### Baltimore bridge



Overview of JFK Bridge Bumpers

The bridge collapse in Baltimore raised questions about the safety of our own JFK Bridge here on Padre Island. The two bridges each have about the same amount of average daily traffic at just over 32,000 vehicles but that is about where the comparison ends since cargo ships would face a real challenge navigating the Intracoastal Waterway. We reached out to officials at the Texas Department of Transportation to inquire if a study had ever been done regarding the vulnerability to a strike by a passing barge and were informed that if such a study exists it would have Homeland Security implications and be classified. A TxDOT spokesman did point out that the bridge has a robust fender system in place to prevent vessels from striking the bridge's support columns. Longtime Islanders still remember the collapse of the Queen Isabella Causeway in South Padre Island in 2001 but there are no records of similar incidents on the JFK Bridge.

The flats that were dry over the low winter tides are alive again with new growth in plant and micro organisms. Shrimp, crabs, minnows and birds are flocking to these areas following the growth, with predatory gamefish right behind them. This flood of water can make finding concentrations of sport fish hard to find, spreading them out over vast stretches of water. This week let's touch on some of my ways to stay on consistent action and quality catches. Shorelines and spoil dumps

are a useful tool that gamefish use to herd and capture baitfish. With high tides there is more water

Hello Dale,

My wife and I own an unimproved lot in CC. We have watched properties here for several years now and the property taxes and valuations for even similar properties are all over the place. I believe we are seeing adjusted amounts. I understand how a mill rate is set, and I understand all the adjustments to valuations here, but for a future buyer; this wacky approach by Nueces County makes things seem unpredictable which makes buyers slow and cautious. For example, if I see two properties and they are market comparable, then the value and unadjusted taxes need to be the same. The county needs to report unadjusted taxes and property values. Part of property taxation is perceived fairness. The other thing messing with buyers is the 11% rate hike; I digress. I think the county ought to take an entirely new approach to what is reported publicly versus adjustments that are specific to a person to develop a real fairness and fair expectations of taxes versus buying from a retiree and getting hit with surprises.

### Fishing in March and April

The months of March and April are a good time of the year to catch big trout along the shorelines of the King Ranch, starting at the Laureles pier on the north side of Baffin Bay and back north for a mile of so. Most of the big trout you catch will be sow trout, females with a big sack of roe (eggs). If the water is clear or just a little murky with a little sunshine, a sliver mirror lure works real good. Sometimes the trout can be spotted by wearing polaroid sunglasses.

If the water is dirty colored live bait works better using a popping cork. For bait use live shrimp, croaker, or small pinperch or if you have a perch trap use piggy perch. To catch piggy perch, squeeze the opening of the trap a little smaller and bait it with one or two crushed blue crabs.

Drift fishing or using a trolling motor to get back up wind works good because it gives you a chance to see the trout but wade fishing usually works better in that you do not disturb the fish as much. This time of the year, it's not unusual to catch a tenor twelve pound trout. Be sure to bring along your camera since only one huge size is allowed per day.

From April to June a lot of small trout can be caught by drift fishing on the east side of the canal a little north of Baffin Bay using live shrimp and a popping cork. Sometimes you will see a small bunch of seagulls working close to the water catching shrimp as the trout kick them up from the bottom. Bobbie Kimbrell

Port of Corpus Christi Donates \$500,000 to the Rebuild of Bob Hall Pier Plans approved for Bob Hall Pier/Restaurant to go out for bids

What a week! I truly cannot say thank you enough to the Port of Corpus Christi commissioners and staff for their help in obtaining \$500,000 toward the reconstruction of Bob Hall Pier. That happened on Tuesday, March 19. ThE donation got us halfway there to the extra million we needed to finish the restaurant/third party concessionaire building. Judge Connie Scott was instrumental in helping me get this done with the Port. Then on Wednesday March 20, the court then accepted my motion to move more of my precinct 4 ARPA funds(325,000) along with Judge Connie Scott's ARPA funds(175,000) to the pier. With those funds we have found the million dollars and the third party concessionaire/ restaurant space will be built. Hallelujah

I know there was a lot of skepticism and anger when this originally did not pass. I vowed then to work tirelessly to get this built for the Island and all of Nueces County. Commissioner John Marez has been a strong supporter of this project from the beginning and he along with the commissioners court should be applauded for this victory. Team work truly makes the dream work. Working with Judge Scott for months, we came up with a solution that she and the entire court could live with. I am grateful.

What also happened during this great week? Well we approved the final plans for the pier and approved it to go out for bids subject to final paperwork. The actual bid on the pier with an allowance for the restaurant space will go out sometime in April but it has been approved by the court and will go out as soon as all paperwork is wrapped up. The construction schedule provided to us by the project manager and project engineer, indicates we will award the bid this summer for the pier and start building this year. Watch out for details on a groundbreaking for that.

It has been a long and difficult task but we have stayed on budget and on track. Thanks also to the Nueces County Coastal Parks board and staff for their outstanding efforts in regard to Bob Hall Pier.

On a separate note for information purposes, once the pier and restaurant space is built, the Coastal Parks board will go out for request for proposals(RFP) to pick an operator for the pier/restaurant. That is way down the road because we need to build it first but I know that is the next question on everyone's minds. So as the pier nears completion sometime in 2025 depending on the length of construction, then the RFP will go out for the restaurant space. So look for that RFP sometime in 2025.

# Pancho Villa Expedition Part 3

Dotson's Note: While executing the withdrawal order, Dodd and a portion of the 7th Cavalry fought an engagement on April 22 with about 200 Villistas under Candelaro Cervantes at the small village of Tomochic. As the Americans entered the village, the Mexicans opened fire from the surrounding hills. Dodd first sent patrols out to engage the Villistas' rear guard, to the east of Tomochic, and after these were "scattered", located the main body on a plain to the north and brought it into action. Skirmishing continued, but after dark the Villistas retreated and the Americans moved into Tomochic. The 7th Cavalry lost two men killed and four wounded, while Dodd reported his men had killed at least thirty Villistas. Thanks to Mrs. Golvia E. The next significant engagement took place on May 5th. A small Carrancista garrison at the silver mining town of Cusihuiriachic was attacked by Villa's forces on May 4th, prompting the garrison commander to request help from U.S. forces at nearby San Antonio. Six troops of the 11th Cavalry, its machine gun platoon, and a detachment of Apache Scouts under 1st Lt. James A. Shannon, totaling 14 officers and 319 men, began a night march under Major Robert L. Howze. Arriving at Cusihuirischic, Howze found that 140 Villistas under Julio Acosta had pulled back into the mountains to the west to a ranch at Ojos Azules, and that the garrison commander had received orders not to cooperate with the Americans.

Howze was delayed three hours in finding a guide and by the time he located the ranch and was deploying to attack, day had broken. When Acosta's guards and Howze's advance guard exchanged fire, Howze with Troop A immediately ordered a charge with pistols through the hacienda. Unable to deploy on line, the charge was made in column of fours and closed with the fleeing elements of Villistas. The other troops deployed to either side of the hacienda attempting to block escape and were supported by plunging fire from the machine gun troop. Friedrich Katz called the action the "greatest victory that the Punitive Expedition would achieve." Without a single casualty, the Americans killed forty-four Villistas and wounded many more. The survivors, including Acosta, were dispersed. Above, General Pershing and General Bliss inspecting the camp, with Colonel Winn,

Commander of the 24th Infantry Also on May 5th, several hundred Mexican raiders, under a Villista officer, attacked the geographically isolated towns of Glenn Springs and Boquillas in the Big Bend region of Texas. At Glenn Springs the Mexicans overwhelmed a squad of just nine 14th Cavalry troopers guarding the town, set fire to it, then rode on to Boquillas where they killed a boy, looted the town and took two captives. Local commanders pursued the Mexicans 100 miles into the state of Coahuila to free the captives and regain the stolen property. On May 12, Major George T. Langhorne and two troops of the 8th Cavalry from Fort Bliss, Texas, reinforced by Colonel Frederick Sibley and Troops H and K of the 14th Cavalry from Fort Clark, rescued the captives at El Pino without a fight. Three days later a small detachment of cavalry encountered the raiders at Castillon, killing five of the Villistas and wounding two; the Americans had no casualties. The cavalry force returned to the United States May 21st after ten days in Mexico. On May 14, 2nd Lt. George S. Patton raided the San Miguelito Ranch, near Rubio, Chihuahua. Patton, a Pershing aide. and was out looking to buy some corn from the Mexicans when he came across the ranch of Julio Cárdenas, an important leader in the Villista military organization. With fifteen men and three Dodge touring cars, Patton led America's first motorized military action, in which Cárdenas and two other men were shot dead. The young lieutenant then had the three Mexicans strapped to the hood of the cars and driven back to General Pershing's headquarters. Patton is said to have carved three notches into the twin Colt Peacemakers he carried, representing the men he claimed to have killed that day. General Pershing nicknamed him the "Bandito".

Dotson's Other Note: The Villistas launched an attack of their own on May 25th. This time a small force of ten men from the 7th Cavalry were out looking for stray cattle and correcting maps when they were ambushed by twenty rebels just south of Cruces. One American corporal was killed and two other men were wounded, though they killed two of the "bandit leaders" and drove off the rest. On June 2nd, Shannon and twenty Apache scouts fought a small skirmish with some of Candelaro Cervantes' men who had stolen a few horses from the 5th Cavalry. Shannon and the Apaches found the rebels' trail, which was a week old by then, and followed it for some time until finally catching up with the Mexicans near Las Varas Pass, about forty miles south of Namiquipa. Using the cover of darkness, Shannon and his scouts attacked the Villistas' hideout, killing one of them and wounding another without losses to themselves. The Villista who died was thought to be the leader as he carried a sword during the fight. The weekly Veterans Round Table meetings are on Thursdays 9-11AM. # Stuff I Heard on the Island

Between now and November of this year three non-partisan elections will take place that will have direct and profound impact on Padre Island.

### Nueces County Appraisal Review **Board**

Last week in this space I addressed a new election which has sprung up on the calendar with Election Day on May 4 and Early Voting to begin on Monday, April 22. For the first time three members of what will become a nine-member Board of Directors of the Nueces Appraisal District (NCAD) will be elected, and under the new rules appointees to the Appraisal Review Board, (ARB) which hears appeals from property owners, must have the approval of two of the three new members of the Board of Directors who will be elected in May. That means that two of the three elected board members will have veto power over any new appointees to the ARB that actually determines property values for the purpose of taxation.

I raised the question of whether board candidates will have to file campaign finance reports so that taxpayers and property owners can see who is contributing to the races for seats on the district board that will select members of the ARB since the Texas Senate Bill is not specific on that point. The candidates file for the seats with the Nueces County Judge's office but they are simply the record keepers, the election, by law, is conducted by the Nueces County Appraisal District making this the district's first attempt at running an election of any kind.

The district itself has been silent on this issue but since last week the judge's office responded that campaign finance reports in the races will be due on April 4, however, they will only cover the period between the date of the candidate's filing through March 25. I expect there to be very little information in those reports since it is early in the election cycle. The question then is when the next round of campaign disclosure reports will be due and more importantly whether they will be available to voters before the beginning of Early Voting on April 22 so that voters will have that information when they go to the polls.

According to the rules of the Texas Ethics Commission the next campaign/candidate financial disclosure filings are not due until July 15 and would cover the period through June 30. Those dates however, are designed for the normal November election cycle and unless separate rules are written by the Nueces Appraisal District for these three elections that would mean that voters would not be able to see campaign finance reports until after the election of the new members to the NCAD board. This is troubling and unless addressed likely litigious.

This election came out of the last session of the Texas Legislature and eventually these elections will be moved to the November election cycle and at that time may become partisan based, but for this cycle they are not and in just over three weeks are we are going to begin choosing three people for the Nueces Appraisal District Board by direct election for the first time in our history with eleven candidates running who are split into three separate races with four candidates in two races and three in the third. The new law requires that the winner in each race get a majority of votes and with those crowded fields there is almost certainly going to be three runoff elections in June.

As stated here last week the last countywide May election was in 2022 when only 6412 of 211,321 (3%) registered voters in the county cast ballots and if there is a June runoff election it is quite possible the races for the three seats on the Appraisal District Board of Directors will be the only races on the ballot. If that is the case cut that 6412 number by at least half and all three seats could be decided by 1500 votes. That means a good turnout of the 8459 registered voters on Padre Island could swing all three races for seats that arguably will have the most

impact on the daily lives of Islanders of any of the other races through November. After years of complaining about out property values we now have a chance to do something about it.

### Flour Bluff School Board races

In November there will also be non-partisan races for four seats on the seven-member Flour Bluff ISD Board of Directors. FBISD property taxes make up almost half of the tax burden of taxpayers on Padre Island and as things now stand the next board chosen at the district is likely going to be the author of a bond package that would go before voters in 2025. The last FBISD bond election was in May, 2013 when a \$49 million school bond package passed by a vote of 269 for and 187 against with only 456 votes cast, a 2.6% turnout. Whether to schedule that bond election on a November ballot when turnout will be higher or to schedule it off-season could have a deciding impact on the outcome and the four members elected this November can make that decision.

### City Council

While it is early in the election cycle for the non-partisan races for Corpus Christi City Council it looks like it could be a crowded field with desalinization being a dividing point and some revised version of Proposition A the second. The belief among the political class is that substantial money from outside the city will pour in to stop desal and the last round of city races bears that out. The word from the local political circles is that as much as \$5 million will be raised locally to push back against the desal move since it would impact expansion at the Port of Corpus Christi. As a reminder, our system elects three At-Large candidates to the nine-member council, with five Single-member seats including our District 4, and the Mayor. This means Islanders can vote in a majority of the races on the ballot.

The Island has a lot at stake at city hall with the managing of the approximately \$4 million that comes into the Island Tax Increment Reinvestment Zone #2 each year and will increase to an estimated \$14 million per year by 2042, streets, the Island Mobility Plan, improvements to Commodores Park and under the JFK Bridge, and the structuring of a city bond package that will go before voters in November. As readers of this space know while we make up about 4% of the city population we now account for just under 15% of the property tax base -and that will increase - but we historically get scant attention in city bond packages. This does not include revenues from Hotel Occupancy Tax (HOT) of which we contribute about 25% directly and as much as 60% if you include areas of the city where hotels fill up during peak beach-going holidays. We have a dog in this fight – five of them to

### By the numbers

In the May primaries just past at total of 2311 voters (24,5%) cast ballost in the two precincts that make up Padre Island out of 8459 registered voters, all according to the records of the Nueces County Clerk's office In the same Primary Elections 21,435 votes cast ballots countywide out of 213,343 total registered (10.5%).

In the last Presidential cycle in November, 2020 128,098 votes were cast countywide out of 212,098 registered ((60%) while on Padre Island the turnout was 73% with 6275 votes cast. You can do the math and if those numbers hold we will make up around 5% of the turnout in the city races which is enough to decide most.

As for the critical races for the three seats on the Nueces County Board of Directors we offer space in these pages to hear what you have to say. Drop us a line. and for voters the last day to register for that election in April 4.

While these elections are all by partisan, our party is The Island.

It sounded incendiary on its face, but a closer look at existing federal and historic records at the time found no evidence of a "Bombing Target B-1" located in Nueces County. A check of the historical records found 370 former bomb sites in Texas, with five listed in Kleberg County, and four in Nueces County (all across the Laguna Madre) but no mention of a "B-1" bombing range in Nueces County. The list shows Targets B-2, B-3, B-4, and B-7 in Kleberg County, but no mention of a "B-1" range of any kind. The pamphlet circulated by federal authorizes on The Island says "Bombing Target B-1 was located on Padre Island, inside the City Limits of Corpus Christi." The federally maintained website mentioned in the pamphlet lists no such site. But in fact, our island has a long history of being fired on by trainees in the U.S. Navy and Army Air Corps – which later became the U.S. Air

Crews working on expansion of the park road at PINS in 2013 found four "ordinances" during excavation work; four were live bombs and one was a dummy bomb. They were practice bombs typically used for training, about three feet long with a charge about the equivalent of a ten-gauge shotgun shell in the nose to show the pilot where they landed.

The history The history of the ranges on Padre Island comes to us from a variety of sources, including the historical data compiled when Padre Island National Seashore was founded, a few eyewitness accounts, and locals who came later and saw the aftermath. Pilot training began at the new Naval Air Station in Corpus Christi began in March, 1941 and accelerated quickly as World War II increased the demand for pilots. By the end of 1942 Corpus Christi NAS and its auxiliary bases were processing 2,500 pilots per month and became the largest naval pilot training facility in the world. Among the notables trained here were future President George Bush, Senator/Astronaut John Glenn, actor Tyrone Power, and TV emcee Bob Barker – where he may or may not have found that the Price Was Right. Island is off limits to civilians Early in the war The Island was declared off-limits to civilians and all information concerning activity on the island was declared classified making the finding of

The bombing targets consisted of large white bull's-eyes encircled by concentric white rings 100 yards in diameter. The eight strafing targets consisted of vertical cloth or paper and, along with the bombing targets, were built spaced about five miles apart. Bombs dropped on the targets were usually very small and contained only enough explosive for pilots to check their accuracy. The principal practice bomb, the Mark IV. was only nine inches long and contained a 40-gauge shotgun shell in the nose as an explosive. Some larger bombs were dropped on occasion, a few 500-pounders, and typically half of their weight would be

With the construction of the targets also came the need to service and repair them and naval personnel had to perform this duty. Initially, crews had to travel by boat to reach many of the targets, but eventually a housing facility known as Caffey barracks was built. Caffey barracks is still on the island and now serves as the ranger station at Padre Island National Seashore. Patrols also were established on Padre Island to ward off German submarines and by 1943, nine patrol stations were established. In spite of the new military presence on the island, cattle operations continued as they had for over a hundred years. Bombing practice was halted during the annual round-ups and for the rest of the year several thousand cattle roamed The Island as they had since the days of Padre Balli. Observers noted that cattle would move away from

targets at the first sign of an airplane engine, then "move in and around the targets as soon as the firing stops and graze bombing areas when the ranges are quiet." After World War II

Things began quieting down after World War II and according to locals, by the Korean War the number of bombing ranges was down to only two. But the bombing stopped when Park Road 22 was extended south of the Nueces/Kleberg county line in 1960. The last range was decommissioned in 1966 and the Navy sent out ordinance experts to sanitize the ranges of all unexploded ordinance. The sand at the targets was sifted down to a level of 18 inches using heavy equipment and the bombs removed. But from time to time, even into the late 1990s calls would come into the Island Moon Newspaper office that someone had found an old bomb on PINS. In 1966 bombing operations were moved to McMullen County managed by NAS Kingsville. That range was often referred to as Yankee/Dixie range, identifying its Yankee and Dixie target complexes.

Corpus Christi attorney David Coover whose father was a ranch foreman on The Island through 1960, and who frequented the ranch and the bombing areas as a teen, told the Island Moon he does not believe there were any bombing ranges north of the Kleberg-Nueces line.

"The northernmost bombing range that I ever saw or heard of was about four miles south of the county line," Coover said this week. "There were as many as six sites through World War II, by the Korean War that had been reduced to three, and there were only a couple left when the military shut them all down in 1960."

### A near miss

We Islanders can't help but wonder what would have happened if the military had pushed forward with a proposal to use Padre Island to explode the first atomic bomb. South Padre Island was one of eight sites that the US Military considered as a place to explode the first atomic bomb and it actually came down to about three sites that were pretty high on the list: one was in California, one was the Alamagordo site in New Mexico and the other one was South Padre Island. Fortunately for us Island dwellers, Almagordo won the contest. An official involved in the decision said later:

"South Padre had been used as a gunnery range for the Army Air Corps. It was a very remote area... It was, at that point of course, really undeveloped as a tourist site and then across from it was the King Ranch which was also, at that time, nearly one million acres of undeveloped land. But, on the plus side, Corpus Christi was 120 miles away and it had rail connections and there was also a Naval Air Station there. So it would have worked."

Then in the early 2000s a Kingsville economic development group pushed for a new bombing site in Kenedy County to replace the bombing range being closed at Vieques, Puerto Rico. The 220,000 acre site near the National Seashore was considered since it was across the Laguna Madre from the vastness of the King Ranch and it also offered the chance to practice amphibious landings. Opposition from Texas politicians stopped the proposal before it reached the official application level.

The only evidence that The Island was once a bombing range comes in the form of the occasion report from the Corpus Christi Police Department which includes language that accuses violators of "Trespassing on a Federal Superfund Site," and the occasional notice from federal authorizes who send out notices like the one mentioned above to meet federal guidelines because somewhere in the annals of federal files there still exists a bombing range on Padre Island. But the last time any evidence that bombs were dropped here was the find by work crews in 2013. So while there may be a paper bomb site on Padre Island don't expect to be needing a bomb shelter.

# Shohei Ohtani's Interpreter Fired by Dodgers

Dotson's Note: Shohei Ohtani's interpreter and close friend has been fired by the Los Angeles Dodgers following allegations of illegal gambling and theft from the Japanese baseball star. ers Stadium in Los Angeles, California on December 14, 2023. Ohtani signed a record-shattering \$700 million deal with the Los Angeles Dodgers, the richest in North American sports history. Interpreter Ippei Mizuhara, 39, was let go from the team Wednesday following reports from The Los Angeles Times and ESPN about his alleged ties to an illegal bookmaker. The team is in South Korea this week as Ohtani makes his Dodgers debut.

"In the course of responding to recent media inquiries, it was discovered Shohei has been the victim of a massive theft and we are turning the matter over to the authorities," law firm Berk Brettler LLP said in a statement Wednesday. Sports gambling is illegal in California, even as 38 states and the District of Columbia allow some form of it. Mizuhara is a familiar face to baseball fans as Ohtani's constant companion, interpreting for him with the media and at other appearances since Ohtani came to the U.S. in 2017. He even served as Ohtani's catcher during the Home Run Derby at the 2021 All-Star Game. When Ohtani left the Los Angeles Angels to sign a \$700 million, 10year contract with the Dodgers in December, the club also hired Mizuhara.

The team did not have an immediate comment. Mizuhara's firing was confirmed by Major League Baseball.

On the Tuesday the week the story broke, Mizuhara told ESPN that his bets were on international soccer, the NBA, the NFL and college football. MLB rules prohibit players and team employees from wagering — even legally, on baseball and also ban betting on other sports with illegal or offshore bookmakers.

"I never bet on baseball," Mizuhara told ESPN. "That's 100%. I knew that rule; we have a meeting about that in spring training."

Mizuhara was born in Japan and moved to the Los Angeles area in 1991 so his father could work as a chef. He attended Diamond Bar High School in eastern Los Angeles County and graduated from the University of California, Riverside, in 2007.

After college, Mizuhara was hired by the Boston Red Sox as an interpreter for Language pitcher Hideki Okajima. In 2013.

the Boston Red Sox as an interpreter for Japanese pitcher Hideki Okajima. In 2013, he returned to Japan to translate for English-speaking players on the Hokkaido Nippon-Ham Fighters. That's where he first met Ohtani, who joined the team that same year.

After Ohtani signed with the Angels in 2017, the team hired Mizuhara to work as his personal interpreter. ESPN said Mizuhara told the outlet this week he has been paid

between \$300,000 and \$500,000 annually. ESPN said it spoke to Mizuhara that Tuesday night, at which point the interpreter said Ohtani had paid his gambling debts at Mizuhara's request. After the statement from Ohtani's attorneys saying the player was a victim of theft, ESPN says Mizuhara changed his story Wednesday and claimed Ohtani had no knowledge of the gambling debts and had not transferred any money to bookmakers.

Mizuhara said he incurred more than \$1 million in debt by the end of 2022 and his losses increased from there.
"I'm terrible (at gambling). Never going to

do it again. Never won any money," Mizuhara said. "I mean, I dug myself a hole and it kept on getting bigger, and it meant I had to bet bigger to get out of it and just kept on losing. It's like a snowball effect."

It would be the biggest gambling scandal for baseball since Pete Rose agreed to a lifetime ban in 1989 after an investigation for MLB by lawyer John Dowd found Rose placed numerous bets on the Cincinnati Reds to win from 1985-87 while playing for and managing the team.

The MLB gambling policy, posted in every locker room, prohibit players and team employees from wagering, even legally, on baseball and also ban betting on other sports with illegal or offshore bookmakers. Betting on baseball is punishable with a one-year ban from the sport. The penalty for betting on other sports illegally is at the commissioner's discretion.

Ohtani's stardom has spread worldwide, even as the two-way player has remained largely media-shy. While he underwent surgery on his right elbow last September and will not pitch this season, he will be used as a designated hitter and there is a possibility he could play in the field. He went 2 for 5 with an RBI in his first game, the season opener against the San Diego Padres in South Korea.

Dotson's Other Note: Japanese baseball superstar Shohei Ohtani has unveiled the identity of his new wife after weeks of speculation. The Los Angeles Dodgers star shared a photo of Mamiko Tanaka, a former basketball player, for the first time.

Ohtani did not reveal her identity when he announced their marriage last month.

The 29-year-old also gave no details about their wedding at that time, only describing his Japanese bride as someone "who is very special to me". The announcement came as a shock to many and caused a stir on social media, leaving many of his fans guessing who she might be. # "Unpossible"

If you were to push the words unbelievable and impossible together you just might get "unpossible." It's the only way I can describe the 1983 NCAA basketball upset of N.C. State over the University of Houston. Jim Valvano, known as Coach "V," was a young, loud, brash, New York Italian basketball coach who owned enough nose to mind everybody's business; if he ever fell face first, it would two days to dig him out. Likeable and excitable, Valvano initially became known more for splitting his pants while jumping up and down during a game than winning. My mother, Edith Purvis, worked at N.C. State for over 25 years. She introduced me to Coach Valvano. He had so much energy; it was like meeting three people at once. Television and radio loved the guy; he was

two-thirds con man and one-third coach. Let's just say he was different. Jim loved people, food, and basketball and ate life in large gulps. Basketball allowed him to enjoy and share his passions, and generating the greatest upset in college basketball history would insure that he be remembered. His coaching style allowed his team to practice cutting down the nets one day a week, instead of working on stopping the back-door cut. They talked about dreaming instead of baseline defense, about playing with confidence instead of implementing the half-court trap. They worked hard, played hard, and had fun; but more importantly, they learned to trust one another while listening to their vagabond coach, who could take any defeat and turn it into dessert. He was contagious, believable and could sell M&M's to a diabetic.

Head Coach Jim Valvano and Assistant coaches Ed McLean, Ray Martin, and Tom Abatemarco, would lead the Wolfpack to a 26-10 season record which included an 8-6 ACC record. N.C. State would end their season ranked #14 in the Coaches' poll and #16 in the Associated Press poll. Just being invited to the dance would require them to win the ACC Tournament. The Wolfpack would defeat Wake Forest 71-70, the Michael Jordan, Sam Perkins, and Brad Daugherty UNC team 91-84 in overtime, and then Ralph Sampson and The University of Virginia 81-78, in succession. State would receive the ACC Trophy and a #6 seed from the committee and was promptly

sent out West to be discarded. The NCAA Tournament started on March 2nd and ended at "The Pit" in Albuquerque, New Mexico, on April 4, 1983. Only fifty-two schools participated in the tourney at that time, and the lowest seeds became the #13's. There was no shot clock or threepoint line. The field would be expanded the following year. No one had any idea at that time that the real Cinderella would come to the party dressed like a wolf. The Pepperdine Waves led by 6 points with one minute to play, in regulation. It would take two overtimes for the Wolfpack to shake Pepperdine by the final score of 69-67. Waves' Head Coach, Jim Harrick, still does not believe they lost. Dead ahead lay Jerry Tarkanian's UNLV bunch that had only lost two ballgames that year. Sidney Green and UNLV led by 13 points with ten minutes to play. State would prevail 71-70 in another nail biter. N.C. State would now prepare for their Sweet Sixteen match-up with the Running Utes of Utah, coached by Jerry Pimm. N.C. State was being held in high esteem by the press as a "team of destiny." In Raleigh, they referred to the team as "The Cardic Pack." The Wolfpack would win in a laugher 75-56. It had been their first easy win. They say what goes around comes around. Up next awaited Goliath, the college player of the year, Ralph Sampson, and his 29-5 Wahoos of Virginia. Coach Terry Holland and his team were looking to avenge their ACC Tournament Championship loss to the Wolfpack. But it was not to be. Virginia was up by 7 points with six minutes to play. State won 63-62 by fouling Virginia with seconds to go, in a tie game, on purpose. Who fouls late in a tie game on purpose? "I couldn't believe my ears when V started

"I couldn't believe my ears when V started yelling 'foul' with the game tied" said Wolfpack forward, Thurl Bailey.

After N.C. State returned from their victory in the regional, 5,000 people showed up to watch the Wolfpack practice in the Reynolds Neal Coliseum. Valvano was on top of the world, and everyone lay at his feet. "Survive and Advance" became his motto.

The Final Four would pit Georgia against

was the championship game. This up-and-down-the-floor playground basketball, with exclamation points provided by rim-rocking dunks, held the basketball world in awe. The winner of this game would surely be crowned National Champ on Monday night. The final score: Houston

The next day during their press conference, Valvano claimed they would hold the ball against Houston. "If we get the opening tip on Monday night, we may not take a

Valvano claimed they would hold the ball against Houston. "If we get the opening tip on Monday night, we may not take a shot until Tuesday," exclaimed Valvano. "Even my mother took the eight points and Houston."

Head Coach Guy V. Lewis, with great

Houston." Head Coach Guy V. Lewis, with great players like Clyde Drexler, Larry Micheaux, Hakeem Olajuwon, Reid Gettys, Benny Anders, Michael Young, and freshman Alvin Franklin, waited to claim their rightful title. I found it interesting that both Guy and Jim both used the "V" in name recognition and both teams' colors included red and white. Before the game, Valvano did what he does best, "Talk." He also made it clear to his team that they were not going to hold the ball in front of 50 million people who would be watching on TV. N.C. State missed ten shots in a row at the start of the game, but still led 33-25 at halftime. Houston stormed back to lead by 7, with ten minutes to go. Wolfpack strategy included not letting the Cougars dunk and fouling to get the ball back. In short, it worked. Freshman Benny Anders was fouled in a tie game with seconds left, as Guy Lewis hid his eyes in his red-and-white checkered towel. Anders missed. N.C. State now with the ball moved up court. The ball went into the corner to Bailey who returned it to Derek Whittenburg as time was running out. Whittenburg launched a 30-footer that appeared to be on target, but short. Time stood still for everyone but Wolfpack forward, Lorenzo Charles, who jumped up, caught the ball and dunked, all in the same motion. It was over; N.C. State 54-Houston 52. "If we win, pigs will fly, and pink elephants will drive Cadillacs," said Valvano before the game. Can anyone say "Unpossible?" I should have known that my pal Dotson Lewis was seated courtside with Blackie Sherrod, the senior sportswriter for the Dallas Morning News. When I asked Dotson for his thoughts, he said, "What a shocker. I thought Guy Lewis had fainted when the game ended," said Dotson. "He was one of the most underrated coaches in college

basketball."
At the end of the 1983 season, several
Wolfpack starters were drafted. They are as
follows: Thurl Bailey was drafted by Utah
Jazz, Sidney Lowe by the Chicago Bulls,
and Derek Whittenburg by the Phoenix
Suns. Lorenzo Charles and Cozell McQueen would later be drafted in 1984, by
the Atlanta Hawks and Milwaukee Bucks,

N.C. State won their last nine games of that 1983 season; and in seven of those games, they were behind on the scoreboard with one minute to play. It was as if this team had been touched in some special way. Was it divine

intervention or luck? Who cares? Sometimes things happen in sports that bring attention to real life experiences. I believe that Jim Valvano's ESPY speech would not have had the same impact without his upset victory and later his bout with cancer. The Jimmy V Foundation for Cancer Research still continues twenty years after his death to lead the nation in money raised. In short, Valvano's seven simple, yet powerful, words will live on, "Don't Give Up, Don't Ever Give Up." True heroes never surren-



I landed this GIANT LADY SPECK this week while casting lighty weighted soft plastics to shallow sand pockets in the Laguna Madre. The trout was 9lbs and released after a few quick photos.

Farah cont. from A1 above the bottom for bait to escape attacks, wider surface area for bait to spread out, and harder hunting. Trout and reds will push schools of bait up against these barriers so that they can cut them off when they are pushing bait. Look for birds of various species along shorelines to show you where bait is plentiful. This week we watched four white pelicans sitting on the beach along the west shoreline of the Lagoon. Just a few yards out was a stand of thick grass along the bank. I watched them shake off the morning chill and walk and swim out to the grass just off the beach They did not spread out and herd minnows as usual, they just swam over and started dipping minnows and swallowing them. I knew that they had just filled their stomachs and had been resting waiting to go grab a mouth full of those tiny minnows, just as the trout were most likely doing on the outside sandy edge of the thick grass. As we approached we caught a few mature male trout in the near bye sand pockets. The moment my soft plastic bait hit the water next to the thick dark grass there was a flash and I felt a tick in the line. I reeled down and bowed the rod in half. Her head breached the surface and shook with gills flared open. White frothy foam filled the air before she dove down and out away from her shoreline hide. I walked her over to my wade fishing partner and had the cameras rolling while I brought her to hand. Her back was black and wide, she was full of eggs and fat. After a moment of touch I let her go right back to her area so she could find her spawn. Check out this beautiful fish on my Facebook page at Joey FARAH'S Backwater Fishing.

High tides are rolling down the ICW a channel, the submerged spoil islands are a great place to find concentrations of all gamefish species. The area south of Bird Island Basin is rich with these spots. Drifting over and around them with shrimp and popping corks, or anchoring up and throwing from the deep edges into the shallows with popping corks or bottom rigs is very successful. We drift these grass spoils with soft plastics and topwaters hunting giant specks and hard pulling reds. The big rock piles in Baffin Bay are starting to hold pots of fish right now with these high tides. The edges will be the best zone as throwing on top with popping corks and live shrimp is good anything sun surface over the rocks will hang you up. The Rocks will yield black drum and trout for the next two months like fish hotels.

The Land Cut to the south and the shipping channels around Port A are gamefish highways. Throwing lures along their edges can be some of the most fun fishing of the year. Like bass fisherman pitching and sight casting to structure we will connect with some true giant trophy fish in the next few weeks in these travel zones. One great technique is to SPOT LOCK AN-CHOR with your trolling motor along any change in the side of the canal. Catching fish that I have located on my HUNMING-BIRD SIDE SCAN makes it seem easy, then hooking multiple times while spout locked down, moving to a new position and hitting them again. Gamefish pick certain areas for a reason and will often return after feeling your fishing pressure.

NEW TROUT LIMITS WENT INTO EFFECT THIS WEEK. THREE TROUT 15-20" with one trout to be kept over 30" a day. I'm sure after the summer these size restrictions will be altered a bit to fit the public more comfortably but for this spring it will no doubt increase our fishery into the absolute great status. This year has already been the best of many years past. I'd love to invite you to give me a call and find YOUR DAY to learn and widen your fishing awareness and learn new spots and techniques. # Birding Basics By Chris Schnurbusch

The hobby of bird-watching, or birding, is increasing in popularity because it requires little to no equipment and can be done outdoors anywhere. While equipment isn't required, birding will be easier and more engaging with a simple pair of binoculars and a field guide—this way you have a closer look at these birds and a great tool for identification. Binoculars come in all kinds of designs and price ranges, so you'll be able to find a pair that works for you and your budget. Field guides vary based on layout and information, and everyone has their own preferences and recommendations. I recommend going to your local bookstore and browsing the various field guides to find which one flows easiest to you. Remember to get the latest edition though, because bird classification changes throughout the years! There are also a few apps you can download on your phone that are great birding tools, such as Merlin

Identification of birds can be really tricky—especially when so many birds look alike! I recommend focusing on these

behavior, and location. These will help narrow down the bird you're looking at and help make identification easier. Blackbirds are bigger than chickadees, Blue Jays bigger than blackbirds, and hawks are bigger than Blue Jays. Seems simple enough, but it's crucial for narrowing down choices. Some birds look similar but are different sizes, like the Cooper's Hawk and the Sharp-shinned Hawk. Notice the color of the bird; for example, a Black-crested Titmouse looks almost identical to the Tufted Titmouse, except it has a black crest on top of its head. Birds can also have drastically different behaviors; a kinglet will bounce around between branches, barely sitting still, while a woodpecker will bob its head while climbing up the sides of trees. These differences can help you identify the bird even when you can't get a good look at the plumage. Location can refer to geographical or local. Species will be found in varying parts of the country, so it's good to know which ones are in your location. Local location refers to sitting on a wire, soaring in the sky, or feeding in the water. All these clues can help determine which species you're seeing.

four characteristics: bird size, feather color

This is a great time of year to pick up the birding hobby, as we're beginning to see migrants flying in. The Texas coast is a great rest spot for migrating birds, as they've just finished crossing the gulf and need a place to recover. Migration provides a great chance to see species that reside farther North in the summer. They won't stick around long, so go on out there and start watching birds!

If you're interested in learning more about species around Texas or want to know how birds are studied, here at Gulf Coast Bird Observatory we band songbirds every third Saturday of the month. Our program is free and open to the public, and you'll get an up-close view of our local songbirds and have an opportunity to take photos. We're happy to answer any questions you may have about birding or the research we do.

# Texas Persimmon Diospyros texana

In the Spring often our thoughts turn fruitful – as in finding the right native plant fruit-bearing species to include in our yards. Texas Persimmon, Diospyros texana in the Family Ebenaceae is an excellent candidate. Depending on conditions this plant will be a medium size tree or a large shrub. It can be grown in the yard, or in some cases is put in a large container. The fruit is sweet and palatable, but contains more seeds than many folks might like dealing with. Fructivorous birds and mammals, however, love it. Some references suggest removing the black outer skin of the fruit before eating. Others note that the fruit can be used to make jams, jellies, and wine.... yum. In some locales, the fruit is also used to make a black dye. One report I read said the fruit had been used to treat hemorrhoids but I don't even want to think about how that might work!

Texas persimmon is dioicous meaning that some individuals are males and others are females. To get the fruit, you of course want females. But, they'll need a male nearby so you'll likely want to have both, unless a neighbor also has one. It is pollinated largely by flying insects, so trees don't need to be that close to one another. It can also reproduce from root sprouts which

is one way it forms thickets in some areas. The wood is not as prized as its cousin the ebony tree but has its uses. The very dark and dense heartwood of larger individuals has been used to build furniture and black keys for pianos. Early Americans

the beauty features of Texas persimmon is its bark. Once mature, the light grey bark will begin to peal somewhat and reveal very pretty pinkish bark underneath.

The species is widespread along the U.S. coastal states and in Mexico. It is not listed in Diamond et al. flora of the Padre Island National Seashore, so it may not be native to the Island, but is to our general region of south Texas. It occurs all the way from near sea level, to mountain and hillsides, and sometimes forms dense thickets in sites with rocky limestone soils. It is drough tolerant and will need little, if any, watering after it becomes established. It will need fertilization only every couple of years or so. It is easily propagated from commercially available seeds, which do not need scarification. As an ornamental in your yard this plant has value to us as well as wildlife.







# 28th Annual Great Texas Birding Classic Begins April 15

Registration remains open until April 1 for those wishing to join more than 1,000 birders who will flock to the coast, forests, prairies and mountains of Texas to compete in the nation's biggest, longest and wildest bird watching tournament.


The 28th annual Great Texas Birding
Classic runs from April 15-May 15. This
statewide tournament invites participants
to document the different species of birds
migrating through Texas during the spring.
"Since the Classic started a lot has
changed," says Shelly Plante, nature
tourism manager for the Texas Parks and
Wildlife Department. "The competition has
expanded statewide to record participation
and is no longer just for experts since the
new categories appeal to budding naturalists
and avid birders alike."
Competitors can choose from a variety of

categories to test their birding skills, participating for as little as half a day or as long as a week in the statewide tourney. Participants can form a team and compete in such categories as the Big Sit!, in which birders must remain within a 50-foot-diameter circle to count their birds. Other categories include a sunrise-to-noon event, youth-only tournaments, a human-powered contest and one tournament held entirely within Texas State Parks.

Last year, more than 1,100 people competed in the Birding Classic, sighting 413 out of 666 documented avian species in Texas. The 2023 event attracted a record-breaking 202 teams that competed from Far West Texas and the Texas Panhandle to the "Golden Triangle" in southeast Texas and the Rio Grande Valley down south. The Birding Classic sported family teams, teams of work colleagues, birding buddies having their spring birding get-away together and more.

Registration fees and team sponsorships for the event raise money for birding and habitat conservation, restoration and enhancement grants throughout the state, helping preserve critical bird habitat and support nature tourism. Last year, the tournament raised \$47,000 for conservation grants. Since its inception in 1997, the Great Texas Birding Classic has awarded conservation grants totaling \$1,163,000.

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# Work on Port Aransas ferry facility resumes

Initial activity on western side of ferry facility will require closure of one ramp, fuel dock

After pausing for spring break, the Texas Department of Transportation's \$64 million project to upgrade ferry system landings on the Port Aransas side has resumed.

Initial work will occur around the fuel dock and adjacent ramp, and those two ramps, which are on the west side of the ferry facility will be closed. Three ramps will remain in service at the Port Aransas landing as well as all five ramps at the Harbor Island landing. As work progresses eastward, updates will advise the public when other ramp closures are required.

The project involves upgrading existing structures and landings, including ramps, pile clusters, fenders, counterweight structures, steel sheet pile bulkheads, fueling systems,



electrical systems, pavement and illumination.

The purpose of this project is to ensure that the TxDOT ferry facility is positioned to safely and efficiently serve the public for decades to come

The work is expected to take about three years to complete. A similar project to upgrade ferry facilities on the Harbor Island side is in the design stage and is scheduled to go to bid by the end of 2026.
