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ALL ROADS LEAD FROM BOYS STATE: REMOVING BARRIERS TO OPPORTUNITY

Every June, the citizens of Badger Boys State make their way to Eau Claire for a week that is sure to have a profound impact on their lives. For some, it will set a course in public policy, the military, or business. For others, they will have gained at least one close friend. In either event, the week means something significant, and the dollars are worth it for the memories they make and the course that is charted. Indeed, the paths and roads of life available to a young man leaving Boys State are far more plentiful than the physical roads they drove in on. But this roads-themed analogy places renewed concern on a problem that's a bit more ... concrete.

Now that I've added yet another dollar to my awful pun jar, I'd like to



dedicate this article to highlight our program's commitment to making sure that every eligible citizen who wants to attend Badger Boys State can do so. It is particularly important for sponsors to know this information as well. Of note is our network of buses that can bring citizens to Eau Claire from various points throughout the state. Buses depart from Beloit, Green Bay, Milwaukee, and Racine and make their way to Eau Claire at no cost to the citizens themselves, which removes a significant barrier for many Wisconsin students, particularly in areas where mass transit is used more frequently and for families that don't own an automobile. This goes a long way in making the program more accessible to citizens throughout the state—and we're happy to see more of Wisconsin's diversity represented as a result.

Also of note is the availability of sponsorships. We are always grateful for the posts who sponsor a citizen or even a few citizens from their local schools. Badger Boys State has made it a high priority to generate additional sponsorship dollars through our Badger Boys State Alumni Association and other avenues. If you have, let's say, three boys interested in attending, but you can only spon-

themselves, which removes a significant barrier for many Wisconsin students, particularly in areas where students where state. We can make that happen.

By working to remove transportation barriers for citizens, as well as prioritizing our own version of "financial aid" for any student who wants to attend, Badger Boys State is not only extending its program in raw population, but it's beginning to reach citizens who may not initially seem like the "right fit." ORATORICAL CONTEST SLATED FOR MARCH 29

The 88th Annual High School Oratorical Regional and Finals Contest is scheduled March 29 at Ripon College in Todd Wehr Hall. Opening ceremonies begin at 9 a.m. The contests began at the post level, then advancing to the county and the district level. The district winners will participate in the Regional contests on March 29 in the morning. The winners of the regional contests will participate in the Finals contest the same day at 12:45 p.m. The contestants are competing for scholarships. The winner of the Department Finals contest will represent the state of Wisconsin at the National Oratorical contest May 16–18 at Hillsdale College in Hillsdale, Michigan.

This is a great opportunity for Legion Family members to attend a great event that features talented high school students who have worked very hard to present their orations. Each contestant will present two orations. The first being and 8- to 10-minute prepared oration about the U.S. constitution. Their second oration consists of a 3- to 5-minute oration on a randomly assigned constitutional topic. There are

A MESSAGE FROM THE NATIONAL & HOMELAND SECURITY COMMITTEE

On many occasions while sitting around with other Veterans and Legion members, the conversation eventually gets around to how can we as a Post be more effective in the community? How can we let everyone know what we do? Sure, we can donate money, we can march in the parades, visit Veterans in nursing homes and assisted living facilities, we can host chili cook-offs, pancake breakfasts and fish frys. We can be available for funerals and flag disposal ceremonies, and also provide programs for the youth that attend the schools in our area. But maybe that's not enough.

Let's take it to the next level, there are things that we can do that not every American Legion post has gotten involved in, and that is to offer our services to the city or county emergency management team. They are the folks called to action in the event of a national disaster. These disasters could be a flood, a major fire, a tornado, or other weather-related events.

An American Legion Post could offer the help needed to provide the emergency management team a shelter, a command center or to accommodate citizens that have been forced out of their residences. We might also be called upon to be available to provide the meals or snacks for the citizens and the other volunteers. Possibly the Legion Post could become a warming shelter during the brutal winter cold.

Consider our Legion, Auxiliary, Sons and Legion Rider members who could also provide needed assistance in the event of a disaster.

So, as an agenda suggestion at one of your next post meetings, discuss how your post could help out in the event of a disaster that could happen locally. When you have established what your post could do, then contact the emergency management office in your city/town/village or at the county level and let them know of what you have to offer.

Most emergency management offices would be ecstatic to have your involvement and a team of volunteers that know how to get the job done.

When the next disaster strikes and a response from the community is needed, wouldn't it be great if the local American Legion post members were the ones leading the charge getting the community and their residences back to normal?

107-YEAR-OLD VETERAN INDUCTED INTO VA HALL OF HEROES

Reynolds Tomter was inducted into the Tomah VA Medical Center Hall of Heroes on December 2 for his courageous service in World War II and service to his community. At 107, he is the oldest surviving member of the Merchant Marine service. The oldest WWII Veteran is 110-year-old Navy Veteran Eugene Baltes. Reynolds stood with the assistance of a walker during the induction ceremony. Stating, "No, I don't need a microphone," his voice boomed through the VA auditorium.

Reynolds, born in 1917 when America entered into World War 1, was drafted in 1943. He intended to join the Navy but found that they filled their quota, so he went to the Merchant Marine recruiting office and enlisted. While stationed in Brooklyn, New York, he made five trips across the Atlantic Ocean and into



the Mediterranean Sea.

The Merchant Marines faced the same dangers as the Navy, but were more vulnerable to enemy attacks due to their lighter armored ships. They depended on Navy escorts and convoys for safety. One in 26 Merchant Marines lost their lives during the war; 11,200 were wounded in action or taken prisoner. The Merchant Marine Veterans were finally granted Veteran benefits in 1988.

Reynolds served as a Steward Mate 3rd Class, primarily as a baker in the galley. Everyone aboard the ship had a combat role, Reynolds served as a backup gunner defending his ship from German U-boats.

Following the war, Reynolds returned to his hometown of Pigeon Falls where he worked in a grocery store that he later bought. He started the local Lions Club and became a lifetime member of The American Legion.

Reynolds joins Medal of Honor recipient Kenneth Stumpf in the Tomah VA Hall of Heroes. Revnolds said.

At the Dec. 3, 2024 Hall of Heroes event at the Tomah VA Medical Center are Rita Rindahl, 10th District Commander; Ken Schoolcraft, Tomah VAVS American Legion Representative; Reynolds Tomter, Tomah VA Hall of Heroes Inductee and lifetime member of the American Legion Hutchison-Stendahl Post 191 in Whitehall, WI; Jennifer Conzemius, Chief of Center for Development and Civic Engagement, Tomah VA Medical Center; and Willie Vehrenkamp, Past Commander Etrick Post 354.

"Now you see what old looks like," receiving laugher from attendees. He modestly said that he was not a hero, just a cog in the wheel making the total war machine run. Reynolds said he "lived a life well spent."

In June 2024, he was one of several hundred Veterans to visit Normandy, France for the 80th anniversary of D-Day, describing his experience as a beautiful time with the gracious French hosts who thanked the Veterans for their freedom. Reynolds was in the front row of Veterans because of his age. He assisted in placing a wreath on the French Tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Paris. His son remarked, "Dad, now the whole world will see you on TV."

Thank you Our Veterans are among the brave There is so much that they gave They gave their blood, their sweat, their tears Just to keep us safe over the years They gave us all those tired hours And proved wrong all the doubters From the entirety of this nation, We honor all in this celebration. The brave, the bold, The ones who didn't make it home The ones we lost, the ones we found The many that are heaven bound Every soldier's mind holds So many stories to be told Just for us to take it for granted All the freedoms we've been handed. I have no idea how they do it. To push and push, yet never quit. So thank you to all the brave men and women Who keep this country safe to live in. There are no words to express My gratitude for your success Thank you.

Thank you, *EA* + ! You gave me the freedom to focus on Michael and the relief of not having to make all the arrangements myself.

Wallace "Wally" Ritterbusch, our eldest member at 100 years old, served in the U.S. Navy in Europe during WWII. Wally was assigned to the operational crew for LCT-547 (Landing Craft, Tanks) that landed at Normandy, France on June 6, 1944 (D-Day). After he completed his service to our nation, he became one of our post's charter members! Following his service, Wally continued serving The American Legion while working as a Tool & Die Maker with AO Smith corporation in Milwaukee, WI.

In the Guard and Army, he was an Aircraft Maintenance Officer and a rated Master Army Aviator. An award is given out annually in his name to an outstanding enlisted person in an Aviation Unit in the Wisconsin ARNG.

On the night of December 6 it was a windy 24 degrees in Milwaukee. 18 men and women of all ages chose to camp outside in cardboard boxes or tents instead of sleeping in their warm beds at home. Many were American Legion family members. They came together to "Support the Cause" as Andy Werner of Lake Mills Squadron 67 puts it. "Freezin' for a Reason" events are held this time of year all over the state.

The event, sponsored by the Wisconsin American Legion, lasted for 24 hours at the Milwaukee War Memorial Eternal Flame. The 3 coordinators were Joe Leone, SAL and TAL member and Department Membership Chair, Gene Hembrook, Department Fundraising Committee Vice Chair, and Dave Hodgson SAL Detachment Vice Commander.

Tables were set up with resources for Veterans and their families during the event. Many American Legion Family members stopped by to see the "camp". Bobbie Zerfas, Assistant Program Manager of the Homeless Prevention Program at the Milwaukee VA, explained that the mission of the VA Homeless Programs is to prevent and end Veteran homelessness. The American Legion Americanism and Government Scholarship Program Department of Wisconsin



Purpose:

To promote "Americanism", love of country, knowledge of government and allegiance to the U.S. flag to our youth. Eligible students are tested on their knowledge of U.S., Wisconsin and Country Governments, the U.S. Constitution and flag etiquette.

What Is It?

The test consists of 50 questions; true/false, multiple choice, matching, and an essay question that must be answered in order to qualify for the scholarships. Students are not allowed to use outside resources for answers while taking this test.



Who Is Eligible?

Any student in the 10th, 11th, or 12th grade in any public, private, parochial or home-schooled within the State of Wisconsin may participate. Students may only take the test 1 times per year; however, students may participate all 3 years and be eligible for the scholarships for multiple years.

The test is available online March 3 through March 14, 2025. **Students Register online** when taking the test on:

wilegion.org/scholarships

The link is only active during the test window.

Annually, 33 students throughout the State of Wisconsin are awarded scholarships selected by the Americanism Committee of The American Legion, Department of Wisconsin. The following scholarships are awarded:

> 11 students in Grade 10 receive a \$250 scholarship 11 students in Grade 11 receive a \$300 scholarship 11 students in Grade 12 receive a \$750 scholarship





The new legislature has been sworn in and has started work. While there are many new members, several

past members remain who have assisted us in realizing our legis-

lative goals. It is not too early to begin the process of recognizing them for supporting our four pillars.

Each district should start now. Which legislator in the state legislature or member of Congress from Wisconsin has demonstrated support for the legislative agenda of the Legion Family? Was the individual a first or second author on a bill, did they co-sponsor a bill? Did they provide assistance to Veterans in the community by helping them access needed government services?

In the last two sessions of the legislature much has been accomplished, such as:

1. Increasing the state grant to the Veterans Service Offices

2. Increasing the grants to the county Veteran Services Offices

3. Eliminating the requirement that County Veteran Service officers take a civil Service exam for the County to receive the grant

4. Excluding certain Military Allowances in determining gross income for the purposes of child support

5. Exempting Military Income received by active-Duty Military members of the U.S. Armed forces from the Wisconsin Income Tax.

The current session will be very busy, and as usual, we will be dependent on members of the legislature to be successful. The Disabled Veterans and Surviving Spouse Property Tax Bill needs to get across the finish line. We need to do more to bring home the Wisconsinites who are missing in action. Military families stationed in Wisconsin need access to quality child care.

The process is laid out in the Department Administrative Manual along with the nomination forms. Nominations are due at Department Headquarters no later than May 1,2025. The date is hard and fast as the nominations have to be processed and delivered to the Legislative Committee for selection for the Department award at the Spring Meetings.

The Department Legislator of the Year will be recognized at the Department Convention in July. The other nominees need to be formally recognized by the nominating district after the convention.

What is character, or integrity? It is who you are when you're all alone, when there is no one around to impress. It has been said that the measure of real character is how someone would behave if they knew they never would be found out.

We could apply that principle to a lot of things in life. Why do we not do this, or why do we not do that? It's usually because we don't want to get caught doing something wrong.

For instance, why do people observe the speed limit? It's because they don't want to get pulled over by the police, evidenced by the fact that when the highway patrol shows up, everyone slows down. We obey the law for fear of repercussions.

That is where integrity comes in. It picks up where the fear of being caught leaves off. Fear is a fine deterrent, and it has its place. But a better deterrent-or a better motive if you will-is wanting to do what is right.

SECURE YOUR BENEFITS AND VA HOME LOANS

James Fialkowski Department Veterans Service Officer

Service Officer Before I talk VA home loans, I want to emphasize the importance of getting your benefits now. Many VA benefits have changed over the years. There are more changes pending VA implementation in the very near future.

Two important changes coming are to the rating schedule. Tinnitus will no longer rate the 10% compensable rating that the current regulation allows. Instead, tinnitus will be rated along with the medically determined underlying cause. This could result in a non-compensable rating of zero percent. This is significant, as a compensable rating qualifies a Veteran as a priority group three in the VA Hospital system. Another noteworthy change to the rating schedule is concerning sleep apnea. Sleep apnea treated with certain breathing assistance devices currently rate a 50% compensable rating. The change will rate sleep apnea for residuals after treatment. If the treatment works well to alleviate symptoms of hypersomnolence as an example, then a zero percent non-compensable rating could be granted.

Note: Changes to the rating schedule do not impact those already rated for those items, as these ratings are maintained. If the new rating offers an increase, the increase must be applied for with a claim.

I recommend submitting an intent to file a claim as soon as you can if you are suffering from any disability that is possibly related to service. Doing so will preserve the date of claim for up to one year for a claim submitted in the future and preserves the ability to be rated by the current regulations. If the regulation changes during your claim timeframe, you legally fall under both rules and benefit by using whichever rating regulation creates the higher compensation.

VA home loans are made by private lenders to eligible Service members and eligible surviving spouses for the purchase of a home, which must be for their own personal occupancy. The guaranty means the lender is protected against loss if you fail to repay the loan. The guaranty replaces the protection the lender normally receives by requiring a down payment allowing you to obtain favorable financing terms.


You will need to get a Certificate of Eligibility from the VA to prove to the lender that you are eligible for a VA loan. In most cases your lender can obtain your Certificate of Eligibility for you.

There are different minimal service requirements but basically anyone who served under Honorable conditions since September 16, 1940, is eligible to apply. If you are still serving on active duty, you must include an original state-

ment of service that identifies you and your Social Security number and provides your date of entry on your current active-duty period.



MEMBERSHIP QUIZ ANSWERS (from Page A1):

- 1. FALSE The potential member is eligible for membership in any Auxiliary unit.
- 2. FALSE A divorced person does not occupy the status of spouse and therefore has no eligibility. But the fact that a member has become divorced from the person whom they originally gained eligibility does not force them to surrender their membership, even if they remarry, as long as their membership has never lapsed.
- 3. FALSE A lapsed member who wants to reinstate should not complete a new application. The original member number is reactivated. Eligibility must be reverified by the unit making sure that a person has not since divorced or the living Veteran is also a current member of The American Legion. Rejoins should be submitted on a Member Change form. Back dues do not have to be paid unless they want to keep continuous years/original join date.
- 4. TRUE No matter when you joined, your membership term is always January December.
- **5.** FALSE Ten senior members are needed to obtain a Unit charter. However, once obtained a unit may fall below ten senior members and still maintain their charter.
- **6. TRUE** The right to vote and the right to hold office are clear privileges of membership.
- 7. FALSE Members wishing to transfer units must have the Member Change Form signed by the new Unit Membership Chair.
- 8. TRUE Honorary Life Members do not receive membership renewal notices. The unit is responsible for paying dues annually for Honorary Life Members.
- **9. TRUE** A member is deemed delinquent for failing to pay dues by December 31 of the current membership year and is classified as expired.
- TRUE Absolutely! Membership applications can be downloaded from the ALA Department website or contact Headquarters to order membership brochures.






While the logistics of ordering and wrapping 834 gifts presented some interesting challenges, we know that no matter how much time and effort goes into the program, the amount of standing financial support from our

CONVENTION RESOLUTIONS

ALA-Wisconsin 2025 Department Convention Resolutions

A resolution is a written, formal motion. If written well, the resolution makes it easier for members to consider the proposal. Importance, length and complexity of the motion, and size and formality of the assembly are major considerations in using resolutions.

ALA-Wisconsin bylaws require that resolutions presented by an individual member must be approved by the unit or district to which the member belongs and submitted to department by June 1 so they can be transmitted to units 30 days before department convention. Any resolution not approved by a unit or district, or when the district conference is held after June 1, must be approved by the appropriate department chair of the program to which the resolution pertains. After the Resolutions Committee and other appropriate chairs/committees have acted on all resolutions, the Resolutions Chair will present recommendations to the delegates at department convention.

SCHOLARSHIPS: NOW is the time to complete and submit scholarship applications. The purpose of the ALA Education Program is to promote quality education for children, especially military children, and adults. Applicants are encouraged to apply for every scholarship for which they are eligible.

The national scholarships—Children of Warriors, Non-Traditional Student, Spirit of Youth and Member Loyalty—are "live" on the national website (www.alaforVeterans. org). Each scholarship application has its own link and must be submitted electronically. To be eligible, Wisconsin applications must be submitted electronically by 10:59 pm on March 1, 2025.

Anyone starting one of the National ALA scholarships with intentions to complete it later, should know that the attachments (letters of recommendation, transcripts, etc.) cannot be saved. The attachments must be re-attached before submitting the final application to National. Applications will be disqualified if all the rules are not followed. Note: Essays must be the original work of the applicant and not generated by artificial intelligence. The national organization uses an AI Detector to review essay questions and will disqualify those created by AI.

The national organization sponsored a webinar to clarify criteria for the scholarships. The webinar was recorded and is now posted on the ALA Academy for members to access. Sign into the national website, select "meetings/trainings," and under "online" select "ALA Academy."

ALA Wisconsin offers twenty-two \$1,000 scholarships. Applications are due to unit presidents by March 1. Unit presidents or their representative should review applications to be sure the applicant has filled out everything completely and followed all of the scholarship rules and guidelines, then be sure to sign it. After signing, unit presidents submit Wisconsin ALA scholarship applications to the Department Education Chairman by March 15, 2025.

In addition to scholarships, Give 10 to Education, Veterans in Community Schools, M. Louise Wilson Educational Loans, Legislation, and educating about AEF, ALA Foundation Veterans Projects Fund, and Be The One – are ways the Wisconsin ALA Education Program is "Serving our Veterans, Military and Each Other from the Depths of our Hearts".

M. LOUISE WILSON EDUCATIONAL LOAN FUND: On February 4, 1925, the Executive Committee of ALA-Wisconsin established the M. Louise Wilson Educational Loan Fund with \$200 to aid women Veterans and female members in attaining a higher education.

This Educational Loan Fund offers interest-free loans of \$800 annually, renewable for up to five years for a total loan limit of \$4,000 available to women enrolled in college on a full-time basis. Repayment starts within six months after graduation or withdrawal from a full-time academic program with minimum payments of \$50 per month.

Since 1925, the maintenance and growth of the fund has been entirely dependent upon the repayment of loans and voluntary contributions from units and friends of ALA-Wisconsin. No other department has this program. Help keep this program a viable part of Wisconsin's Education Program with a donation from the unit, county or district. Personal donations are also welcome.
