


NEWCOURTLAND IS A PARTNER WE CAN DEPEND

A FOOD DISTRIBUTION CENTER IS COMING TO 2208 W. INDIANA AVE.

When our community has a need that Allegheny West Foundation can address, that's what we do. So is the case for the food insecurity in our area of the city. Essentially, we have two grocery stores near the 22nd Street Business Corridor. We in need and individuals in need, in our have Save-A-Lot at 22nd and W. Lehigh at Hope Plaza and we have eff Brown's Shoprite Supermarket at Hunting Park Avenue and Wissahickon Avenue.Problem is, sometimes, because of pricing, people form the community can't afford to purchase the food they want or need at the area markets.

Ron Hinton, President of Allegheny West and he came up with a plan to build an AWF Food Distribution Center.

Because there was no adequate storage space, or refrigeration, in any of the properties owned by AWF, Ron Hinton decided to build an AWF Food Distribution Center, which will be completed by the end of June 2025. The Food Distribution Center is located at 2208 W. Indiana Ave.,

Since the start of the Covid-19 Pandemic Allegheny West Foundation has been making sure that people from the Allegheny West Community who have lost Distribution Center will make a major jobs, or are underemployed, can still feed difference for our service area and for our themselves and their families. In partnership with multiple organizations, Foundation saw the gap. He saw the need, AWF built upon their already existing food program and made it even larger. The free food distribution they do, even while waiting for the news food distribution center to be completed, every Friday, (until further notice), continues outside in front of the Allegheny West Foundation office at 2330 W. Allegheny Avenue, residents from the community line up, sometimes stretching around the block to

only one block away from where we used Fox Street, as they wait for the food we give away. Currently the AWF Food the 19132 and 19140 zip codes. AWF distributes 30,000 pounds of free food each week. After starting the program and witnessing the continued need, it was evident that access to fresh, affordable food is extremely needed in this area of the city., even after the pandemic.
