Beach Parking Permit cost may increase Would be first increase in 21 years

Port Aransas seeks larger share of revenue

The City of Port Aransas has begun a process to raise the cost of Beach Parking Permits beginning in 2027.

The cost of the permits has been set at \$12 per year since 2004 and under the proposed plan would increase to \$20 if approved by the Port Aransas City Council,



Harbor Island the Quest for a Deep Water Port

Ask someone where Harbor Island is often you will a vacant stare followed by a wild guess. But tell them that when they cross the ferry from Port Aransas to the mainland (or The Big Island as we Islanders call it) that they are on Harbor Island and they will understand. Harbor Island lacks the glamour of many of the islands around the area but for more than 100 years it has filled with oil storage tanks, high

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


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

agenda for the next biennium in the run up

to the next session in 2027. Among the successes in the 2025 session he cited were a change in the rules for the Texas Windstorm Insurance Association which now requires a two-thirds vote for any rate increases. That move also comes with a long-sought expansion of the risk pool paying into the Texas Windstorm system from the previous fourteen counties along the Texas Coast –not including Harris County – to include all 254 counties across the state. That change comes after a decade of pushing by Hunter who now has the seventh highest seniority in the 150-member Texas House of Representatives and means all Texans will now pay into the fund. In past years higher windstorm rates along the Texas Coast were often driven by natural disasters, primarily hailstorms, in other parts of the state with the repair costs falling solely to coastal rate payers.

"In the next twelve months Island ratepayers will see decreases in their windstorm rates," Hunter said. The legislature also approved payments of \$1-\$2 million to school districts across the fourteen coastal counties to reimburse them for previous windstorm payments levied solely to those districts in

Hunter also said he plans to renew efforts to bring cruise ships to the Port of Corpus Christi in light of the increased water clearance of the new Harbor Bridge. "The cruise ship bill passed four years ago," he said. "I'm going to tee that up moving forward."

Future agenda

Hunter also outlined for the crowd his agenda moving toward the next session of the state legislature in 2027.

"Our property tax system is broken," he said. "It is a dinosaur. The legislature has taken steps to discount valuations for school taxes but even as we do that property tax evaluations continue to rise. This has to be addressed at the state level."

He also cited rising auto insurance rates and a streamlining of the electricity rate structure as priorities along with increased attention and funding for the arts, and the tourism industry.

"Things are good," he said. "We have made some progress on issues we have been working on for years and now can expand our scope of projects."

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

The holiday season is a time for touching

A while back my friend Short and Wide Jerry – at least that's his name for these pages – called and I reminded him of a holiday ride through Palm Beach in the back seat of a Bentley that at the time was a hair raising experience but now more than a decade in the rearview takes on an opaque quality. Started as a business meeting

It was just before Christmas 1998 and we were slaving in the television dodge at the CBS station in the West Palm Beach market where Jerry was my boss and he wanted to start a business taking old family photos and turning them into videos for viewing at family gatherings. There are a lot of old families around those parts with all kinds of stories and pictures and Jerry aimed to cash in. The project had reached the Who Brought the Money Stage and Jerry had someone in mind. She was a nice lady of about 85 named Gertrude who did a pet segment on the station and Jerry set up a "meeting." There's a section of Palm Beach Island

where the island is narrow enough that houses there have an ocean view on the front side, interrupted only by the county road, and on the back side border the laguna so they can have a boat dock. There are twelve houses, if memory serves, in that stretch of the island and it is known as Billionaires Row; these are not hovels. Gertrude lived in one of those. Her former husband had been the king of vending machines in Chicago and made a lot of money which Gertrude now had half of. "She's going to invest in the company,"

Jerry said. "We're going to have a meeting with her on Saturday night." "A business meeting on Saturday night?" I

"Yea, in Palm Beach."

Well, okay.

So on Friday afternoon Jerry comes by my office and says, "Gertrude's car is going to pick us up at my house at five." "Gertrude's car - pick us up? I'm not liking

the sound of this Jerry." "Oh, don't worry. Just be there at five and

wear a suit." So at five o'clock here comes Gertrude's

Bentley without Gertrude and myself, Jerry, and his friend Roger from Houston who had turned up get in and off we go for Palm Beach; not to a restaurant to Gertrude's house on Billionaires Row. I wasn't liking the looks of things and I wasn't alone. Roger, who was a retired touring golf pro and television weatherman turned television evangelist smelled a rat too.

"Hey Jerry, how many other people are we meeting?" Jerry mumbled something into his hand and

Our suspicions were confirmed when a few minutes later Gertrude made her entrance wearing a hat that cost more than the three of us made in a year and red lipstick so bright it would have made a crossdresser blush. Gertrude had been Miss Poland or something or other and was a nice looking lady for 85 but the sight of her in her hat arm in arm with Short and Wide Jerry in his off the rack J.C. Penny suit with the front buttons screaming for relief against his ample girth was more than Roger could bear. He busted out laughing.

"When we get to the restaurant people are going to think you're the doorman," he said. "If you keep your mouth shut you can make some money."

When we entered the Galaxy Grill Gertrude and Francis knew everyone there from the owner to the shoeshine man, fortunately we didn't know a soul. If we weren't with our "dates' they wouldn't have let the likes of us in the place. Dinner came off without a hitch and Roger was having the time of his life. I could see the wheels turning in his head as he giggled his way through dinner as he kept adding chapters to the story we would never hear the end of.

When we arrived at Chuck and Harold's we cut quite the sight; me barely 40 with my 88 year old date and her lipstick and curtain dress, and Jerry at 48 with Gertrude and her hat so big she looked like a human thumbtack. Sure enough there was a table full of our friends well into their revelry who all made a point of coming by our reserved table for an introduction. The ladies had an open tab at the bar which our work-aday friends took full advantage of as we watched Jerry sweat into his J.C. Penny suit; even sitting down he was half an inch shorter than Gertrude and looked every bit the plump little lamb being fattened up for

"I'm calling a cab," I told him when we got to the men's room.

"You can't," he said. "You'll blow the whole deal.'

"Well, then I'm bolting as soon as we get back to the house," I said. "And I'm taking Monday off.'

"We're not going straight to the house," he said. "We're going to the Leopard Lounge."

The Leopard Lounge This was the coup de grace. The Leopard Lounge was/is an African themed bar in the Chesterfield Hotel which is just off Worth Avenue and has been there since the 1920s. It is Old Palm Beach and the Leopard Lounge was/is known far and wide as prime trolling ground for Palm Beach's Chicken Hawks and Cougars. Men with walkers came through the door with ladies who didn't look old enough to vote on their arms wearing shimmering dresses they had to be poured into; women, well in their 80's with men in their forties who looked like they had bought their suits off the rack at J.C. Penny. If you ever visit Palm Beach, a visit to the Leopard Lounge is a don't-miss experience. Our friends from Chuck and Harold's followed us there and our Movable Feast continued until the wee hours.

On the ride home in the back of the Bentley we had the windows down and all of a sudden my backside started getting hot. I was looking for a graceful exit and considering bailing at a red light and I figured my nerves were causing my keister to heat up. "My tookus is getting warm man," I said to Roger. "I think I might pass out."

"That's a heated seat you redneck," he said. "I dare you to jump out at the next light. I can see you've been fidgeting with the door handle."

"Do you know any songs?" I asked him. He broke out in full voice with Don't Fence Me In and by the time we hit Billionaires Row we had sung the only verse we knew half a dozen times at the top of our lungs and our dates were sound asleep.

We tipped the driver to let us out at the curb and learned a valuable lesson that night; if you ever find yourself escorting a couple of frisky octogenarians around Palm Beach in a Bentley take them to the Leopard Lounge and ply them with Harvey Wallbangers and be nice to the driver.

A few years later Gertrude married a 41 year-old man and as far as I know lived happily ever after on Billionaires Row. Frances faded from view, and Short and Wide Jerry never got his video company off

preeminent deep water port; Harbor Island with its strategic location just inside the pass has been part of that discussion since the beginning. But it wasn't until 1890, after the Panic of 1893 and the failure of the original jetty at the pass that things got serious.

The beginning In 1858 the United State Corps of Engineers

was seeking to establish a port on Harbor Island and after extensive investigations by the Central Transit Company, backed by the Great Baring Brothers of London, the present site of Aransas Pass was selected to build a port city to carry commerce between Europe and Asia. Construction of a railroad terminal and harbor improvements were underway when the Civil War intervened. Then the building of the Union Pacific Railroad from coast to coast stalled the project further.

Just prior to the war a man named Pryor

Lea dreamed of a railroad from the Lamar

project. Then after the war the focus for

deepening the pass focused on Rockport

was eventually folded into the Aransas

where the cattle packery business was centered. The Corpus Christi, San Diego and Rio Grande Railroad was founded and in 1875 was taken over by the Mexican National Railways who wanted to build a spur to the city of Aransas Pass with the goal of connecting to deep water. The first attempt to deepen the pass came from the citizens of Rockport who in 1868 raised \$10,000 for a 600-foot dike on St. Joseph Island. Details of this plan have been mostly lost to history. Then in 1879 Congress authorized the deepening of the pass after a Corps survey recommended two parallel jetties and protection for the eroding of Mustang Island. This was/is known locally as the Old Government Jetty and consisted of layers of rock and brush; it was a failure as the jetties produced no deepening of the pass. The next attempt came at the urging of Maj. Oswald H. Ernst who recommended two stone jetties be built and that erosion on Mustang Island be contained by laying an

Plan B is not much better

In March 1860 a charter was granted to the Aransas Pass Harbor Company for the "constructing owning, and operating deep water channels from the water of the Gulf of Mexico and across Aransas Pass. At the same time the Aransas Harbor City and Improvement Company was formed and investors from all over the country got involved, including the son of President William Henry Harrison. With investors in place the promoters launched a nationwide publicity campaign and what followed was a rush to invest like South Texas had never

The Bay View Hotel was built in 1893 and was a three-story showcase to impress potential investors. Included in the project were plans to build a railroad from Aransas Pass to Harbor Island and construction began. Rock for the planned jetty was shipped in by rail and loaded onto barges head for the jetty site.

But things hit a snag when the Panic of 1893 hit and the railroad was taken over by South Pacific Railroad which had financial ties to Galveston. Harbor Island developers appealed to the Texas Legislature and got the rights to buy land immediately around the harbor and with money from Brown and Sons of Baltimore drew up plans to adopt a single, curved jetty around the island and went to work. The project was an abject failure. The water got no deeper and land sales went to zero. The Aransas Pass Harbor Company had spent \$401,553 and had nothing to show for it. They contracted with a man named C.P. Goodyear to provide a twenty-foot channel and he used 13,000 pound of dynamite to blow out 500 feet of the jetty but all it did was blow a lot of water up in the air – the channel refused to deepen. The project to deepen the channel had now taken on a Rube Goldberg quality as each succeeding group poured good

money after bad.

At long last success Private industry appealed to the deep pockets of government and in 1899 the deep pockets complied. The Corps finally realized that a single jetty would not do the job and removed the old north jetty, replacing it with that of an earlier design. Then in 1907 they authorized the completion of the south jetty along with the extension of the north jetty. When the project was done the water began to deepen across the mouth of the pass and engineers began looking at the deepening of the channel and the building of a basin for Harbor Island. Work continued for several years until the oceangoing liner Brinkburn arrived at Harbor Island on September, 7, 1912 and took on a load of over 10,000 bales of cotton. The celebration lasted a week. The Brinkburn was later sunk by German U-boats off the coast of Algiers but

The 9.6-mile Aransas Harbor Terminal Railroad connected Harbor Island with the mainland and the San Antonio and Aransas Pass Railway and a cotton compress was built on the island in 1913. Then during World War I a concrete shipbuilding firm was constructed there and by 1927 the Humble Oil and Refining Company had built a large oil terminal on Harbor Island. Other major oil companies laid pipelines to the docks to meet the oil tankers and Harbor Island had its deep water port and became home to a series of oil storage tanks for more than fifty years.

Harbor Island was economically afloat.

The rest as they say is history.

Chimney Swifts and their Reliance on Us



Chimney Swift Tower

If you've ever looked up on a summer evening and noticed a flurry of tiny, boomerang-shaped birds swirling high in the sky, chances are you've spotted chimney swifts. These aerial acrobats are nature's little daredevils, spending almost their entire lives in flight—eating, drinking, and even bathing on the wing. With their chattering calls and dazzling swoops, they turn the twilight sky into a living performance. But behind the show lies a surprising truth: many chimney swifts depend on humans to survive.

Chimney swifts are built for nonstop motion. Their long, curved wings slice through the air as they scoop up mosquitoes, flies, and other insects by the thousands. A single swift can eat hundreds of bugs in a day, making them both entertainers and pest control specialists. But when it comes time to rest and raise their young, they need somewhere special to cling—and that's where we come in.

Long ago, swifts nested in hollow trees, attaching their tiny stick nests with their own glue-like saliva. But as forests were cleared, their options dwindled. Luckily, humans had unintentionally provided the perfect replacement: chimneys. Tall, dark, and narrow, these man-made structures became swift skyscrapers. Today, many populations rely almost entirely on chimneys, barns, silos, and other human-built towers for roosting and nesting. Without us, their numbers would plummet.

Unfortunately, modern architecture is leaving swifts in the lurch. Many chimneys are now capped, screened, or removed altogether, and sleek new buildings don't have the rough, vertical surfaces swifts need to cling to. Across North America, chimney swift

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populations have declined dramaticallydropping by more than 50% in just a few decades.

The good news is that there are viable solutions to help them. Conservationists and bird lovers have begun building "swift towers"- special tall structures designed just for chimney swifts. Communities are rallying around these projects, often placing towers near schools, parks, or nature centers where people can gather to enjoy the evening spectacle of swifts swirling into their roosts like smoke being pulled back into a chimney.

Helping chimney swifts isn't just about saving a single species. It's about protecting the unique relationship between people and wildlife. These birds remind us that sometimes, nature can adapt to our presence in surprising ways—and that we have a responsibility to adapt in return. Plus, who wouldn't want to keep a few thousand mosquito-eating acrobats around?

So next time you see chimney swifts spiraling overhead, take a moment to marvel at the partnership we share. By leaving our chimneys open, supporting swift tower projects, or simply spreading the word, we can ensure these feathered flyers continue their evening dance for generations to come.

Bend knows weather can surprise us, but the hailstorm that hammered the Corpus Christi area on Nov. 1 was unlike anything most of us have ever seen. Golf ball-sized hailstones rained down across neighborhoods, battering roofs, denting vehicles, and leaving a trail of property damage that residents are still tallying. But the most heartbreaking losses weren't the shattered windshields or broken shingles, they were the birds.

Over the past week, researchers in the Harte Research Institute's Conservation and Biodiversity Program, along with regional partners, have been working to understand the scale of the mortality event triggered by the storm. Updated assessments estimate 1,860 birds were killed or injured, a staggering number that speaks to the storm's intensity. The brown pelican, an iconic resident of our coastline and a species that only decades ago was struggling to recover from DDT-era declines, took the hardest hit. Of the total losses, 1,484 were brown pelicans.

Photos collected after the storm show pelicans and other waterbirds lying where the hail struck them, many on nesting or roosting islands that offered no shelter from the ice falling from the sky. But the storm's impact extended well beyond coastal

species. Woodpeckers, falcons, and other land-based birds were found washed up on the beaches in the days following the storm victims of the same violent weather cell. In all, more than 30 species were documented in the assessment.

The Coastal Bend community and our conservation partners are stepping up, turning a moment of loss into an opportunity for learning, recovery, and resilience.

To capture the full picture, HRI scientists have deployed drones to survey the affected islands and partnered closely with Texas Parks and Wildlife, the Coastal Bend Bays & Estuaries Program, The Nature Conservancy, and the UTMSI Amos Rehabilitation Keep (ARK). Their rapid response has been crucial not only for documenting losses but for rescuing survivors. So far, 417 birds have been captured alive and transferred to the ARK for treatment and rehabilitation.

Events like this remind us how vulnerable coastal wildlife can be, and how quickly a single storm can reshape the landscape.

City of Corpus Christi and the City of Port Aransas each maintain about eight miles of gulf beaches, some belonging to Nueces County but maintained under reciprocal agreements by each of the two cities. According to figures from the City

of Corpus Christi which administers the revenue stream a total of 273,228 permits were sold in 2024 raising \$3,118,299. (See attached story). The revenue currently is split by the three entities according to the linear feet of beach maintained by each. However, this revenue split has worked to the advantage of the City of Corpus Christi which sold 118,021 permits to 153,439 for the City of Port Aransas but received \$1.4 million (45.5%) of the revenue to Port Aransas \$1.2 million (38.5%). Nueces County would stand to gain the most funds from the increase in the permit charge since they would continue to receive 16% of permit sales dollars from both cities while selling only 1768 permits in 2024. Under the proposed fee increase they would continue to receive 16% of the total revenue which would have been \$5,464,560 in 2024 if the \$20 fee had been in place which would have increased the county's share from \$498,927 to \$874,329. Nueces County Coastal Parks Director Scott Cross said Nueces County Coastal Parks receives about \$500,000 each year in funds from beach permit sales to be used for beach maintenance which makes up a large portion of the department's \$3.2 million

Port Aransas City Manager David Parsons said the need for the increase is driven by the rising costs of beach maintenance over the past 21 years and the need for beach renourishment projects around the Port Aransas-Corpus Christi city limits where beach erosion has made driving increasingly difficult.

"One of the biggest issues we're all looking at is an eroding beach that starts eroding around the Palmilla Golf Course, and continues eroding well past the southern Corpus Christi city limits. In this area the beach is getting narrower and narrower, to the point that driving cars and beach users are getting dangerously close to one another," Parsons said. "It's to the point that the Texas General Land Office (GLO) CEPRA division is actually showing some concerns and have reached out to us regarding the erosion rates that they're seeing in the most recent 2025 University of Texas Bureau of Economical Geology historical erosion rate report, and we are discussing a possible future beach renourishment project."

The next step, if all three bodies agree to the rate increase, would be to go to the Texas General Land Office for Beach Plan amendments that would reflect the increase. That process is expected to take about six months followed by votes of approval from all three of the local governmental entities which would push implementation of the new higher rate to January 2027, for the 2027 calendar year.

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

On the Rocks By Jay Gardner

Lily and I headed north last week up to Austwell to do an oyster survey for a new pier that's going in up there in Hynes Bay (which is a secondary bay of San Antonio Bay). I hadn't been up that direction (other than passing through) in quite some time. The trip reminded me of when I was working for the Texas Coastal Ocean Observation Network (TCOON) back in the early 2000's, maintaining water and monitoring stations up and down the coast. We had a station installed near Chicken Foot Reef there in San Antonio Bay, and I would have to change batteries, or the hydro sonde's out. This would involve dragging a skiff up to the Aransas Wildlife Refuge, dump it in, and run around the corner through the ICWW, and up into the bay to the station. Those were good times, but Hurricane Harvey wiped that station out.

One of the weirdest things I saw up there coming back from doing my station work was The Duke, an Eco-tour and dolphin watch boat I worked on for Billy Gaskins a few years before that in Port Aransas. It was a foggy day, very flat, and I was just easing back towards the ICWW and I saw her slowly chugging north. I had no idea why she was so many miles from home, but there was my old tour boat. I couldn't see anyone behind the helm, and I felt like I was in a ghost story.

Anyhoo, we got to the old pier site and thankfully there were two of the old pier pilings left out in the water, so we knew how far out we had to go and all that. We were surprised not to find any oysters, but the water was really shallow and windswept, so they shouldn't have been there anyway. The pier is free to move forward. Of course, Lily found a large dead alligator gar and had to mess with it. Gross.

Water reuse

The city council finally voted to look into reusing water from the wastewater treatment plans for industry. We have been reusing a portion of the water for golf

courses for many years. There was a line that went from either the Greenwood or Oso plants back out to the Kings Crossing course, but that has likely been offline for years. The Oso Golf Course is right next to Oso Treatment Plant, which makes that easy for piping. The Greenwood plant has more volume, but it's far away but feeds Lozano. The Broadway plant there at Concrete Street is close to industry, but they're phasing that one out. Maybe those plans will change with the new focus on reuse. That wastewater would have gone into the

river or bay or laguna, depending on which plant you're talking about. The Allison Wastewater Treatment Plant used to pump some of its water under the Nueces River and out into the Nueces Delta. I did some water quality monitoring of that back in day, as others like Sam, Aaron and Erin did, and the freshwater hitting those cells helped the fishery a lot. Unfortunately, they had to stop pumping in there due to high levels of something, which really wasn't hurting anything.

I highly support the reuse of our wastewater; you loyal readers know that in some parts of the country, they treat it and put it back into their drinking water system. We're headed in that direction. Water is water. However, I'd like to see a day where the water coming into our system passes through and makes it into the Nueces Delta and river, but you loyal readers already know about that. The Coastal Bend Bays Foundation is having a coastal issues forum about how inflows are managed into the bays on Monday, December 8th at the Del Mar CED. If you have questions, go check





ocean, a surprise strike, a few small fish, a monster redfish stole the show, then that ball of warmth opened up the flats and the sand pockets glowed. We picked through the flats talking about family and adventures, catching fish all morning. Each change of location was a adventurous search for the next trophy for my guests, to me I was just checking my pets. I thought that my clients thought they were so lucky, but it was me that was the lucky one. To share this place, open so many eyes to what I breathe every day. These are the days we get our island back, the crowds are gone and it's peaceful. Invite those old friends down, take the kids to the beach, get up and watch the sun rise over the sea.

Topwater action is on fire! The water is staying in the 70's and is perfect for explosive attacks on topwater plugs. The mornings are best, but cloudy days will have you getting blow up's all day. I like larger plugs with loud rattles, but that is just one of the varied selections to choose from. I always throw a plug that I can see at the end of my cast, color. This is important so that you can watch for shuttle strikes and better become the injured baitfish you are imitating. I always let the bait crash and skip skip pause, just like bait has been hit and got away but still confused and baffled. A slow steady walk the dog style retrieves with pauses will usually work best. Smaller topwaters are built for a faster retrieve and action. Change it up from large to small, loud to quiet. If you want to get good at catching fish on topwaters, fill a small box with a few and just decide you're going to only use them all day. You will find success and learn the magic and addiction to catching fish on topwaters. The majority of the fish you will catch will be mature gamefish, no trash fish and fewer small ones. Caution should be had with those treble hooks! A shake, a fling, or just a split second and your hooked harder than the best trout strike. It's really hard to take out hooks burried in your own body. Leaving them on the rods halfway up is dangerous too, walking around the boat is just waiting to get grabbed. The cooler temps are getting everything WILD! This next week we will see some more cold weather come down and bring winter a bit closer. Don't let that north wind blow a hole in your soul, get out and enjoy what we have to be grateful for, and don't forget, YOUR ON THE ISLAND, GET YOUR-SELF ON THE WATER!

You know the kind of dream where you're in a fight but you can't land any blows? Your arms just won't swing. Or you can't pull the trigger on your gun. Or you try to run, but you can't quite move. You are paralyzed, powerless, and frustrated. These sorts of dreams fall under the psychological category of inhibition dreams. We all have them

When we are asleep and experiencing vivid, lively dreams during REM sleep, our brain is trying to move our body in accordance with the action in our dream. During this time, inhibitory neurotransmitters in the brain stem induce REM *atonia*, a temporary paralysis of voluntary muscles. It's a good thing, too – otherwise we might be punching our partner or running through the patio door. But within the dream, it is a terrifying and inexplicable paralysis that we cannot overcome – no matter how hard we try.

Restaurant and bar workers suffer frequent and special versions of these dreams. What follows is a selection of real, work-related inhibition dreams from real food and beverage industry folks. The names have been changed for no particular reason.

Penelope has been a server for 30 years. That's enough time to have seen it all. One would think Penelope's psyche has been hardened against the vagaries of restaurant work, but that is simply not the case. She still has the dreams. Recurrently in Penelope's dreams, right there in the restaurant's dining room, there is dense, tall grass everywhere – and she simply cannot navigate it. Everyone's upset with her, food has not been served, her customers have begun to give up, and some are leaving. Penelope is gripped by fear, frustration, and undergrowth: she is in the weeds.

Amos is a world-class bartender: he knows how to make every drink there is and could make half of them at once if needed. And Amos is fast. In a jam-packed, dance-oriented, meat-market nightclub, Amos is a speed-bartender. Don't get me wrong, Amos could grow a handlebar mustache, don a waxed canvas apron, and make craft cocktails all day long if he were called upon to do so, but that's not his bag. He likes the chaos and debauchery of a place where people go to get drunk and get laid – and most often, but not strictly – in that order. After the bar closes, Amos crosses over: from behind the bar to a seat at it. On one particular night, he's got an after-hours guest. Once the bar has been wiped down, the till reconciled, and the doors locked behind them, Amos is taking Clarissa to his place When they arrive, there's more drink, music, laughter, intimacy, and finally ... sleep. In his slumber, Amos finds himself back at work. Clarissa has been waiting for him to make her a cocktail for some time. But the ice well is empty. The soda gun splutters and spews. Everyone else needs a drink,

too, and all of the bottles are empty. Amos wakes up in a panic. But he is relieved to see that Clarissa is sound asleep next to him and does not need a cocktail. Amos falls back asleep and has the exact same dream again. And again. And again.

If you are a cook or some other kitchen worker, you are not immune to similar nocturnal hellscapes. You're behind the line, the ticket rack is full, and the printer won't stop whirring. Its paper has spilled onto the floor in an ever-growing pile. There are half a dozen servers standing across from you at the pickup window – some are yelling unintelligibly, and they are all staring...at you. You try to fire appetizers and entrées, but your mouth emits no sound. You can't find a clean sauté pan or even some tongs. Food is burning somewhere, and you just wish you could move fast enough – or at all – to dig yourself out. You try to reach for a plate, but your arms won't budge – if they worked, you'd use them to violently rip the printer from its moorings and throw it to the floor. You turn your gaze downward to see what's wrong with your arms. Your frustration is stopped dead in its tracks and instantly morphs into red-faced embarrassment: you are not wearing pants. Not even underwear. You wish in vain for just an apron – but you wish even more that the servers would stop staring.

Darla, the hostess, is a busy restaurant's first line of defense against the incessant onslaught of customers. She grips her podium with both hands. It's like a hot seat whose occupant can please no one: not the servers, not the kitchen, not the manager, and certainly not the customers. When Darla gets home from her Saturday night shift and drifts off to sleep, she knows what's coming. By her third round of REM, things have gotten really bad. She is stuck at her podium. The reservation book doesn't make sense: it's just a bunch of squiggly lines and a single number. Is it how many are in a party? Is it the time of a reservation? She can't know. In slow motion, she turns her head away from angry, impatient, would-be diners. The dining room is over capacity. A table hasn't come up empty in hours. The bar is five deep. There are people standing and eating food off napkins with their hands. The entire back wall of the restaurant is *engulfed in flames*. Darla tries to run away from it all, but the podium will not release her, and just then, she wakes up with a start. She knows it was just a dream – but only because of the fire.

BBB Scam Alert

Beware of health care cons during open enrollment

If you are adding or changing your Medicare or Healthcare.gov coverage during open enrollment, watch out for unsolicited calls claiming to «help» you find the best deal. Unfortunately, scammers see this open enrollment period as a chance to trick people out of money and personal information. Open enrollment for Medicare runs from October 15 through December 7 (Medicare). Medicare Advantage open enrollment is from January 1 to March 31. or within three months of getting Medicare. Heathcare.gov open enrollment begins November 1; December 15 is the last day to enroll or change plans for coverage starting January 1, and January 15 is the last day to enroll for coverage starting February 1

How the scam works

BBB Scam Tracker frequently receives reports of scam calls and texts pretending to be from Medicare. In a recent report, one person shared, «They called to have me sign up for a new Medicare card. I declined. They have been persistent in their calls to me and my husband.»

In another report, the target reported that a caller pretended to be an agent "asking if I got a new updated Medicare card in the mail. He then verified my name and mailing address. Then he wanted me to get my old card and read off info to him, such as the date on the lower right side of the card. When he asked me to read my card number, I told him I cannot."

Another consumer reported being targeted through a text message and shared the following: "I received a text saying that my health benefits were about to expire and I needed to call the number to renew. Then, the representative told me I had to pay and my bank had to verify with them...That's when I knew it was a scam."

If you stay on the line, these callers allege they can enroll you in a better plan than what you currently have, according to Scam Tracker reports. This new plan is cheaper, and you can keep all the same services. To get started, all you need to do is provide some personal information, such as your Medicare ID number and your Social Security number.

No matter how good the deal sounds and how convincing the caller seems, don't do it! The call is a scam, and sharing personal

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information will expose you to identity

Selecting a health insurance plan can be challenging and complex. Be on the lookout for common red flags.

Be wary of anyone who contacts you out of the blue. Healthcare.gov and Medicare provide legitimate help for determining which plan is right for you. These people — sometimes called Navigators or Assisters — cannot charge for their support. If someone asks you for payment, its a scam. You will also need to contact them on your own. They will not call you

Be wary of free gifts and "health screenings." Keep a healthy level of skepticism any time a broker offers you free gifts or other special deals. Never sign up with a broker who offers you an expensive sign-up gift in exchange for providing your Medicare ID number or additional personally identifiable information. Other times, brokers offer free "health screenings" to weed out people who are less healthy. This technique is called "cherry picking" and is against Medicare rules.

Guard your government-issued numbers. Never offer your Medicare ID number, Social Security number, health plan info, or banking information to anyone you don't know.

Go directly to official websites. If you want to make changes to your healthcare plan, go directly to Medicare. gov, Healthcare.gov, or your employer's health insurance provider. Don't click on links in suspicious messages.

Contact your employer directly. If you receive an unexpected email about benefits policies, ask your employer about it before you click on anything to make sure its legitimate.

If you are unsure whether a call or offer is from Medicare or you gave your personal information to someone claiming to be with Medicare, call 1-800-MEDICARE to report it. Jesus Christ is Lord. This is the most basic and universal of all Christian statements. Which means, if Jesus is Lord, nothing else or nobody else is Lord.

For the churches that follow the liturgical calendar, this Sunday, November 23 is Christ the King Sunday. Pope Pius XI instituted the Feast of Christ the King in 1925. His reason for emphasizing the Lordship of Jesus at that time was the rise of Communism and Fascism. Pope Pius XI called for Christ to rule in our minds, in our wills, in our hearts, in our bodies. In time, Protestant churches joined in celebrating Christ the King Sunday.

Nearly a decade later, a group of dissenting Protestants in Germany refused to join the collaborationist Christians in their effusive praise and support for the nationalistic fervor of Nazi Germany. They issued a declaration that asserted among other things, "we reject the false doctrine, as though there were areas of our life in which we would not belong to Jesus Christ, but to other lords." Some who signed this declaration became martyrs for their faith.

Affirming that Jesus is Lord challenges the compartmentalized smallness of our faith and our tacit acceptance of the world's injustice. It has implications for everything we do, everything we fail to do, and everything in which we are complicit. The message of Christ the King Sunday is timely. It stands against any movement that claims exclusive influence over the hearts and minds of God's people.

This is why Christians must be wary of all attempts to connect the reign of Christ to any nationalistic movement. The message of Christ is compromised when it is connected to the grab for power and the control of nationalistic fervor. Human biases and fears dominate in the rush of a win-lose way of understanding life.

The Christian church has often been an imitator of human empire and power. Many times, we will support those movements and causes that we think will get our side

In this view of Christianity Jesus becomes a national superhero who shows how strong God is by winning at our game. However, at the cross of Christ we see that Jesus came and showed us how strong God is by willingly losing at our game. No wonder the Bible talks about people yelling at Jesus on the cross to save himself. This is what we would do, try to save ourselves. However,

God is self-giving in ways that don't make a lot of sense to our ideas of win-lose, insider-outside, right-wrong. This is the reign of Christ the King.

However, the message of Christ as king also challenges another common human kingdom, the kingdom of self. Kingdoms o self are strong and enduring. They heavily defend their territory through justification of control, power and self-interest. Perhaps the quest for power and control offers an easy substitute for the hard task of love. After all, it is easier to be God, than to love God. It is easier to judge people than to love people. It is easier to own life than to

This is why it is important to drag ourselve to the foot of the cross on Christ the King Sunday. Jesus on the cross in the ultimate act of self-emptying love is not most people's image of a king. Not only was Jesus executed; he was humiliated. Leaders scoffed; soldiers mocked; a criminal derided; people trash talked.

There is no better time to consider our human distortions of power than the Sunday before Thanksgiving. The scene of the cross gives shape to what Christ's reign really looks like in humility and sacrifice. I also gives shape to how we live, the choices we make, the people we love, the words we choose.

To affirm Christ is King is to choose peacemaking instead of war making. It is to choose liberation instead of exploitation. It is to choose to sacrifice rather than conquest. It is to give forgiveness not retribution. It is to show mercy not vengeance. It is to care for the vulnerable instead of privi leges for the powerful, It is to be generous rather than greedy. It is to welcome rather than exclude.

Each Sunday a bunch of humans also gather to worship God in community at Island Presbyterian Church, giving thanks for grace, love, healing, and hope, working for peace, justice, and reconciliation. Top quarterbacks of all time-Part 1



Dotson's Note: Who is the greatest quarterback of all time? It's a question that has been posed countless times. You might have a good idea on who is No. 1. But what about Nos. 2-25? Now those are the spots in the football universe where the QB debate gets pretty interesting. Makes for good conversation, too. I thought it would be a good time to discuss the game's most exalted position, and to contrast the most celebrated players that played it. Thanks to the late Bill Morgan and to Elliot Harrison for many of the facts contained in report and to the late Bill Morgan for the photos.

Here We Go-

25- Norm Van Brocklin-Los Angeles Rams, 1949-1957; Philadelphia Eagles, 1958-1960. A part-time starter for one of the NFL's greatest offenses of all time in 1950; Norm Van Brocklin set a passing record of 554 yards in one game the following year. It still stands, remarkably. After being traded from the Rams to the Eagles in 1958, Van Brocklin went on to be selected first-team All-Pro. win MVP, and become the only team to ever topple the Lombardi Packers in the title game -- all in 1960. Then he retired. What a way to go out.

24- Len Dawson-Pittsburgh Steelers, 1957-1959; Cleveland Browns, 1960-1961; Dallas Texans, 1962; Kansas City Chiefs, 1963-1975. With apologies to Joe Namath, Len Dawson was the AFL's premier quarterback. He led the younger league in completion percentage seven times, passer rating six times, and touchdown passes four times. Dawson won three titles, the AFL championship in 1962 and 1966 pre-Super Bowl, then a blowout win in Super Bowl IV. He also would become one of the first passers to play until he was 40. «Lenny the Cool» just isn>t talked about enough.

23-Fran Tarkenton-Minnesota Vikings, 1961-1966, 1972-1978; New York Giants, 1967-1971. Tarkenton is known for starting and losing three Super Bowls. What you should know is that he is one of the all-time unique players at the position. Tarkenton was a starter in each of his 18 NFL seasons, and was traded from Minnesota to the Giants in 1967, then back to the Vikings in 1972. That's when his brilliant third act began, as Tarkenton led the Vikings to three NFC Championship Games and an MVP. He was also the passing yards leader in his final campaign in 1978.

22- Warren Moon-Houston Oilers, 1984-1993; Minnesota Vikings, 1994-1996; Seattle Seahawks, 1997-1998; Kansas City Chiefs, 1999-2000. Moon could be higher on this list; he could be lower. Those who would say others belong ahead of him would have a point in that Moon never enjoyed success in the playoffs, winning only three postseason starts (and never advancing to a conference title game) in his 17-year career. Yet, what those pundits miss, and why Moon could be

(should be?) higher on this list, is the fact that he had to spend the first six years of his pro career in the Canadian Football League before he got a chance to play quarterback in the NFL. Supposed super-smart, forwardthinking college coaches and NFL scouts thought he should play wide receiver instead of quarterback -- yes, at every level of his career he encountered racial stereotypes before proving them all very wrong. Moon would later pace the NFL in passing yards in back-to-back seasons, and might be the top pure thrower of the football anyone this side of Joe Namath has

21- Jim Kelly-*Buffalo Bills, 1986-1996.* Put the four Super Bowl losses aside. Sure, Kelly and the Bills' offense didn't play great in any of those contests. But what about all the playoff games to get them there? Kelly was a leader who, unfortunately, doesn't own the stats to stand up to some of the other top passers of his era. One reason is because he spent his first three seasons playing in the USFL. Check that, he was lighting up the USFL. The second reason? Remember that Kelly was throwing passes in November and December in Buffalo. While it provided the Bills an incredible home-field advantage, it didn>t exactly lead to racking up fantasy points.

20-Kurt Warner-St. Louis Rams, 1998-2003; New York Giants, 2004; Arizona Cardinals, 2005-2009. When it comes to rating Warner, most folks can't get past the mid-career lull. Their argument is, essentially, that he didn't enjoy enough of a prime. Well, that might be true. But it sure as heck wasn't all his fault. How about the talent evaluators who missed on him coming out of college? Where's their culpability? Or the Rams, who benched him in 2003 after he sustained injuries to go with Marc Bulger? Then there were the Giants. They sat Warner in his lone season with the team, despite posting a 5-4 record with him, to play Eli Manning (who went, ahem, 1-6). Let's not forget about the Cardinals, who were hellbent on turning Matt Leinart into the next Neil Lomax. How'd that work out? Anyway, all Warner did in his limited time as a QB1 was win two league MVPs, a Super Bowl MVP, start three Super Bowls, and retire at the top of his game. Not to mention, there must be some kind of merit scholarship for taking the Cardinals to Super Sunday. I was always most impressed with his ability to hold onto the ball on those seven-step drops, deliver the mail, and take the hit. Stat you need to know: Warner went 1-2 in his three Super Bowl starts, but did you know that he threw a touchdown to tie the game or take the lead | Most prospectors arrived with everything in the final three minutes of all three games? That puts things into perspective.

<u> A little Island history</u>

A Grog Shop or Two and Hogs Running Wild in the Streets

The period leading up the statehood was a precarious one for the area in and around Corpus Christi, Colonel Henry L. Kinney was doing brisk business at his trading post along the bay where shallow draft boats ferried cattle and cotton. He had begun using the title "Colonel," which he claimed to have earned during the Seminole War in Florida, but there is no evidence that he took part in that conflict.

On July 25, 1846 General Zachary Taylor moved 4000 troops into the area, first landing at St. Joseph Island then ferrying them to Fort Marcy near the future sight of the Breakers Hotel on North Beach. Eventually 5000 troops were headquartered there and Corpus Christi began to grow.

A grog shop or two

A description of the town was written just before the arrival of Taylor's soldiers by William Bollaert describes the town: "... at the present time there are some 30 or 40 fighting men, a few cannons, and Colonel Kinney's house fortified...there are some half dozen American stores and one owned by a German, and a grog shop or two. All businessmen appeared to be on good terms and friendly with each other."

A portion of the diary of West Pointer Colonel E.A. Hitchcock describes the town five months after the soldiers arrived: "... in five months the small village had a population of about 2000 people...drinking, horse racing, gambling, prostitution were rampant...however, not all of the officers and men sought the lewd and licentious, since a thespian group sponsored a theater that was well attended." Future President U.S. Grant was one of the thespians who

Colonel Kinney for his part, is said to have made up to a million dollars through deals with the Army and with interests in Mexico. He went so far as to mark the trail to Laredo by attaching a plowshare to the back of a wagon headed there to mark the route. Next he tried to get dredging done across the muddy flats between Aransas Pass and Corpus Christi. There apparently was some doubt about whether this would get done because when a newspaper editor wrote a story about the effort he ended with the sentence, "Every word of the above is true." Kinney organized a World's Fair and began promoting Corpus Christi as a jumping off point for caravans headed for the California gold fields.

But when General Taylor's army left town business had dropped off precipitously. In the 1850 census Corpus Christi had a population of 689 souls with 150 dwellings.

Hogs running wild in the streets

in the way of equipment to get there. Local merchants sold them wagons, carts, mules, and mustang horses caught in the Wild Horse Desert and tamed. The county commissioners court found it necessary to take action to keep hogs from running wild in the streets.

Indians continue to be a problem. Most of the trouble was along the trails in and out

of Mexico in the vicinity of San Patricio township and along the banks of the Nueces River. A man who went out to bring in his cows for the evening milking was found murdered. Another went out to camp along the reef road and his mutilated body was found the next day.

A new Ranger company led by M.B. "Mustang" Gray was organized and the Corpus Christi Star carried a story seeking troops: "All of our rangers are either mustered out or are being mustered out of the service, which renders the frontier entirely exposed at this time. Thisving parties of Indians may now make a descent upon the unprotected towns."

Gunfight in a Matamoros alley

Colonel Kinney served in the Senate for the First, Second, Third and Fourth legislatures of the new state of Texas. He also became increasingly involved in land speculation by buying large tracts of land and selling them to new immigrants. In 1852 he organized the Corpus Christi Fair in an effort to promote the region which was a success, however, h was less successful in luring settlers, and he began to lose money quickly. To recover some of his losses, he went to Washington in an attempt to persuade the government to invest in several schemes, including a camel corps to transport goods from Corpus Christi to San Francisco and an army hospital in Corpus Christi. None of the ideas took hold and Kinney then embarked on a venture to establish a colony in Nicaragua. Financed by New York speculators, he contracted for thirty million acres of land along the Mosquito Coast but faced stiff opposition from the United States government, and when his largest financial backer died Kinney was forced to abandon his plans.

When he returned he found that his wife had divorced him and then in 1862 he became involved in a feud between the Rojos and Crinolinos families in Matamoros and was shot and killed. The Fort Bend Flag newspaper of February 27, 1862 carried the official story which put Kinney in a dark alley one night while attempting to rekindle an old romance with a lady named Genoveva, with whom he had a daughter, and her current husband shot

Colonel Kinney went out the way he lived, down the barrel of a gun in a murky corner of civilization. But he had helped to birth a town and Corpus Christi was here to stay.






