

Texas Voters Support Homestead Exemption Over Appraisal Caps

The Texas Association of Property Tax Professionals this week released the results of a statewide survey conducted by Texas' preeminent political pollster Mike Baselice.

The statewide survey of 800 Texas voters found strong support for the Texas Senate plan to provide significant property tax relief by increasing homestead exemptions as opposed to the Texas House scheme to lower appraisal caps.

In summarizing the survey results, Mike Baselice said, "More than four out of five likely voters in Texas support SJR 3 - ameasure to increase the Texas homestead exemption to \$70,000, and to increase the exemption for seniors and disabled homeowners to \$100,000. Specifically, voters support SJR 3 by a 70-point margin – 82% in favor to 12% opposed.

"At a smaller 42-point margin, voters support reducing the cap on appraisal increases to 5% in HJR 1 (67% in favor to 25% opposed)."

gate system at the entrance to the park and plan on dividing the area to segregate small and


We also rely on volunteer Friends of the Riley P Dog Park to provide ongoing maintenance, and their help is greatly appreciated.



Senior Moments Special to The Island Moon By Dotson Lewis

20th Air Force

Dotson's Note: When Sergeant John Dellinger watched the 3d Marine Division—his assigned B-29 aircraft, not the military ground force—take-off for Mission No. 330 on the afternoon of August 14, 1945, he was unaware it would be the last Allied combat run of the Second World War. The next day, the Japanese government agreed to a cessation of hostilities. For the 20th Air Force veteran and many of his teammates back in Guam, however, Dellinger recalled not knowing "that the war was over until all our aircraft ... returned from Japan. And that's how I found it out." John Dellinger turned 100 on July 31, 2020. He still recalled much of his time in the U.S. Army Air Forces during World War II, often with genuine joy in his voice. Thanks to Dr. Jeremery Prichard, John Dillinger, and Jerry Plemons for the facts contained in this report,



WW II Veteran Reflects on Maintaining **B-29s On Guam**

"Always Liked Airplanes"

John Samuel Dellinger traces his fascination with airplanes to his youth. He wasn't especially interested in flying them, however. He wanted to tinker with them.

He attempted to enlist in the Army Air Corps upon graduating high school—a few years before the attacks on Pearl Harbor brought the U.S. into the war. He demurred when informed that the service was only accepting "foot soldiers."

uniform after all, drafted into the Army in 1942. Despite performing well on sections of the entrance exams that tested one's knowledge on mechanics, Dellinger received assignment to a non-aviation unit in Florida after completing Army basic training.

He would soon find himself in an olive-drab

Dellinger speculates that someone took a fresh look at his testing records because, not long afterward, the Army transitioned Dellinger to Amarillo Army Air Field in Texas. He began training as an AT-6 aircraft mechanic before converting to the B-29 Superfortress. In October 1943, then-Private First Class Dellinger graduated the Army Air Forces' Airplane

"Walked into the Twentieth Air Force"

Dellinger crisscrossed the country for advanced B-29 instruction at Chanute Field, Illinois, and the Boeing Aircraft facility in Seattle, Washington. When he reached Great Bend, Kansas, "That is when I walked into 20th Air Force," he gleefully reminisces. "And I was a happy camper."

His time in Kansas—and in the Caribbean, when the harsh Midwestern winter of 1944 disrupted training—was consuming. He repaired B-29 engines after returning from lengthy training flights as aircrews prepared for extended trips across the Pacific. The challenging workload and environment notwithstanding, Dellinger always felt rewarded when his B-29 once more took to the skies. "I loved doing that, put[ting] that aircraft right back in the air again."

Guam-1945



His stateside training complete, Dellinger received assignment to the 30th Bombardment Squadron, a subordinate unit to the 19th Bombardment Group. He and his fellow Airmen traveled to Guam, where they remained for the duration of the war.

Guam was not a particularly hospitable environment. The island's makeshift runway was still under construction upon Dellinger's arrival, creating a rather unpleasant landing

in February 1945. In addition to recurring typhoons and limited clean water, Dellinger recalled, "We had to put our tents back in the jungle, a mile away from the aircraft because, you see, Japan was bombing us, too."

Dellinger was ultimately responsible for the engines on two B-29 aircraft while stationed at Guam. His unit lost the first bomber, Tail Number 42-63573, to combat damage in May 1945. They received a new B-29 a few weeks later, christening this latter one the 3d Marine Division, in honor of the ground forces that helped secure Iwo Jima for the Allies in March 1945. They later named Major General Graves B. Erskine, commander of the 3d Marine Division, "Honorary Plane Commander" at a ceremony held on the island.

Three quarters of a century later, Dellinger is most proud that neither aircraft he maintained were lost due to mechanical failures. He also "really, really liked working with the aircraft, and I liked working with the personnel. I sure did." He likewise credits the Army soldiers and Marines stationed on Guam who provided him protection while performing his aircraft repair responsibilities.

"I Owe a Lot To The Military"

Dellinger returned to North Carolina after his military discharge in late 1945. He resumed his pre-war employment as a mechanic on assorted machinery, but with more knowledge and awareness after three years as an aircraft mechanic in the AAF. "Very thankful for what the military taught me. I've got to thank the military for helping me afterwards."

Seventy-eight years after the fighting ended, 20th Air Force is ever thankful for Sergeant Dellinger's wartime contributions and service

A Partial Update On the 20th Air Force



Sept. 1, 1991 - Twentieth Air Force reactivated as a component of the Strategic Air Command and was located at Vandenberg AFB, Calif. Operationally responsible for all land-based Intercontinental Ballistic Missiles, Twentieth Air Force's rebirth came at a time when America's nuclear forces entered a decade of unprecedented force reductions and changes, specifically with the end of the Cold War and the dissolution of the Soviet Union. These global changes reshaped the basic fabric of the US's nuclear deterrent forces. Over the course of the decade, the ICBM force structure was reduced from six to three missile wings. The number of alert ICBMs also shrunk from 1,000 to 550. For the men and women of America's ICBM Team, it proved to be a period of sustained, dramatic change, one that posed significant leadership challenges for Airmen at all levels of command.

June 1, 1992 - Strategic Air Command inactivated and the majority of SAC's assets, including Twentieth Air Force, transferred to the newly created Air Combat Command. The new U.S. Strategic Command assumed combatant command of Twentieth Air Force's ICBMs.

Jul. 1, 1993 - Twentieth Air Force transferred to Air Force Space Command and moved from Vandenberg AFB to F. E. Warren AFB, Wyo., on 1 October 1993.

2004-2008 - Deactivation of both the 400th Missile Squadron at F.E. Warren AFB, Wyo. and the 564th Missile Squadron at Malmstrom

Dec. 1, 2009 - Air Force Global Strike Command assumed control of Twentieth Air Force and the Air Force's Minuteman III ICBM

Oct. 1, 2015 - The 377th Air Base Wing at Kirtland AFB, N.M. transferred to Twentieth

Stuff I Heard on the Island By Dale Rankin



July will mark three years since Hurricane Hanna tore the T-head off the end of Bob Hall Pier. As we sit here today the Pier is gone and the plan to rebuild it is as empty as the water it left behind.

Two separate boards with a combined

twelve decision makers and three engineering/design firms hired by the county are now engaged in coming up with a design plan that so far has yet to decide where to locate the entrance to the new pier, whether it will be located over the beach or over the dune line due to concerns over flood insurance and a pending permit from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. The bifurcated decision-making process is split between the seven-member Nueces County Coastal Parks Board which as a free-standing state agency holds sway over the final design of the pier, and the five-member Nueces County Commissioners who hold the purse strings but also have shown a tendency to arbitrarily mettle in the design process.

In June of 2022 the design of the pier was 30 percent complete when the designers presented a plan to move to 80% design to the Parks Board with the goal of starting construction as soon as the Corps permit was approved. That plan was shelved in the midst of an election year when objections to the plan calling for a single row of support pilings were raised due to the fear that one row of pilings would not create a satisfactory wave for surfers.

The design of the new pier as presented to the board last June included 25,000 square feet of space on a 20-foot wide pier 18.5 feet above the water supported by two rows of steel pilings each twenty-four inches in diameter place 16 feet apart with a D-shaped deck at the seaward end of the 1240 foot pier. The previous pier was 15 feet wide. Under that plan the first floor of the old restaurant structure, the only part of the pier still standing, would be increased by 2500 square feet from current 5000 square feet at a cost of \$2 million but a plan previously approved by the board was not included in the new design due to an estimated cost of \$900,000 to increase the support pilings to hold the added weight of a second floor. No design was ever begun for the second floor of the structure and the existing building was designed with a 25-year life span when it was completed in

Three years and counting

Now with the three-year anniversary of Hurricane Hanna approaching the funds available for rebuilding the pier have dropped from the initial \$28.3 million to \$22.4 million with \$2.3 million for demolition of the old structure. The only remaining structure from the old pier – the building that housed Mikel Mays Beachside Bar & Grill - may or may not be torn down due to the expenditure of half of its designed lifespan even as the dispute over whether to put a second story on top of it continues, the cost of the pier has increased by \$1.5 million in the past year, the cost estimates for the reconstruction are now over a year old and likely too low, and in spite of two boards and three design firms engaged there are currently no exigent design plans to rebuild it. Two months ago when one of the pier's three designers presented a proposal for 30 percent design of the pier to the Parks Board another of the designers pointed to the drawing and said, "You can't build that pier for \$22.4 million" and that is where things stand today.

A harbinger of things to come arrived when an item regarding using \$2 million in funds from the American Rescue Plan (ARPA) to pay for the new pier came before the Nueces County Commissioners Court a month ago with the caveat that the pier had to be open for business by the end of 2026 and the commissioners were unwilling to take the plunge fearing that the \$2 million in ARPA funds would have to be covered by the county due to the pier not being finished by that time. They punted.

Instead \$1 million of the \$2 million in ARPA funds that had been committed to paying for the second story of the restaurant building was transferred to the building of the pier by Precinct 4 County Commissioner Brent Chesney while an additional \$1 million under the control of Nueces County Judge Connie Scott was placed in abeyance where it remains today. The question of whether that ARPA money can be used for the second story appears to still be open with indications pointing toward the affirmative – but again it is one of the pending questions regarding the pier design

Two issues have arisen of late which have stalled the process; the first being whether a new restaurant is one story or two, if it is built/rebuilt over water can find flood insurance, the second being complications with permitting due to beach erosion and a rising Mean High Tide Line. Under the vicissitudes of state and federal regulations the Mean High Tide Line is the line of demarcation between federal and state regulatory authority since a new structure built over water falls under the rules of the Corps of Engineers and a new structure built over dry land falls under the purview of the Texas General Land Office. Since the building of the old pier the waterline moved toward the dunes complicating things. Also hanging fire is \$3.1 million in funding at last count – from the GLO to build an entrance structure that would launch from the parking lot at Briscoe King Pavilion and span the beach at a height of 19 feet and land as the entrance to the pier.

Who's on First?

So as I understand the process the next step is to come up with a design that can be built for \$22.4 million but there is currently about \$4 million that was set aside for contingency and another \$11 million in uncommitted ARPA funds. The next step is to update the cost estimates for the various elements of the pier that are now outdated in order to figure out what can be built with the money available – whatever number that turns out to be. Assuming the Corps of Engineers Permit will come through in the next few months the ideal would be for a plan to be ready to go bids by that time but

In the meantime there are still fundamental questions remaining: How much will the new pier cost? How much money is actually committed to the project? Where will the entrance be located? How wide will the new pier be? Where will the restaurant be located? Will the restaurant have an expanded first floor or a second floor and in either case how will it be paid for? Up to this point the designs have been presented to the Parks Board then go to the Commissioners for funding and so far we are nearing the three year mark with no plan and no stated plan to make a plan.

They are: City Planning Commission, Watershore and Beach Advisory Committee, Park and Recreation Advisory Committee, Nueces County, Nueces County Water Control and Improvement District No. 4, and Corpus Christi Convention and Visitors Bureau. ISAC meeting, unless otherwise designated, are held at 5:30 p.m. on the first Tuesday of each month at the Island Baptist Church and are open to the public.





TIRZ #2 was established in 2002 and in 2022 was extended through 2042. When it was extended the boundaries were expanded to include Commodores Park on the north and Balli Park on the south.

The funds come from new construction inside the boundaries of the zone since its inception in 2002. It is administered by the Island Reinvestment #2 Board of Directors which includes all members of the Corpus Christi City Council as well as representatives from each of the taxing entities who participate including the Nueces County Commissioners

north side of the street under the new bridge and onto the Whitecap North Padre Island site now under construction. Extension of the canal would connect it to the water flow under the Park Road 22 Water Exchange Bridge now under construction improving water conditions and allowing for connected boat passage throughout the Island canal

The bridge, estimated to cost about \$1.5 million, would be paid for with funds from the Island's Tax Increment Refinance Zone #2 (TIRZ #2). Funds for TIRZ #2 are generated from taxes on new development inside the zone's boundaries since 2002. (See graphic). Unlike the Water Exchange Bridge which consists of three arches the Commodores bridge would be of a standard design from the Texas Department of Transportation significantly cutting costs and construction time.

The new bridge is part of the Padre Island Mobility Plan which includes the entirety of Padre Island with pedestrian and cart connectivity as well as connected boat passage through the Island Mobility Plan now under development by the city. The filings state that the submittal is to initiate construction plan review and receive feedback from City Staff so comments can be incorporated into the final design plans. The Commodores Bridge project has been identified as a TIRZ 2 funded project by the TIRZ 2 Board and City Council. The intent is for the developer of the Whitecap project, Ashlar Development, to prepare plans and engage a construction contractor to build the bridge. The design calls for a bridge with minimum water clearance of 14 feet, the same as the Water Exchange Bridge, with pedestrian paths, which bridges a 66 foot-wide waterway. Utilities, including a 16-inche water line, would run along the underside of the bridge.

Traffic would be reduced to two lanes on Commodores Drive while construction is underway which is estimated to take about a year and a half. The 102-page plan is to be circulated to city departments for review. No timeline for construction of the new bridge is listed.

Jody Conradt-Basketball Coach

By Dotson Lewis Dotson's Note: Addie Jo "Jody" Conradt (born May 13, 1941) is a retired women's basketball coach. She was the head coach for the women's team at University of Texas at Austin (UT). Her coaching career spanned 38 years, with the last 31 years at UT from 1976 to 2007. She also served concurrently as the UT women's athletic director from 1992 to 2001. During her tenure at UT, she achieved several notable personal and team milestones in collegiate basketball. At retirement, she had tallied 900 career victories, second place in all time victories for an NCAA Division I basketball coach. Conradt was inducted in the inaugural class at the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame in 1999. Thanks to Jody

Addie Jo Conradt was born in Goldthwaite, Texas to Ann and Charles Conradt. Both her parents were athletic, with her mother playing competitively on a local softball team, and her father playing semi-pro baseball. She was a standout basketball player at Goldthwaite High School, where she averaged 40 points per game. Many people growing up in Goldthwaite stayed there, according to Conradt, but she got a sense that one could have larger ambitions when a Goldthwaite native, Marie Reynolds, joined the All American Red Heads Team, a barnstorming basketball team which played throughout the United States and around the world. After high school, Conradt played collegiate basketball at Baylor University, earning a degree in physical education in 1963. She finished her collegiate basketball career averaging 20 points per game. After graduation, she taught and coached at Waco Midway High School and earned her master's degree from Baylor in 1969.

College Coaching

Prior to Conradt's career at UT, she served as women's basketball head coach at Sam Houston State University from 1969 to 1973, where her teams had a record of 74–23. She then coached at the University of Texas at Arlington from 1973 to 1976, where her teams had a record of 43-39. In 1975, in response to Title IX, the University of Texas created a separate women's

athletic department. In 1976, they hired Donna Lopiano to become the first women's athletic director. The following year, Lopiano hired Conradt as coach of the women's basketball team. Conradt had attracted national attention while at the University of Texas at Arlington. After two losing seasons, they went 23–11 in the 1975–76 seasons, upsetting powerful opponents. Texas planned to bring the women's program to national prominence, and they felt Conradt was the right coach for the job. Teams coached by Conradt were using tactics not seen in many other places, such as full court pressure, double low posts and a transition game. In Conradt's first season, the team went 36–10. The team was ranked in the AP top ten in the nation all but one year in the 1980s, including a string of four years, from 1984 to 1988, where they earned the number one in the nation ranking. The success translated into fan support, the team was averaging 7,500 fans per game by the end of the 1980s, including such state and national leaders as future governor Ann Richards and US Congresswoman Barbara Jordan. In the 1985 NCAA tournament, the Lady Longhorns lost a heartbreaking game to Western Kentucky 92-90. Watching the game was highly recruited Clarissa Davis, who had not yet decided where to go to school. She resolved to go to Texas, and help them. The following year, Texas would win the national championship with the first

undefeated women's season, with a record

of 34-0. Although Davis wasn't a starter on the team, she ended up earning the tour-

nament's most valuable player award. In 38 seasons Conradt's head coaching record was 900-306. Her record of 900 career victories is second only to that of Pat Summitt. During her tenure at UT, her record was 783-245. Between January 1978, and January 1990, Conradt's Lady Longhorns did not lose a Southwest Conference game, a streak of 183 consecutive conference victories. From 1986 to 1991, Texas was the women's basketball attendance leader, including an NCAA record average of 8,481 for one season.



Over her career, Conradt has coached:

- 28 players who went on to play professionally
- four US Olympians
- three players who earned a combined 13 national player of the year honors
- eight Kodak All-Americans Conradt was inducted into the Basketball Hall of Fame in 1998 and into the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame in 1999. She is only the second woman inducted into the Naismith Hall of Fame.

Conradt was succeeded as UT women's basketball head coach by Gail Goestenkors, the former women's basketball head coach at Duke University.

In 2008, Conradt was honored, along with Dick Vitale, by the Atlanta Tipoff Club, with the Naismith Award, an honor presented annually that "pays tribute to the individuals who have made a significant impact on women's and men's college basketball".

After retiring from coaching, Conradt continued to work for the University of Texas as special assistant to the women's athletic



Dotson's Other Note: In 2012 the University of Texas at Austin honored Jody Conradt with a 7-foot bronze statue inside the Longhorns basketball arena. The statue was dedicated in a private ceremony. Former Tennessee coach Pat Summitt attended the dedication, which included a video message from former U.S. Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice in recognition of the 40th anniversary Title IX, the federal law that bans sex discrimination in educational programs, including sports. Conradt is just the second female to have a statue dedicated on the Texas campus, joining civil rights champion and former U.S. Representative Barbara Jordan. The Texas president Bill Powers called Conradt a "truly historic" figure. "Of all the blockbuster statistics that paint the picture of Conradt's storied career, the only number you really need to remember is 99. That's the percentage of her players who graduated," Powers said. "Her career is a reminder that when you make sure your players are students first, everything else falls into place." The statue will be on permanent display in the Frank Erwin Center at all games and activities taking place in the center.

I've never seen anyone get so much joy out of running. He was fiery, competitive, yet happy to be playing baseball. He had what people called a quick start, two steps out of the batter's box and he was running full speed. I've never seen anyone run like Jackie Robinson. Pigeon toed, both arms moving side to side, palms open and fingers extended as if he were grabbing air to pull himself along, his whole body ran. After Jackie Robinson broke the color barrier in Major League baseball on April 15, 1947, nine of the next eleven Most

Valuable Player Awards were won by African-Americans. That's what we are missing in today's game. The "Golden Years" of baseball were the 1940's, 1950's, and 1960's. On Saturday, all 30 Major League clubs will honor Robinson by wearing his #42.

Branch Rickey made Jackie Robinson promise not to retaliate against the onslaught of criticism that was sure to come his way. The following is an example. In 1947, the Brooklyn Dodgers were playing the St. Louis Cardinals. Future Hall-of-Framer, Enos Slaughter, hit a grounder to "Pee Wee" Reese at shortstop. Jackie was playing first base. Even though Slaughter was called out, he stepped on Jackie's foot as he crossed first base and drew blood. Jackie said nothing as the two of them just stared at each other. In 1949, Jackie had been moved to second base. Slaughter and the Cardinals were in town, again and Enos hit a line drive off the left field fence at Ebbets Field. As the throw came in from the outfield, Slaughter slid into second base. Jackie was waiting on him with the ball in his glove and promptly hit Enos in the mouth with the tag and knocked out three of his teeth. Jackie then looked down at Slaughter and said, "I don't forget anything." Enos Slaughter later said, "I respected that son of a gun for the rest of my life."

How Is Your Plumbing Old Man? By Dr. Tom

This week we will talk about plumbing issues in guys over fifty. It is something that most men will encounter at some point in their life. In general, urinary issues like bladder infections and kidney infections are much more common in women than men especially when we are younger. This is thought to be due to the shorter urethra in women and issues with post coital urinary tract infections etc. Men typically have lower issues with this and only start having issues when the prostate begins to enlarge with age.

Prostate is a gland in men that the urethra passes through on the way out. The prostate will enlarge over time due to the effects of testosterone. This in turn can cause compression of the urethra and thus narrowing. This narrowing will cause outlet obstruction of the bladder and then we will have stagnant urine that sometimes never leaves the bladder. This condition increases the incidence of infection due to bacteria that have time to multiply and become symp-

What are the symptoms of prostate enlargement which is termed benign prostatic hypertrophy or bph for short? Typically it starts with decrease urine flow and trouble stopping or dribbling. This progresses to increase frequency and what we call nocturia (getting up at night to urinate) of 2 to several times. It can be escalated if you take otc meds with decongestant in them as these act like an antiflomax. If this is left alone sooner or later you will encounter a sudden escalation of symptoms with burning on urination, sometimes fevers

and escalating back pain as the infection migrates up the ureters to the kidneys. Once it gets to the kidneys things can get ugly with systemic toxicity high fevers and sometimes sepsis.

How do I prevent these nasty issues associated with bph? Medicines that open up the prostatic urethra are useful, these medicines include Flomax, Cialis, Hytrin and Cardura. Medicines that open up the prostate have to be taken daily or the same issues return. Now there are other meds that shrink the prostate itself and these include Proscar and Avodart they cause long term improvement and can be taken with the medicines that open up the prostate so that you get initial relief and ongoing shrinkage of the prob-

There are numerous surgical procedures that can help alleviate symptoms as well including TURP which is transurethral prostate resection, there is the Urolift and some other high tech gizmos that urologists can use based on your unique situation and there of course can be side effects and complications to both meds and surgery. Keep an eye on your symptoms if you notice burning, fever, increasing symptoms or blood in your urine be sure to see your doc before things get ugly. You need to have an annual PSA to help screen for prostate cancer which can sometimes mimic these conditions. Getting in with a urologist if you start getting infections more than 1 or 2 is a good idea because it probably won't stop. Hope you have a great week. See you on the water! The Island Outdoors On the Rocks

I'm glad I got my hummingbird feeders up a couple weeks ago because I walked out to some vicious aerial dogfights the other morning on my way out the door. I didn't have time to get out the bino's and go through the combatants, but they looked mostly like black chinned and ruby throated hummers. The kiskadee's and golden fronted woodpeckers have found my mulberry tree, and they are tearing it up. Won't be long for a solid migration/fallout.

Birds colliding with windows are a major issue at this time of year, and I get lots of texts of "what is this bird, it just ran into my window." This applies mostly to the smaller songbirds and especially warblers and hummers when they get into their fights. Unfortunately, this is a major cause of mortality, of up to 100 million or so birds a year. If this occurs, and you feel the need to get involved, you can gently place them in a shoebox or some small box for a few minutes. Handle them as very little as possible. Don't try to feed them crackers or water, as most of these little birds don't eat Saltines or even drink water. The most important thing is to give them a quiet, dark, safe environment to collect themselves. If they don't fly away after five minutes, then you may have to look up a wildlife rehabil-

If the shoebox trick doesn't work, the Texas Sea Life Center is able to take birds on the Island at all hours. They are open 10 a.m. – 4 p.m. Wednesday through Friday, and on Sundays till 2 p.m. I talked to Crystal over there the other day, and she let me know that they have pet carriers out in front of the building that you can drop birds off whenever, and they will tend to them. The carriers provide a safe place from predators, plus the cool dark place that might allow a migrant to come back around. This will also go for when fledgling time comes around here in the next month when you find a baby bird and can't get it back in the nest where it belongs. Handy information for those that I haven't bored to tears yet and you've moved over to Joey's column

already.

Large glass windows and sliding glass doors tend to do birds the worst, as they can only see the reflection of what's behind them. There are stickers you can put on the glass to break it up to help them see. Or you can just do like I do and leave your windows dirty. Ha! Don't forget to keep Fluffy the Cat inside during the peak of migration, especially on the Island. Check out the live migration maps on BirdCast.





Uncle Bruce came in town to fish with his brother and Nephue Jay and showed us how to wiggle a worm, to land this nice trout in a DOA 3" Cal Shad. 1/4 ounce jig heads let's us make long casts and maintain contact with the bait in high winds. Farah

Spring Tide Strategies

Every spring we have a few Bull Tides that sweep life in and throughout the back bays and estuaries. Mid April is a prime time for some of our best fishing, but high tides can make it difficult for anglers to find concentrations of gamefish as they get spread out with the abundance of water. This is due to the higher tides filling all of the ultra shallow water flats and scattering baitfish. Our top end predators use areas like shorelines, spoil islands, grass lines, and areas that have significant structure to herd bait up against and strike. With more water spreading things out and deeper water over shallow water structure, gamefish are having a hard time just like fishermen.

Drift Fishing

Riding the winds over the vast shallow flats is a great way to cover water, find scattered gamefish, and learn lots of water quickly. The bottom sweeps by like a movie before your eyes in the clear shallow water. Sand pockets open up a view of life below the surface. Baitfish, crabs, shells, and vegetation capture your imagination as we follow our lures with our eyes and watch them disappear when trout bolt out of their grassy hides and strike our baits. Making deliberate casts past sand pockets and letting the lures play the role of an injured baitfish seeking refuge. I usually employ various soft plastics to match the main food sources present. Small paddle tail baits like the DOA 3" Cal Shad, the longer and erratic darting DOA 5.5" Jerk Bait, and the DOWN SOUTH LURES Super Model paddle tail that is a great small mullet character. The size of your jig head is ultimately the deciding factor of your speed and presentation. I use 1/16,1/8,1/4 on the boat with a quality OWNER SHORT SHANKED, or DOA SHORT SHANKED JIG HEADS. The lighter ones will allow a soft entry that sounds more like a real baitfish landing from escaping an attack,

often I'll catch fish as soon as it hits the water. Lighter heads will allow your bait to dance and glide down through the water column, and I can even flutter and skip them on the surface like a fleeing bait. Your line can get whipped up in the wind easily and that's when a heavier choice can offer some advantage. Longer casts as well and a consistent point of control between the angler and the lure will be felt with a heavier jig head. The 1/4 ounce jig head will keep your bait down and close to the bottom, often in the strike zone, and in the face of gamefish hunting the bottom like redfish!

Drifting shorelines and spoil islands are great places to find action during high tides. Drift with your motor down so that you can cast right up until you rest the boat on the bottom. With the motor down one can easily get together start the motor raise it up and idle out. Take your time and go slow only to move down 50-100yds and make another drift. Powering around blasting out of shallow water will alert fish to your presence. The spoil islands along the ICW are in the highway of baitfish and shrimp travel right now. Look for trout off of the drop off and redfish up in the shallows. Making drifts around these sunken islands can make for some great fishing right now.

With the push of water the ICW Canal is a solid place to find all the action you need. I've been working the edges of the "ditch" with my MINNKOTA I-PILOT AND MY HUMMINBIRD Solix side scan. Finding schools of trout and redfish easily along the edges then Spot Locking in position. The advancement in technology is intense with this HUMMINBIRD Side Scan. I can actually tell the difference in species. I've been having a client on the front of the boat work topwater plugs along the shallow edge and the rest of us stepping soft plastics off of the drop off. All species of fish have been aggressive and filling our days with solid hookups.

Nature Notes

Sing Your Heart Out!



Northern Mockingbird

When you walk outside here in Texas, there is a very good chance that you will see at least one bird flying around. And even more than likely, you will hear them singing or calling too. The bird calls or songs that we hear every day are often taken for granted, but each of these chirps has its own natural history.

To start, the sounds a bird makes comes from a tiny organ located at the top of the windpipe called the syrinx. Some birds can use this organ to make two sounds at once, which is why some bird songs can sound two-note. Who knew that birds could duet themselves?

It is important to know the difference between a bird song and a bird call. A bird song is, generally, longer and more complex than a call is. Singing can be used to attract a mate, while calling can be used to alert others to the presence of danger, for instance. And because the song is more complex, sometimes these birds need to learn how to do it.

Some species of passerines (songbirds), like the flycatchers for example, acquire their songs innately. They are born with the ability to sing their songs and don't have to hear them to learn. Other passerines need to hear their parents or neighbors sing their song to learn it. When one of these songbirds is born, there is a period of time shortly after hatching called the "sensitive period" during which it must listen to its parents and absorb the sounds that they make. After that comes a period of practicing. It will take what it has learned and try to sing, this singing being incomplete and sounding more like babbling. After a little while of practicing, it crystalizes its final song which it will use for the rest of its life. The important stage of this process is actually the critical learning period. If a bird doesn't hear the song that it's supposed to learn, then its song will always sound wrong.

Birds like the white-crowned sparrow are close-ended learners, meaning that they follow this process as a juvenile and their song is cemented as an adult. But there are also open-ended learners, who can adjust their songs over their adult lifetime. An open-ended learner can expand its repertoire throughout its life. A good example of this is the Northern Mocking bird, which will continuously hear songs of other species, learn them, and mimic them. Another cool example of an open-ended learner is the Mynah birds. These birds can not only mimic other species, but have the ability to mimic sounds like a car alarm or a horn.

This field of research is still emerging and we are learning more and more about birdsong. Bird songs are more intricate than you might think, so when you hear that European Starling (open-ended learner) or White-crowned Sparrow (close-ended learner) sing, think about what it had to go through to sing those beautiful songs.

time came up with a plan. The company that owned the majority of the land on both sides of SPID from Commodores to Whitecap had a permit with the U.S. Corps of Engineers that required them to have water flowing under Park Road 22 by the end of the year 2020 and the plan was to place culverts under the roadway at an estimated cost of \$900,000 paid by the developer. The new plan was to include \$1.2 million on the bond package to upgrade the culverts to a water exchange bridge by combining the \$1.2 million with the private developer's \$900,000 to pay for culverts providing \$2.1 million for the estimated cost of the bridge. There were many complications. For one the developer didn't have to put the culverts in place until 2020 and there was no agreement to combine the funds prior to the vote. Further, there were no design plans for the bridge and cost estimate was at best a back of the envelope guess. Thirteen years went by during which not only was the IUPAC come into being but the Island Strategic Action Committee (ISAC) had been established in 2010 under the 2004 Island Development Plan as an advisory group to the city council and its members began pushing for the bridge project to move forward.

Find the money

In 2016 all the pieces were in place except funding. The city had identified \$7.5 million in money left from old bond elections that had already been completed (the \$1.2 million from the 2004 bond package had grown to \$1.5 million by transferring money from other similar bond projects), and ISAC voted to recommend the commitment of up to \$4 million in funds from the Island Tax Re-Investment Zone (TRZ) which was established in 2002 as part of the Packery Channel project to capture property tax on new construction inside the zone after that date. The fund was designed to maintain the Packery Jetties and to dredge the channel as needed, which was thought to be each year and required a \$4 million reserve fund for that purpose. As it turned out the channel has only had three dredge projects after the original construction. The TRZ boundaries include the area from Zahn Road to Whitecap and along SPID from Whitecap to Commodores, including the Schlitterbahn Waterpark. The amount of money the fund generates has varied from \$2 million to as much as \$6 million before the economic crunch in 2008. For the latest TIRZ #2 fund balances see the graphic in this issue). It has funded several projects including the pavilion along Zahn Road which is now under construction.

Out to bids

By early 2017 a final design on the proposed bridge was in place and it was unique to The Island. The design, which was ultimately used, was paid for by the private developers and done by Urban Engineering and called for three arches each forty feet wide spanning two cart and pedestrian paths bordering a forty-foot wide waterway with fourteen feet of clearance from the waterline to the bridge. Using arches rather than the standard Texas Department of Transportation design with I-beams was a nod to the fact that the bridge would be the centerpiece connecting what was then \$500 million in development on the Lake Padre side to the then Schlitterbahn Waterpark on the west side through a 3200-foot long channel with retail, commercial, and residential space along the banks. The connection the bridge would provide would have the effect of turning Padre Island into one contiguous resort community and the canal would be the Island's signature icon with the bridge as the centerpiece. That plan is now coming to fruition with the completion of the bridge.

Parts of the project were already in place. In 2015 the canal connecting the bridge site

to Lake Padre on the east side of the roadway was finished and bulkheads constructed in anticipation of the building of the bridge. A portion of the canal on the west side had been dug when the Schlitterbahn park was built to use the sand there as fill for the project but was not bulkheaded. But the entire canal was not in existence and the cost of finishing it was put at \$3 million and on the political side the city council under the direction of then Mayor Nelda Martinez was understandingly not going to build a "bridge to nowhere" and things were stalled. It was a chicken and egg problem. It was discovered that the \$3 million set aside in the park's private construction budget for the canal and bulkheads had gone into the park itself and there was no money for the canal. By 2017 that hurdle had been cleared enough that it looked like the project would finally catch fire.

2017

Things were looking up in early 2017 when the project went out to bids and when they were opened in April of that year it looked like all the pieces were in place. The price came in at \$12.5 million, which was about \$1 million more than the funds available but a reachable number and it looked like construction was just around the corner. The only holdup was a signed commitment by the property owners on the west side of the road that they would in fact build the canal, which they said they were in favor of doing and which would create between \$15 and \$18 million in added property value along its banks by creating new waterfront property. They just had to find \$3 million.

Then disaster struck. As the bid remained open through June of 2018 with construction pending on the bridge and ongoing discussion for canal construction the Schlitterbahn Waterpark and the land between it, SPID, and Whitecap were the subject of bankruptcy proceedings. Everything came to a halt as the future ownership of the 70 acres west of SPID where the canal would go hung in the balance. As that process stretched on through 2018 the window on the bid package closed and once again in June 2018 the project went idle, albeit with \$11.5 million in funding still available and the design in

place. When the new landowners came in, Axys Capital and International Bank of Commerce, they recognized the financial sense of the bridge project and to move it along in April 2019 the owners and the Corpus Christi City Council approved a Developer Agreement that would create a Gordian Knot of interlocking responsibilities that would protect the private owners from building a canal without a bridge, and the city from building a bridge to nowhere. That agreement remains in place (see the sequence of events in the story on this page).

As things now stand

That is where things stood until two weeks ago when the bids on a second round of bidding were opened with local Hass Anderson Construction, Ltd. coming in as the low bidder for the second time, this time at \$13.9 million leaving a \$2.4 million gap between the money required and the money available.

That is where things stand as of the first week of November of 2019. For the first time since 2004 the city and the adjacent landowners both have all the pieces in place with the project's future hanging on finding \$2.4 million in funding. If that gap can be bridged in the next few months the first of the tenets of the Developers Agreement can be put in motion and the construction of the Park Road 22 Water Exchange Bridge and the canal joining it to the Island's existing canal system can begin simultaneously. If not the Park Road 22 Water Exchange Bridge will likely go down in the annals of Island history not as the Bridge to Nowhere but rather A Bridge Too Far.






Last Week's Mystery Islander! Nick Colosi



Our Mystery Person of the Week last issue was Islander Nick Colosi.

The desert photo is Nick walking away from going on patrol with a Marine Corps tank company. During Desert Shield/Storm he was deployed to Saudi Arabia as Regimental Surgeon with the 24th Regiment, 4th Division Marines, responsible for coordinating the medical care of approximately 5,000 Marines. The other photos are of Nick emerging from the hatch of a Gemini space capsule and him sitting in the framework of the space craft's pilot's seat in the world's largest human centrifuge. He was active Navy on loan to NASA to help design the instrumentation of the Gemini.

The centrifuge was used to create the gravitational forces of rocket launch and re-entry on the visual field lose to the crew to determine where to place critical



instruments which were needed at specific G Forces during flight. Researchers rode the centrifuge to understand what the astronauts experienced.

"I lost consciousness at 5 G's," Nick said. "This was shown in TOP GUN during Maverick's 10-G flight and when the pilot lost consciousness as he descended after the bombing run."

When Nick practiced in St. Louis many years ago, he served as Senior Medical Officer in the region to liaison with the Flight Surgeon of the Blue Angels with the Washington University Medical Center where he was faculty and staff to provide potential emergency medical care. Nick was a Commander, Medical Corps, USN, and retired as Captain after 34 years Navy with 24 of those years with the Marines.

Texas Senate Passes Bills aimed at Improving Teacher Pay

SENATE APPROVES TEACHER PAY RAISES, EDUCATION SAVINGS ACCOUNTS

The Senate on Thursday approved a bill that

would grant a \$2,000 across-the-board pay raise for all Texas teachers, with even more going toward teachers in smaller districts and those that perform exceptionally in the classroom. SB 9, dubbed "the Teachers' Bill of Rights" by author and Conroe Senator Brandon Creighton, also includes a number of provisions designed to ease the increasing burdens faced by teachers in Texas. An interim legislative study found that not only does Texas have a dire shortage of qualified classroom teachers, but that three-fourths of current teachers have considered leaving the profession at one point. Creighton said this bill is designed to reverse that trend by offering unprecedented levels of support to the state's educators. "It is specifically designed for the hearts and minds of our Texas teachers and how we can make sure that they not only feel lifted up and valued, but they feel inspired and renewed again to stay in the profession," he said.

Teachers in smaller districts would qualify for a \$6,000 bump in pay, in order to bring them more in line with their urban colleagues. While the average starting pay for a Texas teacher is near \$60,000 annually, in rural areas, Creighton said, many begin around \$30,000 a year. The bill would also expand the state's teacher merit pay program. Since implementation in 2019, Creighton said that the program has benefited more than seven thousand Texas teachers, adding between four and seventeen thousand dollars to their base salaries. In all, the bill contains \$3.3 billion in additional teacher compensation. Teachers with young children could also take advantage of existing pre-k programs at campuses where they teach; Creighton said that many teachers don't currently qualify for these programs, which are aimed at children from disadvantaged

Aside from compensation, the bill seeks to improve teacher support through mentorship programs. It would establish a residency program, where college students learning to be educators can actually work alongside veteran teachers in the classroom

backgrounds.

to gain valuable experience and be paid to do so. It also expands the mentorship program for new teachers, pairing master teachers with younger educators with only one or two years of experience. Teachers would also be empowered to remove a disruptive or abusive student from the classroom and would have to sign off on any plan to return the student to class.

Senate Bill 8 would make it easier for kids to switch schools

Next, the Senate considered SB 8, also by Creighton, which would make it easier for parents to move their children into different schools, including private schools. Creighton titled this measure the "Parental Bill of Rights", emphasizing that it would put power in the hands of parents to direct their children's education. "Senate Bill 8 is a game-changer for educational freedom in Texas," he said. Parents could move students to a school in another district - subject to capacity - if they feel it would benefit their child. It would also allow parents with children in public schools to apply to receive up to \$8,000 in state funds to place in an education savings account (ESA) to pay for private school tuition, tutoring, or other educational related expenses. Creighton said that smaller school districts can feel the loss of even a single student much more keenly than large urban districts, so the bill would provide districts with fewer than 20,000 students a \$10,000 grant for five years for each departing student. Funding for ESAs would come out of general state revenue rather than dedicated public school funds and would cover up to 62,500 ESAs. Applicants would also be prioritized based on the quality of the school the student is leaving, with two-thirds of the slots open to students currently attending schools ranked C, D, or F on the state's A-F campus quality scale. The bill was amended to open ten percent of the slots to low-income families whose children currently attend private school and have a combined income of less than twice of the

The bill also gives parents more latitude to review instructional materials, streamlines grievance processes, requires parental consent for changes to health or wellness policies for their children, and bans curriculum related to human sexuality or gender identity.

federal poverty level.

With his experience in both research and management, he recognizes the value of science-driven solutions to address real-world problems. Additionally, Stunz brings an understanding that people are a key part of the equation, and managing for both a healthy environment and economy is vital for the Gulf of Mexico.

Stunz has conducted extensive field research. Whether getting "hands-on" with sharks, examining how artificial reefs enhance the marine environment, or gathering data to develop sound sportfishing regulations.






