The month of July, which corresponds mostly with the Hebrew month of Tammuz, doesn't have any Jewish holiday but has an important observance: the fast of 17th of Tammuz, or known as Shivah Asar B'Tammuz in Hebrew. This fast is linked to events that happened thousands of years ago to the Jewish people, so we might ask why this observance is still in the Jewish calendar.

The main reason for this fast is that the walls of Jerusalem were breached in 69 CE by the Romans after a long siege. This breach resulted in the destruction of the holy Temple three weeks later on the 9th of Av, or Tisha b'Av. A fast has been instituted by our sages because of the tragic nature of this event. This date, however, holds more tragedies, which might further explain the fast:

- -On that day, Moses broke the tablets of the Ten Commandments when he saw his people worshiping the golden calf.
- -During that same period, in 586 BCE, the Babylonian king Nebuchadnezzar also held a siege of Jerusalem (which resulted in the destruction of the first Temple, also on Tisha b'Av) and the Jews were forced to stop Temple offerings because of the lack of sheep.
- -Apostomos (a Greek or Roman general, depending on opinions) burned a holy Torah scroll.
- -An idol was placed in the Temple.

For these reasons we still fast more than two thousand years after the destruction of the second Temple. We need to understand that a date holding a particularly traumatic event carries the same energy year after year on the anniversary of the event. To observe a fast is to be given the opportunity to transform negativity, or darkness, into blessings. This is the reason why we still have this fast in the Jewish calendar.

What is true for events that concern the entire community also is true for each of us in our personal life. Below is a teaching that explains this deep concept.

Imagine a man at the beach. Barefoot, walking at the edge of the water. The waves come and go. Water comes and goes. The sound of the water comes and goes.

Coming and going.

This is a natural cycle.

It happens in nature, like day and night, the moon. Even the wind, although you may not notice this aspect. In life -and also in heaven- everything is also coming and going.

More precisely, receiving and giving.

What you perceive as a succession of events that are high and low is, in fact, this cycle. You need to know that it isn't about high and low moments, it is more like water coming and going. It always comes back.

When life, like the water, goes down, it isn't a low, it is more like taking a breath. You are filling up, but prior to breathing in, yes, there is a letting go, like breathing out what you don't need.

Water goes down, breathing out, letting go, the sand is now cleansed and sparkles. Energy is then gathered and you breathe in, your lungs expand, the water comes up because G!d breathes out as you breathe in. The ups and downs of water are necessary for life.



Ups and downs in life are not what you think. Your life is not linear, meaning a straight line representing time. Life is shaped like a shell, it goes around.

As you turn around, you unconsciously encounter what has happened before. The question is, how do you react to it this time

around? What are your emotions this time? What do you bring to the world this time? This is extremely important!

If you pass by an experience that appears painful, honor your emotions, you may talk to the experience itself. Ask what it is you are supposed to learn. When you learn, you evolve and the emotions will dissolve. When you pass by the experience again, you can acknowledge the event, saying hello and being grateful for the growth that happened.

The example of a painful moment is used, but you see, this is not reality. It only appears to be painful because you have the power to transform this pain into bliss. When you do this, you happen to spread this bliss in the world, and everyone can take advantage.

How wonderful.

When you pass by a happy moment, you need to recognize it. If you practice mindfulness and gratitude this feeling will spread and what appears to be uncomfortable moments will slowly dissolve, just like water clears the sand and makes it pristine. Keep this image, imagine water cleansing your soul, your heart. Past events that are tainted are cleansed this way.

Allow the water to flow through you, honor your emotions, and believe that your life is being cleansed. If you let this happen, you will transform a painful moment into bliss.

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A Silver Cup and a Hooked Rug by Ruth Chevion



When the Nazis entered Tarnow (my father's home city in Poland). one of their first decrees was that Jews should bring all their silver objects to the Gestapo. My father's family had beautiful silverware, and some lovely silver ritual objects. There was a fivearmed silver candelabra for the sabbath. a silver Hanukkah menorah, a special silver spice box for ending the sabbath, a silver holder for the braided Havdalah candle, silver salt boxes, etc. But most precious of all was a little silver wine cup that my father had received as a gift upon his bar mitzvah.

The cup was already 150 years old when it was given to my father in 1935. It is about 5 inches high, and one-and-one-half inches wide at the lip. Engraved with the swirls and curlicues of old world silversmithing, the couple of small dents it has in the stem only add character. The cup survived the Holocaust. Here's how:

When the order came down to turn over all silver to the Gestapo, Grandmother Miriam did comply to some extent. She surrendered a few objects. But not all. Her best sabbath candelabra she hung from a long rope down into a well. To Polish friends she entrusted the Hanukkah menorah, and other favorite pieces for safekeeping. Then with the help of her three children, gingerly so as to leave no marks, she lifted a floorboard in their city apartment. Into the narrow space under the parquet, she nestled some objects that were special to her: Grandfather's silver snuff box, some spoons from her silverware set, and of course the cup. Then they replaced the board.

Before they could finish hiding the cup and the other objects, there was a knock on the door. The man who stood there was a Polish man of the town. They recognized him. He was a well-known outspoken anti-Semite, a Jew-hater, someone who might have been happy to see the Jews of the city being rounded up, harassed, and removed. After introducing himself, as though he needed introduction, he offered to safe keep anything for them. He would keep anything they gave him safe to the end of the war, he said. Anything at all. Calmly, Grandmother went and rolled up a hooked rug she had made and some pictures and handed them over to him. Politely, she closed the door behind him.

When the war ended, Grandmother Miriam, with my dad and my aunt Chava, found their way back to Tarnow. In the search for things she had secreted, Grandmother found very little. The sabbath candelabra in the well was gone, rope and all. The Polish friends either had no memory of anything entrusted to them or had themselves disappeared in the interim. But a few things did survive. The little silver kiddush cup was safely under the floorboard having rested there and tarnished peacefully for six years, along with the spoons and the snuffbox.

The rug and pictures came back too. Shortly after the family's reappearance in Tarnow, the man appeared at their door and dutifully returned the rug and the pictures, wrapped just as grandmother had wrapped them six years earlier.

They questioned him. Grandmother Miriam and my Aunt Chava had no reason at that point to be reticent. "Why did you do this?" they asked. "Why would you of all people? We know you were no friend of the Jews. Why did you keep our property for us for such a long time and bring everything back?"

"I didn't like the Jews any more than anyone else did," he replied. "But what the Germans were doing was wrong. I felt I had to do something."

My Aunt Chava and I discussed this story again a few years before she died. We were sitting in her living room in Kiriat Motzkin in Israel talking about her Holocaust experiences. "You never know about people," she observed with a smile.
