

BADGER BOYS STATE

THE SILENT LESSON OF BADGER BOYS STATE: THE RULE OF THREE

Simply put, one learns a lot during their week at Badger Boys State. The sources of knowledge are plentifulcounselors, Legionnaires, fellow citizens, various professionals and educators, and the nightly assemblies, to name a few. The lessons range from the practical to the profound. For instance, citizens learn how to properly run a meeting using parliamentary procedure or give an effective one-minute campaign speech. They likely learn a thing or two about what career they wish to pursue in life-or at least careers they wish to avoid. Nearly every citizen learns something about themselves during the week.



Having been involved with this program for a decade, I've been able to observe a silent lesson that is always taught during the week. Although few ever point it out, it is perhaps the most important one the program can give. I call it the "rule of three: person, principles, and patriotism.

At the beginning of the week, every citizen has three vital things with them: a BBS shirt, a red or blue lanyard, and themselves. The fact that these are extremely obvious items makes this lesson a stealthy one. The

citizen is - first and foremost - an individual. They have the autonomy to make their own decisions about what they wish to do in life, what company they keep, and where they go. The individual citizen is the smallest decision-making body at BBS.

Also on the first day, citizens are given a red or blue lanyard. These lanyards separate the citizens into the two fictitious political parties at BBS: the Federalists and the Nationalists. Although these parties have no platforms or ideologies, the citizens develop those with each other over

the course of a few days. In the real world of course, one's political and/ or spiritual identity is shaped by their experience and worldview, not a lanyard. Yet the lesson still holds—the citizens' principles and beliefs are vital in guiding their decisions.

Throughout the week, all 700+ citizens wear the same gray T-shirt with "Badger Boys State" printed on the front. At the first assembly, the visual is overwhelming: some of the best our state has to offer all gathered in one place wearing one thing. The shirt is a unifier. Despite it—and be a part of it.

each individual and lanyard color, the citizens are all a part of one entity.

The rule of three at Badger Boys State helps citizens understand that life is made of decisions we make by ourselves, as a group, and as a nation. The trick is to find the balance between all three by having a good sense of self, strongly rooted principles, and a strong commitment to the good of the nation. This lesson rises like the eastern sun over the course of our week at Badger Boys State. As always, we invite all Legionnaires to Eau Claire to witness

Every Legion Post, Unit and Squadron has an Historian position. The Historian maintains a a photographer. Any member can record of the activities in a given year. With the age of digital cameras contained within your cell phones, everyone can be capture the moment and send their pictures to the Historian and post them onto social media platforms. pictures and download them to a

uses templates to layout page designs. Since most yearbooks are in chronological order, the yearbook layout can go rather quickly. One can work on it as pictures come in, leaving some spaces to play around with or to add text. The written words are just as important to the visual. We want to know what the picture is about and who is in them, this enhances the yearbook's contents. Desktop publishing in general has brought massive changes in the yearbook makeup as there is no longer the need to print pictures and cut and paste things into a photo album sleeve and arrange them in a three-ring binder. Digital cameras and desktop publishing arrange the data electronically through the process and directly publishes a bond book to print.

World War II Vet Marks 100th Birthday

World War II Veteran Wallace "Wally" Ritterbusch recently turned 100 years old!

Born in Cedarburg in 1924, to Albert and Emma, Wally was one of four kids in the family. He remembered growing up near the nail factory, between Grafton and Cedarburg.

Wally went to high school for two years and then left to work for a farmer. It was in June 1943 when Ritterbusch was 18 that he was drafted into the U.S. Navy.

"I was a petty officer machinist and worked on the Landing Craft, Tanks (LCT)," said Wally.

Wally proudly served during WWII and was an integral part of D-Day, June 6, 1944, when the landing craft brought tanks and troops to Omaha Beach during the Normandy Invasion.

Some of his framed awards include a bronze battle star, honorable discharge medal and an award from Legion Post 486 where he has been a charter member since returning home from service in 1946.

Service Officer new rule or law can change the outcome of earlier benefit decisions. Here are few recent changes and some examples to think about

Beginning March 5, 2024, VA is making all Veterans exposed to toxins while serving our country eligible to enroll directly in VA health care without first applying for other VA benefits. This expansion of care means that all Veterans who served in the Vietnam War, the Gulf War, Iraq, Afghanistan, the Global War on Terror, or any other combat zone after 9/11 will be eligible to enroll directly in VA health care without obtaining an alternate reason to qualify, like applying for VA compensation. Additionally, Veterans who never deployed but were exposed to toxins or hazards while training or on active duty in the United States will also be eligible to enroll.

PACT Act- Effective date of law, August 10, 2022. For Agent Orange exposed Veterans - Two disabilities added, monoclonal gammopathy of undetermined significance and hypertension. The following new Agent Orange presumed exposed locations were added. Any U.S. or Royal Thai military base in Thailand from January 9, 1962, through June 30, 1976, Laos from December 1, 1965, through September 30, 1969, Cambodia at Mimot or Krek, Kampong Cham Province from April 16, 1969, through April 30, 1969, Guam or American Samoa or in the territorial waters off Guam



or American Samoa from January 9, 1962, through July 31, 1980, and Johnston Atoll or on a ship that called at Johnston Atoll from January 1, 1972, through September 30, 1977.

For Gulf War Veterans - Over 20 new presumptive disabilities added as due to burn pits/particulate matter to include many cancers and numerous additional disabilities, most are breathing, or lung related. Permanent extension of Gulf War Illnesses, removal of 10% requirement, and definition of Persian Gulf War Veteran was expanded. There was also an expansion of locations associated with radiation exposure. Example: A Veteran lost their left ear hearing due to a non-service-related cancer. Their right ear hearing loss was service connected. This Veteran's cancer is now service connected and both ears may be rated at their level of disability, along with any other residuals from the cancer.

The Blue Water Navy Vietnam Veterans Act of 2019 extended the presumption of Agent Orange, to Veterans who served in the offshore waters (12 nautical miles) of the Republic of Vietnam between Jan. 9, 1962, and May 7, 1975. There are hundreds of situations where someone was denied for benefits in the past that now qualify. This law, along with a 1985 court case cause a powerful chain reaction for anyone who would now qualify. The nuances to this situation are too many to list here. If you or someone you know served in the waters off the shores of Vietnam, there may be monies due for claims previously submitted.

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

In 1916, over thirty years later, President Woodrow Wilson declared June 14 as National Flag Day. In his address he stated, "My Fellow Citizens: We meet to celebrate Flag Day because this flag which we honor and under which we serve is an emblem of our unity, our power, our thought and purpose as a nation. It has no other character than that which we give it from generation to generation. The choices are ours."

Same mission through a different name. Greetings everyone, ALRA state Judge Advocate Ken "Rhino" Rynes here for director Corey.

Back in 1993, a couple of Legionnaires from Garden City, Michigan, had an idea to promote and expand their

post by forming a small group of motorcycle riding Veterans into their post. With help from the Michigan state judge advocate, the "Riders" were born. They are now nationwide and 110,000 members strong.

In 2006, the Riders took on the mission of funding the "American Legion Legacy Fund". The National organization had put out the call and goal to raise 20 million dollars for this fund that would give scholarships to children who had a parent killed in the War on Terrorism.

The Riders truly answered the call. The National "Legacy Run" debuted in 2006 riding from Indianapolis to Salt Lake City, Utah. When the 300 - 400 bikes rolled into town they brought \$120,000 for the Legacy Fund. The run continued to grow each year to a point that it was bringing in over one million dollars annually right up to 1.2 million dollars in 2023.

With that great success, the goal of 20 million dollars was reached to fund the Legacy scholarships. With energy levels still high for the run, a home for the funds raised was needed, but had to follow the original path of care for Veterans and their families. That location was found in the VCF or Veterans & Children Foundation. Established in 1925, VCF has awarded millions of dollars to military families in need

and helping them traverse the winding road of applying for and receiving the funds due them from the VBA for service-connected injuries and disabilities

Like the goal of 20 million dollars for the Legacy Fund, The American Legion has established a goal of 25 million dollars to fund the VCF in perpetuity. With this new mission and goal, the Riders are kickstands up and taking the challenge head on to take care of our fellow Vets and their families.

The Legion Family has supported the Riders at every level these past 17 years and we are asking for that continued support into the future of Veterans helping Veterans and their families. So as I stated in the beginning, same mission through a different name. Thanks in
