*Pastor Tony*

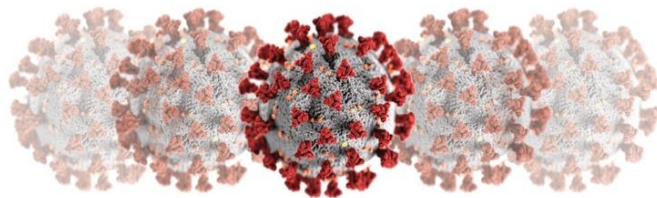

## BUILDING AND GROUNDS

Have you noticed a slightly different look to the church building? The entire exterior of the building and the bell tower were color stained by Gary's Painting. They also painted some outside doors which needed it. The east entrance door was only primed during the original construction and it looks much better now. The project which was funded by the "Blessed to be a Blessing" campaign came in under budget and was completed the week of August 10<sup>th</sup>. The next project is to replace the edging between the rocks around the building and the lawn. Contract bids are being secured and the plan calls for interlocking bricks to replace the timbers which have rotted over the years.

## REMEMBERING NORM NELSON

We have received word of the death of Norm Nelson, who passed away on August 13, 20, age 85. Norm and his wife Doris were founding members of CPC.

The Nelsons, Rev. Dean & Phyllis Williams, and Ken and Marilyn traveled together to Willmar in the very early days of our history. The result of that (and several additional) visits was the formation of CPC as a new church development. Doris Nelson served as church treasurer for several years and was the church's keyboardist prior to her death from ovarian cancer. The Nelson library is named after her. She was insistent that we should budget 6 months of salary for a choir director, in the event we found one. Sure enough, Andrea Besnett Lund joined our church staff in early January and got our music program started. When June came, we alerted the congregation that we did not have enough in the budget to keep a choir director for the remaining 6 months of the year. Within a couple of weeks, the congregation had donated the necessary funds. The music lovers of our congregation were most grateful to Dorie for her foresight.

Norm, retired from the Minnesota Highway patrol, was an early Building and Grounds chair and was instrumental in arranging for a landscaper he knew who put together a special grass formulation so that overflow crowds could park on our lawn as at the time we had an unimproved parking lot. Norm was what one might call a "hail fellow, well met" --

another way of saying he was hearty, friendly, and congenial.

About a year ago, Norm moved to the Twin Cities to be nearer his children. Winters here were becoming more difficult. He is fondly remembered by many here.

## The Nelsons and the Story of the Beginning of CPC

Dorie Nelson, while getting her hair done one day, learned from her beauty operator that someone was trying to get a Presbyterian Church started in Crosslake. So Dorie called the Twin Cities Presbytery and was told she had the wrong one. She then called the Presbytery at Willmar but they were unaware of any startup in the area. So Dorie put an ad in the local paper and 2 couples responded to it—Rev. Dean and Phyllis Williams and Ken & Marilyn Whitehead. The three couples got in the car and drove to Willmar to see if Presbytery would assist them. This started the ball rolling for the formation of CPC. It was later when Dorie learned that the person interested in starting a new church actually was wanting to start an Episcopal church. That individual and his wife, however, did become a part of the CPC family in those early days.

The early days (or years) of CPC were a struggle but that small group became wonderful friends and persevered. They sacrificed much to provide us with the church we have today.

At the dedication of our building, Dorie and I used a different hymnal than what the congregation was using. Our hymnal had 3 verses but the congregation's borrowed hymnals had 4 verses. At the end of the 3 verses, Dorie and I stopped playing but the congregation continued to sing. Dorie and I then caught up by the second or third measure! Afterwards, the Nelson's daughter related that the congregation kept right on singing in spite of the fact that the instruments stopped. She felt it was so typical of the CPC congregation—it had always "kept going" in spite of difficulties.
