As 2023 enters the history books we take stock at the changes of 2023 with much to be thankful for Around The Island, not the least of which is the completion of the Don Patricio Exchange which after two decades of planning will bring the circulation of water from the Gulf of Mexico to Island canals in 2024. As 2023 comes to a close an agreement to connect the canal under the new bridge to the existing canals on its west side is moving forward and once that process is complete work is set to begin on a new water exchange bridge under Commodores Drive in 2024. The year 2024 will be a transformative one as work on two major Island projects continues around Lake Padre and at the Whitecap North Padre Island site.

# New life for an old building...

New Year's Eve 2024 will see the opening of the new Merida's restaurant in the building commonly referred to by Islanders as the old German Bakery. In 2023 the final nail in the coffin of the old Mikel May's Beachside Bar & Grill on Bob Hall Pier was placed as Nueces County Commissioners voted to rebuild the pier without a home for the business, But Islander May 'Merida' Mendoza who also owned Mikel May's is set to open Merida's restaurant in the distinctive thirty-four hundred square foot building built in 1988 on SPID just north of Whitecap Boulevard which features the unique hexagonal gazebo style roof. Reservations are being taken for a New Year's Eve grand opening and Mendoza completely remodeled the interior and exterior including eleven boat slips on the canal. As 2024 opens the new restaurant will be the sole business accessible by water on the west side of SPID until new retail space is constructed at the Whitecap North Padre Island site. The business will be first of many coming to The Island where Islanders can arrive by boat.

# 2023 A Year of Progress Completion of the Don Patricio

The big story of 2023 was the completion of the new Don Patricio water exchange bridge on SPID. The project was twenty years in the making and was dedicated in December, 2023. The bridge was named after the pioneer Island rancher and State Senator Patrick Dunn whose descendants were on hand for the ribbon cutting.

The new \$20 million bridge is the centerpiece of Island development with its connecting waterway between Lake Padre, the Whitecap North Padre Island development, Lake Padre, Packery Channel, and the Gulf of Mexico. Cart and pedestrian paths will also connect

# Packery Dredging \$3.5 million project underway as 2023 ends

Work to dredge Packery Channel to fourteen feet is underway as 2023 comes to a close. The \$3,531,549 contract was awarded to Callan Marine Ltd., of Galveston with funds for the dredging project coming from Tax Increment Reinvestment Zone No. 2. The project will move approximately 270,000 cubic yards of sand from the channel which will be used to widen the beach from a point south of Whitecap Boulevard northward to approximately halfway up the Michael J. Ellis Seawall. It is the fourth major dredging of the channel since the original dredge in 2004-2005 and is expected to take about seven months

# Endangered Sea Turtle Found Stranded in Wales Returned to Texas for Release

"Tally" the Kemp's ridley sea turtle embarking on aerial transatlantic journey thanks to international partners, volunteers

In September, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and partners released a rehabilitated Kemp's ridley sea turtle named "Tally" from Galveston into the Gulf of Mexico for a second chance at life. Tally was found stranded and near death on the distant shores of Talacre in Northern Wales in 2021. After washing up on the shoreline

on the north coast of Wales in November 2021, Tally was spotted by a dog walker and reported as "presumed dead" to the local British Divers' Marine Life Rescue. The responding biologist from the



Anglesey Sea Zoo, Gem Simmons, soon realized Tally was still alive, and along with the director of the

# Taxpayers got a break in 2023

Property Tax Cuts at state and city level

Property Tax payers got a break in 2023 as state lawmakers and the Corpus Christi City Council provided some tax relief.

Lawmakers in Austin agreed on a tax bill that allocates \$12.6 billion to reduce the school property tax rate by 10.7 cents per \$100 valuation for homeowners and business properties. It also includes an increase to the state's homestead exemption from \$40,000 to \$100,000 at an estimated cost of \$5.3 billion, and some extra relief for seniors and property owners with disabilities, averaging an extra \$170 per year. School property taxes make up about one half of the total property tax burden for Island homeowners.

# A Solution to the Flooding of Island Homes

ISAC subcommittee suggests a way to prevent flooding of adjacent homes due to changes in elevation regulations



Current solution to the problem.

A sub-committee of the Island Strategic Action Committee (ISAC) in 2023 issued a plan that would prevent the flooding Island homes due to changes in federal regulations two years ago. When the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) issued a new flood map for Padre Island in 2021 it raised the elevation for new homes from the previous level of nine feet above Base Flood Elevation (BFI) to ten feet and an additional foot was added to that to lower flood insurance rates across Padre Island. BFI is defined under FEMA


# World War II Ace George Kirk Passes away at 101

"1943 was a good year. We were 22-years old. The Navy gave us their fastest planes and I married Ginny. It was the best summer of my life."



The Island lost World War II ace and hero of the Greatest Generation in 2023 when long time Islander George Kirk passed away after a heart attack.

He was a Naval Flying Ace with seven combat victories, awarded two Distinguished Flying Crosses and two Navy Air Medals. He was awarded his wings at Naval Air Station Corpus Christi in June 1943 and joined fighter wing VF-8 in September. Born April 27, 1921 in Moline, Illinois, Kirk was attending the University of Iowa when Pearl Harbor was attacked in 1941 and joined the US Navy in early 1942. He earned his wings at Corpus Christi's Naval Air Station at the outset of 1943 and was assigned to Fighting Squadron Eight (VF-8) near Norfolk, Virginia. During pre-deployment training, he married Virginia (Ginny) Christofferson, a partnership that would last over 60-years.



George in 2021

Ensign Kirk and his VF-8 squadron sailed to war at the end of 1943. George and his squadron participated in key engagements in the northwest Pacific islands including the Great Marianas Turkey Shoot. Promoted to Lieutenant in mid-1944, George became a fighter pilot "ace," credited with seven aerial combat victories.

'We were twenty-two years old," George said. "The Navy let us fly their fastest planes. We were near the beach and I married Ginny. It was the best summer of my life."

A life well lived.

# Island loses a legend

# Longtime Islander Joe Farah Passes Away in 2023



How did you end up here Farah?

Pioneer in the deep water diving industry and longtime Island business owner

Island icon Joe Farah passed away in 2023 after 30 years of business at Farah's Waterhole on The Island. Joe took an interesting road to get to Padre Island that started in Hollywood where he grew up and where he was an extra in the movie Spartacus, played ball in Bob Hope's yard before becoming a legend in the commercial diving industry in Louisiana where he was a pioneer in deep saturation diving.

Joe received his Marine Biology degree from San Fernando State College in 1966 and took to the sea as a diver.

"At that time you could make \$200 month without a degree, \$400 with a Bachelor's and \$500 with a Master's," Joe said. "But commercial divers were making \$300 a day." At age 24 he set out for Morgan City, Louisiana where he became a commercial diver for Transcontinental Pipeline.

"I developed all the gas and decompression diving tables using the partial pressure laws, gas laws and physics that I learned in college and high school. They used to think 150 feet was deep until I got there" Joe explained.

He made 200-300 foot dives routinely and held the record for 350 feet. In the decompression chamber he would go down over 1000 feet and stay on board with three other crew members for 120 days. It would take four days to ascend because of the saturation point they would have to go up only one foot an hour.

Joe's diving tables were used to determine the decompression stops on the ascent. Joe was the first to use "Live boating" in the field. He would walk the pipeline to inspect it and the boat would not be anchored but mobile, following him along on the surface. He was also the first to do "live boat construction" where he would take two pipelines and flange them together. He was also instrumental in Bringing OSHA safety regulations for commercial divers. He did all this during his almost thirty year career during which time he became, and still is, a legend amongst divers.

In 1992, Joe decided it was time to "drag up" (retire) from diving. He thought about how to make a living in the Bluff and decided to take his father's advice and "Open a bar where there were none." He looked at lots on the Island because there were not any bars there. Island realtor Mary Spolans helped him find the right site and Island architect James Mazoch helped him refine

Joe and Toni married in 1969 and lived in their home on Azores in the Bluff that was built by a developer in 1964. Son Joey is a popular Laguna Bay fishing guide and son Michael is a partner at Morgan Stanley in Rockport. Joe had stories of being swallowed by a giant fish and breaking a window at Bob Hope's house along with a long list of Island history and legends. Joe's passing leaves a hole in Island living that can never be filled.



In 2007 Joe decided to cut down the collection of bras that had been hanging from the ceiling for the seventeen anniversary of Farah's Water Hole and turn them into a piñata. What he didn't see coming was the force they would create when they came flying out and sent Joe sprawling.

### City Tax Cut

Homeowners with homestead exemptions got a 10% decrease in the appraised value for property tax calculations for the City of Corpus Christi in the 2024-2025 tax year after a move by the Corpus Christi City Council this year.

Homeowners across the city will see their appraised value reduced from the previous 10% reduction to 20% in the  $2024\mbox{-}2025$ year by reducing the appraised value of homes across the city.

Homeowners over 65 years of age will see an additional reduction in their appraised value for city property taxes from the current \$50,000 to \$62,500, also in the 2024-2025 tax year, after the change in 2023. Tuesdays vote.

At-Large City Councilman Mike Pusley, sponsored the cut in appraised value for city property taxes with a second from At-Large Councilman Michael Hunter, and the measure was passed unanimously by the

Since 1987 the value placed on homesteads in the City of Corpus Christi owned by residents over 65 years of age has been reduced by \$50,000 from the appraised value from the Nueces County Appraisal District. Under the new rules that amount will increase to \$62,500 in 2024. The cuts in appraised value will result in the loss of about \$10 million in the 2024-2025 tax year, according to the city staff.

The reduction in appraised value only applies to city property tax. To calculate the value of a homestead for city property a tax under the new system begin with the appraised value of the home from the Nueces County Appraisal District, subtract 20%, then if the homeowner is over 65 years of age subtract another \$62,500. Divide that number by (\$)100 and multiply by the city tax rate which for the 2023-2024 tax year is \$0.599774 per \$100 valuation; the tax rate for the 2024-2025 tax year will be set in September, 2024.

79 Crashes at Aquarius-SPID intersection since traffic light installed...

As of January, 2023, there had been a total of 79 crashes at the intersection of Aquarius Street and South Padre Island Drive (Park Road 22) since the installation of the traffic light there in early 2017, according to statistics from the Corpus Christi Metropolitan Planning Organization.

The numbers from the MPO show four of the accidents resulted in serious injury, six were hit and run, 35 occurred in the intersection, and 44 occurred on the roadways entering the intersection.

# Christmas Lights

Dotson's Note: Christmas lights (also known as fairy lights, festive lights or string lights) are lights often used for decoration in celebration of Christmas, often on display throughout the Christmas season including Advent and Christmastide. The custom goes back to when Christmas trees were decorated with candles, which symbolized Christ being the light of the world. The Christmas trees were brought by Christians into their homes in early modern Germany. Thanks to a couple of my friends whose names I will not disclose and Wikipedia for the facts contained in this report and for the photos.

Christmas trees displayed publicly and illuminated with electric lights became popular in the early 20th century. By the mid-20th century, it became customary to display strings of electric lights along streets and on buildings; Christmas decorations detached from the Christmas tree itself. In the United States and Canada, it became popular to outline private homes with such Christmas lights in tract housing starting in the 1960s. By the late 20th century, the custom had also been adopted in other nations, including outside the Western world, notably in Japan and Hong Kong. It has since spread throughout Christendom.

In many countries, Christmas lights, as well as other Christmas decorations, are traditionally erected on or around the first day of Advent. In the Western Christian world, the two traditional days when Christmas lights are removed are Twelfth Night and Candlemas, the latter of which ends the Christmas-Epiphany season in some denominations. Taking down Christmas decorations before Twelfth Night, as well as leaving the decorations up beyond Candlemas is historically considered to be inauspicious.

The Christmas tree was first recorded to be used by the Lutheran Christians in the 16th century, with records indicating that a Christmas tree was placed in the Cathedral of Strasbourg in 1539, under the leadership of the Protestant Reformer, Martin Bucer. In homes, "German Lutherans brought the decorated Christmas tree with them; the Moravians put lighted candles on those trees.» These candles symbolized Jesus as the Light of the World.

The Christmas tree was adopted in upper-class homes in 18th-century Germany, where it was occasionally decorated with candles, which at the time was a comparatively expensive light source. Candles for the tree were glued with melted wax to a tree branch or attached by pins. Around 1890, candleholders were first used for Christmas candles. Between 1902 and 1914, small lanterns and glass balls to hold the candles started to be used. Early electric Christmas lights were introduced with elec-

trification, beginning in the 1880s. The illuminated Christmas tree became established in the UK during Queen Victoria's reign, and through emigration spread to North America and Australia. In her journal for Christmas Eve 1832, the 13-year-old princess wrote, «After dinner... we then went into the drawing-room near the dining-room. There were two large round tables on which were placed two trees hung with lights and sugar ornaments. All the presents being placed round the trees». Until the availability of inexpensive electrical power

in the early 20th century, miniature candles were commonly (and in some cultures still are) used.

The first known electrically illuminated Christmas tree in the United States was the creation of Edward H. Johnson, an associate of inventor Thomas Edison. While he was vice president of the Edison Electric Light Company, a predecessor of today's Con Edison electric utility, he had Christmas tree light bulbs especially made for him. He proudly displayed his Christmas tree, which was hand-wired with 80 red, white and blue electric incandescent light bulbs the size of walnuts, on December 22, 1882, at his home on Fifth Avenue in New York City.

Local newspapers ignored the story, seeing it as a publicity stunt. However, it was published by a Detroit newspaper reporter, and Johnson has become widely regarded as the Father of Electric Christmas Tree Lights. By 1900, businesses started stringing up Christmas lights behind their windows. Christmas lights were too expensive for the average person; as such, electric Christmas lights did not become the majority replacement for candles until 1930.

In 1895, US President Grover Cleveland sponsored the first electrically lit Christmas tree in the White House. It featured over a hundred multicolored lights. The first commercially produced Christmas tree lamps were manufactured in strings of multiples of eight sockets by the General Electric Co. of Harrison, New Jersey. Each socket accepted a miniature two-candela carbon-filament lamp.

The first recorded uses of Christmas lights on outdoor trees occurred in San Diego in 1904; Appleton, Wisconsin, in 1909; and New York City in 1912. McAdenville, North Carolina, claims to have been the first in 1956. The Library of Congress credits the town for inventing «the tradition of decorating evergreen trees with Christmas lights dates back to 1956 when the McAdenville Menss Club conceived of the idea of decorating a few trees around the McAdenville Community Center.»



# **Candles On the Tree**

However, the Rockefeller Center Christmas Tree has had «lights» since 1931, but did not have real electric lights until 1956. Furthermore, Philadelphia>s Christmas Light Show and Disneys Christmas Tree also began in 1956.

In Canada, archival photos taken in 1956 around suburban Toronto capture several instances of outdoor evergreens illuminated with Christmas lights. Though General Electric sponsored community lighting competitions during the 1920s, it would take until the mid-1950s for the use of such lights to be adopted by average households.

\*The best lights I have seen are at the corner of Whitecap & Isabella on The Island.

Dotson's Other Note: Christmas lights found use in places other than Christmas trees. By 1919, city electrician John Malpiede began decorating the new Civic Center Park in Denver, Colorado, eventually expanding the display to the park's Greek Amphitheater and later to the adjacent new Denver City and County Building - City Hall upon its completion in 1932. Soon, strings of lights adorned mantles and doorways inside homes, and ran along the rafters, roof lines, and porch railings of homes and businesses. In recent times, many city skyscrapers are decorated with long mostly-vertical strings of a common theme, and are activated simultaneously in Grand Illumination ceremonies. # Stuff I Heard on the Island

In the sixteen years since I took over publication of the Island Moon I can't remember a more eventful year on our Island than 2023.

The pace of change has picked up since 2018 when ownership of huge chunks of Island land changed hands after the demise of the old Schlitterbahn waterpark and the new owners have undertaken the two near billion-dollar projects that 2023 saw moving forward. As we look back through the clearness of history a few years down the road I believe 2023 will be seen as a pivotal year on The Island as the new Don Patricio Bridge became a reality and will lead to the connection of Island canals making our Island much more accessible by boat for both residents and visitors moving us in the direction of a resort destination that has been on the drawing board for thirty years.

### 2024

As things now stand by the end of 2024 work will be well underway or complete on a dry stack boat storage facility next to the Don Patricio Bridge and an accompanying marina as well as a new colony of model homes at the Whitecap North Padre Island site. As 2023 comes to a close the infrastructure at the site is being installed and work on the bulkheads is nearing comple-

Early 2024 plans call for a detour of Commodores Drive to be cut through the Whitecap NPI site to allow for the start of construction of a water exchange bridge that will connect the dead-end canal north of Commodores Drive to the Whitecap NPI site. That waterway will complete the circuit of canals that will be a gamechanger that will move us toward being the Venice of the Texas Coast.

### Island Mobility Plan

2024 should also see the completion of the Island Mobility Plan that has been moving through the Island Strategic Action Committee with the help of the staff at the City of Corpus Christi. The plan was stalled for years without the connectivity provided by the Don Patricio Bridge but now the task is to connect the west side of The Island to the bridge through the cart paths that are part of the new bridge and on to Lake Padre and the gulf beaches. There is about \$11 million in state money available to build cart and pedestrian paths along the SPID corridor and the private property owners at Whitecap NPI and Lake Padre have developed plans that will include cart and pedestrian bridges over canals that will complete the circuit. Once the plan is finished, which should be done by the end of 2024, things will move quickly as funding for completion of most of the comprehensive plan is already in place. Over the next few years there is nothing that will change our Island more than the implementation of the Island Mobility Plan because it will take much of the current cart and pedestrian traffic off Island streets and direct it along the miles of cart and pedestrian paths that are included in the plan.

# A reason to be optimistic

I know that over the past decade or so there has reason to be pessimistic about the completion of new development on our Island since historically things have tended to move forward in starts and stops; mostly stops. But as stated above I believe the completion of the Don Patricio Bridge is the watershed we have been waiting for. I think the old days when long-time Islanders, jaundiced by decades of inactivity, not so jokingly suggested that that the Island slogan should be Coming Soon are behind

Longtime Islanders may lament the changes as they miss the more bucolic times but sooner or later all the vacant land on our Island was going to be filled with something and I think what we are seeing coming in gives us reason to be optimistic. Our challenge going forward is managing change and after all of these years of anticipating it we are in a good position vis a vis the private partners and the city planning staff for dealing with what is coming

I believe 2024 will be a good year for our Island.

# A little Island history

# North Beach in 1941 It was what Padre Island is today

In 1941 North Beach was alive with activity. It was the amusement center and playground of the city. There was a saltwater swimming pool next to the Ferris wheel and amusement park and that is where most people swam in Corpus Christi Bay.

The seawall was not yet finished and what fishing party boats there were based on the south end of North Beach near the Bascule Draw Bridge leading into the port. They were tied up to the jetty that now houses the Lexington aircraft carrier. There were a few shrimp boats but not many, mostly hand operated and they kept only white shrimp that sold for about 30 cents per pound. There was a theatre and three or four large dance halls that filled up on Saturday night. There were some curio shops near the bridge and some bars that sold beer nearby.

Nelson fish market was located near the bridge near the causeway to Portland and a bunch of fishing shacks were on the northwest side of North Beach abutting Nueces Bay. The mosquitos were thick and big as horse flies. About nightfall they rose in swarms, especially during the rainy season. There was a steady stream of Japanese ships in and out of the port hauling oil and scrap iron back to Japan. Other ships hauled a lot of cotton and grain to other nations of the world which provided a lot of work for everybody at the port. A lot of fisherman fished from the jetties catching mostly hard head catfish and a few Sheepshead. A lot of

trout were caught in the winter months near the end of the jetties by the ship channel. In 1941 North Beach was what Padre Island is today, a thriving tourist oriented paradise. The Eden of Texas and still growing for what holds for the future.

North Beach was also a deadly place to be in the event of a hurricane. Back in those days you never knew if a hurricane was coming unless it was reported by a ship in the Gulf of Mexico. The 1919 hurricane drowned nearly everybody on North Beach just a few feet above sea level. I have often wondered why back in those days and even today why the mayor and the city council did not promote and urge fill dirt to be hauled into North Beach on all of the vacant or city owned land. There was an elementary school located about the middle of North Beach and the high school was above the Bluff on Tancahua Street. It was called Northside, one block from Carancahua Street. After the Naval Air Station was finished in 1942 North Beach was alive with sailors with their bell bottom trousers and coats of Navy blue. They, the sailors, brought new life into North Beach as the teenie boppers swooned over them. A few years later a hurricane hit North Bach again and wiped out all of the amusement center and a lot of the property which pretty much ended the heydays of that era. All new buildings were put on stilts and or elevated by fill. Forgot to mention, the teenies were also called Bobby Sockers.

What the future holds for North Beach is yet to be determined, hopefully it will not be funded with tax money.

# \$4 million for Briscoe King Pavilion





The Board of Directors of the Island Tax Increment Redevelopment Zone #2 approved \$4 million in funds for a revitalization of Briscoe King Pavilion in 2023 and the Nueces County Coastal Parks Board approved the first draft of a plan. The design may change as the project moves along but the drawings released this week call for an entirely new building to be constructed adjacent to the existing Briscoe

King Pavilion and most importantly for Island the new building includes a meeting space that would accommodate 300 people with tables and additional people with the tables removed. The plans also call for an air-conditioned catering kitchen in the existing building, a bride room for weddings, and would repurpose the remainder of the existing building.



given year.

This caused flooding in dozens of existing Island homes which had never experience flooding as the elevation of lots in new neighboring houses was raised to meet the new requirements sending rainwater onto the adjacent lots. Currently the city Unified Development Code calls for any new homes to provide an engineer-stamped plan for a drainage to prevent water from running onto adjacent lots before receiving a building permit. The city rules call for runoff from Island lots to sheet drain either to the street for dry lots, or into the adjoining canal for

The report presented to the ISAC board at its November meeting by members of the subcommittee, ISAC board members Bob Corbett (Chairman), Marvin Jones, Roy Coons, and Mike Pittman, recommends a change to the city Unified Development Code that would change the way lots under new homes handle drainage.

Under building methods adopted after implementation of the new FEMA flood map the common practice was to simply use sand to raise the elevation of the entire lot. With a setback distance of five feet between houses this left an angle of descent between the new, higher, lot and older lot of 30 to 40 degrees which was the root cause of the flooding. The new rules are expected to be put in place by the end of 2024.



# Permit filed for five-story development at Whitecap-Park Road 22 Corner Residential, retail, office space, two restaurants, roof-top pool



By Dale Rankin In August, 2023, Axys Capital Credit Fund which owns the land on the southwest corner of the intersection of Whitecap Boulevard and Park Road 22 filed an application for a permit with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers for an 11.5 acre project at the site that consists of a five-story development, including one, two, three, and four-bedroom units with ground floor retail and office components, and a rooftop pool, restaurant, bar, amenity desk, commercial pad sites. In total, the project includes 245 residential units, 27,802-square-foot of commercial space, 15,645-square-feet of office space, 2,635-square-feet of storage, two restaurant pad sites totaling

11,148-square-foot, parking facilities for 690 vehicles, and various other common areas and amenities.

The plan would fill approximately 8.8 acres of wetlands at the site which according to the submission would be mitigated with 21.4 acres of land owned by Nueces County but located in Kleberg County. The proposed site was turned into man-made wetlands after the area was excavated for fill sand to repair damage to 1100 feet of bulkheads along Cruiser Street caused by Hurricane Allen in 1980.

As 2023 comes to a close no word on when the plan might be put into effect have been announced.

# Franco Harris Football Blocker & Running Back

Dotson's Note: Franco Harris was born in Fort Dix, New Jersey. His father, Cad Harris, a Black soldier, served in World War II and was stationed in Italy during the war. His mother, Gina Parenti Harris, was a native Italian and became a «war bride", who moved with her husband when he returned to the United States after the end of the war. Thanks to Bill Morgan for the facts and photos contained in this report.



Franco Harris graduated from Rancocas Valley Regional High School in Mount Holly Township, New Jersey, in 1968. He then attended Penn State University, where he played on the Nittany Lions football team. Although he was primarily a blocker for the running back during his first year at Penn State, he amassed a career total of 2,002 yards rushing with 24 touchdowns and averaged over 5 yards per carry, while also catching 28 passes for 352 yards and another touchdown. He led the team in scoring in 1970.

Harris's statistics during his final three seasons at Penn State: 1969: 115 carries for 643 yards and 10 touchdowns, 12 catches for 189 yards; 1970: 142 carries for 675 yards and 8 touchdowns, 6 catches for 66 yards 1971: 123 carries for 684 yards and 6 touchdowns; 10 catches for 97 yards and 1 touchdown.

He was selected 13th overall in the first round of the 1972 NFL Draft by the Pittsburgh Steelers despite assistant personnel director Bill Nunn and head coach Chuck Noll preferring Robert Newhouse. In his first season with the Steelers (1972), Harris was named the NFL Rookie of the Year by *The Sporting News* and NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year by the Associated Press. In that season he gained 1,055 yards on 188 carries, with a 5.6 yards per carry average. He also rushed for 10 touchdowns and caught one touchdown pass. He was popular with Pittsburgh's large Italian-American population: his fans, including "Brigadier General" Frank Sinatra, dubbed themselves "Franco's Italian Army" and wore army helmets with his number on




During his rookie season, Harris was a key player in one of professional football's most famous plays, dubbed the "Immaculate Reception" by Pittsburgh sportscaster Myron Cope. In the first round of the playoffs, the Oakland Raiders were leading the Steelers 7–6 with 22 seconds to play when a Terry Bradshaw pass was deflected away from intended receiver John "Frenchy" Fuqua as defender Jack Tatum arrived to tackle him. Harris snatched the ball just before it hit the ground and ran it into the endzone, resulting in the Steelers> first playoff win.

Harris was chosen for nine consecutive Pro Bowls (1972–1980), and was All-Pro in 1977. Harris rushed for more than 1,000 yards in eight seasons, breaking a record set by Jim Brown. The running back tandem of Harris and Rocky Bleier combined with a strong defense to win four Super Bowls following the 1974, 1975, 1978, and 1979 seasons. On January 12, 1975, he was the Most Valuable Player of Super Bowl IX; in that game he rushed for 158 yards and a touchdown on 34 carries for a 16-6 win over the Minnesota Vikings. Harris was the first African American as well as the first Italian-American to be named Super Bowl MVP. Harris was a major contributor for the Steelers in all of their first four Super Bowl wins. His Super Bowl career totals of 101 carries for 354 yards are records and his

four career rushing touchdowns are tied for

the second-most in Super Bowl history.


Harris claimed that he extended his career and thus his contribution to the team's objectives (including four Super Bowl victories) by avoiding unnecessary contact.

With the retirement of O. J. Simpson after the 1979 season, Harris became the career rushing leader among active players. Following the 1983 season, Harris and Walter Payton were both closing in on Jim Browns NFL rushing record, and Harris asked the Rooney family for a pay raise. Believing that Harris was on the downside of his career, they refused and Harris threatened to hold out. The Steelers released him during training camp in 1984 and he then signed with the Seattle Seahawks during the 1984 season. He played just eight games with the team, gaining only 170 yards before retiring (192 yards short of Jim Brown's record).

In his 13 professional seasons, Harris gained 12,120 yards (then 3rd all-time) on 2,949 carries, a 4.1 yards per carry average, and scored 91 rushing touchdowns (then also 3rd). He caught 307 passes for 2,287 yards, a 7.4 yards per reception average, and nine receiving touchdowns. Harris's 12,120 career rushing yards rank him 12th all-time in the NFL, while his 91 career rushing touchdowns rank him 10th all-time tied with Jerome Bettis.

Dotson's Other Note: Harris died in his sleep at his home in Sewickley. Pennsylvania, on December 20, 2022, at age 72, three days before the 50th anniversary of the "Immaculate Reception". Harris's death was considered sudden, as he had been active on social media just days before his death and had spoken to visitors at the Heinz History Center the day before his death including a live interview with KD-KA-TV from the Heinz History Center. He was set to attend a ceremony at halftime during a Steelers game against the Las Vegas Raiders on December 24, 2022, to retire his jersey number. Hours before his death, Harris recorded an interview with Steelers defensive end Cameron Heyward for his podcast in what would be his last public interview, during which he ironically commented about how he was «feeling good» and happy to have made it to the 50th anniversary of the «Immaculate Reception». His cause of death was later ruled as natural causes. Immediately after his death, many gave public tributes. Terry Bradshaw, who had found out about Harris's death from his wife after seeing a text message from Mel Blount, had just seen Harris two weeks prior, filming material related to the Immaculate Reception's anniversary and was in a "state of shock".



# Gridiron Nicknames

As Super Bowl LVIII gets closer everyday, I can't help but think of all the nicknames of some of the greatest football players of all-time. Nicknames are considered a right of passage in the NFL. You must earn your nickname. Even if they are funny, they are said with respect. Nicknames place players at a higher level of affection. Sometimes if you achieve greatness, your nickname may last forever. The good teams and most extraordinary players all have nicknames. Here are a few of the nicknames I read about in the newspapers as a young boy, before football was televised: Bears' linebacker, Clyde "Bulldog" Turner was tough against the run. Chicago's Harold "Red" Grange was known as "The Galloping Ghost" and received his nickname because no one could catch him. Chicago Bears' fullback, "Bronko" Nagurski was a man among boys. Washington's quarterback was called "Slingin" Sammy Baugh because of his ability to throw accurate passes downfield. Rams' Elroy "Crazylegs" Hirsch had an unusual running style, and Lions' cornerback, Dick "Night Train" Lane, received his nickname because of his fear of flying. Lane rode a night train to all away games, as the rest of his team flew.

The stories that are attached to the nicknames are also fun and worth telling. Here are a few you may have never heard of. Cincinnati Bengals' quarterback, Kenny Anderson, was called "Candlelight" said wide receiver, Chris Collinsworth, "Because when he received one blow, he was out." Rams quarterback, Pat Haden, was called "Rhodes" by his teammates as in Rhodes Scholar, because he knew the answer to everything. Pittsburgh Steelers' running back, Rocky Bleier, was referred to as "Prune Juice" because he was slow and steady. Green Bay running back Paul Hornung was called "The Golden Boy" by the press but was known as "Goat Shoulders" to his teammates, because of his build. One of Hornung's teammates, Ray Nitschski, was called "The Judge" because he sat on the bench so long at the beginning of his career that he said he felt like a judge. Wes Welker received his nickname "Slot Machine" for his ability to line up in the slot and catch passes. My pal linebacker, Shane Nelson, of the Buffalo Bills was called "Dr. No" as in no hole, no gain. Robstown's very own Gene Upshaw was nicknamed "Highway 63" by his teammates. Upshaw wore the #63 and had no problems creating a lane for the Raiders' running backs. Rams' tackle, Merlin Olsen, was called "Muley" by his teammates because he was raised on a farm and was stubborn. The media referred to Rams' David Jones as "The Deacon," but he was also called "Swamp Boy," by his teammates. The grace and running style of Lance Alworth earned him the title of

What Houston Oilers' fan can forget wide receiver Billy "White Shoes" Johnson and of course, Oakland's Dave "The Ghost" Casper. Chicago Bears' "Iron Mike" Ditka, Cowboys' "Bullet Bob" Hayes, and Baltimore Colts' Lenny "Spats" Moore are some of my all-time favorites. I also loved Denver defensive end, Rich "Tombstone"

Gayle Sayers played at the University of Kansas and became known as the "Kansas Comet" for his speed. Eugene "Mercury" Morris terrified defenses from the Miami Dolphins' backfield for many years, while Cowboys' Daryl "Moose" Johnston led the way for "Touchdown" Tony Dorsett. Another Chicago Bear running back that wowed everyone was known as "Sweetness." Walter Payton would earn this nickname because of his slick running style and flamboyant personality. The 49er's Joe "The Jet" Perry was well known, as was Alan "The Horse" Ameche of the Colts.

Houston Oiler's Earl Campbell would carry the name of his hometown in his nickname as he was referred to as "The Tyler Rose." The Miami's backfield duo of Larry Csonka and Jim Kiick were known as "Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid." "The Diesel," known as John Riggins of the Washington Redskins, was fun to watch. The "A-Train," Mike Alstott of the Tampa Bay Bucs, was as hard to bring down as a freight train. L.A. Ram's linebacker, Jack "Hacksaw" Reynolds, got his nickname by cutting a 1953 Chevy in half with a hacksaw after a loss. Ted "Mad Stork" Hendricks received his nickname because of his unusual height, 6'7", as a linebacker for the Steelers, and the king of linebackers may very well have been New York Giant's "L.T.," otherwise named Lawrence Taylor. Cowboys Cliff Harris was called "Captain Crash" because he ran into everyone on his team or theirs and Charlie Waters nicknamed Dallas cornerback Aaron Mitchell. "A.M. P.M." "If he hit you in the morning, you didn't wake up until the afternoon," said Waters. Oakland's defensive back. Jack Tatum, carried the moniker of "The Assassin" because of his brutality while tacking a ball carrier. Defensive tackle, Randy White, played for the Dallas Cowboys and became known as the "Manster," (Half Man, Half Monster). "Mean Joe" Greene may have the most recognized nickname, thanks to a Coke commercial. William "Refrigerator" Perry not only played tackle for the Chicago Bears, but also ran a few touchdowns in near the goal line. Cowboys offensive tackle, Flozell "The Hotel" Adams was 6'7" and weighed 340 pounds, or about the same amount as a small hotel. Baltimore Colts' tackle, Art Donavan, was simply called "Fatso" because of his large frame, and the nickname for his teammate, "Big Daddy" Gene Lipscomb, speaks for itself. Linebacker "Chuck" Bednarik of the Eagles was called "Concrete Charlie" because of his hard hits. Don't forget Alex Karras who was nicknamed the "Mad Duck" because of his short legs. Deion "Prime Time" Sanders of the Cowboys had the ability to come up with a big play when needed. Making big plays from the wide receiver position was what he did best and Michael Irvin of the Dallas Cowboys would be referred to as the "Playmaker."


"Broadway Joe" was none other than Joe Namath, who quarterbacked the New York Jets to the AFC's first Super Bowl win. "Joe Cool" described S.F. 49ers Quarterback, Joe Montana, who had no problem staying cool under pressure. Ken "The Snake" Stabler was a fine quarterback and hard to sack for the Oakland Raiders and "Captain Comeback" was given to Dallas quarterback, Roger Staubach for his ability to make good things happen at the end of

Some of the more recent nicknames that have retired include "TB12" for quarterback Tom Brady of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. Of course Pittsburgh quarterback, Ben Roethlisberger, was called simply "Big Ben." And last but not least, we had "Gronk," a shorter version of his real name, Rob Gron-

# TPWD Seeks Input on Proposed Changes to Spotted Seatrout Bag, Size Limits



The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) is seeks public input on proposed rules which, if passed, would change bag and size limits for spotted seatrout on the Texas coast. The proposed rules would reduce the spotted seatrout bag limit to three fish and restrict the allowable size to 15-20 inches, with one fish over 25 inches allowed

The rule responds to public scoping and survey efforts by the department which found that many anglers wanted to see more restrictive measures to improve the fishery. TPWD encourages the public to provide comment on the proposed regulation changes at one of several public hearings hosted on the coast, virtually or over the phone. The proposals will then be considered for final action by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission during the January 2024 Com-

mission Meeting. Opportunities to provide comments for or against these proposals include:





We are smashing trout limits on soft plastics every day! This was two back to back sow trout our good luck charm brought to hand this week along the King Ranch Shoreline.

We are sending out and welcoming in 2023&2024 with some excellent fishing! Gamefish numbers are steady in our area. The Laguna Madre and Baffin Bay are blessed to be an ecosystem that has both a resident population of fish as well as being a system that gets influx from the other areas of the Texas Coast. This is why we bounced back so quickly after the big freeze a few years back, trout came in from the upper coast. This is great news for us but in other parts of Texas there is a great absence of gamefish. Looking ahead into 2024 there will be some new trout regulation changes There are pretty solid accounts of the new rules being 3 trout total between 15-20" with one trout over 25" a day to count towards the limit. This is all a result of the massive strain on the trout populations with the freeze and fishing pressure. It's a lot of politics that come down to a balance between harvest and Mother Nature.

We have been experiencing some great 50-100 fish days with east limits of a lot trout. Our bigger fish are coming on our days when we have only three anglers and are able to fish shallow water. With four or five rods casting and lures hitting the water larger mature fish hear the cast as we near them. We are quickly approaching the coldest time of year. This is also a time when the bay waters flip in temperatures and the deeper water will not always be the warmest. Cold water will work its way down to the deep pockets and in these sunny days the shallows warm up in the sun. Bait and gamefish will move towards the edges of shallow flats and find the spots where warm water flows off into the transition zones. Anglers should look for soft muddy bottoms when it's cold and sandy pot holes in 4' of water when it's warm.

WEATHER CONTINUES TO BE GREAT!! Crowds are down and the fishing is good with lots of trout action along the King Ranch Shoreline in 3-4' of water. The Boat Hole area on the North side of the JFK Causeway is great for redfish on live shrimp and popping corks drift fishing around the small islands. Fisherman using dead and live shrimp along the ICW Canal have been

finding good catches of drum and redfish with some trout to mix. If you really want to boost your fishing this year make it easy to go, come slide your boat into a lift at MARKER 37 Marina! All you have to do is roll up and climb in the boat and lower it into the water. The marina has everything from gas to bait and everything in between You can forget about trailering likes at the ramp and traffic. Live shrimp is hard to come by this time of year but just take a look over the rail as you go over the bridge and you should be able to see that white shrimp flag flying when we have bait.

# Symbiotic Relationships of Birds

When we think of different species interacting in nature, we might tend to think of predators and prey. But there are many other connections in our ecosystems that go beyond that. As organisms evolve in close proximity to each other over time, they can form close relationships that benefit one or more parties; this is called symbiosis. There are three major types of symbiotic relationships. These types are mutualism (where both species benefit), commensalism where one species benefits and the other is heither positively or negatively affected) and parasitism (where one species benefits at the expense of its host). Animals, plants, fungi, bacteria, and viruses can all have symbiotic relationships with each other. Let's explore the ways that birds exhibit each of the three basic types of symbiotic relationships. What does a crocodile that's not afraid of the dentist, and a bird that's not afraid of a crocodile have in common? A mutualistic relationship! In possibly one of the most daring displays of symbiosis, the Egyptian Plover can be spotted in the mouth of a Nile Crocodile, pecking at its teeth. The secret to this stunt is that the Egyptian plover picks out meat that has been stuck in the carnivorous crocodile's teeth. This provides food for the plover, and a much-needed dental cleaning for the crocodile. After all, who would turn down a free trip to the dentist? This mutualistic behavior benefits both

Commensalism can be found in neotropical forests in Central and South America as army ants storm the forest floor. Nearby small invertebrates flee the approaching

swarm. This gives several species of antbird, an ant-following specialist, a chance to swoop in and catch the prey being flushed out. Some ant-following flocks rely only somewhat on the ants, doing some hunting on their own, while others rely completely on the insects. The relationship between army ants and ant-following birds is an example of commensalism. This is because the birds benefit with a range of tasty forest meals, whereas the army ants are neither harmed nor benefited. What is the first thing that comes to mind when we think of parasitism? Perhaps external parasites like fleas or ticks, or maybe an internal parasite like roundworms? It may come as a surprise that birds can be parasites too. Brown-headed cowbirds (Molothrus ater) and Common cuckoo birds (Cuculus canorus) are brood

A boord parasite is a bird that lays its eggs in the nests of other bird species. The other bird species, called a host, then raises these eggs and chicks. The brown-headed cowbirds and common cuckoos benefit from this relationship by saving time and energy that would normally be spent on child rearing. The host bird is negatively affected by having its time and energy spent raising another chick rather than being able to dedicate its full care to its own offspring. Birds such as the Egyptian plover, antbirds, and brown-headed cowbirds show us that interspecies relationships can be beneficial or harmful and much more complicated than you might expect!





# New Bridge for Commodores Drive



Commodores Drive were approved in 2023 The bridge design is part of a larger plan to extend the canal which currently dead-ends on the north side of the street under the new bridge and onto the Whitecap North Padre Island site now under construction. Extension of the canal would connect it to the water flow under the new Don Patricio water exchange bridge. The bridge, estimated to cost about \$9 million, would

be paid for with funds from the Island's Tax Increment Refinance Zone #2 (TIRZ #2). Funds for TIRZ #2 are generated from taxes on new development inside the zone's boundaries since 2002. Unlike the Water Exchange Bridge which consists of three arches the Commodores bridge would be of a standard design from the Texas Department of Transportation significantly cutting costs and construction time.

# Paving of "Paper Streets" could begin in 2024

Streets that exist only on paper were to be the retail district

After years of inactivity regarding the paving of what have come to be known as the Paper Street on Padre Island 2024 may be the year they finally get paved.

When City of Corpus Christi officials approved funding from the Island Tax Increment Refinance Zone #2 (TIRZ #2) in mid-2023 buried in the paperwork was a mention of paving long-designed but never finished streets running parallel to SPID between Verdemar Drive south, to State Highway 361 near the Packery Channel Bridge which would provide access to more than 40 undeveloped lots there were intended to be the Island downtown retail district. Due to a wrinkle in the city process for funding new streets those streets have never been built in spite of underground utilities already being in place. Under the city plan new streets are paid for by private developers and eligible for reimbursement from the City Development Fund, however, since the lots along the so-called Paper Streets are each owned separately there is no single, large property owner will to step forward with the original funded needed to build them.

The original design of Island streets what is now called Sand Dollar Street was to run from Verdemar Drive south to State Highway 361 taking some traffic pressure off of the SPID main corridor. Along the way, behind Scuttlebutt's Seafood Bar & and the Pelican Lounge, the Island's original designers planned an area for retail and commercial space. Construction on the utilities for the three streets originally designed to run through the area Sand Dollar Street, Ocotal Drive, Tortugas Avenue, was halted with but not before sewer and water lines, including some fire hydrants, were built with a four-inch gas line installed in March, 2023 and are still in place today awaiting the streets and adjoining development they were designed to serve.

The planned routes for the streets are visible as four-wheel drivers use them as shortcuts, and even the curb cuts where the streets were expected to enter State Highway 361 and Whitecap are in place - exits waiting for streets. The original developers of Padre Island had not finished the three streets before the area was annexed by the City of Corpus Christi which for almost forty years has ignored them.

But with the recent addition of an exit from the Lake Padre development onto State Highway 361 and a new, platted street set to connect the Speedy Stop now under construction next to American Bank to the highway as well the need to pave the streets has taken on a new urgency. The new roadways south of SH 361 mean traffic in

Packery Channel will increase dramatically and the need for the connection between the highway and Verdemar Drive and which under the vote taken by the board of TIRZ #2 on Tuesday can be funded through that funding. Texas Department of Transportation has set aside \$1.5 million for a redesign of the intersection but no design contract has been issued.

Problem dates to Island development The problem began as a solution to previous problem; a lack of park space in the city. Developers in Corpus Christi in the 1960s and 1970s could either pay a Development Fee to the city, or set aside land dedicated for parks. Island developers chose to set aside large chunks of parkland in lieu of paying the fee. The developers also had the option of increasing the amount of dedicated Island park land or building sidewalks and chose that option that was cheaper at the time of dedicating 49 acres of parkland and accounting for the lack of sidewalks along most Island streets. Building sidewalks across private property now would require the use of imminent domain and would be prohibitively expensive.

In other areas of the city funds from the

Development Fee are placed in a non-interest bearing account and used to pay for new streets. As the owners of lots along the new streets developed their property and hooked into the utilities they paid an initiation fee which was used to re-pay the money in the fund from the Development Fee. When the last dollar was gone from the development fund it corresponded with the development of the last vacant lot on the new street. It was a pay-forward system which worked in most areas of the city but without Island developers paying the fee for the past three decades there has been no funding source to establish the account to build the original streets; no funds, no construction of the Paper Streets. There is currently no money in the city Development Fund and city officials are searching for a new system to fund

new infrastructure. 35 years of inattention

There has been an ongoing debate at City Hall, still unresolved, about whether street bonds can be used to build already-platted but unconstructed streets. New streets are routinely built from the planning stages on with street bonds, but, on at least on Padre Island, no bonds have ever been used for Paper Streets. The Aquarius Extension, built with bonds from 2004, was considered an extension of the existing Aquarius Street

rather than a new thoroughfare. But for almost forty years that has not happened and a handful of Island streets remain ruts in the sand, Paper Streets and nothing more, but after Tuesday vote on the use of




