^{*}Ben Williams is considered the father of the minirose classification and calls for an entry of ten (10) Mini-Flora roses, either one (1) each of ten (10) different varieties OR two (2) each of five (5) different varieties; one bloom per stem, each exhibited in separate containers, all blooms at exhibition stage and each with a separate tag.



"Red" Is Not Confirmation of Rose Rosette Disease

It is an honor to be able to assist the University of Georgia's Center for Invasive Species & Ecosystem Health with the evaluation and verification of materials submitted by rose growers from around the country who are concerned that roses in their gardens have possibly contracted the dreaded rose rosette disease (RRD).

While wearing my "verifier" hat, a common occurrence seems to be sprouting that is possibly causing folks to be unnecessarily anxious. That occurrence involves the presence of growth on their roses that may be red in color. New growth produced by a healthy rose is a maroon red (see figure 1).





As that new growth hardens off, the red color changes from red to bronze to green (See Figure 2). This change from red to green is part of the normal development process in roses. Just because the color red is present *does not mean* that the rose has contracted RRD.

While it is true that roses infected with RRD can exhibit red growth, it is usually in association with other symptomatic growth (e.g. "witches broom"). The development of the "witches broom" symptom may be subtle (one or two stems) or a great mess of distorted growth.

It is also possible that the red color found in infected roses may not be the same as the red color found in healthy roses (Figure 3). In infected roses, the red may or may not change to green – but there are usually other symptoms present that will point to the possible presence of the virus (Figure 4).

The color change is due to the presence of anthocyanins in the plant. Anthocyanins are water-soluble pigments that help determine flower, berry and leaf colors in certain plants.

Anthocyanins that make new growth on roses red or bronze help protect the young leaves and stems from UV rays – keeping them safe from sun damage when they are the most sensitive. As the new plant tissue hardens off, this protection is no longer needed and the reddish hue fades.

Some believe that the red tint in new leaves is a genetic trait between varieties and is not found in all roses. That said, I don't think I have ever grown a rose that did not produce new leaves that were some shade of red, maroon or bronze

The online survey at www.rose.org will close at 7:00 PM (CST), September 26, 2022. Any paper forms submitted must also be in the hands of your district coordinator by that date. We urge you to use the online system - it's easy and it saves from having to transcribe written forms. Please take the time to report on all the varieties you grow on the **Roses in Review** survey list.

A broad base of participation is needed to make this project worthwhile. We need your evaluations, whether you grow one of the varieties on the survey list, or dozens of them. We welcome evaluations from you whether you are new rose-grower, a "garden" rose-grower or a seasoned veteran grower, whether you grow roses for your landscape and garden, or if you also grow them to exhibit or arrange. We are happy to get reports from non-ARS members as well, so please let all of your rose-growing friends know (and encourage them to try an ARS Trial Membership as well).
