

There is something new on the course but old to the game. For the relatively new golfer, it may be new information, while for the seasoned golfer, it is simply a review. So, what's new....the yellow stakes (you'll find some on hole number 15 for example).

In 2019, the USGA made significant changes to the USGA Rules of Golf. Among them was giving clubs the discretionary power to eliminate yellow penalty stakes (not a requirement but an option), thus resulting in allowing lateral relief from penalty areas in many instances.

While Lake Windcrest was previously part of the trio of clubs that was identified as Golf Trails, most, if not all, yellow stakes were removed; for those who remember, hole #6 on the west (Oaks) course was a par 3 over water and changing the stakes to red allowed a drop to the side, often taking the water out of play on the next shot. However, as our singular club has now focused on updating the markings on our course, there are obvious situations where lateral relief simply is not even a possibility (hole #15...there is no way to take a drop sideways since the ravine cuts through the fairway from the wooded area on one side to the wooded area on the other.

According to the USGA Rules of Golf, for a yellow penalty area, you may take relief by dropping into a relief area using (1) the spot at which your last stroke was made under stroke and distance (see Rule 17.1d (1)) or (2) the back-on-the-line relief procedure (see Rule 17.1d(2)). The back-on-the-line relief procedure is amended to provide that the player is required to drop on the line. The spot on the line where the ball first touches the ground when dropped creates a relief area that is one club-length in any direction from that point.

Each month, clarifying rules questions that occur during a regular playday has been a priority. Here are two such instances...again, the focus is on Hole #15. Player hit her tee shot such that it landed in somewhat of a lateral ditch left of the fairway but not in the wooded area. Because of recent rain, the ditch had water in it...was she entitled to a free drop...yes, this was considered casual water. Player then hit her shot back into the water...again she gets relief, but must to more varied looks. No longer are sleeves and count the stroke.

A second situation which occurred was related to a tap-in putt of just inches. BEWARE...you need to be cautious with these little putts. You must strike the ball. You may use any part of your putter to make the stroke...you may even strike the ball from the opposite side of the hole (a surprising discovery for me). However, the following do not meet the definition of striking the ball:

- ٠ A player holes a short putt by hitting the ball with the bottom of the clubhead, using a motion similar to that used in making a shot in billiards or shuffleboard. Moving the ball like this is a push.
- A player moves the club along the surface of the ground pulling ٠ it towards him or her. Moving the ball like this is a scrape.
- A player slides a club beneath and very close to the ball. The player then lifts and moves the ball by use of a forward and upward motion. Moving the ball like this is a scoop.

If any of these actions are used to hole the ball, the stroke counts course is "good taste"...and remember, the golf and a two stroke penalty is also assessed.



Several of our members have reported issues with their ghin stats and we are in the process of making corrections. You may find entries that may not correspond by exact date, but it is important that each of you review your history and report any scores that are missing or that appear in your record but are not yours.

Email Joni at: (stoyville@comcast.net) with a detailed of account of any corrections needed as of the end of March. Those of you who have been participants of LCC, your posted scores from the LCC matches against Falcon Point may be higher than you might have expected. If you failed to enter a "most likely" score when you picked up on a hole, a net double bogie would have been entered for that hole. In match play, even if you pick up, you are expected to enter the score you most likely would have had...in the future, don't just show an X. The seasoned match play competitor will put an X to indicate a pick up with the most likely score in the corner of the scorecard box.



Many changes in the game of golf came with a major overhaul of the Rules of Golf in 2019. But also, along the way, there have been some subtle changes in "golf fashion". Just like the game of tennis, where "tennis whites" were pre-requisite to any match, golf attire has undergone a transition collar required on ladies golf tops. "The LPGA website now states under their dress code: "We allow sleeveless and collarless shirts to be worn during play. There is no specific length requirement on shorts or skirts. Denim, cut-offs, and workout clothes are not allowed."

Recently, ads have been appearing promoting spandex golfwear. Rule of thumb has been if it is marketed as golfwear, it should be acceptable. A bit of a conundrum stems from the LPGA policy prohibiting workout clothes and the inclusion of spandex in golf catalogs. Spandex leggings have become a trend, and not just at the gym...you can see them at the shopping mall, the grocery store, etc. Spandex is not everyone's friend...the best advice to assure proper attire on the golf course is not the gym.
