It was wonderful to see everyone at our September meeting, and to hear the enthusiastic talk about the Sarasota Youth



Opera given by Maestro Jesse Martins and Martha Collins. This year they introduced us to another enthusiastic member of the Youth Opera Staff, Cameron Maxwell (pictured at left). With the help of a beautifully created video production, they explained the workings of the

Youth Opera with emphasis on their summer camp, putting together their professionally presented Fall Youth Opera, and working with children's voices and abilities, and with composers who are commissioned by Sarasota Opera to write operas for children's vocal range. We also heard moving accounts from two former Youth Opera members about how important Youth Opera was to them in preparing them for their adult life. One, soprano Monica Conesa, sang Aida at the Verona, Italy Arena this past summer. Imagine,



seeing and hearing one of "our own" at such a renowned venue! It was such a pleasure to present the Youth Opera with a check for \$5,000 from our Guild.

Our October 18 meeting will feature artists from Sarasota Opera singing some of our favorite and some less well known pieces. We hope that you all will join us then.

#### TUNE-UP FOR THE UPCOMING OPERA SEASON Elizabeth Aversa

It's the end of summer, the beginning of a new school year, and football season is underway. This means that our opera season will begin in a matter of weeks – the Sarasota Youth Opera's fall production is just over a month away (November 3 & 5) and the Puccini concert follows on November 10 & 12.

Before our full operas begin in Winter 2024, we might want to review some opera basics – just a little tune-up for the coming season. If you are new to opera, enjoy the brief descriptions of terms and concepts along with the examples that are linked here. And if you are already an expert on this fabulous performing art, then just enjoy the videos. Each entry in the list has a link to an example and then a link to the full opera. Just click and enjoy!

**Opera**, which tells a story through music, consists of three basic elements: music, drama, and spectacle. The **Prologue** is an introduction to the opera in which a character prepares the audience for the story to come. Here is the Prologue to Monteverdi's *Orfeo* in which "Music" tells the listener about the story that is about to unfold. The **Overture** is an instrumental introduction in which the orchestra gives the audience a preview of the moods and themes they will hear in the upcoming acts. Leitmotifs are introduced as well. A Recitative is a type of singing in which the rhythm, cadence, and pitch of ordinary speech are adopted to move the plot of the story forward or to allow for conversation between characters. Instrumental accompaniment is minimal. The recitatives provide links between the arias of the opera. An **Aria**, or air, is a song usually with instrumental accompaniment for a single voice. Arias are the "big numbers" in opera, but they rarely move the plot forward. They generally provide reflection or emotion rather than

An **Ensemble** is a piece that is sung by two or more characters at once. (Duet = two characters, trio = three characters, quartet = four characters and so on.) The singers may be expressing a shared emotion (as in a love duet) or they may be telling conflicting points of view. #### **SPECIAL PRELUDE**



On Friday, October 20 at 10 a.m., Sarasota Opera Executive Director Richard Russell, will be presenting a special multimedia talk on the life and works of Giacomo Puccini, composer of such beautiful works as La Bohème, Tosca, and Madame Butterfly. The talk will take place in the Towers Auditorium., located on the 2<sup>nd</sup> floor of the

Towers Building, 1533 4th Ave W, Bradenton, FL 34205. Coffee and pastries will be served at 9:30. Admission is \$5.

Mr. Russell is a dynamic speaker with an encyclopedic knowledge of opera, having started his career as a tenor with many opera companies throughout the nation, including Sarasota Opera. He was director of Princeton Opera, and has been with Sarasota Opera for thirteen years.

Giacomo Puccini was born December 22, 1858 in Lucca, Tuscany, Italy, and died November 29, 1924 in Brussels, Belgium. He was one of the greatest exponents of operatic realism, or *verismo*. He was born into a family of musicians, and was educated in music from a young age.



Once he heard Verdi's Aida, he was convinced that his future was in opera. Lucky for us!

#### MONICA CONESA RISING OPERA STAR

At our September meeting, we met two former Sarasota Youth Opera singers in a video produced to introduce the public to SYO. Moving commentaries on their experiences at YO were given by two former members: **Soprano Monica Conesa** (birth name: Monica Gonzales) and visual artist **Pablo Gonzalez** (no relation to Monica).

At 17, Monica performed the lead role of Rowan in the 2013 production of *The Little Sweep* by Benjamin Britten, and dreamed of becoming an international opera star. Monica adored Anna Netrebko, and listened to her recordings as she drove to rehearsals for *The Little Sweep*. Netrebko, in fact, was her muse and inspiration. She did what she could to enter the world of opera: study French at Mooney High School, take vocal lessons via Skype and pay close attention to her mentors: vocal coach Maestro Jesse Martins and acting coach Martha Collins. How very proud they must be of her!

She studied at the Manhattan School of Music and the International School of the Voice. She has won many prestigious vocal competitions.

In 2022 she debuted at the age of 26 in the title roles of *Aida* (twice) (the youngest artist to premier in this role except for Maria Callas) and *La Gioconda* at the world famous Arena di Verona. She returned to reprise the role of Aida in 2023 Who was playing Aida in Verona when Monica wasn't? Who else but Anna Netrebko!

She also performed last summer in concert with Riccardo Muti in Ravenna. Maestro Muti was the Artistic Director of La Scala for 19 years, as well as principal conductor of the London Philharmonia, the Philadelphia Orchestra, and the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, as well as many others.
