Selichot by Rabbi Marc Philippe



The High Holy Days will take place in October this year, but the kick start will be on Saturday, September 28 with the beautiful and heimish service called "Selichot". In Hebrew, when we say "selicha," it means "sorry", therefore, the Selichot service is a series of penitential prayers. In the *Mahzor*

Vitry, an 11th-century work describing the yearly cycle of observances and prayers, it is written that "it is a custom to begin on the Saturday night before Rosh Hashanah to rise early to the synagogue, before the sun rises, and beg for mercy."

At Temple Israel, we will meet at 7:30 PM on Saturday night starting with Havdalah and beautiful Jewish melodies to usher in the High Holy Day atmosphere. The Torah mantles will be changed to the white ones and will be reverently processed in the Sanctuary, further contributing to creating the particular aura of the Days of Awe. Traditionally, Selichot prayers continue to be recited before Shacharit every day until Rosh Hashanah. At Temple Israel, inspirational daily emails, based on these prayers subsequent to our Selichot service, will be sent in order to take advantage of the wisdom of our tradition and to enrich our High Holy Days experience.

The special atmosphere in the synagogue on that Saturday night will be enhanced with candles and musical instruments. Our mere gathering on that night will have a moving effect, not only preparing us for Rosh Hashanah, but also propelling our souls to manifest HOPE. Hope for peace in Israel and in our community, hope for healing our collective trauma since October 7, hope for love to prevail, hope for a fulfilling and exalting year...

On Selichot night, the central prayer of the liturgy is the chanting of the 13 attributes of mercy. This year, however, this chanting will take on a special meaning. The mercy we will be praying for is related to G!d's forgiveness of course, but this season, as we chant these 13 attributes, the petition will be for our hope, and hope we can have, because the number thirteen in Judaism is filled with beautiful and inspiring mystical meaning. As we know, In Hebrew, each letter has a numerical value.

For example, the value of aleph (the first letter) is one, bet (the second letter) is two... this means that every Hebrew word has a special number and if we search which words have a numerical value of thirteen, we realize how significant it is that

the Torah enumerates 13 attributes of mercy. The Hebrew word "ahavah," meaning "love," has precisely the numerical value of 13. How exceptional, by reciting these attributes, we invoke Divine love into our life and the community. Our petitions are suffused with extraordinary energy if we are aware of this fact.

The word "echad," meaning "one" also has the value of 13. This is connected to the Shema, signifying G!d's oneness in the world, the interconnection of all creation and how G!d is beyond any limitations. All is possible. Our prayers of hope for peace and healing can be fulfilled!

I hope you will contribute to the prayers that night, joining your voice with the entire community across the world. As you do so, you will contribute to manifesting peace while expanding your heart and soul, connecting with G!d.

I also hope that by understanding these 13 attributes, your prayer experience will be enhanced, propelling you into exalting High Holy Days.

- 1. ה-ו-ה / Hashem compassion before a person misses the mark;
- 2. י-ה-ו-ה / Hashem compassion after a person has missed the mark;
- א-ל / G-d mighty in compassion, to give all creatures according to their need;
- בחום / rachum merciful, that humankind may not be distressed;
- เคาะบุ / ve'chanun and gracious if humankind is already in distress;
- 6. אֱרֶךְ אַפַּיִם / erech apayim slow to anger;
- 7. וְרֵב-חֵסֶד / ve'rav chesed and plenteous in kindness;
- 8. אַמֶת / ve'emet and truth;
- 9. נֹצֵר חֶסֶד לְאֻלְפִּים / *notzer chesed laalafim* keeping kindness unto thousands;
- 10. נשֵׂא עוֹן / noseh avon forgiving iniquity;
- 11. וְפֶשַּׁע / vafeshah and transgression;
- 12. וַחֲטָאָה / VeChata'ah and sin;
- 13. וְנֵקֵּה / VeNakeh and pardoning.

Midnight Rides to Deliver Coal by Ruth Chevion

Before the war, my Dad's father, Elchanan Fessel, would take my Dad along with him on midnight rides through the back streets of Tarnow to deliver coal. There were Jews in the city too poor to heat their homes in the winter. Of course, my Dad, Pelek, loved these outings. He would sit next to his Dad on the box seat as horses pulled the coal-filled wagon.

Elchanan kept records of who needed the coal. His file box was color coded. The people who regularly received coal deliveries were coded green. These people knew they would get free coal. Their deliveries could be made in daylight. But the people whose paperwork was coded red might be ashamed to have free coal delivered to their homes. They might be new to poverty. Their coal had to be delivered secretly, during the night.

Grandfather's coal deliveries were not a personal project. He was doing his part as a member of the Kehila (Kuh-**Hee**-luh). The word "Kehila" literally means "congregation," but back then it was not a religious organization. It was not a temple. It was a decision-making body for the Jewish community. In Tarnow, The Kehila had maybe 30 members - influential worldly people elected by popular vote of local Jews. It provided a safety net for Jews. The Kehila gave Elchanan the names for free coal.

But providing a safety net was only a small part of what The Kehila did. It was The Kehila who decided which schools and which libraries needed funding, which synagogues needed repair, where to hold Yiddish theatre, which writers to bring in for lectures, which musical performances to support, etc. The Kehila was so busy in Tarnow that they even had their own multistory building in which to conduct business.

Elchanan was an active member of the Tarnow Kehila. His main project was Jewish education. He was a leader in the establishment of Yavneh, which was elementary school education for Jews. And he was a staunch supporter of Safa Berura, the Jewish gymnasium (secondary school) where subjects were taught in both Polish and modern Hebrew. (Safa Berura means "clear language" in Hebrew.) An additional personal motivation for Elchanan was that he had three teenage children in school. Pelek and Alex were already enrolled in Safa Berura; Chava would enter there when she was old enough. Elchanan was an ardent Zionist. He advocated educating young people for a future in the land of Israel.

I'm sure you can detect dear reader, that I am proud of my Grandfather Elchanan and all his accomplishments, but when the Germans came into Tarnow, on September 8, 1939, one week into the invasion of Poland, all Grandfather's accomplishments were black marks against him. Along with the other members of The Kehila, he was targeted as a leader in the Jewish community. Hitler had standing orders that when his army entered a place, the first order of business was to kill the leaders. Execution style, shooting on the spot with bullets. This applied to Jews and non-Jews alike.

Sure enough, within days of entering Tarnow, German soldiers burst into the family apartment on Olearska Street. They ransacked the place. They ran from room to room opening every closet, looking behind every curtain to find my Grandfather. They knocked over plants in the greenhouse, searched the pantry, looked under everything, behind everything, beds, tables, the maid's room, the bathtub. They ran upstairs to the laundry room. They crawled under the big vats there, searching behind the wringer and the drying racks, shouting angrily about what they would do to when they found him.

But Grandfather was not there. Neither was my Dad nor my Uncle. In the weeks before the invasion of Poland, Grandfather had organized a group of Kehila members, and they had collectively bought a bus. By the time the German soldiers were ransacking the home on Olearska Street, Elchanan Fessel and his two teenage sons were long gone, on a bus, on their way eastward toward Russia, as far away from invading Germans as possible.




Photo of Safa Berura, my dad's high school on St. Anne Street in Tarnow
