The bond issue passed in 2015 for our buildings can only be used for exactly that.

This tax is not used to operate the district, pay employees or run the business.



A Lot Has Changed in 18 Years!



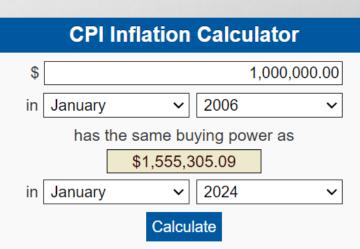

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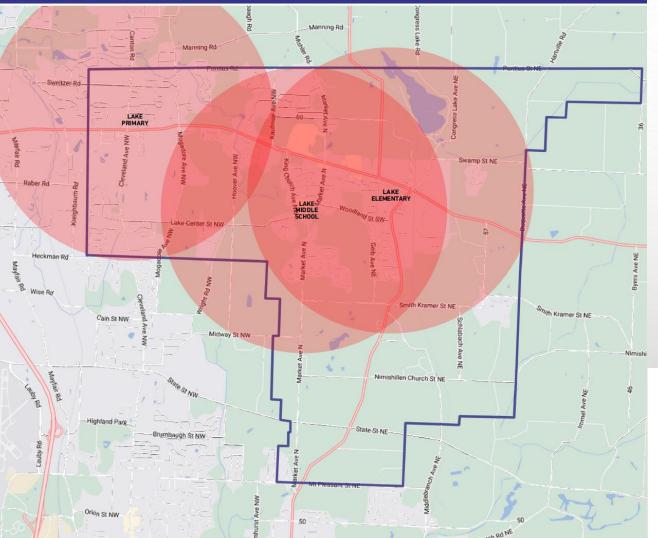
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BUSING MAP

(salaries, benefits, supplies, tires, fuel, everything except new buses)

State Minimum busing

- K-8: No busing w/in 2-mile radius
- 9-12: No busing
- Impacts 447 K-8 Students
- Impacts 440 9-12 Students
- Reduction of Approx 20 Bus drivers due to reduction of routes and staggered start/stop times
- Increases bus density
- Elimination of 300+ Alternate Stops Daily

Tier I – 65.7% Utilization 34 Riders / 51 Possible Seats

Tier II – 87.0% Utilization 67 Riders / 77 Possible Seats

District Structure

- Think of Lake Local School District as a business
 - CEO & CFO → Superintendent & Treasurer
 - Our Administration is Management
 - And we have ~450 employees across our staff serving 3300 students
- Cost to Run this Business is approx. \$40MM per year
 - This business is a service based organization
 - Don't make products, we educate through services
 - All of our policies, practices and spending is
 - Governed by the State of Ohio
 - Audited annually by the State of Ohio
 - **Reported** to and **Reviewed** by the Board of Education Every Month
 - Our Treasurer, has the responsibility to Comply With the Law & Make Your Tax Dollars last as long as possible
 - We also have Capital Expenditure & Equipment Needs, Technology Needs and Facilities/Building Needs like any Brick & Mortar Business – 10 year plans
- 80+% of our General Fund Expenditures are for salaries & benefits
- After People...busing/Transportation, Sports, and Purchased Services are the next largest spends.

When we talk cuts....80%+ of cost is People, teachers, staff, your neighbors, your community members working in the schools.







District Funding

- On the income side Funds Collected are approx. \$36MM per year
 - Multi-\$MM cash balance → Being good stewards allowed us to build savings.
- The largest income buckets are taxes and state funding with
 - Approx 44% from Local taxes Must be voted in This is what you and I pay in property tax
 - Approx 53% from State & Govt Funding Comes with Specific Restrictions
 - Balance is from a variety of income sources that the district leverages (rent, donations, partnerships - *Restricted Use* typically focused on facility maintenance (like the new track surface at the stadium).
- State provides 18-24 months of visibility to funding
- Lake is required to produce a 5 year (60 month) forecast







District Funding

- **But Wait!...**Lake is growing, more houses, rising prices = more \$\$ for the Schools...**Not the case**
- State Law
 - Does not allow Lake to collect higher levels of tax dollars from the community even as housing prices and the number of houses increase.
 - Lake, and all districts can only collect the total dollar value that was passed at the time of a property tax levy.
 - If more houses are built or home values increase...the amount you pay annually adjusts down so that Lake collects the same \$\$ this year and every year that a levy is in place.

***There are different types of Millage & Levies that provide funding with the majority of Lake's being Voted Millage. This receives a very nominal alteration each year of ~1%

This methodology has been deemed *Unconstitutional* by the Supreme Court of the State of Ohio since 1997, but no legislative measures have been implemented to provide Lake or any public school in Ohio an alternate method for property tax collection.







District Funding

State Funding Formula (Run and Mandated by the State – We Do Not Influence)

- Uses a District's valuation to determine how many state dollars they will receive.
- As Lake's home prices have increased and new construction has come online, the state calculates Lake's valuation increasing and as a result
- Enrollment, Valuation, Income
- ...we "Should" be able to collect more taxes from our local community.
- The result is that state funding is actually decreased when our district valuation increases, even though no new levies have been passed and we cannot collect more on the old levies.
- Lake is also exposed to **Unfunded Mandates**:
 - Districts must provide staff, support and curriculum through new programs
 - Many of which are the best things for your children and the students
 - Lake must comply but is either not provided funding for or is provided partial funding.
 - This bucket of cost has grown significantly over the past decade.

LAKE COMPARED TO OTHER DISTRICTS

The Issue 22 Levy will cost Lake property owners \$333 / \$100,000 of the county auditor appraised value of their home. The appraised value is what all property taxes are based off of and is established by the Stark County Auditor's office. You can find your property's appraised value on the County Auditor's website through the link below.

The bond issue which was passed in 2015 to build Lake's new schools will be ending in two years. This reduces school levy impact on property owners by close to 30% for the final three years.

Issue 22 Annual Impact for 5-year term:* 2025 - \$333 / \$100,000 2026 - \$333 / \$100,000 **2027 - \$235 / \$100,000 2028 - \$235 / \$100,000 2029 - \$235 / \$100,000**



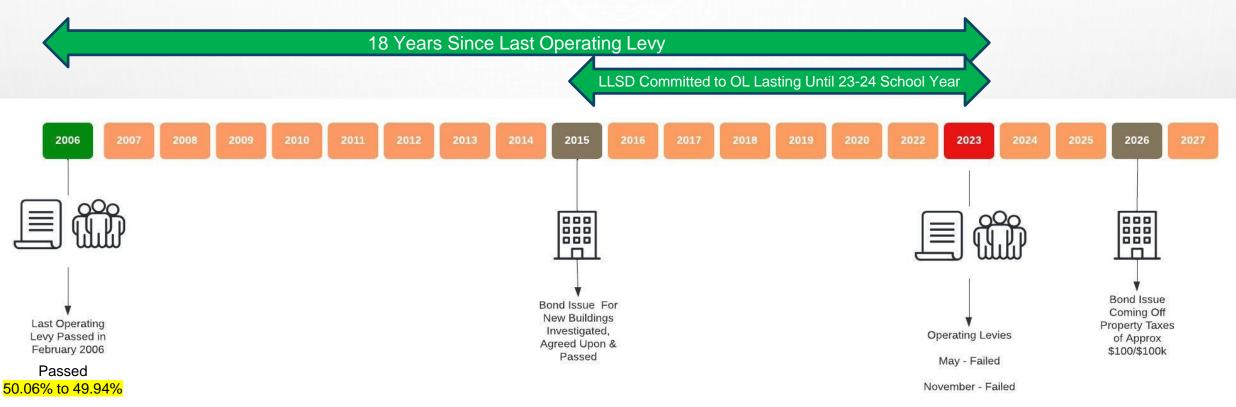


What is a Mill?

The revenue generated by 1 Mill is different for each District. To generate the same dollar amount as 9.5 mills at Lake:

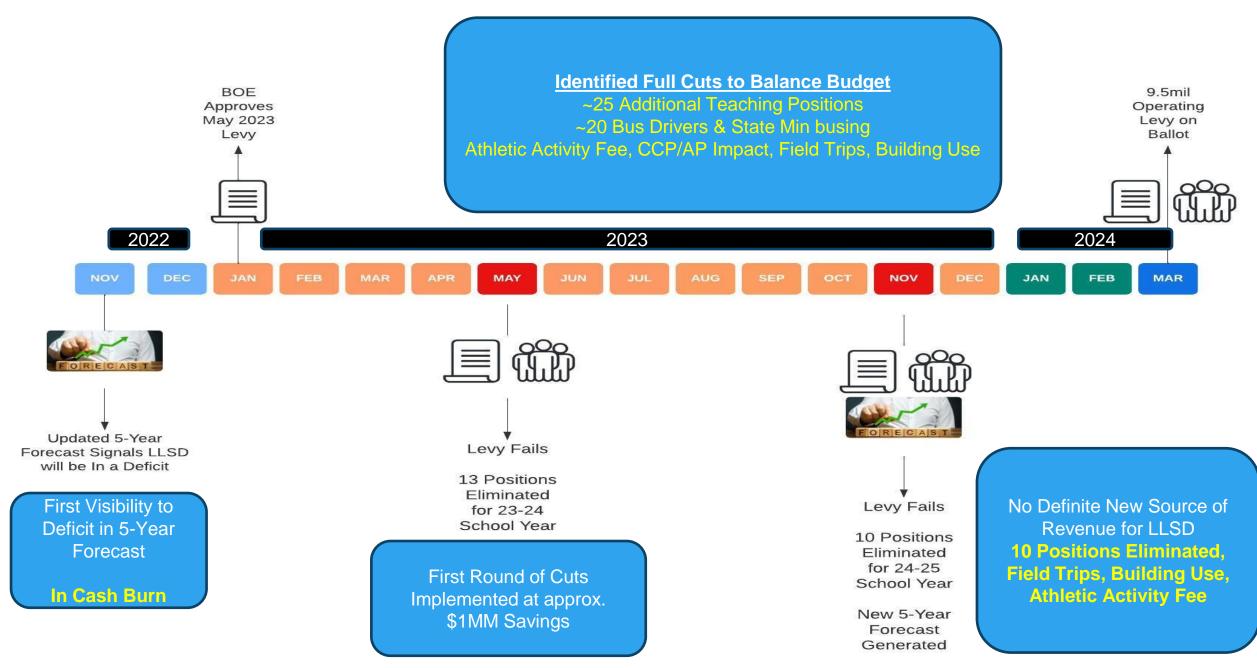
Lake LSD	9.5
