#### **ALERT: PARKING LOT DETOUR**

# **April Speaker, Mac Rivenbark**

#### **GROWING ORCHIDS OUTSIDE A POT**

Mac and his wife Helen started an orchid business 26 years ago after many fascinating trips to the Philippines where Helen is from. With extensive study Mac has become an expert in Philippine and other Asian orchid species and has grown and successfully bloomed hundreds of different species.

From Mac:"For this lecture I will bring and show A variety of easy to grow orchid plants that can bloom great here in Florida. I will try to explain which ones that can be mounted and show how to do that successfully. I will also try to explain where

and how I have seen them grow there best and the type of care needed. This lecture has a lot of information for both beginners and even the more experienced growers. I have traveled to the countries where these plants grow naturally in nature and have gathered advice and information from many large commercial orchid growers and from hundreds of amazing private orchid collections. I will try to answer questions during this culture lecture as we all learn from one another. #### When Should I Repot?

When an orchid plant starts to grow over the edge of the pot, it is time to repot it!

Orchid plants need repotting for one or a combination of two main factors: Potting mix breaks down, often evidenced by dead roots, or the plant outgrowing the container. In the first case, a larger pot may not be required, simply replace the growing medium. In the second case, the plant may need

dividing or may be shifted into a larger pot. Fresh media should always be used. A good general rule of thumb is to pot for the bottom of the plant, the root system, and not for the top, the foliage.

Aliflor, an expanded clay product, is popular on its own as a potting media, or used as an additive to mixes. A fresh, fast-draining, but water-retentive medium is essential to the healthy root system necessary for good growth. Whether a bark-based mix (which drains well, is forgiving of watering errors but breaks down rather quickly), a peat-based mix (which retains moisture well but requires more careful watering and frequent re-potting) or some inorganic, basically hydroponic method, orchids have been grown successfully in a variety of media.



# APRIL GROWING FROM DR. MARTIN MOTES

This March has been much cooler than usual. The vast winter storms which have ravaged the continent with snow have arrived in S. Florida tempered by the benign warmth of both the Atlantic and the Gulf of Mexico. These vast weather systems have also brought us well above average rainfall which has been beneficial to our orchids as it largely fell in large quantities in relatively short periods of time.

The benefits of this extra moisture, which in addition to plumping out our orchid's roots and bulbs, washed away any excess fertilizer salts which may have accumulated across

the dry winter. Also washed away were mites and *Thrips*. With the persistent cooler than average temperatures *Thrips* have not been as prevalent as usual but as temperatures rise into the upper eighties their return is inevitable. A good rule of thumb is that five days without rain with temperatures in the upper eighties or higher are the prognostications for *Thrips*. Use the methods set forth in *Florida Orchid Growing* and *Florida Vanda Growing* to control them.

With large high pressure systems dominating our weather and with rising temperatures, relative humidity is exceptionally low. Both plants and growing media are drying very rapidly. Be sure to water especially thoroughly to the point of saturation. Be careful to water vandas until their roots turn overall green. Letting them get too dry will result in the roots acting like a cork in a wine bottle and repel rather than absorb water.

The wide swings of day to night temperatures in spring greatly encourage new roots and the initiation of flower spikes. Now is one of the few times in the year that some benefit is derived from "Bloom Booster" fertilizers. The extra phosphorus adds to the propensity to throw roots. A single application will suffice.

April's delightful temperatures and low humidity should inspire us as well as our plants. Now is the time to get all of the outside chores done before the heat and humidity turn up in May.


