# Island vote crucial in Race for new U.S. Congressional seat

Four candidates raise \$2.5 million

Candidates are lining up for the primary election for the seat in the newly redrawn U.S. Congressional District 34 which includes Padre Island and Flour Bluff.

After the November 2026 General Election neither will longer be represented by current Congressman Michael Cloud whose district will include only downtown Corpus Christi, including the port, and a slice across northern Nueces County with the rest of the county in the newly drawn lines of District 34.

The new district stretches from Nueces County through Kleberg, Willacy, Kenedy, and Cameron counties and a check of the metro-

politan areas in the new district finds that about 280,000 of the residents in the new district outside Nueces County are distributed across the cities of the Rio Grande Valley with the majority of the voters coming from the Corpus Christi area.

# Opening of Corpus Christi Pass Plan from 1967

When the dredging of Packery Channel was approved in 2000 it was the culmination of years of attempts to make a permanent water pass through The Island.

In 1967, the same year Hurricane Beulah cut The Island into more than a dozen pieces and opened the pass, a study was commissioned by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission to determine the feasibility of opening Corpus Christi Pass on



a permanent basis. By 1970 the pass had silted shut but before the plan could be put into effect Hurricane Celia roared through the Coastal Bend and opened it

The exact location of Corpus Christi Pass has moved around over the last few decades. What was originally Corpus Christi Pass was actually a series of

Editor's note: The City of Corpus Christi this week released updated numbers for the Island Tax Incremental Reinvestment Zone #2. Funds for TIRZ #2 are derived from property tax on new construction inside the boundaries of the zone since its creation in 2002 It was renewed in 2022 and now runs through the year 2042. Money raised in the zone is earmarked for improvements inside its boundaries. The zone includes areas on The Island zoned for commercial and retail business, it does not include areas zoned for residential. The numbers are current as of August 31, 2025.

## New rules for POA regulation of fences

State law makes changes to property associations authority

The Texas Legislature in its 2025 session made changes to the Texas Property Code regarding fences around private residences. Senate Bill 711, which modified 2 Texas Property Code §202.023 took effect September 1, 2025, and changes what control property owner associations have over

Under the revised law, Homeowners Associations and Property Owners Associations may no longer completely prohibit security fences on private property as part of a homeowner's right to install "security measures." This includes perimeter fencing for safety and privacy purposes. However, associations may still regulate important aspects of those fences, including:

• Material and design standards: Boards may require certain materials, colors, or styles to maintain architectural consistency.



What is widest and deepest that Packery Channel - by any name has ever been?

First off it is not possible to say exactly where Corpus Christi Pass has been located over the years. The current location near Fish Pass is relatively new and is not the same location indicated in writing from Spanish explorers in the 1700's. On a sand island a big blow or a small hurricane can move a pass quickly and often.

Traditionally any pass located near the current location of Packery Channel was referred to as Corpus Christi Pass. That pass, between Padre and Mustang Island has been reported as much as 30 feet deep and one mile wide. A chart of the Texas coast in 1908 showed it to be at least one-half a mile wide and from 25 to 30 feet deep. What is now known as Packery Channel has been open intermittently subject to tides and hurricanes.

At various times when Mother Nature closed it attempts were made to reopen and dredge the pass but Mother Nature always won. The pass that eventually became the ski basin – adjacent to the east side of the 361/Packery Bridge was dredged in 1874 and it was this route which was just to the north of Corpus Christi Pass eventually became the route for Packery Channel. However when Corpus Christi Pass was at its widest and deepest it encompassed the area that included both what is now Packery Channel and Corpus Christi Pass as well.


The tidal flow from the Hurricane of 1919 affected tidal flow along this part of the coast and Corpus Christi Pass began to close. It was still used by smaller boats and fishermen and was completely closed by 1933. Only once since then was an attempt made to open it until the building of the Packery Channel.

That was in 1938 when a large suction dredge was put to work but workmen discovered that the pass could fill in as fast as they could dredge it. Finally, according to those who were around at the time, it was the opening of the Intracoastal in the 1940's that changed the water flow in the bay and closed the passes. They were re-opened by various hurricanes over the years but Moth er Nature closed them again.

### Donors Beware!

Last week an assault was launched against 1.4 million American charitable organizations. If you give money to charity, you need to know the facts, so this exploitation doesn't reach you, too.

The "crowdfunding platform" called GoFundMe created these dubious donation pages without these nonprofits' approval, authorization, or even knowledge. Aided in part by data from PayPal, the scheme draws upon publicly available tax information and sometimes even uses outdated nonprofit logos. They have gamed the system to rank higher on internet search engines than official donation pages.

The goal appears to be siphoning money from well-intentioned people that may or may not ever reach the intended charity. What is known is that the platform will take a 16 percent platform fee off the top. This includes a standard transaction fee, an extra "tip" for GoFundMe (why?), and an additional surcharge for recurring gifts (why?). At best, the duped donors who give \$100 will have only \$84 reach the charitable mission.

Worse, the charity will never know the donors' identities, so there will be no "thank you" note, no tax receipt, no relationship with the nonprofit, and no recognition will be given for the gift.

Nonprofits are being advised to challenge GoFundMe for its unauthorized charitable solicitations and trademark infringement. Some are reaching out to their state Attorney General (in Texas it's the Charitable Trust section which protects 80,000 active charities) and the Federal Trade Commission.

Advice for donors: Never make a gift through an intermediary; always give directly to the charities you support.

*Update:* GoFundMe has apologized to nonprofits for its actions. It says it is making nonprofit pages opt-in only by the nonprofit, it is removing unclaimed nonprofit pages from its index, and it will continue to include nonprofits on its directory so they are discoverable and create fundraisers (so GoFundMe can profit from the transactions).

passes which began at the bay side of what is now Fish Pass and ran parallel to the beach all the way down Padre Island to what is now the end of Whitecap Boulevard. The last remnant of the historic Corpus Christi Pass is Lake Padre. The pass historically was considered the dividing line between Padre and Mustang Islands. That line now is Packery Channel which was originally part of the Corpus Christi Pass

acknowledge need for a permanent water-exchange pass between the Gulf and Corpus Christi Bay. A study was commissioned in February of 1967 by the firm of Turner, Collie & Braden based in Houston and presented to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission in June of that year. The idea of cutting the pass was done in an attempt to reduce salinity levels in the Upper Laguna. It was part of a larger plan to combat hypersalinity in the Laguna. The study concluded that a pass could be cut through Mustang and Padre Islands but jetties would be needed to keep it open in the long term.

But as far back as the 1960s there was an

### The Plan

It called for "heavy stone revetments...to fix the Gulf mouth of the pass and protect it from wave attack." It also called for the revetments to be at the terminus of jetties which would be a total of 1400 feet in length, bordering a channel that would be ten-feet deep by one hundred feet across on the Gulf side of the beach and sixty-feet wide and seven-feet deep on the bay side.

The side slopes would be at a ratio of one vertical to three horizontal.

Heavy stone revetments would run from the gulf end of the jetties to a distance of 1000 feet landward with layers of stone weighing up to three tons and to a thickness of six feet. Lighter stones weighing up to 400 pounds would then be placed inside the rocks from the Gulf mouth to the point where the channel emptied into the bay.

The jetties would be 400 feet apart on the gulf side and extend a mere 400 feet out beyond the beach. The exact length would be determined not by designers but by the budget. The total budget for the project varied from \$2.7 million for 1000-foot jetties to \$5.4 million for 2200-foot jetties with half of the costs being the actual construction costs of the jetties themselves and the remainder for engineering, inspections and labor. Annual dredging was anticipated to cost between \$66,000 and \$100,000.

- Location restrictions: HOAs/POAs can now prohibit fences in certain areas including sidewalks, easements, drainage areas, or

Grandfathered and exempt properties Homeowners who installed front yard or perimeter fences before September 1, 2025, are grandfathered under the previous rules and are not subject to the new restrictions.

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# Stuff I Heard on the Island

of Padre Island had a choice to make. They could either build sidewalks along the new Island streets they were creating or they could dedicate additional land for parks when they handed The Island and its infrastructure over to the City of Corpus Christi. Having plenty of vacant land and always short on money they chose the latter. The Island has 49.7 acres of parkland scattered across five city parks on Padre Island with some designed to be large enough for placement of a drilling rig. But a check of those parks finds little in the way of improvements in the past five decades with the work about to begin at Commodores Park the most significant in our history, and a new skatepark under development at Billish Park paid for, not with city bond money as in other parts of the city, but rather with funds raised on Padre Island through the Island's Tax Increment Reinvestment Zone #2. This all came into focus this week when a press release from the City of Corpus Christi crossed my desk extolling the "Major Parks & Recreation Improvement Projects Completed in FY 2025." It reads in part:

The Corpus Christi Parks & Recreation Department is dedicated to enhancing the quality of life for its residents through a range of major improvement projects throughout the city. From the groundbreaking Bill Witt Aquatic Center, marking the most significant expansion of the city's aquatic program in over 50 years, to the addition of new dog parks, basketball courts, and playgrounds, the city is brimming with opportunities for leisure, recreation, and fitness. They include two new dog parks and improvements to a third, while the Island's only dog park, paid for solely by donations and mowed by volunteers is not on the list and under Parks and Recreation Department rules not eligible for the Adopt A Park Program. Twelve New Playgrounds, Major Repair and Maintenance Projects, Projects on the Horizon and how many are located on Padre Island? Take a look at the list of bond projects for the City of Corpus

Christi included here back to 2012 and count how many of them are on The Island. I won't belabor this because I think you get the point.

### Two things to consider

There are two key points to consider here: First, a list of bond projects, including parks, is expected to be in place by August 2026 to be placed on a November 2026 ballot: Second, that ballot will also include an election for five seats on the Corpus Christi City Council.

# The White-spotted Puffer Fish By Kayla Pringle



The White-spotted Pufferfish, Torquigener albomaculosus

As someone who considers themselves a bird person, I'm aware of the many different examples of courtship displays between male and female birds. Courtship displays can include special movements, songs, calls, or physical postures that one or both sexes perform to attract a mate and signal readiness to breed. I previously believed that birds were the only animal group that went to great extremes to impress a mate, but I was wrong.

A perfect example is the white-spotted pufferfish, which has a spectacular courtship display of its own. Males of this species create a large circle on the seafloor using their bodies. This is done to attract females for breeding and usually takes more than a week to complete. As the male shapes the circle, he uses his fins to carve evenly spaced divots in the sand around the entire perimeter. He then gathers shells and pieces of coral to decorate each divot and crafts an intricate maze-like pattern in the center. His hope is that a female will be impressed enough to lay her eggs in the middle of his circle.

In 1995, a photographer discovered one of these mysterious sand circles underwater but had no idea what-or who-created them. After years of observation, scientists finally identified the artist in 2011: the male white-spotted pufferfish.

These sand sculptures are found 10 - 30

meters deep, off the coast of Amami Ōshima Island near Japan. Each circle is about 2 meters wide and usually takes the male 7 - 9 days to finish. Scientists believe this may be the most orderly structure ever built by any fish.

What influences a female's choice of mate remains somewhat of a mystery. Possible factors include sand composition and color, the size of the circle, and the number of divots and peaks. Some scientists hypothesize that females can gauge a male's size based on the scale of the circle and the divots—potentially favoring larger males for their strength and ability to provide better protection.

Once a female chooses a mate, they spawn, and she releases her eggs into the nest. Afterward, she departs, leaving the male to guard the nest until the eggs hatch, usually about 5 days later. Once the young have hatched, the male abandons the site and does not reuse the nest.

The courtship behavior of the white-spotted pufferfish is a striking reminder that the animal kingdom is full of creativity and complexity, far beyond what we might expect. Just as birds use songs and dances to woo a partner, these small fish transform the seafloor into a masterpiece for love. It's a great example of how the drive to reproduce can result in breathtaking creations, even on the ocean floor.



People often ask, "Where are these dolls coming from?"

There are plenty of theories. Some think they fell out of cargo containers that slipped off ships during storms. Others believe they were simply lost by children playing at the beach. A few even wonder if they're connected to La Isla de las Muñecas, or "Doll Island," in Mexico, an eerie island where dolls hang from trees as offerings to spirits. While that makes for a great ghost story, the real answer might be less spooky but more important.

I believe most of the dolls — and the thousands of other pieces of marine debris we see — are washing in from rivers that dump plastic and trash from all over the world into the ocean. Once in the water, ocean currents, including the powerful Loop Current in the Gulf, transport this debris across vast distances. Here in Texas, we're in the perfect (or unfortunate) position to catch it all. In fact, our beaches receive about 10 times more marine debris than other Gulf States due to how these currents wrap around and

deposit items along our shores.

While the creepy dolls make for fascinating and sometimes unsettling beach finds, they also serve as haunting reminders of how connected our waterways are, and how far plastic pollution can travel. Every doll tells a story, not just of playtime lost, but of how our trash can impact coastlines and ecosystems thousands of miles away.

So next time you see one of these unsettling faces staring up from the sand, remember: it's more than just a creepy doll. It's a message from the ocean about the plastic journey we're all part of.

Zone #2 for a water flow study to determine all likelihood, it would be handled by local the best location for a seagate was turned down by city officials.

Reed said the early cost estimates for the proposed seagate are "in the \$5-\$7 million range." He said PIPOA officials "could fund it" but plan to approach adjacent private property owners for possible assistance in funding once the results of the RFQ are known.

"We are working on these details now as well as the alternatives if the stakeholders are unable to assist. They're level of commitment will determine their level of participation," said PIPOA Executive Director Rick McGinley. "The devil is in the details. I'm hoping to get the design package ready to go out to industry by the end of November. Shortly after the holidays we should have a design package to review - January 2026. The actual construction build will be tied, in part, to our funding sources and the approval process for the permits. Make no mistake, our charter is to protect this community.'

The gate would be designed to keep water flow below 1.9 feet per second, and protect Island bulkheads from tidal surges up to eight feet.

The question of who, or which organization, would determine when to open and close the seagate once it is complete and opera-

tional, is currently open. "Contributing factors may come from the National Weather Service or Hurricane Center," McGinley said. "We also hope to incorporate actual water velocities measured within the canal system as another

environmental input. We expect to firm up these details and who actually gets to pull the trigger (close or open the gate) by the

time we get to a critical design review but in

emergency management services." The move to a RFQ comes after a similar request for a study on the location of the seagate failed to produce qualified applicants within the \$50,000 budget. PIPOA officials said this week that money will be

rolled into the new RFQ. The previous seagate at the location now proposed was removed in 2020 at the behest of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. That seagate was built in the 1980s and never

deployed. PIPOA officials have said previously they want the temporary sand dam currently blocking water flow through Lake Padre and the Padre Island canal system to remain in place until the new seagate is operational. No timeline for the start nor completion of construction on the new seagate has been announced.



### **Transitions**



Derek and Amanda had a beautiful DOUBLE HOOK UP! Nice redfish from the shallow flats north of the JFK on BONE Dimond DOWN SOUTH LURES! High tides are scattering slot reds all in 2' of water!

We have to let go of the many glorious Summer Days we are leaving behind. The thought of the cold wind blowing through our souls can make us turn against the change of seasons and holidays in life. I'm choosing this year to embrace the winter as change, letting some things die off, and become the soil for new life. No need to forget the way the sun filled our hearts in the boat, or the smiles and laughter we all shared on the beach and in the water. Those times are burned into us forever, and will come again in good time. I'll be looking forward to THE CALL OF THE WILD, that stir inside us all that is felt when you brave against the chill. I'll snuggle under cold sheets and hold on tight to those warm little grandkids. Before you know it the green buds will pop out on the mesquite trees and we will be staring into the rays of sun on those sweet spring days all over again.

The month of November is my favorite time of year! The crowds are gone, the bait masses have dwindled and it's a little harder for gamefish to find meals. This and the need to fatten up for the cold times drive the fishing to a peak! We will see everything gather around and into the traditional zones out in the bays. These are the changes in depth, bottom structure, tidal flow, and temperatures. Clearly marked on maps the north and south running changes in the Laguna Madre are a great place to start. Drift across the changes finding the specific level game fish and bait are holding them isolate your fishing to impact the beat levels at the prime

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lunar feeding times. Simply, use the slow periods to find them, and don't waste time fishing over the dead zones during prime time. This also goes for taking your days off on slow lunar feeding days, pick the best ones to go and run errands on the slow ones.

These levels of transition can light up with fish activity during different times of day. Some things may dictate availability of food sources at didn't times. The deeper water may hold shrimp and invertebrates that come out during the night, and have fish active their then, and not at first light. At the same time gamefish feeding up shallow may be taking pin perch in the grass at first light.

MARKER 37 MARINA, has had lots of live shrimp and even some piggy perch now and then. Don't forget about that beautiful pier around sunset either. Grab some food and go get some of that magical tradition between day and night.

Concentrating on transitions is a good way to find patterns that can show you the big picture. Just as in life we have to use these traditional times to take a look back and ahead, and enjoy the stuff North Wind.

# Half a million Texans voted in first week of early voting for the Nov. 4 Election 6130 in Nueces County

Texas Secretary of State Jane Nelson this week released early voting numbers for the first week of early voting ahead of the Nov. 4 Election.

Texas counties reported that as of Sunday evening, 561,819 ballots were cast. In-person voting reflected the vast majority of the votes. The vote-by-mail cumulative was 23,510.

In Nueces County as of close of Early Voting Tuesday a total of 6130 (2.84% of registered voters) ballots had been cast. 586 at the Island's polling place at Island Presbyterian Church, and 490 at the Ethel Eyerly Senior Center in Flour Bluff.

"Statewide, Texans are going to the polls to vote on 17 proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution, and many will also have the opportunity to weigh in on local or special elections," said Secretary of State Nelson. "Now is a good time for eligible voters to make a plan for voting early or casting their ballot on Election Day." The cumulative voting number represents about 3% of Texas' 18.4 million registered voters. These numbers are unofficial and will likely increase as all counties finish reporting.

Early voting in-person runs through Oct. 31, and Election Day is Nov. 4.

# Very Sophisticated Cheating Technologies.

Dotson's Note: How NBA figures and mafia families allegedly stole millions in rigged poker games: "Very sophisticated cheating technologies" X-ray tables. Hidden cameras. Pre-marked cards. Even special contact lenses. Prosecutors say the suspects charged recently in a high-profile illegal gambling bust made use of sophisticated technology to cheat victims out of millions. Thanks to Kerry Breen, Amanda Arden, Jacob Rosen, Anna Schecter and Pat Milton for the facts contained in this report, and to Kerry Breen for the photos.

In a series of arrests recently, law enforcement officers across the country took several big names in NBA basketball and dozens of alleged criminal figures into custody on illegal betting charges. One case focuses on sports betting while another involves allegations of elaborately rigged high-stakes poker games.



**Shuffling Machine** 

FBI officials said at a news conference that the poker ring was operated by organized crime figures from "La Cosa Nostra," referring to known mafia families. The 31 defendants include alleged members of the Bonnano, Gambino, Luchesse and Genovese crime families, as well as Portland Trail Blazers coach Chauncey Billups and former player Damon Jones. Miami Heat star Terry Rozier is charged only in the sports betting case.

The poker scheme started as early as 2019, with rigged games played in New York City, Las Vegas, the Hamptons, Miami and other locations, officials said.

"The fraud is mind-boggling," FBI Director Kash Patel said at the briefing. Ricky Patel, the Special Agent in Charge for Homeland Security Investigations in New York, said the scheme "cheated victims out of at least \$7 million." Joseph Nocella, the U.S. Attorney for the Eastern District of New York, said the defendants allegedly used a "variety of very sophisticated cheating technologies" to rig poker games with thousands of dollars at stake — and he described some in detail.

### Targeting "fish" with "face cards"

The victims of the schemes were called "fish," Nocello said. They were lured into the games with the chance to play alongside professional athletes, Nocello said. The pro athletes were known as "face cards." The "face cards" included Jones and Billups, he said.

Those involved, from the dealer to the "face cards," knew about the scheme, Nocello said.

"Once the game was underway, the defendants fleeced the victims out of tens or hundreds of thousands of dollars per game,"

Nocello said.

### A "quarterback" and secret information from shuffling machines

Those taking part in the scheme allegedly used self-shuffling machines that had been "secretly altered" to read the cards in a deck and predict which player at the table had the best poker hand, Nocello said. One rigged shuffling machine was obtained at gunpoint, Nocello said. That information

was then sent to an off-site operator who allegedly sent the information via cell-phone to the co-conspirator at the table. The co-conspirator, known as the quarterback, then allegedly secretly signaled the information to other defendants and used that information to win the poker game.

### Hidden cameras and X-ray tables

The defendants allegedly used a kind of poker chip tray that secretly reads cards with a hidden camera to analyze the chips that were in use, Nocello said.

They also allegedly used special contact lenses or eyeglasses capable of reading premarked cards, and an X-ray table that could read cards even when they were placed face-down, according to the charging documents. Hidden cameras were also built into tables and light fixtures, said New York City Police Commissioner Jessica Tisch.

### "A financial pipeline" for the mafia

Members of organized crime families allegedly got involved because they had pre-existing control of non-rigged but illegal poker games in New York City, Nocello said. They worked to organize the games and took a cut of the proceedings, according to Nocello. They also allegedly worked to enforce the collection of debts, Nocello said.

The games "created a financial pipeline for La Cosa Nostra" — the mafia — "to help fund and facilitate their organized criminal activity," said Christopher Raia, assistant director in charge of the FBI's New York Field Office.

## Shell companies and cryptocurrencies

The defendants allegedly laundered the proceeds from the rigged games through cash exchanges, multiple shell companies and cryptocurrency transfers, Nocello said.

### Technology suppliers

Some of the cheating technologies were provided by defendants named in the indictment, Nocello said. The defendants who did so then allegedly received a share of profits from the rigged games, he said.

# NBA's Rozier and Billups placed on leave

The NBA said in a statement that it is reviewing the indictments and cooperating with investigators. «Terry Rozier and Chauncey Billups are being placed on immediate leave from their teams, and we will continue to cooperate with the relevant authorities," the league said. Prosecutors noted in the court filing, "The charges in the indictments are allegations and the defendants are presumed innocent unless and until proven guilty."

An attorney for Billups called him "a man of integrity" and said he intends to fight the charges. "To believe that Chauncey Billups did what the federal government is accusing him of is to believe that he would risk his hall-of-fame legacy, his reputation, and his freedom. He would not jeopardize those things for anything, let alone a card game," the attorney, Chris Heywood, said in a statement, adding, "We look forward to our day in court."

Rozier's attorney, James Trusty, said Rozier had previously been characterized by prosecutors "as a subject, not a target" of the probe. "It is unfortunate that instead of allowing him to self-surrender they opted for a photo op. They wanted the misplaced glory of embarrassing a professional athlete with a perp walk. That tells you a lot about the motivations in this case," Trusty said in a statement. "They appear to be taking the word of spectacularly incredible sources rather than relying on actual evidence of wrongdoing. Terry was cleared by the NBA and these prosecutors revived that non-case. Terry is not a gambler, but he is not afraid of a fight, and he looks forward to winning this fight."

At 21 he had sailed around the world five times before making The Island his home

During 1980-81, he returned to Okinawa after 35 years, as the Division Surgeon, Third Marine Division, FMF and Force Surgeon, III Marine Amphibious Force, FMF with Headquarters in Okinawa, Japan, where he was the doctor for 46,000 Marines in the Western Pacific and Indian Ocean.

In 1982, he became the Executive Officer and Director of Clinical Services at the Naval Hospital, Corpus Christi and then requested release from active duty in 1983. From 1983-1988, he served in the USNR Active Reserve as the Commanding Officer of Fleet Combat Support Hospital-10; Diving Medical Officer with Special Boat Unit 22 (UDT/SEAL) and as the Senior Naval Medical Officer, NR Headquarters, European Command, US Army, 1985-1987.

Captain Blankenship is a retired military Flight Surgeon, military Parachutist, Navy Deep-Sea Diver and Submarine and Diving Medical Officer, as well as being a Commercial Pilot with Instrument and Multiengine ratings. He has served in several branches of the Armed Forces in the air, on the seas, and under the seas and with the U.S. Marine Corps. Bill has traveled to 90 foreign countries and all fifty of the United States. He served briefly in WWII (Okinawa), China Civil War (ashore), Korean War (at sea), and Vietnam (ashore). He has had Permanent or Temporary Additional Duty and served aboard nine US MERCHANT MARINE freighters, tankers and a troop ship, and 9 US Navy submarines (diesel, nuclear fast attack and fleet ballistic missile), carriers, destroyers, submarine rescue vessels, patrol boats, auxiliary rescue vessels, submarine tenders, and a Vietnamese armed river junk. 

He belonged to numerous military, flying, diving, medical and dental organizations and served in Medical Missionary Units three times in Central America. His highest military rank is captain in the medical corps of the US Navy, 55 decorations from the Armed Forces and a certificate of appreciation from the U.S. State Department for his service. He lived on Suntan Ave. on Padre Island, 13810 Suntan Ave.

### Armistice Day (Veterans Day)

Dotson's Note: Armistice Day, later known as Remembrance Day in the Commonwealth and Veterans Day in the United States, is commemorated every year on 11 November to mark the armistice signed between the Allies of World War I and Germa ny at Compiègne, France, at 5:45 am for the cessation of hostilities on the Western Front of World War I, which took effect at 11:00 amthe "eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month" of 1918—although, according to Thomas R. Gowenlock, an intelligence officer with the U.S. First Division, shelling from both sides continued for the rest of the day, ending only at nightfall. The armistice initially expired after a period of 36 days and had to be extended several times. A formal peace agreement was reached only when the Treaty of Versailles was signed the following year. The date is a national holiday in France, and it was declared a national holiday in many Allies of World War I nations, several of which have since changed the name of the holiday from Armistice Day to either Remembrance Day in the Commonwealth of Nations, or Veterans Day in the United States. Italy celebrates the Armistice with Austria on November 4 as National Unity and Armed Forces Day. In Poland, November 11 coincides with National Independence Day.

### History in Allied countries

The first Armistice Day celebration was held at Buckingham Palace, commencing with King George V hosting a «Banquet in Honour of the President of the French Republic" (Raymond Poincaré) during the evening hours of 10 November 1919. The first official Armistice Day events were subsequently held in the grounds of Buckingham Palace on the morning of 11 November 1919, which included a two-minute silence as a mark of respect for those who died in the war and those left behind.

Similar ceremonies developed in other countries during the inter-war period. In South Africa, for example, the Memorable Order of Tin Hats had by the late 1920s developed a ceremony whereby the toast of «Fallen Comrades» was observed not only in silence but darkness, all except for the «Light of Remembrance», with the ceremony ending with the Order's anthem «Old Soldiers Never

In Britain, beginning in 1939, the two-minute silence was moved to the Sunday nearest to 11 November in order not to interfere with wartime production should 11 November fall on a weekday. This became Remembrance Sunday.

Commemorations of November 11 were initially focused on honoring the military dead of the First World War and the return to peace. Just prior to or after World War II, many countries changed the name of the holiday, several changed the focus to include all veterans of their armed services, and a few honor their war dead both uniformed and civilian. Most member states of the Commonwealth of Nations followed the earlier example of Canada and adopted the name Remembrance Day. The United States in 1954 changed the name to All Veterans Day, later shortened to 'Veterans Day'.

### 21st century

In the United Kingdom and Commonwealth countries, Armistice Day is observed with a two minute silence (one minute in Australia) on the eleventh hour, with the main service taking place on Remembrance Sunday (also known as Remembrance Day). Both days are commemorated formally but are not public holidays. The National Service of Remembrance is held in London on Remembrance Sunday. The Catholic Bishops of England and Wales suggested that churches should conduct a Requiem Mass for the dead of the war on Sunday 11 November 2018.

In the United States, Veterans Day honors American veterans, both living and deceased. The official day of national remembrance of those killed in action is Memorial Day, which predates World War I. Some, including American novelist Kurt Vonnegut and American Veteran For Peace, Rory Fanning, have urged Americans to resume observation of 11 November as Armistice Day, a day to reflect on how we can achieve peace as it was originally observed.

In France, the holiday may also be known as Remembrance Day (Jour du Souvenir). In Belgium, it remains Armistice Day (Jour de l'Armistice). The day has been a public holiday in Serbia since 2012. The Serbian forces suffered the largest casualty rate in World War I. To commemorate their victims, people in Serbia wear Natalie's Ramonda as a symbol of remembrance.

On 11 November 2018, the centenary of the Armistice, commemorations were held globally. In France, more than 60 heads of state and government gathered at the Arc de Triomphe in Paris.

### Going Native

Blue Eyed Grass

By Ed Proffitt



Fall is bringing relief from summer heat, even though our short bout of rainfall seems to have abandoned us again to drought. flowers. Sisyrinchium grows wild in dry The island's nature, where it's not disrupted by alien plants, asphalt and concrete, is showing nice seasonal blooms and fruiting. Salt marsh plants are recovering some parts of the intertidal zone nicely, but at others, not so much. Some mangroves are reproducing and it's possible we'll have a nice but small crop of propagules to keep their recovery going.. at least in our part of Texas. Further north, there's been much less recovery.

Around the island, I've seen a number of individuals of blue-eyed grass (which in showing one clear "problem" with using common names, isn't in the grass family at all but rather the iris family). Sisyrinchium sagittiferum, family Iridaceae, is a bit of a tongue twister, but is the name

botanists use. It grows to about a foot tall and produces conspicuous blue or purple and moist prairie and grassland habitats and on disturbed ground like roadsides. You can grow it from transplants or seed in your yard or garden or potted plant areas in full or partial sun. It will do well in dry conditions (or somewhat moist sites too) and tolerates a bit of salt, even some brief flooding by salt water in some places near the intertidal zone. Sisyrinchium also grows well in sandy or clay soil, and with organic matter in the soil too. The species attracts many pollinators and is good forage for some herbivores. I've read that some Native American's made a tea by boiling the entire plant and used it to treat hay fever. Include this plant in your yard and you'll be happily Going Native.
