## THE FOSTERING FOUNDATION ALL CARERS SUMMER FORUM

#### Our Registered Manager Nita Yeowell takes us through the successes of the inaugural All Carers Summer Forum

On Thursday 15 June, we invited foster carers from across the Fostering Foundation's different regions to gather for a day of inspiration, support and connection. Our first ever All Carers Summer Forum was the brainchild of our CEO, Sakina Khan, who wanted to create a way for all our carers across our network to connect.

We spent the day at the Holiday Inn, Taunton, with a programme designed to celebrate and inspire our carers. We started with an introduction from myself and the Fostering Foundation team, making sure that new and experienced carers alike had chance to put faces to familiar names (if they hadn't met us already) and sharing all the new initiatives and progress that we've made in recent months.

We then got to the star of our show - Nick Barwick, founder of Insight Wellbeing. Nick's company specialises in motivational speaking, training, fostering consultancy and mentoring for children, young people and adults who have experienced childhood adversity.

As a child, Nick was raised in foster care and overcame many areas of adversity and stigma. At aged 13, he moved to foster carers who promoted his education and "encouraged him to never give up", but his past trauma meant that he struggled with behaviour

Nick spoke to our carers from the heart for two hours, first sharing his experiences in an inspiring and informative talk, and then spending time with us to answer a range of questions from our carers and provide direct support from the perspective of an adult who has been through it all himself.

"It was an excellent presentation, and Nick was so insightful," said one of our attendees. "It gave me a new insight into the thoughts, feelings and understanding from children's point of view."

Another said: "Thank you, Nick, for sharing your personal experiences and teaching us to enable foster carers to look further into the lives and future of children in care."

We then broke for lunch – catered for by Holiday Inn and including a delicious hot buffet, salad bar and other refreshments - which was a wonderful opportunity for attendees to mingle and chat. Many people chose to chat with carers from across different regions, and share experiences.

We had originally planned to do a formal afternoon session where our attendees could ask the Fostering Foundation questions in a Q&A session, but everyone was enjoying the informal setting so much – and we were all still so energised from Nick's wonderful talk that we decided to adapt our question time to be more informal, and instead our team went table to table to chat to groups of foster carers and make sure they were fully supported. It was a wonderful moment for our team to catch up with carers in a more meaningful way.









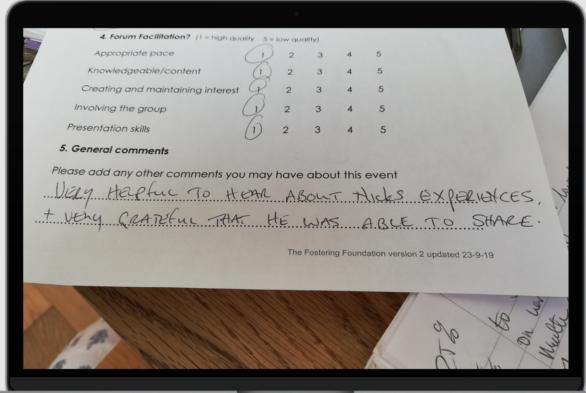
One carer told us after: "It was very nice to see everyone, and the presentations were excellent."

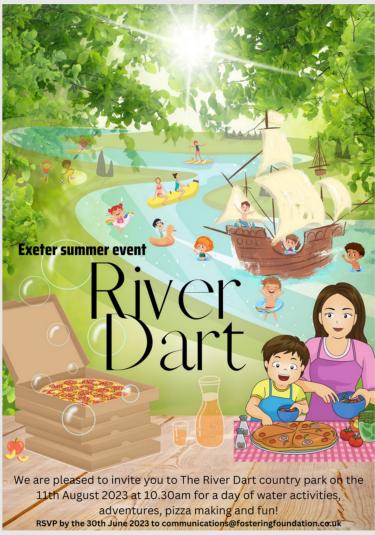

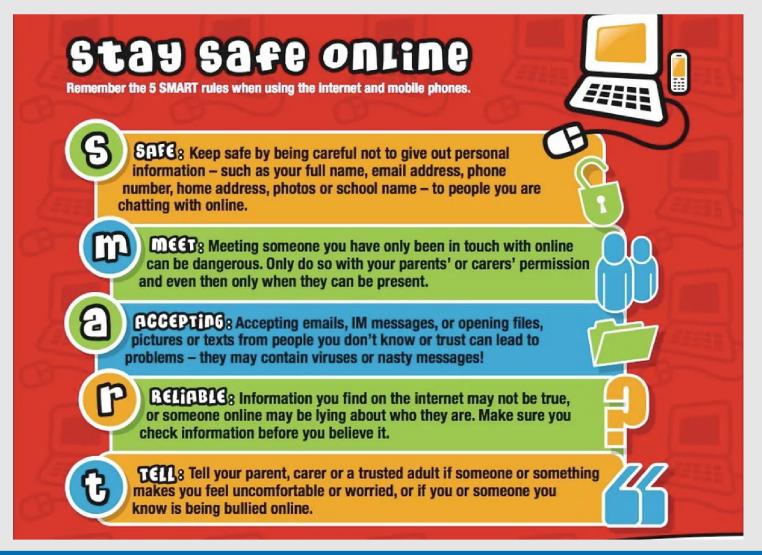

# UNDERSTANDING THE ROLE OF RESPITE CARE AND SHORT BREAKS AT THE FOSTERING FOUNDATION

As followers of our articles will know, here at The Fostering Foundation we offer training for a range of different types of foster care. From long-term and short-term placements to resilience care, sibling groups and care for UnaccompaniedAsylum-Seeking Children, we aim to serve as many children in care as possible across our diverse regions of the South West of England.

One of the key areas to make this possible is respite care and short break fostering. Both terms refer to a type of short-term foster care that provides a break to other foster carers or birth families for a specified and limited period of time, usually lasting between a couple of days to a fortnight, and often taking place during a weekend or school holiday in order to provide as little disruption to the child in care as possible.

#### What is Respite Foster Care?

The purpose of respite care is to provide much-needed support for foster families who are experiencing high levels of stress, and is especially valuable to those fostering children with disabilities and/or additional needs. It is carefully planned around the child's care plan and enables foster carers an opportunity to recharge as well as provide the young person with new experiences.

Wherever possible, if regular respite is considered beneficial for the families, it is recommended that the same respite carer is involved each time, in order to provide minimal disruption for the young person and to create the opportunity to form a meaningful relationship.

#### What is a Family Based Short Break?

Family based short breaks are a specialist type of respite foster care that is specifically designed to support the needs of disabled young people and children with special, educational, needs and disabilities (SEND), while providing long term carers with a break to recharge.

This type of short break might, for example, include an overnight stay with special activities, provided by registered foster carers. It's crucial that our Short Break Foster Carers are fully trained – as all our foster carers are – and also well equipped to care for children with disabilities and SEND.

#### Is there training involved?

Our short break foster carers benefit from all the training and skills development as any other foster carers, along with specialist training to ensure they are equipped to care for children with physical disabilities, special educational needs and disabilities, or particular behavioural issues that might require additional care.

Our short break foster carers also receive a generous allowance while the child is in their care and, since The Fostering Foundation matches our respite carers and young people with the same diligence that we do our long term placements, there is often the opportunity to make a long term commitment to families in need of regular respite and build truly life-changing relationships with the young people and families you help.

Although short break care might, on the surface, seem like a small amount of time to commit, it in fact plays a crucial role in support foster families and the most vulnerable children, to ensure they have the best possible care in their young lives.
