Sign Language is a form of communication that is so vital to the development of the deaf/hard of hearing child and their proper development to communicate. Not only for those who require it on a day to day basis - but also for people looking to learn a new language. According to Gallaudet University, American Sign Language is the sixth most common language in the United States.

Ninety percent of deaf children are born to hearing parents, which can make learning sign language a family affair. Parents who learn ASL along with their child often find it easier to communicate on a deeper level with their deaf child, and avoid frustration.

Even knowing the basic logistics of sign language can help parents and children better communicate to build relationships and strengthen bonds. Having a way to communicate early allows kids and parents to communicate valuable information and impart rules and boundaries. For people who are deaf/hard of hearing, the benefits of learning ASL are undeniable. But what are the benefits for people who can hear?

Long-term cognitive benefits have been shown in many studies for hearing children that have learned sign language. With the visual nature of sign language, it is shown to be a great tool for early readers and enhances spelling skills. It is also very helpful for Communicating in loud environments. Most importantly, learning sign language provides an opportunity

to get to know your deaf community!

Starting March 20th, the Family Center on Deafness will be providing Sign Language classes in St. Petersburg and Largo. This is a fun, 6-week beginner level course to help build the foundation for ASL.

Raisina Children with **Hearing Loss**




super heroes, and who their nemesis is. The students will soon create a story line for each super hero complete with illustrations.

On Saturday Jan 12th, Studio Movie Grill and FCD collaborated to host a private showing of




Mary Poppins Returns with open captions. We had a great turn out of families and friends within the Deaf community. So glad we were able to collaborate with such an accommodating company!

It's all about STEM

RIT's National Technical Institute for the Deaf (NTID) will soon be joining with the Family Center on Deafness to present several new programs designed to increase our students knowledge in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math.). The NTID Regional STEM Center is an outreach program that achieves goals of improving access to postsecondary STEM education and employment for Deaf/hh students by:

- Improving the understanding that middle and high school students, teachers, and vocational rehabilitation (VR) counselors have on opportunities for deaf/hh individuals in STEM careers.
- Improving the instructional and technical skills of high school teachers in STEM areas.
- Establishing, expanding, and improving pathways for deaf/hh students to transition from high school to associate degrees, to baccalaureate degrees, and beyond in STEM areas.

The program helps improve access to learning for Deaf/hh students who may be in mainstreamed classes, with or without support and access services. The center's purpose is to promote training and postsecondary participation for deaf and hard-of-hearing students in STEM fields.

FCD is looking for middle and high school D/hh students who are interested in participating on a Robotics team. Students will compete against other teams from across the southeast. Competitions will be held in North Carolina and students will then head to a national competition if the team wins. Future Quest helps teens plan for college and career

Parents also received important information about financial aspects of college, and the support and access to services that will help their student succeed.
