

Who Was Martin Luther King Jr.?

Martin Luther King Jr. was a Baptist minister and civil-rights activist who had a seismic impact on race relations in the United States, beginning in the mid-1950s.

Among his many efforts, King headed the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC). Through his activism and inspirational speeches, he played a pivotal role in ending the legal segregation of African-American citizens in the United States, as well as the creation of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the Voting Rights Act of 1965.

King won the Nobel Peace Prize in 1964, among several other honors. He continues to be remembered as one of the most influential and inspirational African American leaders in history.

Origins of the MLK Holiday

Celebrating Martin Luther King Jr. Day is no long-standing tradition, and its establishment was no sure thing. Here's how the occasion became as central to January in America as New

Year's resolutions.

Beginning almost immediately after King's assassination, members of Congress proposed that his birthday ought to be a national holiday, but bills mandating the occasion went nowhere. The effort received more publicity when, after about a decade, shortly after the failure of a bill that was introduced by Rep. John Conyers Jr. of Michigan in September of 1979, Stevie Wonder released a song called "Happy Birthday." Despite its cheery title, it was specifically meant to make a case for the holiday, calling out anyone who didn't support the idea; Congress finally passed a bill designating King's birthday as a national holiday, to be celebrated on the third Monday in January, starting in 1986. from Times Magazine excerpts.

Congressman Lewis was one of the leaders of the Selma marches, including the march on Bloody Sunday. 

New health department campaign, “This is life with HIV,” shares stories of local people, dispels myths

LANSING, Mich. – Life with HIV looks a lot different today than it did 30 years ago. That is the message of “This is life with HIV,” a campaign just launched by the Ingham County Health Department and Ingham Community Health Centers to share accurate information about what living with HIV means.

The campaign addresses misinformation and features local people living with HIV. People are encouraged to get tested and, if positive, connect to care. Testing and care are available at Forest Community Health Center through the health department and the Ryan White Program.

“People living with HIV can live long, happy and healthy lives,” said Ingham County Health Officer Linda S. Vail. “Modern treatment options are drastically improved, but unfortunately work to reduce stigma around HIV hasn’t made as much progress. There is a lot of unnecessary fear and outdated beliefs in our community when it comes to HIV. Addressing this is key to HIV prevention and treatment.”

The campaign shares the stories of local people living with HIV and is initially launching with two local campaign models. One is Jackie, a grandmother who is living with HIV and who has opted to use a pseudonym, and the second is Jonathan, a writer who is living with HIV.

“Most people are surprised when they hear the worst part of having HIV is just the hatred and death wishes from the community,” said campaign model Jonathan Thurston. “People treat me like a walking disease, but, realistically, since I’m on meds, I’m about as contagious as someone with diabetes.”

The campaign will run through September 2021 and will continue to recruit local models throughout the campaign to show the diversity of people living with HIV in Mid-Michigan. Approximately 500 people in Ingham County are living with HIV. The campaign will recognize World AIDS Day with a free, confidential HIV testing event at Forest Community Health Center located 2316 S. Cedar Street in Lansing from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. on December 2. Everyone tested will receive a free gift card. Campaign materials will also be on display.

- Signed Photo Release Form and a recent photo


