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

The partial solar eclipse will begin at 12:13 p.m. and end at 2:54 p.m., with a maximum eclipse (92.9 % coverage) to occur at 1:33 p.m. Corpus Christi and the Coastal Bend will not be within the path of totality so those who plan to view the eclipse must use protective eyewear. City, State and Federal officials turned out en masse Wednesday along the shores of Packery Channel to note the completion of \$15 million in repairs to the jetty system after damage from Hurricane Harvey in 2017.



Quick background: I was born, raised and educated in Boston' Massachusetts, graduating from Boston Latin School, Boston College and Suffolk Law School. I was in the practice of law as a trial attorney for over 40 years until I retired in 2015. Rather than retire to Florida, my wife and I decided to move to Corpus Christi, with one daughter and two grandchildren living in San Antonio and my other daughter living in Austin. We arrived in Port Aransas in November 2015.

Having served on the appraisal review board for five years, I know the landscape surrounding the appraisal district,, which on the whole I found to be fairly well run by the administration and blessed with some excellent and dedicated appraisers and staff. From my very first day on the ARB, we were reminded day after day that the ARB was separate and independent of the District, despite the fact that our offices are in the same building, with daily contact. Nonetheless, I do believe that to this point the ARB in making its decisions is not influenced by its close contact to the District. We made our decisions based on the evidence submitted to us by the District on the one hand, and by the Property Owner on the other.

My main reason for running for a seat on the Appraisal District is the fact the new law grants the new elected members a veto power concerning new appointments to the ARB. I strongly believe that the ARB is an underappreciated and underutilized advantage that the average property taxpayer has in the state of Texas. Back home in Mass, no such agency exists. You have a problem with your appraised value, your only remedy is to hire counsel and file a lawsuit. I believe i have the knowledge and experience to properly vet potential ARB members. Lastly, living in a 10 unit condominium here in Port Aransas, in which my family is the only full time resident, I have strong opinions concerning Short Term Rentals and how those properties are assessed by the District. 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

Mike attended Angelo State where he played college football for 2 years then set aside the sport he loved to focus on his pursuit of a medical degree.

A 1990 graduate of the UTMB School of Medicine, Dr. Britt returned to UTMB for a clinical research fellowship in surgical infectious disease following his internship at Baylor College of Medicine. He completed his orthopaedics residency at the University of Missouri -Kansas City and a fellowship in Adult Reconstructive and Arthritis Surgery at the Florida Orthopaedic Institute. After beginning his professional career in private practice, he later joined the faculty at Louisiana State University – Shreveport and returned to UTMB as a faculty member in 2018. In 2023, Dr. Britt retired from UTMB and relocated to Corpus Christi where he worked for Coastal Orthopedics at the time of his passing. Mike also played semi-professional football for the South Texas Heat and was a devoted Texas Longhorn fan. He was called to medicine and loved everything about orthopedics. He leaves behind a group of brothers, sisters, and friends in the medical community who he grew up and trained with. The relationships he had with his patients, and the love and respect they had for him, are a testimony to the giving

Senior Moments Special to The Island Moon

Dotson's Note: Another skirmish was fought on June 9, north of Pershing's headquarters and the city of Chihuahua. Twenty men from the 13th Cavalry encountered an equally small force of Villistas and chased them through Santa Clara Canyon. Three of the Mexicans were killed, and the rest escaped. There were no American casualties. Thanks to Clarence C. Clendenen, Mrs. Golvia E. Lewis, The First Cavalry Division, and Wikipedia, for the facts and photos contained in this report.



On May 9, at a face-to-face meeting in El Paso, Texas, Carranza's Secretary of War and Navy, General Álvaro Obregón, threatened to send a massive force against the expedition's supply lines and forcibly drive it out of Mexico. Funston reacted by ordering Pershing to withdraw all his troops from San Antonio de Los Arenales to Colonia Dublán. Although the order was rescinded on the evening of May 11 when no evidence of Carrancista troop movements was found, the southernmost supply depots had been closed and materiel sent north that could not easily be turned around.

Pershing was ordered to halt in place at Namiquipa, making tactical dispositions of his forces there and on El Valle to the north. The movements began a gradual withdrawal of the expedition to Dublán. On May 19th, units of the 10th and 11th Cavalry returned to the base to guard the supply lines with Columbus and conduct reconnaissance in the absence of the temporarily grounded 1st Aero Squadron. As the threat of war with the de facto government increased, the northward movement continued. Pershing's headquarters left Namiquipa on June 21st, setting up again in Dublán, after which the advanced supply depot at Namiquipa closed June 23rd. June 29th found the expedition concentrated on the main base and a forward camp at El Valle

The last and most costly engagement of the Mexican Expedition was fought on June 21 when 3 officers and 87 men of Troops C and K of the 10th Cavalry, sent separately to scout Carrancista dispositions reported along the Mexican Central Railway, combined into a single column and encountered a blocking force of 300 soldiers. They were soundly defeated at the Battle of Carrizal, with Captain Charles T. Boyd, 1st Lt. Henry R. Adair, and ten enlisted men killed,[n 18] ten wounded and another 24 (23 soldiers and 1 civilian guide) taken prisoner. The remainder, including the sole surviving officer, Capt. Lewis S. Morey, were rescued four days later by a relief squadron of the 11th Cavalry. The Mexicans did not do much better; they reported the loss of 24 men killed and 43 wounded, including their commander, General Félix Uresti Gómez, while Pershing listed 42 Carrancistas killed and 51 wounded.[2] When General Pershing learned of the battle he was furious and asked for permission to attack the Carrancista garrison of Chihuahua City. President Wilson refused, knowing that it would certainly start a war.

The action at Parral in April had made the destruction of Villa and his troops secondary to the objective of preventing further attacks on U.S. forces by Carrancistas. The battle at Carrizal brought the countries to the brink of war and forced both governments to make immediate overt gestures clearly showing their intent to avoid it. Although the United States deployed 100,000 troops on the border, by July 4 the major crisis had passed The Punitive Expedition, U.S. Army remained at Colonia Dublán indefinitely as a fixedbase operation to be a negative incentive to the Carranza government to take seriously its obligation to catch Villa. The Carranza government proved unequal to the task but nevertheless U.S. operations inside Mexico virtually ceased over the next six months.

A Joint High Commission for negotiations with the Carranza government was agreed upon in July, and the first of 52 sessions met on September 6th in New London, Connecticut. Although the commission reached accord on all issues, the negotiations failed to result in a formal agreement for withdrawal of U.S. forces signed by the Mexican government. Despite this, Pershing was ordered on January 18, 1917, to prepare the expedition for return to the United States, which was executed between January 28 and February 5. While the expedition made a dozen successful contacts with Villista groups in the first two months of the campaign, killing many of his important subordinates and 169 of his men, all of whom had participated in the attack on Columbus, it failed in its other major objective of capturing Villa. However, between the date of the American withdrawal and Villa's retirement in 1920, Villa's troops did not again successfully raid the United States.

Between June 1915 and June 1916 raiders from Mexican irregulars carried out 38 raids on the United States, resulting in the deaths of 26 soldiers and 11 civilians. Following the attack on Glenn Springs, the Army transferred three regiments of active-duty soldiers to the border area. On May 8, state militia units from Texas, Arizona, and New Mexico were activated. On June 15, 1916, another attempted raid by Mexican border-crossers, this at San Ygnacio, Texas, 30 miles downstream from Laredo, was repulsed by soldiers with casualties to both sides. As a result, using powers granted by passage of the National Defense Act of 1916, Wilson on June 18 fully mobilized Guard units from the remainder of the states and the District of Columbia for duty on the border.

Dotson's Other Note: More than 140,000 National Guard troops were called up, but only two regiments, the 1st New Mexico Infantry and the 2nd Massachusetts Infantry, were actually assigned to the Mexican Expedition, and those to guard the base at Columbus. Historian Clarence C. Clendenen asserts that although no Guard units officially crossed into Mexico at any time, soldiers from the two regiments at Columbus did enter Mexico to perform various tasks. Stuff I Heard on the Island

If you can live on them little cocktail wieners and water you can just about live free on The Island these days just by making the rounds of ground breakings and ribbon cuttings. Just wave a shovel or a pair of giant scissors around here and office seekers will line up for a photo op and we get to sample some of them little cocktail wieners. Personally I like mine slathered in barbeque sauce. So with that said and with a move to revive the Island United Political Action Committee underway to unite the Island's 8459 registered voters behind friendly candidates this November we have to ask ourselves the real question; what do we want?

November

Let's start with what will be on the city ballot in November. The first of what will be many briefings on the revised version of the city's Proposition A was given to the Island Strategic Action Committee on Tuesday night. At issue, among other items which we will explore as things move forward, is how to allocate revenue from two 1/8-cent city sales tax streams which each raise \$8 million per year for the next 25 years. The last iteration of Proposition A sent only a scintilla of the \$1.5 Billion - with a B - of that money to The Island and coincidentally or not that plan went down in flames by a twoto-one margin. The six percent or so of the citywide vote that will emanate from Padre Island in the fall could make the difference in round two which raises the question of whether any of that Prop A money could be used on Padre Island.

The answer on Tuesday was that it can be used for "drainage and storm water projects" along the SPID corridor. As you read this there is \$17 million in federal/state money in the bank awaiting the completion of the Island Mobility Plan which includes cart and pedestrian paths along that corridor and if funds from Proposition A could be used to cover the current bar ditches that \$17 million could be used in for other purposes as our island becomes a connected grid of paths over the next few years.

Bonds

Then there are the bonds. Sometime in August as the Corpus Christi Council sets the details of Proposition A they will also set a

bond package that will be somewhere in the \$100 million range of which Island taxpayers will pay somewhere in the range of \$20 million with debt service. It seems like we ought to get something for that. Most of the money raised for Proposition A will go downtown to prop up the cost over runs at the American Bank Center so our Return on Investment will need to come from the bonds.

Since 2016 the ISAC has generated a modest wish list of Island project for funding and as a result there was \$1.15 million in 2018 for improvements under the JFK Bridge and \$1.5 million in 2020 for improvements at Commodores Park – neither of which are currently underway. There have been some success stories such as the new access road on SPID between Jackfish Avenue and Commodores Drive and the improvements on Jackfish which are currently underway.

Almost fifty years after a grid of Island streets east of SPID, between Verdemar Drive and State Highway 361 were designed they still remain "Paper Streets" as that is the only place they actually exist. Every two years for the past two decades it has been proposed that they be included on a bond package and every two years for the past two decades they missed the cut. This is especially exasperating since the underground utilities – half the total cost – are already in place. Some money from the Island Tax Increment Reinvestment Zone #2 have been earmarked but bond money could complete the funding. We are also seeing development on the south end of The Island stymied due to lack of a main sewer line; exactly the kind of projects bonds are designed for.

I could continue but you get the point. The process going forward is for ISAC members to develop a list of items to be included in the next iteration of Proposition A and in the November bond package. As we sit here today there is already \$2 billion in new development happening around us and the planning process for the next 25 years in now underway. It's time we get a fair shake from city hall and it starts in November.

We're going to need a lot of them little cocktail wieners.

Ida and I drove from Michigan to Texas on our recent vacation, taking along our little

dog Frack. While there were lived on Padre Island for two weeks. The 110-mile long island, stretching from the general vicinity of Corpus Christi to the Mexican border, is now being converted into a national park. But it is still unimproved, practically uninhabited and barren.

Driving to Texas from our home in Michigan in a Jeep took us almost five days. We were very tired from being in cramped quarters when we arrived at the park are on the north end of the island near Bob Hall's fishing pier. But tired as we were we decided to make the long drive south towards the Manfield Pass area, about 75 miles down the island. Our driving time was slow, averaging from 10 to 15 miles per hour. We had heard the south end of the island was no place to be stranded without food and water. Not being an experienced beach driver, I followed advice given to me at the pier and stuck close the water's edge for smoother faster driving. About 20 miles down the beach we started to drive over thousands of small sea shells. The area is known as *Little* Shell and it was here that disaster almost overtook us.

A foolish mistake

The tide started coming in. huge waves hit our Jeep, causing the engine to stall. I could't get it started and we became concerned about being washed out to sea with the Jeep. I tried to dry off the engine, but it was constantly flooded with water. I started to call for help on my Citizens Band (CB) radio. I burned out my main battery calling for help. I then switched to my auxiliary battery that we carried for just such an emergency. I kept calling out this is K-N-M 0750 Michigan mobile local, now on Padre Island, approximately 20 miles south of the Bob Hall Pier. I am stuck and the tide is coming! Does anyone copy? I need help! Does-anyone-copy?

After continually repeating my message hoping my auxiliary battery would hold up, I finally made contact with someone on the mainland. Our words were cut off now and then because the wires and mic kept getting wet. He said he would get us help and then mentioned something about the navy and a tow truck. I couldn't understand him very well, and then everything went dead.

My wife and I were worried that the Jeep and all our camping supplies and equipment were going to be washed out to sea. We started to carry all of our belongings to high ground beyond the beach. As we were carrying our few supplies away from the stranded vehicle, we heard the roar of a low-flying airplane. It was a U.S. Navy helicopter. I started waving like mad, and after circling a few times it landed. As the machine set down, its rotors blew sand in all directions. Were we happy to see the pilot! As the pilot walked over to us, he said, "It looks like you folks are a in a little trouble here." He said would send help and took off, hours later a tow truck arrived.

Help arrives It was at this point that an experience started that I hope I never have to undergo again. The tow truck arrived about three hours after the helicopter left. It was a large truck with big balloon tires and two men riding in it. Before the driver tied a towline to my Jeep I told him I was flat busted. The seawater had ruined most of my traveler's checks. I later lost what was left of them in the sea. They must have fallen out of my shirt pocket while I was trying to dry off the plugs and points get the Jeep started. I offered to give him my Polaroid camera and case as collateral, and I promised to pay him the full amount of the towing bill as soon as I got back to Michigan, if not sooner. He said it wasn't necessary to give him the camera, and that we could send the money later. He towed the Jeep out of the soft shells and sand and then gave us a fast tow to get the car started. Ida and I thanked him

and his partner for helping us and they left.

Just then a navy truck arrived. I told the driver that I though the truck that had just pulled our Jeep free was the one sent by the helicopter pilot. The driver told me it wasn't, and that the man who had pulled my Jeep out of the sand was a shrewd operator who charged sky-high prices (as I was to find out later).

I told the Navy people I was sorry they had made a long trip for nothing and the driver said he was sorry that he couldn't have saved us a large towing bill.

We spend the night at the camp of some people we had met on the beach and as we were driving back to camp I noticed jackrabbits running in all directions in front of the headlights. I have never seen so many in my life. Our friends advised us to keep on the back roads to avoid what is known as Big Shell, an area more hazardous than Little Shell. We left early the next morning. As we were heading into what I call *No man's* land the day seemed much better than the one before. The sun started shining brightly, the temperature was just right, and the waves coming in from the sea were calm. Everything seemed to tell us that our trip to Padre Island was not to be in vain, and that we would discover treasure of years gone by. I felt this was the right place to search for old Spanish coins and relics. But with the coming darkness Ida and I went to bed so that we could get an early start the next morning, it was to be a longer night than I expected.

Trouble arrives

About 3 a.m. we heard a loud horn blowing outside out tent. It was the tow truck that had pulled us out of Little Shell. I recalled being told that these two men had beat an old man over the head with a tire iron simply because he didn't have enough money to pay his tow bill. I told Ida to stay in the tent because it looked like trouble. I went out to talk to the two men. I didn't get to say much. The driver was a big fellow and his partner was medium-sized and both were stone drunk.

"I was thinking it over and changed my mind – I want some collateral for the \$75 you own me," the driver more or less yelled at me. It was my first inclination the bill would be so high. The driver wanted my camera, metal detectors, our stove, ice chest and a few other things. He told me he was going to take them or else! He started toward me from the front while his partner was edging around toward my back. Just then Ida stepped out of the tent with my .35 caliber carbine. She had it cocked and pointed straight at the driver's head.

She told the two that we had offered the camera once, and it had been refused, As soon as we could get our traveler's checks reimbursed we would pay the full tow bill. I told the two men that my wife was a very nervous person, and that I thought it would be best if they left. As they were driving away, the driver hung his head out the window and hollered back. "You'll hear more about this. No one pulls a gun on me and gets away with it."

The next day, a fisherman drove by our camp and handed us a letter that a constable had asked him to deliver. The letter informed us that he would like to see us on a matter "of utmost importance...when you leave the island."

It was Good Friday and the specter of Easter loomed ominously.

I'm not talking Resurrection, I'm talking tourists. By midday, the volume of traffic in Port Aransas was portending quite the weekend. I love that people love this town, but sometimes it can be a bit much. Spring break wounds were still being licked. Was there something to be done? I called my partner Andrea and told her to pack a bag: we were going to turn the tables on San Antonio.

It took me a while to sew-up my Friday work obligations and we didn't get on the road until late afternoon. Apparently I don't know how to get to Sinton the back way anymore. There used to be a four-way stop for US 181 at TX 188. No more. I guess there's an overpass and an exit now. We realized something was amiss right away but decided to live life on the edge and drive on to Papalote. From there, we figured we'd just stick with good ole US 181 all the way. It was a trip down memory lane seeing all those towns for the first time in decades: Skidmore, Beeville, Normanna, Tuleta, Pettus, Tulsita, Kenedy, and Karnes City.

It was getting dark when I let Andrea take over driving. After a minute, my mind started to wander. Having spent my formative years in the Hill Country near San Antonio, I definitely have a connection to the town and love it to this day. San Antonio has such a great vibe. For one thing, the people are authentic and welcoming. For another, San Antonio history runs deep. We all know about the battles waged for sovereignty over the area, but there is so much more. My mind eventually wandered all the way back to 1936. Something magical was happening in San Antonio over Thanksgiving that year: Robert Johnson was recorded performing sixteen of the only twentynine songs we would ever hear by him. And it was going down in room 414 at The Gunter Hotel.

We breezed on through the evening. I was tired and had Robert Johnson songs drifting in and out of my head. "Dust My Broom", "Sweet Home Chicago", and of course "Cross Road Blues". We passed through Hobson, Falls City, Poth, and Floresville. The haunting "Terraplane Blues" had just visited me when we emerged from Elmendorf into San Antonio proper. I snapped out of it and got on my phone to book us a room.

We'd stayed at The Gunter Hotel the last time we were in San Antonio and I didn't see any reason to break with this pascent tradition. Room 414 was unavailable the last time and the story was the same on Good Friday. It didn't matter to us, really. I've got mixed feelings about sleeping in that room anyway: it's not like Robert Johnson slept there. Oh, hell no. He was just recorded there. By some white dudes. Johnson slept in a boarding house during his time in San Antonio..... and that was only when he wasn't being beaten and jailed by the local constabulary.

We were hungry by now. I briefly entertained the notion of making a last-minute reservation at one of the restaurants I'd had my eye on but it was late and no opportunities presented. After a few minutes we decided to hoof it around the corner to The Esquire Tavern. I'd remembered the food was good when we'd skulked in there for late-night snacks a few years ago with Susan and Gentry Powell. When I was a youngster, businessmen who worked downtown would go there in the daytime for a Scotch, but going in that joint at night back in the day was breeding scabs. It's not like that now. The Esquire is a cool joint. The decor is spot-on with dim lighting, semiswanky booths, a tin ceiling, flocked damask wallpaper, and a notably long-ass bar.

Do they make their own ginger beer? Of course they do. Do they have copper cups? Check. A little vodka, lime juice, and crushed ice later and I was enjoying a perfect Moscow Mule replete with the mint garnish. Andrea opted for a French Seventy-five. They've got a fun little selection of food at The Esquire - all of which was available until 11 PM - with some things served all the way until 1 AM.

We started with deviled eggs that had a piped-in filling of yolk mousse. I could detect smoked paprika and a briney-ness that may have been from dill pickle juice. Whole grain mustard and fried green peppercorns adorned this snack for the brief duration of its existence.

We next had small side salads consisting of mixed greens, lettuce, plum tomatoes, and English cucumber, dressed with basil vinaigrette, and loaded with tiny croutons. What kind of people leave their home on The Gulf to order seafood platters inland? We are. We are those kind of people. The giant panko-breaded shrimp were cooked perfectly as was the beer-battered cod. The tartar sauce was a bit overwrought, leaning into the realm of remoulade, but was good nonetheless. The platters came with chili-salt fries which reprised the role the smoked paprika played in our appetizer. They are available al la carte and I would eagerly order them that way in

We had a big Saturday planned and got up early. First stop was Fanick's Garden Center. This lovely oasis is to be unexpectedly found at the end of a residential street in Southeast San Antonio. I bought a couple of pots of herbs and Andrea liberated some hanging baskets. We moved on to Paul's Desert - a nursery devoted exclusively to cacti and succulents. Andrea collects these and made quite the haul. Next, we swung into Asian Supermarket for whole duck, duck eggs, Laostyle sausage, and some pantry items before we closed-out the day at Central Market for wine, cheese, and pastries. We left ourselves enough time to rest a bit before dinner, but just barely.

We'd been hearing about the cebiche Peruano at Leche de Tigre since our last trip and had made reservations for 7:30 PM. Let me tell ya folks, this place will open your palate to a whole new world of uncooked seafood. The Cebiche Classico featuring kampachi (amberjack) was bathed in the titular leche de tigre - a concoction of lime juice, fish stock, ginger, and various alliums, spices, and chiles. It was scrumptious and we also really enjoyed the Pulpo al Olivo that showcased Spanish octopus in avocado crema. We sat at the counter directly in front of both of the young men preparing the cebiche as well as the chef de cuisine who meticulized each hot entree with tweezers before sending them to tables Back at The Gunter Hotel, we closed down the bar with a few tourists and the duo of Brazilian jazz-fusion musicians playing there.

I was tired on driving back to Port Aransas Easter Sunday. I was listful of the road all the way to the island. I thought about Robert Johnson again and half-sang one of his songs in my head. But it wasn't any of the well-known ones I'd thought of on the way up to San Antonio. It wasn't any of the others either like "Stop Breaking Down". "Hellhound on My Trail", or "Traveling Riverside Blues". Nope. The air had changed now. It was thicker. Wetter. Saltier. And a little bit stinky. All-in-all it was like breathing-in home. I couldn't remember all the words to "Dead Shrimp Blues", but I got close.

NCAA Women's and Men's Best Basketball Title Games

Dotson's Note: Since the first NCAA women's and men's basketball tournaments, the championship games has seen it all: blowouts, thrillers and everything in between. I looked at every game and narrowed the list down to four of the greatest in each of women's and men's title games. Actually, I did ten games in each, but thought Dale might chop the report in half.

The Best Women's Title Games

1. 1983 – USC 69, Louisiana Tech 67

Just the second-ever women's basketball NCAA title game proved to be one of the best. Louisiana Tech won the inaugural title in 1982. The Lady Techsters looked for more the following year, but ran into Southern California. Literally. The game hinged on a deciding foul as Kim Mulkey was called for charging with 9 seconds left and a chance to tie up the 69-67 scoreboard. The ball was sent to the other end, and the Trojans won its first title. Cheryl Miller was just a freshman at the time; Miller led her team with 27 points and nine rebounds. Paula McGee contributed 17 points and six rebounds.

2. 1991 — Tennessee 70, Virginia 67 OT

The first-ever overtime played for the national title came in 1991 when Tennessee's Pat Summitt was on the hunt for her third championship. Tennessee forced overtime after trailing by five points with 1:15 left to play. Dena Head steadily scored the final five needed — including the game-tying free throws — to keep the Volunteers in the game. In overtime the Vols took control, and the rest is history. The Lady Vols overcame a Dawn Staley-led Virginia team that caught them in the tournament the year before. Both Staley and Head led their respective teams with 28 points. Tennessee became the first women's basketball program to win three championships. Summitt said before the game if she got three that's all she needs, she could retire then. Summitt kept it rolling and won five more.

3. 1993 — Texas Tech 84, Ohio State 82

Two decades ago, Sheryl Swoopes lifted Texas Tech over Ohio State setting several records that still stand today. Swoopes scored 47 points, notching the all-time scoring record in a — men's or women's championship game. She also broke the record for most points in a half (24), most made field goals (16), highest free throw percentage (11-11) and most points scored in the Women's Final Four (78). Ohio State kept it close throughout. With just over two minutes left, the Buckeyes scored to trail 73-75. Then the Lady Raiders turned to, who other than, Swoopes. She scored five points in the final two minutes to lift Texas Tech despite Ohio State's last-second efforts. The title marked the first and only national championship for Texas Tech, cementing Swoopes in both program and NCAA history.

4. 1994 — North Carolina 60, Louisiana

Tech 59 March Madness is the most fun when nails are bitten and hearts are pounding. North Carolina beating Louisiana Tech at the buzzer had all of that. With 0.7 left on the clock, Louisiana Tech led 59-57 looking to win its third national title, but not on Charlotte Smith's watch. The Tar Heels inbounded the ball under their own basket. Tonya Sampson cut through the paint drawing three defenders including Smith's as she bolted to the 3-point line. Call it a lack of communication, a perfectly-time cut or just a moment of fate — Smith found herself alone above the arc. The ball left her fingertips with 0.3 left, the buzzer sounded and it went in. Smith finished the game with 20 points and 23 rebounds, 19 and 13 in the second half. The shot called the Tar Heels' first and only championship.

The Best Men's Title Games 4. 2019: VIRGINIA 85, TEXAS TECH 77

A game between the two best defenses in college basketball turned into one of the best-executed second halves of basketball I can ever remember seeing.

This is what happens when you have elite coaches and high-level, veteran players on the court at the same time. They figured out how to exploit each other's weaknesses, both teams went full small-ball -- De'Andre Hunter was the biggest guy on the floor by the end of the game -- and it turned into a thrilling, compelling finish. Texas Tech erased a 10-point deficit in the final 10 minutes and took the lead in the final minute only to see Hunter bang home a game-tying three with 12 seconds left.

The Wahoos pulled away in the extra frame, completing maybe the greatest story in the history of college basketball: Becoming the first No. 1-seed to ever lose to a No. 16-seed to winning a national title.

3. 1987: INDIANA 74, SYRACUSE 73

This game is known for the shot that Keith Smart hit with just four seconds left in the

With Steve Alford being face-guarded by Sherman Douglas, Smart found a way to get open for a 15-footer on the baseline that gave Bob Knight his third and final national title. Smart scored 12 of the final 15 points for the Hoosiers, and while the next two games on this list are better known title-winning buckets, Smart's is the only one that was hit when his team was trailing.

2. 1983: N.C. STATE 54, HOUSTON 52

This game will go down as one of the worst beats in college basketball history.

Houston has to defend for 45 seconds. They nearly force a turnover twice in the final 15 seconds. They don't allow the Wolfpack to get within 18 feet of the rim at any point. The shot that N.C. State gets to win the game is a 30-footer with four seconds left on the clock that's an airball, and the only reason that the Cougars lost in regulation was because Whittenberg's shot was an airball.

If that bounces off the front of the rim, Lorenzo Charles' put-back dunk doesn't happen. If Whittenberg gets a better look and has a normal miss, Jim Valvano would have to beat one of the best college basketball teams that we have ever seen to win his

N.C. State pulled off one of the biggest and most exciting upsets in the history of the NCAA tournament, giving Jimmy V a national title and helping build his name cache so that his fight against cancer -- and the hundreds of millions that have been raised since his lost his battle -- became a national news story every December.

1. 2016: VILLANOVA 77, NORTH CAR-OLINA 74

Considering the stakes involved, Villanova-North Carolina was the best college basketball national title game that I have ever seen. It was well-played throughout. It featured a stretch of North Carolina dominance, a stretch of Villanova dominance, a wild comeback in the final five minutes by the Tar Heels and the most exciting finish that we have ever seen in a title game.

Everyone remembers the shot that Kris Jenkins hit to win the game at the buzzer, but what seems destined to be lost to the annals of history is the fact that Marcus Paige hit one of the greatest shots in NCAA tournament history with just 4.7 seconds left. His double-clutch, floating three-ball would be on par with the threes hit by Mario Chalmers in 2008 and De'Andre Hunter in 2019 if Kris Jenkins hadn't won the game at the buzzer.







On the Rocks By Jay Gardner

This time of year always wears me thin. We Evangeline and seawater desal will help get close to having consistent spring-time conditions, and then we get another cool front that drops the temps and spins the wind around on our heads. I know, you're supposed to be careful what you wish for, but I'm ready for fun times on the water and down the beach. But, I suppose we should bide our time a bit longer.

Desalination Issues

As I dig into local water authorities and water sources, it becomes clear that there are already many desal plants operating all over Texas. For example, back in 2004, the Southmost Regional Water Authority in the Valley constructed a brackish well-water desal plant and have expanded it twice to current operating capacity of 10 million gallons per day (MGD), although it is designed for double that capacity. The plant uses water from 20 water wells drilled into the Gulf Coast Aquifer (same one that stretches underneath us all the way to Mississippi) from 200 to 300 feet down. This is a regional plant, instead of a few scattered across the landscape, and owned and operated by one entity, however there are seven more smaller desal plants sprinkled through the region

for smaller towns and irrigation users.

This was in response to the Amistad and Falcon reservoirs (that Texas shares with Mexico on the Rio Grande) falling below 20 percent back in the 1990's. That drought was so bad that the Rio stopped flowing, and without water to pull, the taps dried up. Their plants came online within a year or two. I know most of you loyal readers have heard the term "Evangeline Aquifer" which is part of the same massive aquifer. If we choose to get that online, the water from the Evangeline will also have to go through desalination, although the suspended solids and salts are much less than seawater. It's a less intensive process but includes very similar infrastructure. Plus, the "brine" from the Evangeline can be put right back in a ditch or river with nominal impacts, and in the absence of any other flows, might prove beneficial. Florida has been doing this since the 1980's.

I'm not writing about this because I'm short on topics. I'm writing about desal because the Center for Coastal Studies is continuing to monitor the Nueces River and Nueces Delta, and the results are fairly dim. Dissolved oxygen is already at dangerous low levels, and salinities are higher than they are supposed to be anywhere near the river. The lack of fresh water in the delta is hampering production of fish, shrimp, oysters, and crabs for the entire bay system. This

with, is restoring flows to our delta, river, and bays. There will be more on this later.


Birds of a Feather

Heather let me know that there was a small fall-out on the Island the other day. I didn't have time to look up, as I'm still running a grinder on a boat. Ebird is showing some signs of life, as is BirdCast. Anyone seen the cattle tyrant around lately? I haven't heard of any reports. But the hummingbirds are moving through the area, and I had all three "common" species on my feeders at one time the other morning. Everywhere I look, the local birds are carrying nesting material. They will have a jump on the migrants that are still lingering in South and Central America and Mexico.

Political Season is upon us

Well folks, get ready to be bombarded with more advertisements about Type A funds, who's running the best campaign, and whose political record is better than whose. I'm about to head out to the Packery Channel ribbon "re-cutting" ceremony. This is going to be a rough election season, and I plan on spending as much of it as I can on the water. 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Backwater Adventures

The WINDS OF MARCH started the last week of March and seem to be taking over the first half of April this year. It's a sign of spring tradition between average north winds and prevailing southeast winds. Southeast winds will bring in our big spring tides and each of these will flush water, bait, and gamefish from the south into our Baffin Bay system. Higher tides in our northern bays will send this movement towards the back lakes of Shamrock Cove, and behind St. Jose Island. It is a wonderful time of year to wade fish the back side of Padre Island in all the shallow lagoons and marshes. Take a walk along any dock or shoreline and you will see swarms of tiny baitfish everywhere. Spring is here so get out and embrace it before the heat of summer.

Back Lake Redfish

Back Lake Redfish, are bountiful between Port A and North Padre. There are many dirt road access points where one can park and walk, kayak, or fish from the shore. The Mustang Island Park Fish Pass on the bay side is a great place to start. Topwater plugs and soft plastics under a cork will keep you from getting grasses up. My favorite is a lightly weighted soft plastic lure with a 1/16-1/8th oz jig head. Casting at all fish that you see can be good, sometimes it's just mullet but then it's not, redfish explosion! Entering these areas in a boat can be tricky with so much shallow water and twisting islands. Take your time and idle in the flats, running on top can get you into shallow water where you can't get out. The shoreline north and south of Bird Island Basin is also a great place to access some pristine fishing.

Trout Fishing is on fire

On the boat we have been catching lots of slot trout with multiple oversized trout a day along with some redfish and a few flounder. The flounder typically come back into the bays around March and April. The smaller males are easy to catch; the females are spread out and along the canals and deeper drops. Our redfish have been coming from the shorelines up shallow and the spoil islands along the ICW. Perch and shrimp have been in their bellies. Along the ICW spoils live shrimp and popping corks, and soft plastics under a cork has been best. Big Trout have been On Fire! We have released a lot of trophies this year and many oversized fish. Following the migration of bait and birds seems to be the key. Presenting lighter colored soft plastics at dawn and switching to darks mid morning is still working well. Finding the right sand pocket where multiple fish are bedded up doing their spawning has been important and picking the best part of each sand pocket for the bigger females to be hiding while making your cast. I don't just throw to the middle of the pocket. I pick through the edges and

cast far beyond the pocket and lightly swim my bait into the corners and settling the baits down in the middle of the sand. Make each cast count and imagine yourself as the baitfish.



Thoughts from Reverend Ken

Allow me to tell a story on myself. Heading into the St. Patrick's Day weekend, my wife Barbara and I boarded a plane to Los Angeles to see family and to cheer on our daughter in the LA Marathon. Meredith had never run a marathon. In fact, she had not done much running until the middle of last year. The preparation for the marathon quickly became a source of healing for the intense brokenness in her life. We needed to be there.

We arrived on Thursday night and proceeded to the rental car location. The clerk showed us a row of cars from which we could choose the car we wanted. We chose a car; we walked around the car to inspect for any damage. There was some slight damage on the rear bumper, so I took a picture. We loaded up the car and got in. At the last minute we decided to change cars.

The suitcases were moved from the first car to the second car. Off we went on the one-hour drive to Orange County to see members of Barbara's family. We arrived at our hotel to check-in before looking for some late dinner. As I got out of the car, I opened the back door to get my backpack. No backpack. No backpack in the trunk. I immediately realized the backpack was in the backseat of the first car.

When I travel my backpack is my life. On this trip it held my laptop, IPad, work files, charging cords, hearing aid supplies, and medications. I suddenly felt very vulnerable.

It was late and we decided to look for a place to eat. While eating I tried to contact the rental car company. It was clear I would not be able to talk to a human being at the site from which we rented the car. We decided to make the one-hour trip to the rental car site first thing in the morning.

Upon arriving we waited to see the lost and found person. When she emerged from the backroom, we told her our story. I even showed her the license plate of the car with my backpack from the photo I took the night before. After more waiting she informed us that the car had been rented that morning. My backpack was off on an adventure. After more waiting, the manager contacted the person who had rented the car. The person was on the other side of Pasadena headed to an appointment. He would return the car, and backpack, on Tuesday morning.

I asked the manager to contact him again and inquire about finding a public place I could meet him to retrieve the backpack. I offered to go anywhere in southern California. I needed the medications. We waited some more. The person was not returning the manager's call.

We left and headed back to Orange County to see family. This began a constant weekend preoccupation with checking my phone for updates via messages, texts, or emails. Several times a day I would reach out to the manager. No, the other customer was not

responding to calls, texts, and emails. I was doing a slow burn for most of the weekend. Didn't the other customer realize I needed those medications? While we were with family, there were times I was not all there.

Sunday morning, we made our way to the finish line of the marathon. It was going to be too crowded to follow our daughter along the race. We decided to wait for her at the finish line, checking her progress by following her phone on my phone. Of course, this allowed me to also check for updates on the backpack!

We found a couple of seats in the bleachers about fifty yards from the finish line. Our daughter Meredith was not going to be among the early finishers. It would be a couple of hours until she made it to our location.

In that time, we saw a lot; I saw a lot. I saw runners stop to help their fellow runners who needed assistance getting to the finish line. I saw a LAPD officer help a runner get to the finish line. That video went viral. I also saw a LAFD officer and a member of the private security company working the race do the same with other runners. A few runners sprinted to the finish line. Where did they find that energy after twenty-six plus miles? I saw expressions of agony that revealed the ecstasy of accomplishment. I saw runners raise their arms in exhilaration. I heard screams of joy from runners and their families who had gathered to cheer them. I saw tears on runners and supporters.

I saw our daughter nearing the finish line. We screamed her name; she heard and saw us. Her expression, even through the clouds in my eyes, is one I will never forget. She had taken another important step in her journey of healing. She finished the marathon

It was just a backpack.

We were reunited with the backpack on Tuesday morning before we left to come home. However, my perspective had been changed. Easter does that for us.

Easter is not over on the following Monday. Resurrection brings moments of new life and new perspectives daily. In brokenness big and small, in death, tiny and large, God finds us with hope and healing; God recenters us on the joys of life and love in the living Christ.

Speaking of life, a bunch of humans gather each Sunday to worship in community at Island Presbyterian Church, giving thanks for grace, love, healing, and hope, working for peace, justice, and reconciliation. On the Texas coast at Padre Isle What's left of the Old Bob Hall, Still stands as a sad reminder, Amidst a lonely, gloomy pall.


She stood for years on Padre Isle

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
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

Sea Turtle Nesting Season has Arrived

Report sightings, slow down on Texas beaches to conserve imperiled sea turtles



Report Sea Turtles Nesting, 1-866-TUR-TLE-5 (1-866-887-8535)

Turtle nesting season is now underway and U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is reminding Islanders if they see a nesting turtle call 1-866-TURTLE-5 (1-866-887-8535). After observing and reporting a sea turtle, visitors are asked to remain at the site until a biologist arrives. If it is not possible to stay until a biologist arrives, visitors are asked to carefully mark the site by laying pieces of beach debris, such as pieces of wood or other debris, in a large circle around the nest area so biologists will be able to find the nest when they arrive. To help ensure the survival of nesting sea turtles and eggs, biologists and volunteers will patrol Texas beaches throughout the nesting season. The Service, along with the National Park Service, Texas A&M University at Galveston, the University of Texas Marine Science Institute, Sea Turtle, Inc., Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, and Turtle Island Restoration Network, and the Texas Sealife Center on Padre Island will be working together to coordinate a response when a nesting sea turtle, tracks, or nest is found.

This year marks 46 years (1978-2024) of bi-national Kemp's ridley sea turtle conservation. In 1947, an estimated 40,000 Kemp's ridley turtles nested on one stretch of beach near Rancho Nuevo, Mexico. This was the only known nesting site at that time. Over the next four decades, the species suffered a devastating decline with a 99.4 percent reduction in numbers of nests. In response to the dramatic loss of this species, the Service and its partner agencies launched a cooperative international project in 1978. The project focuses on nest protection efforts in the U.S. and Mexico, implementing regulations requiring the use of turtle excluder devices on commercial shrimp boats, and establishing a second nesting colony of Kemp's ridley sea turtles at Padre Island National Seashore, Texas, where historical nesting had been documented.

Cooperative efforts continue to help the Kemp's ridley sea turtle population. In 2023, 256 Kemp's ridley nests were found in Texas – the largest number recorded in Texas since 1978 was in 2017, when 353 nests were documented.

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


