Mayor Cherelle Parker Came To N. 22nd Street With Great News for Business Owners April 15th

Mayor Cherelle L. Parker, on the heels of her first 100 days in office, came to North 22nd Street April 15th bearing positive news, particularly for small business owners. The Mayor chose to hold her press conference at the Allegheny West Foundation Business and Community Resource Center at 2850 N. 22nd Street. The Allegheny West Foundation is a 501 C-3 nonprofit organization in existence since the early 1970's. Of the many things AWF does under the leadership of Ronald E. Hinton, Jr., is to support small business owners along the official N. 22nd Street business corridor, and throughout the area. The N. 22nd Street Business Corridor brags a list of some 110 small businesses. Of that number, there are 53 Black owned businesses. There are 17 Asian owned businesses. There are 9 corporate owned businesses. There are 6 Arabic owned businesses. There are 5 Hispanic owned businesses. There are 4 Caucasian owned businesses. There is one Greek owned businesses.

Prior to Mayor Parker becoming the Mayor, trying to legally start a business in this town could be very discouraging. There was so much red tape to get through before you actually could get a business license, that some people have shared that they were almost ready to throw in the towel before they could get their business vision on track.

During the packed press conference, with a lot of her senior staff in the room, small business owners and community leaders, Mayor Parker shared that she wants a revival at City Hall.

Mayor Parker said "I want a revival that brings out and supports the best that our good city has to offer, for a more efficient government and one that listens to residents and to the businesses. We are committed to elevating efficient government services that are streamlined, user friendly and accessible. Why? We want to remove all the red tape for small business owners. I've had a goal to do this since I was a member of City Council. As we think about this, I want you to know we can and will further position Philadelphia as an equitable and premiere destination to do business with our formal platform which is called PHL Open for Business.

The Executive Order that I am going to sign today, renames the office of Business Services to the Mayor's Business Action Team. This changes and underscores my commitment to having all city departments to work as one Philly government. It's a reason why the Sanitation Commissioner is here, but we're talking about neighborhood based small businesses. We want the Mayor's Business Action Team to provide that one on one assistance to businesses that they will need when trying to navigate city services and one that connects them to whatever resources that they need. The partnerships include these departments; The Mayors Office of Policy Planning and Delivery.

The Managing Directors office, our Licenses and Inspections, the Health Department, Revenue and Procurement, Our traditional Planning and Development, Law, Innovation and Technology an done that's near and dear to my heart, the Clean and Green Department. Clean and Green is extremely important along with the Streets Department and Recreation and any department that is regulating and servicing businesses. Why is

that? We don't want you having to work on trying to get access to Licenses and Permits and get over other administrative hurdles. We want you increasing your bottom line and improving your business so that you can contribute more to our economic power.

Why does It matter Mayor Parker asked. She stated, "It matters because the more people buy and spend, the more revenue we collect. That means some of the challenges that are facing our city, we'll have more revenue in order to address those challenges".



#### North 22nd Street Market Profile

Along the North 22nd Street Businesses Corridor as of March 31, 2024, we have approximately 95 businesses that are up and running. There are three new businesses that have moved onto the business corridor in this 3rd quarter, however one of them is still outfitting the inside of their academy, and they are taking enrollment applications. However, they are not officially open yet.

#### **Business Owner Demographics**



Along our corridor there are 53 Black owned, 17 Asian owned, 9 corporate owned, 6 Arabic owned, 5 Hispanic owned, 4 Caucasian owned businesses, 1 Greek owned.

All total there are 19 storefronts that are selling products or services that no one else is selling on the corridor. We have 10 beauty Salons or Barber Shops. We have 7 places where you can go and purchase food. Most of our restaurants are carry out. Only two have inside seating and in both instances, seating is very limited. We have one Super Market at 22nd and W. Lehigh at Hope Plaza and we have 3 Mom and Pop type corner grocery stores. Our service area has 10 medical related facilities or businesses. We have at least 10 area churches, including 2 Mosques on N. 22nd Street. We have 13 education related organizations or businesses along N. 22nd Street, or in the immediate area. We have 3 cell phone businesses on the corridor. There's 3 businesses where you can purchase alcoholic beverages, and there's 2 nail salons and one nail supply business. We also have 7 apparel stores.

The majority of our businesses are open 6 days a week between 10am-7pm. There are

a handful of businesses that stay open later, which includes our food businesses and the businesses that sell alcoholic beverages. The beauty salons and barbershops can have anywhere from 2 workers on hand, up to 6 or 7 workers.

Finally we would note that many of our businesses along our corridor have video security systems inside their businesses and outside of their businesses. It's about keeping business owners, their staff and their customers safe.

She can help walk you through the process of getting up to four FREE outdoor video security cameras, through the city of Philadelphia Department of Commerce.

Want to make your storefront look more appealing--- but thinking you can't afford to do it?

You need to check out the Storefront Improvement Grant that comes through the City of Philadelphia,

Department of Commerce.

It's the SIP Grant.

If approved for a grant, you pay half, and the City of Phila. Department of Commerce will pay the other half, for your storefront improvements.

#### Alba Martinez Means Good Business for Philly

In February the new Commerce Director for the City of Philadelphia did a walking tour along the North 22nd Street business Corridor, which runs from 22nd and W. Allegheny to 22nd and W. Lehigh. Long that five block radius there's upwards of 110 businesses that are up and operating, open for business, most of them 6 days a week, if not seven days a week.

Alba Martinez came out to see first hand, for herself, what all is happening along the N. 22nd Street business corridor, who the business owners are and to hear some of their challenges. No way would she had bene able to visit every single business owner, however she toured an impressive number of the businesses and with each one, she was very engaged and extremely interested in hearing what entrepreneurs had to say.
