WHO WE ARE

Lions International is a non-political service organization established originally in 1916 in Chicago, Illinois. As the world's largest service organization, 1.4 million members serve in over 48,000 clubs across 200 countries.

The **Rogue Valley Lions Club (RVLC)** is a local group headquartered in Central Point OR. We are a 501(c)(3) charitable organization that raises funds and provides volunteers for local causes. Formerly the Jacksonville Lions Club, founded April 13th, 1948, we have expanded to serve more of Southern Oregon.



WHAT WE DO

In addition to service projects, we raise funds for worthy causes. With the money we raise, we support charitable sight and hearing organizations, such as the Southern Oregon Lions Sight and Hearing Center in Medford. We sponsor local educational endeavors, including scholarships, art contests, American Flag education, and we assemble and deliver over 150 Christmas food bags to shut-ins through "Food & Friends."

Recurring events

We participate in the following community events:

- We march in local parades with our classic yellow 1941 tractor and trailer float:
 - o 4th of July Parade, Central Point
 - o Christmas Parades in Jacksonville and Central Point
- Bling Fling, a used jewelry fundraiser sponsored by the Oregon Lions Sight and Hearing Center.
- crafts fair featuring local artisans, where we host a booth.
- American flag presentations to local elementary schools. These halfhour presentations to local first-graders tell the story of how our flag was created and what it represents.
- Adopt-a-Road cleanup twice a year, helping keep Old Stage Road trashfree.
- Jacksonville Elementary Children's Theater traffic control at the Britt Pavillion.

Major annual fund-raising events

Our major fundraising events are highly successful Wine Walks in historic downtown Central Point where we pair local businesses with approximately 15 Rogue Valley wineries.

- Spring Wine Walk fund raiser, Central Point, end of May.
- Harvest Wine Walk fund raiser, Central Point, end of September.

When we meet

 - Meetings are conducted using Roberts Rules of Order.

 opportunity to get to know fellow Lions in a social setting. Spouses and
 significant others are welcome, but please make sure the meeting
 coordinator knows they will be joining us.

Dues

Dues are paid annually to help fund local and international operations. Annual dues are currently set at \$80 and are paid at the end of each year.



Your Buddy

When you join, you will be assigned a "Buddy," in most cases the sponsor who invited you to your first meeting. Your Buddy will help you get oriented to our activities and procedures and help you integrate into our Club's culture. Lean on your Buddy to help you become a staunch member of our Club.

Any prospective member can be our guest to have them experience how we work together and to meet other members. You can invite them to attend any regular meeting with no need to coordinate with anyone. Introduce your guest to the Club at the beginning of the meeting. The Club will pay for any guest's dinner.
