I want to start out by thanking everyone who helped me in my journey to Department Commander. A special thank you to my daughter, Liz, SAL 2nd District Commander Jeremy Mason and Washington County Commander Joe Le-

one. You helped make my hospitality rooms successful with all the work you put into it. You are all awesome.

This year my theme is Keys to Success – Back to Basics. I chose Keys to Success because The American Legion offers so many keys for success as a veterans organization - our programs, people, education and communication. We will be working on each of these areas this year.

One of my goals is 100% membership. It can be done. Joe Roberts, a 203% Post Commander, has agreed to be my Membership Chair. We will

be back to doing membership rallies. When I was Membership Chair, we did membership rallies and the Districts that supported them did well. It is a chance to call the 2930 members and get them into a local Post. It is also a chance to help some of the posts that might need a little extra support in making calls.

A best practice of 100% posts is to make frequent contact with their members. My challenge to our posts this year is to do the same. This isn't as big of a project as it seems. Let's start with a post that has 150 members. If you can get 10 people to help make calls, this is now 15 members per person per month to call. Break that down by week and it is 4 calls per week per person. Very manageable. Next month, switch up the names so each person is calling someone different! If you have over 150, you could make calls every other week. If you have over 300 members, you could do the calls quarterly. Again, this is a best practice of 100% posts. Their members pay their dues because they feel informed and like they are a part of the group. I would like to hear from those posts that take up the challenge to let me know how it is working for them.

I will be hosting an open chat session with Post Commanders on August 17 at 6 p.m. and August 20 at 9 a.m. This will give the Post Commanders a chance to ask questions or just have some general discussions. On August 24, at 6 p.m., there will be a Post Commanders course available via Zoom. This will be another opportunity to learn more about the job at hand and more opportunities to succeed. I look forward this upcoming year and the successes we will have as a team. Remember to believe that we can succeed! You can be an instrument of change. It starts with ONE. Be the change you want to see!

The year of 2022 did create some interesting roadblocks mostly because of COVID, and all of the restrictions that it created. We all know that as an organization we suffered greatly because of it and we still struggle to recover from it. I am very happy to tell you that the officers of the Detachment of Wisconsin, the District Commanders and Squadron Commanders have done a terrific job at recovering our membership. At the close of membership this year the total Sons membership was at 105% of last year's membership total. In addition to that we also added 5 new Squadrons. Things are looking GOOD for the future of the Sons. I would like to invite all

Please feel free to contact me or any of the Detachment Officers to answer any questions and to help you get one started. We have received consolidated squadron reports from 32 squadrons. The amount of donated time, money, and goods have a total dollar value of \$1,404,363 this is what the Sons bring to the Legion. We are not done yet because we will be engaging the Squadrons even more this year.

Our ALF dog program has been more active with four deployments in the past year and that program is in a financially stable state so that we will be able to continue providing comfort to the families of the deployed. The look on the faces of the children that receive them would melt the heart of a stone statue. If you know of a child that ALF could help, please contact our Children and Youth chairman Robert Sirovina.

My Historian, Mike Pook is putting together a scrapbook to enter into the competition at National. Mike is very good at this and his passion shows in his finished product.

Last year the Squadron from Hartland held their 3rd annual sleep-out for homeless veterans which was very well organized. When I heard about Hartland's fundraiser I called and talked to Mark Pape, who had organized the event, and asked if he would be OK with my Squadron doing the same thing, Mark was overjoyed with the thought of his idea being expanded. Hartland does their event in February and we do ours in March. At the end of both events the collective total was well over \$100,000 donated to homeless veterans. Both Squadrons are planning on doing it again this year, if you are interested in hosting one, please feel free to contact Mark or myself as we would be happy to help get you started.

Last year the Sons purchased two new laptops to be used by the Adjutant and Assistant Adjutant because of the amount of work it takes to do their jobs as well as sharing of files. We purchased an 8x12 enclosed trailer to store and transport our ALF dogs and meeting equipment. We have had the trailer outfitted with graphics that show our commitment to our veterans, children, and Legion programs. At this point it may seem that I am bragging about what we have done in the past year but that is not the case, I am PROUD of what we have done in the last year. As a team the SONS are able to do so much for the Legion, The Legion family and most importantly our veterans, and we will. As we move forward into the next year, I want to ask all of the Sons to be PROUD. Be PROUD to be a member of the SONS, because of your actions many will benefit.

30-FOOT FINANCIAL TARGET UPDATE

FY2021-2022 Financial Recap, 12 Months Ending June 30,o 2022:

- 112.40% of Revenue Budget.
- 95.48% of Expense Budget.
- 3.93% Annualized Time Weighted Return on Temp Restricted Donation Investments
- 4.90% Annualized Time Weighted Return on Unrestricted Donation Investments.
- \$4.34M in Total Assets.
- \$294K in Total Liabilities.

Considering the bear-market volatility over the past six-months, national-averaged 9.1% CPI inflation rate and 3.6% unemployment rate, the Department has fared better than expected but will need to continue to conserve resources, reduce or cost-share expenses as much as practical, and identify other revenue sources outside membership and direct-mail fundraising in FY2022-2023 to sustain programs and services.



STILL SERVING

Wisconsin native, Navy Commander Matt Steeno found himself struggling to find his civilian career as he began to transition from active duty after 23 years of dedicated service. The effects of COVID further complicated the process, he spent almost nine months unemployed. Steeno joined the Navy in 1996 after earning his commission through the Naval Reserve Officer Training Corps at Marquette University in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. Throughout his deployments he worked as a Damage Control Assistant, qualified as a Command Duty Officer, and was awarded his Surface Warfare Officer designation. His career led him to earn a Master of Science in Systems Engineering from the Naval Postgraduate School in 2002. He had tours around the world including England, Africa, and the Arabian Gulf. He worked in support of NATO and as a staff officer at the Pentagon. Yearning for work life balance, he and his wife decided to return to their hometown of Green Bay, Wisconsin to raise their children.

Steeno was referred to the Jobs for Veterans State Grants (JVSG) program at the Brown County Job Center, also known as an American Job Center in Green Bay, WI. JVSG staff include the Disabled Veteran Outreach Program (DVOP) Specialist and the Local Veterans Employment Representative (LVER). The DVOP assisted Steeno with refining his resume. The LVER, Derek Jablonicky, quickly realized that Steeno's leadership skills and talents translated perfectly for a shipbuilding company in Marinette, Wisconsin. Jablonicky leveraged his strong relationship with Fincantieri Marinette Marine to share Steeno's resume with the Human Resources staff. After a series of interviews and some negotiation, a position was created to maximize Steeno's years of experience.

Fincantieri Marinette Marine values veterans in their workforce including disabled veterans. Fincan-

tieri Marine Group and the JVSG staff have worked to help veterans find meaningful careers within the company.

Since their partnership began in 2013, nearly 40 veterans have been hired due to direct referrals. Fincantieri currently employs 2,151 employees, with veterans making up 11.4% of their total workforce. Of the 566 people hired in 2020-2021, 60 were veterans, most of which were JVSG staff referrals. In 2021, Fincantieri won the American Legion Employer of the Year Award and the Disabled American Veteran (DAV) Employer of the Year Award due to hiring and supporting our nation's veterans.

The JVSG staff have imbedded themselves into the community to access the resources that veterans may need to prepare for a new job. "The JVSG staff work hard to build relationships with organizations that support veteran hiring," said VETS Deputy Assistant Secretary Margarita Devlin, "the importance of the JVSG staff and the impact that they have in their communities shouldn't be underestimated."

Jablonicky received the Wisconsin American Legion and DAV LVER of the Year in 2021 for his work in building stronger relationships between employers and veterans. This year, DVOP Nancy Brown will receive national recognition from the DAV as DVOP of the Year primarily for her efforts in working with rural veterans. Brown also worked as a LVER and received the national American Legion LVER of the Year Award in 2016 and is the first Wisconsin JVSG staff to earn both national recognitions. DVOP Geraldine Perry will be recognized this summer in Milwaukee as the national American Legion DVOP of the Year. Perry's recognition is due to her efforts in partnering with the Center for Veterans Issues, a grant recipient, through the Department of Labor's Homeless Veterans' Reintegration Program. The JVSG staff in Wisconsin has created a proven model of success based upon trusted relationships and understanding the needs of all stakeholders.




mentor new members when they join. We have overlooked the needs of our members overall.

AUXILIARY EMERGENCY FUND (AEF)

It is an honor to serve this year as the chairman of the Auxiliary Emergency Fund (AEF). Please let me know if I can be of assistance.

What is the AEF and what does it do? This national program was first established in 1969 and the purpose is to provide temporary emergency assistance to eligible members of the American Legion Auxiliary who have endured a significant financial setback as the result of an act of nature or another personal crisis.

The AEF was created with a bequest from the estate of Auxiliary member Helen Colby Small of Burlington, Wisconsin. For the past five decades this fund has been helping Auxiliary members get back on their feet, with the generous support of current Auxiliary members. **To be eligible**, it is required to be a member of the American Legion Auxiliary,

with dues current and membership for three consecutive years (the current year and immediate past two years); who have not received a grant of the same type they are applying for within the last 12 months; and are applying within six months of the disaster. Applicants are eligible to apply for a Disaster Assistance grant or a Temporary Assistance grant when:

- A financial crisis hits, leaving a member without resources to pay rent/mortgage and/or utilities, and no other source of aid is readily available.

Unique Loan Fund Program Meets Wisconsin's Mission

More than ninety years ago, a lady named M. Louise Wilson had a vision. She wanted to assist women who required financial support to further their education. Because the American Legion Auxiliary made this vision a reality, the lives of unit members have been enhanced as we use these loans to further educate our own members.

Q. What makes this loan unique?

A. It is so simple to apply for the loan. Applicants must contact the program chairman to indicate their interest in a loan. The chairman then sends all necessary information to the applicant. There is no interest on this loan unless the student fails to pay it back. Six months after graduation, payments of \$50 per month will be due.

Q. What are the requirements?

A. The applicant must: 1) be a current member of the American Legion Auxiliary, 2) submit a copy of the DD214 for the veteran that made her eligible for membership, 3) send a transcript of her high school grades, 4) include three letters of recommendation, 5) be approved by the program chairman (most correspondence can be done through emails), and 6) have a responsible adult co-sign the promissory note.

Q. What is the amount of the loan?

A. If approved, the applicant can borrow up to \$800 per year for five years. One year from the date of the first loan, the applicant may apply for an additional \$800 by sending a copy of college grades and maintaining membership in the American Legion Auxiliary. If approved, she may continue to borrow until the total reaches \$4,000 or she graduates from college, whichever comes first.

Q. Why do you ask for donations?

A. Donations ensure that future generations will be able to take advantage of this program. Unit presidents receive a copy of the donation sheets, which are also posted on the Department website.
