions at all levels of government. All these tools at all levels can be effective for any citizen to make change.

So, while the running for office, giving speeches, and asking for votes are all fun and important learning at BBS, the lessons in making change are what we believe linger long after the session is over. We make sure that training the leaders of tomorrow includes all the ways we can make change. For us, it only makes sense.

All adults involved with the program must pass a background check and complete abuse training through The American Legion.

Funding for your program varies depending on how much program you want. Some communities in Wisconsin field up to four teams in their program, while others may simply have one junior team. Legion posts can sponsor teams, or if no post exists or is willing to sponsor a team in a community, outside sponsorship is allowed.

MIDWINTER DONATIONS BENEFIT PILLARS ADULT AND FAMILY SHELTER

What does the American Legion and Pillars Adult and Family Shelter have in common? The answer is- a mutual desire to help Veterans and others in need in the Appleton area who may be struggling with housing insecurity; and to help an organization within our own community bringing awareness to homelessness, especially during the winter months.

In January, The Wisconsin American Legion held its Midwinter Conference in Appleton at the Hilton Paper Valley Hotel and Convention Center. Almost 600 Legionnaires and Legion Family members attended the event. During the conference, Legion Family, which includes Legion members, Auxiliary members, Sons of the American Legion and Legion Riders, came together collecting items for our local shelter, which provides to individual and family shelters. This year the 9th District decided that Pillars would be the recipient of the donation.

Pillars has long served the Appleton community, which includes Veterans who may be experiencing homelessness or housing insecurity. According to Pillars' Development Manager Emily Boettcher, Pillars helped 56 Veteran clients for Fiscal Year 2024.

Pillars' vision is "envision a creative, compassionate community that collaborates to find innovative, effective solutions so experiences of homelessness are rare and brief and everyone has a place to call home.'

Our donation included a substantial sock donation from Wigwam Socks, which are desperately needed during the cold winter months. Appleton American Legion Post 38 personnel put together 15 laundry baskets, which included bath towel sets and various personal items, some with a focus on women's health and wellness. Numerous items





were donated in accordance with requests from the 6 Pillars locations throughout the Appleton area.

Once the items were collected, they were loaded into a truck and delivered to Pillars by 9th District 2nd Vice Commander Migeal Babino, Kennan Post 362 Commander Rosanna Bogle and Sergeant-at-Arms Larry Bogle, and Appleton's Post 38 Communications Director Catherine Kutzleb. All items donated were graciously received by Pillars staff members Nikki, Lauren, Emily, and Rye.

The Pillars' staff on duty remarked this was one of the largest single donations received, noting the donation would benefit many individuals at all of their facilities. The smiles in the photos capture the joy of both giving and receiving, especially when donations are desperately needed.




POST 151 HONORS WWII MEMBER ON 100TH BIRTHDAY

American Legion Westside Memorial Post 151 recently honored longtime post member Leland Stafford, who celebrated his 100th birthday with family and friends on February 15, 2025. Stafford, born in 1925, enlisted in the U.S. Army Air Force in 1943 and served until discharge in 1946, attaining the rank of master sergeant.

At his birthday celebration, Leland reminisced about his WWII pilot training. In 1944, he was serving as an airman at Traux Field, Madison, when he got orders to report to a Florida base for flight training. Leland's pilot training ended mid-course since the need for pilots had diminished by 1945. He was happy, however, to be the first of his fellow enlisted cadet pilots to fly solo before flight training ended. He was then re-assigned to electronics where he underwent an FBI background check as he would be trained in IFF (Identification Friend or Foe). Leland finished his WWII duty as an MP.

Later, Leland enlisted in the Wisconsin Army National Guard in 1953 and served another 11 years while raising his family and serving as a Madison Police Department patrolman and investigator.

At Leland's centenarian celebration, Post 151 members took the opportunity to present him a shadow box that displays his decorations, shooting badges, rank and unit insignia he earned during his WWII and post-war service.

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HURRICANE HELENE RELIEF PROVIDED BY TWO WISCONSIN POSTS

Two American Legion Posts join forces to provide relief to Hurricane Helene's continuing impact on Western North Carolina.

Hurricane Helene, a formidable storm that struck western North Carolina in late September 2024. Helene's trajectory took it through the Caribbean and along the southeastern United States, with its remnants eventually reaching western North Carolina. The hurricane's powerful winds, exceeding 100 mph, caused extensive damage creating large amounts of debris. The most significant impact of Helene on western North Carolina was the immense rainfall leading to accumulations of over 15 inches in some areas, which led to catastrophic flooding, inundating homes, farmland, and infrastructure.

Flooding led to the contamination of water bodies with sediments, pollutants, and debris. Floodwaters devastated crops and livestock, leading to substantial losses for farmers. Damage to roads, bridges, and buildings disrupted transportation and communication networks. Flooding and wind damage left many residents homeless or displaced. Temporary shelters were set up, but the process of rebuilding and returning to normalcy was slow and challenging. Local organizations, volunteers, and government agencies worked together to provide relief and support recovery efforts.

By early October Post 116 in Fuquay-Varina, NC, was al-



ready in action and the Legion stated the following, "Post 116 in Fuquay-Varina is hosting a donation drive to help those affected by flooding in western North Carolina." This call was picked up by the Olson-Grinde-O'Donnell Post 348 in DeForest WI, and a monetary donation of the post was matched by individual donations of post members and hand delivered by two Post 348 officers who own a second home in North Carolina.

In January 2025, the knitting group at Christ Lutheran Church, DeForest, WI produced nineteen quilts and two baby-sized quilts for the relief effort, since the weather, particularly in the higher elevations has gotten quite cold. Post 348 provided shipping and they were received by the Fuquay-Varina Post and will be sent to needy individuals and families in the affected area.

As Secretary, one of my top priorities is advocating for programs that benefit Wisconsin's Veterans and strengthening the vital partnerships that make our work possible.

That is why I am so grateful for the relationship we've built with the American Legion. Together, we are stronger, and that strength is essential in protecting and supporting our most vulnerable Veterans.

Governor Evers shares that commitment to supporting partnerships. It's why he has, once again, submitted a budget that provides funding for the expanded Veterans Outreach and Recovery Program (VORP). This innovative program, one of the first of its kind in the nation, exemplifies the power of collaboration in delivering life-changing services to Wisconsin Veterans.

VORP bridges the gaps that too often leave Veterans struggling alone. VORP outreach coordinators work with County and Tribal Veterans Service Officers, law enforcement, nonprofits, VSOs, and community organizations to maximize resources. They help Veterans secure housing, access mental healthcare, find employment, and navigate complex systems that can be overwhelming. They don't wait for Veterans to come to them; they travel across multiple counties, building trust and breaking barriers.

Currently, we have 16 regions with a coordinator in each region, connecting Veterans to community services and providing case management and support in each of those regions. VORP also has 4 clinical coordinators and 2 program supervisors who are key in delivering these Veteran services. Unfortunately, Governor Evers' ARPA funding for 7 of these positions is about to run out. We've asked for general-purpose revenue to replace the ARPA funds.

Without that vital funding, we'll have to return 11 regional and 2 clinical coordinators. Scaling back will result in increased wait time for Veterans to receive services, less timely intervention, delayed mental health assessments, and delays in getting Veterans off the streets, into housing, and into needed treatment. Fully funding the expanded program means more lives saved and more dignity restored. It is the right thing to do to honor the commitment we all made to those who served.

VORP is just one of the ways we help Veterans face and triumph over challenges. At WDVA, we know that no Veteran should have to go it alone. That's why your advocacy— the Legion's commitment to ensuring no Veteran is left behind—matters so much.

We encourage you to contact your elected state representatives to support programs like VORP, so Veterans know we have their backs. Find your legislator online by visiting legis. wisconsin.gov.

I am grateful for the American Legion's vocal support in keeping Veteran support programs fully funded and supported in the Badger state. Thank you!

As Human as We Are

"Elijah was as human as we are, and yet when he prayed earnestly that no rain would fall, none fell for three and a half years!"

-James 5:17

The showdown between Elijah and the prophets of Baal in 1 Kings 18 is one of the most triumphant scenes in the Old Testament. One man of God versus 450 false prophets

in a winner-take-all contest to determine whose God was the true God of Israel. The rules were simple. Elijah built one altar and placed his sacrifice of a bull on it. The false prophets built another altar and placed their sacrifice of a bull on it. The god who sent fire to burn his sacrifice would be declared the true God.

The false prophets went first. They prayed for hours, begging their god to respond. They worked themselves into a frenzy. They cut themselves, hoping their blood would get Baal's attention. But nothing happened.

When Elijah's turn came, he instructed people to pour water on his altar until it and the ground around it were flooded. He wanted to make it impossible, in human terms, for his altar to ignite. And then he prayed. And God sent fire from Heaven that consumed Elijah's sacrifice and altar, as well as the ground around it.

The Lord left no doubt as to who the true God of Israel was. Yet Jezebel, the queen of Israel, stubbornly refused to acknowledge Him. When she heard what had happened, she sent word to Elijah that he would be killed the next day. Like that would scare a prophet of the one true God.

First Kings 19:3-4 describes Elijah's memorable response this way: "Elijah was afraid and fled for his life. . .. He sat down under a solitary broom tree and prayed that he might die" (NLT).

Wait ... what? Why? The simple answer can be found in the passage from James 5 above: "Elijah was as human as we are."

People tend to put spiritual leaders-teachers, preachers, evangelists, podcasters, influencers-on pedestals. Oh, they're so spiritual. They never get down. They never struggle with depression or anxiety like I do. Every day is great for them. Not true. Every spiritual leader you admire is just as human as you are and struggles with vulnerabilities and weak moments, just as you do.


The devil knows that the most vulnerable time for many Christiansleaders and laypeople alike-is right after a spiritual victory. Maybe you've experienced that. Maybe you took a bold step of faith to do something for God's glory, and it went well. But immediately afterward you face a spiritual attack. Maybe your marriage foundered. Or your kids turned from Christ instead of to Him. I have experienced moments of weakness when as a Department Chaplain, I have said things and acted unholy and irreverent.

Don't focus on your emotions. Focus on God. Remember, you're not as good or as bad as people think you are. You're God's servant. Just do your job. Give Him the glory and keep moving, whether you're a leader or a layperson.

Understanding that leaders are as human as you are helps you resist the urge to put them on pedestals. It helps you be more realistic about your expectations for them. It helps you empathize with their responsibilities.

Perhaps most importantly, though, it encourages you to pray for them. The best thing you can do for the spiritual leaders in your life is to ask God to give them the strength, compassion, wisdom, discernment, and patience they need to accomplish God's work.

March 15, 2025 marked the 106th surely saved countless lives. It is with our shared goals, of the Legion family, that we "consecrate and sanctify our comradeship by our devotion to mutual helpfulness.' From Shell Shock in WWI, to today's suicide, The American Legion has met the challenge at hand. In 1921, the Legion convinced the federal government to create the Veterans Bureau. This gave Veterans healthcare, disability benefits, and vocational training. This later evolved into the Veterans Administration and then into our current Department of Veterans Affairs. In 1944, The American Legion drafted the Servicemen's Readjustment Act or the "GI Bill". When the initial GI Bill period ended in 1956, 7.8 million out of 15.4 million Veterans enrolled in an education or training program. In 1955, the Veterans Administration backed one-third of housing starts. It is estimated that the GI Bill returned \$7 to the economy for every \$1 spent in costs. We continue to address our representatives in government, to care for Veterans and their families. Since the Legion's inception, Veterans and their families have received benefits, as well as participated in programs that enrich lives. Health, wellness, and quality of life are found in the Legion. As the premiere Veteran organization, we celebrate our 106th birthday and proudly represent the American ideal.

The selection criteria and nomination forms are found in the Administrative Manual. Any serving member of Congress or the State Legislature is eligible for nomination. This award is to recognize sustained performance by any legislator. The nominee selected must advance the legislative goals of American Legion Department of Wisconsin to include the four pillars.

During the last few years, the Legislative committee has received three or four nominations at most. This year, our goal is to receive a nomination from each district. In order to accomplish this, you, the membership, must participate in the process.


