Industry colleagues rallied around Greg after his diagnosis and suggested dinner to honour his generosity over the years. What Greg thought would be a few quiet beers at



the pub turned into a sell-out event - the Green Gala - at Country Club Tasmania.

As MC of the event, I was blown away by the extraordinary emotion, bravery and sense of community felt on the night.

The room heard from Launceston's Dr Rosie Clarke, who shared findings from her MND research, as well as Greg who spoke of his gratitude and experience with the disease.

Friends of RAW to make difference

Launched at the end of November this year, the Friends of RAW program engages frontline community members to be part of a community-driven suicide prevention program.

In consultation with key industry stakeholders, the program was created to address an unmet need from frontline workers experiencing individuals sharing the harsh impacts of situational stressors and mental health challenges.

The program is designed to empower individuals to bridge the gap and connect people into RAW's support services.

RAW, known as Rural Alive and Well, assists to build healthy and resilient rural communities



as a way to reduce the prevalence of suicides through low-cost, low-stigma mental health and suicide prevention programs that are person-centred and non-clinical in care.

Friends of RAW is currently looking for individuals who work along rural, remote and primary industry workers to join its program.

Rock Lobster fishers heard in government changes

Congratulations to Tasmania's small rock lobster fishers for standing up and having their voices heard.

Earlier this year, the Liberal Government consulted with the rock lobster industry regarding the fisheries existing rules, which expired in November this year.

While most of the proposed rule and policy changes were welcomed, the proposal to expand the 60-pot area across the entire state was contentious.

After relentless community campaigning and advocating on behalf of these fishers in Parliament, the Primary Industries and Water Minister finally backed in our small regional communities and fishers.



This process had caused immense stress to those fishers, regional communities and businesses reliant on our rock lobster fishers.

Again, congratulations to our fishers and rock lobsters groups for being brave enough to stand up and voice their concerns.
