The recent 80th session of the American Legion Youth program held in June at the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire campus, was a great success. A group of 680 citizens and 140 volunteer staff worked together to deliver a program that promotes Americanism, leadership and the study of democracy. Counselors, administrators and work groups devoted to operations and logistics makes it all happen. Included in that successful team are the three American Legion members working in Supply. These three are responsible for moving materials in a timely way so that the BBS program can be more productive. Whether it be paper or computers, water bottles or campaign materials Mike Feier, Jim Schmidt and Gene Wall are on it.

Mike Feier is a member of Post 54 in Marshfield. He has been a part of the volunteer staff at Boys State




#### VIETNAM WAR COMMEMORATION PARTNERSHIP PROGRAM



#### **ONE LESS WORRY**

I have heard veterans say they are afraid to get mental health help even when in crisis for fear of making things worse for themselves later due to added medical bills if they are seen emergently. Therefore, I am writing this article to

are seen emergently. Therefore, I am writing this article to enlist our army of informed people to Be The One and help spread the word.

Per the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA), the Veterans COM-PACT Act is now in effect. Veterans in acute suicidal crisis may go to any VA or non-VA health care facility for emergency health care at no cost – including inpatient or crisis residential care for up to 30 days and outpatient care for up to 90 days. Veterans do not need to be enrolled in the VA system to use this benefit.

This expansion of care was added to help prevent Veteran suicide by guaranteeing no cost, world-class care to Veterans in times of crisis. It increases access to acute suicide care for up to 9 million Veterans who are not currently enrolled in VA.

Per the VA, the act allows the VA to:

- Provide, pay for, or reimburse for treatment of eligible individuals' emergency suicide care, transportation costs, and follow-up care at a VA or non-VA facility for up to 30 days of inpatient care and 90 days of outpatient care.
- Make appropriate referrals for care following the period of emergency suicide care.
  - Determine eligibility for other VA services and benefits.
- Refer eligible individuals for appropriate VA programs and benefits following the period of emergency suicide care.

Eligible individuals, regardless of VA enrollment status, are:

- Veterans who were discharged or released from active duty after more than 24 months of active service under conditions other than dishonorable.
- Former members of the armed forces, including reserve service members, who served more than 100 days under a combat exclusion or in support of a contingency operation either directly or by operating an unmanned aerial vehicle from another location who were discharged under conditions other than dishonorable.
- Former members of the armed forces who were the victim of a physical assault of a sexual nature, a battery of a sexual nature, or sexual harassment while serving in the armed forces.

Bottom line, this removes the financial worry for eligible individuals and helps get them continued care.

If you're a Veteran in crisis or concerned about one, contact the Veterans Crisis Line to receive 24/7 confidential support. You don't have to be enrolled in VA benefits or health care to connect. 

# ALA MEMBER JOINS DOD DOMESTIC VIOLENCE EXPERT ADVISORY PANEL

Kyler Steffe has been a member of Willard L. Hinzman ALA Unit 511 in Ridgeland for 27 years. While attending Winona State University, she was a student advocate for victims of gender-based violence and helped run the university's sexual abuse report hotline. She graduated in 2016 with a Communication Studies major with a leadership and advocacy emphasis, and two minors in women, gender, and sexuality studies and social justice.

After college Kyler worked as a legal advocate at a domestic violence and sexual assault agency in Winona, Minnesota before moving to the West Coast where she worked as a legal advocate at her community's domestic violence services agency and then at her county's child advocacy center where she advocated for and assisted children, teens, and adults with civil protection orders.

In the beginning of 2023 she took the role as the Navy's Family Advocacy Program Victim Legal Advocate. Her main responsibilities are speaking with and supporting survivors of domestic abuse and sexual abuse, assisting with civilian protection orders and/or military protection orders, safety planning, empowering survivors, and assisting survivors to obtain resources for safety.

Kyler was nominated by her boss with the Family Advocacy Program in the Navy to be a subject expert about domestic abuse in the Armed Forces. 734 Navy personnel across the nation and overseas were nominated for the subject matter expertise topic and 20 were chosen to represent the Navy. The Department of Defense (DOD) has selected Kyler to be a member of the domestic violence expert advisory panel with a focus on improving survivors' access to domestic abuse services in the U.S. Armed Forces. The DOD is conducting this panel as a Congressionally mandated study to provide analyses and recommendations for improving domestic abuse prevention and response in the U.S. Armed Forces.

The panel will have representatives from each branch of the Armed Forces, and Kyler Steffe will be representing the U.S. Navy. These domestic violence experts will meet with the head leaders of the DOD to discuss access to domestic violence services for survivors of violence, identify what needs to be improved, and what changes can be made in governing policy to assist victims. Kyler recently received an email from Washington, D.C. headquarters congratulating her on this new position.

The ALA members of Unit 511 are so proud of Kyler and the difference she is making! Kyler is the daughter of Mike and Becky Steffe. Mike is the Commander for American Legion Post 511 and Becky Steffe is the President of ALA Unit 511.

#### **AUXILIARY EMERGENCY FUND**

What is the Auxiliary Emergency Fund (AEF) and what does it do? AEF is a national program that was established in 1969 to provide temporary emergency assistance to eligible members of the American Legion Auxiliary (ALA) who have endured a significant financial setback as the result of an act of nature or other personal crisis.

The AEF was created with a bequest from the estate of ALA member Helen Colby Small of Burlington, Wisconsin. For the past five decades this fund has been helping Auxiliary members get back on their feet through the generous donations of current Auxiliary members. To be eligible, the applicant must be a member of the ALA for three consecutive years (the current year and immediate past two years), cannot have received an AEF grant of the same type within the last 12 months, and is applying within six months of the disaster.

Eligible applicants may apply for a Temporary Assistance grant or Disaster Assistance grant when:

A financial crisis hits, leaving a member without resources to pay rent/mortgage and/ or utilities, and no other source of aid is readily available.

A natural disaster or weather emergency leaves a member with a damaged or destroyed primary residence and/or significant emergency expenses (lodging, food, fuel, supplies, etc.), and no other source of aid is readily available.

Applications for assistance are available on the department website (**www.amlegion-auxwi.org**).





#### **EDUCATION / M. LOUISE WILSON EDUCATIONAL LOAN FUND**

The new school year signifies a fresh start or a new beginning: a time to make changes or renew energies/enthusiasm with what has been done in the past. With the Education Program year completed and a new one beginning, ALA units have the opportunity to begin anew: add a new program or improve on past performance.

Considered the "Father of our Constitution", James Madison stated, "a popular Government, without popular information, or the means of acquiring it, is but a Prologue to a Farce or a Tragedy." Just as the founding fathers For God and Country, the American Legion Family understands that education is vital for the success of a democracy.

The purpose of the ALA Education Program is to promote quality education for all children and adults through literacy programs, scholarships, and classroom activities and opportunities.

Units are encouraged to work with Posts, Squadrons and Riders supporting and/or par-

ticipating in the following activities: Veterans in Community Schools, Give 10 to Education, American Education Week (11/13-11/17/2023), Teacher Appreciation Week (5/8 - 5/12/2024), Assist Military Children, Veterans Pursuing Education and ALA Scholarships.

The American Legion joined with the National Education Association to establish and promote American Education Week because an educated populace is necessary for national security. Work with the Legion Family to thank all who have roles in educating the nation's youth, including teachers during Teacher Appreciation Week.

Greater success is achieved by working with school personnel. Make an appointment to visit with the superintendent, principal or a teacher to share the educational activities of the ALA.

Invite a Legionnaire to be the unit's Veteran in the classroom sharing his or her experiences/stories with students. Talking with a Veteran makes it personal. When students learn how Veterans served and problems experienced, they better understand why Veterans deserve to be honored and thanked and learn what Veterans did to protect America's freedoms.

Give 10 to Education may be actions or donations of items in sets of ten: ten visits to read to a class or giving the teacher ten books to share with students. Necessary classroom supplies and volunteering (tutoring, assisting, etc.) are welcomed throughout the school year.

ALA units should seek out military families who may need assistance. Due to moves or negative experiences, military families may need help or just some friendly faces.

Provide Legion Family scholarship information to members, schools and the community. Scholarships are given to promote and support education beyond high school, with special emphasis on military children, Veterans and service members.

The M. Louise Wilson Educational Loan Fund also promotes the ALA mission and is funded by donations. Female Auxiliary members can apply for interest-free loans to further their education at a technical, two or four-year college/university.

Applicants must:

Be a resident of Wisconsin and a current female member of the ALA.

Submit a copy of the DD214 document of the Veteran who provided eligibility.

Send a transcript of high school grades and three letters of recommendation.

Co-sign the promissory note along with a responsible adult.

Have the application approved by the Education Chairman.

Correspond on a regular basis through email.

Begin repayment of loan six months after graduating or ceasing to be a full-time academic student.

If approved, the applicant can borrow up to \$800 per year for five years, for a total of \$4,000 by sending a copy of satisfactory college grades and maintaining membership in the ALA.

This program depends on Legion Family donations and ALA applicants honoring their responsibility to repay their loans.

For God and Country, the ALA Education Program supports Veterans, military, their families and communities.
