<u> A little South Texas history</u>

Texas Rangers in Mexico City

Editor's note: As our readers know in the past several issues we have been running a series on the Texas Rangers in the Nueces Strip in the late 1870s. Due to an attack on our computer system we are unable to run the next installment of that series in this issue and hope to continue it next week. This week we jump back a few decades to the late 1840s as Texas Rangers entered Mexico City as part of the U.S. Army in the U.S. – Mexico War. Troops of Texas Rangers under

the leadership of legendary Texas



Ranger Colonel Jack Hays fought their way through the streets of Monterrey, Mexico in house to house fighting before being recalled to San Antonio where they reformed, adding more men and arming themselves with two long-barreled six-shot Colt pistols as they landed in Veracruz and began a march to Mexico City. Their accoutrements were few; besides the pistols and a rifle each Ranger carried a knife, a hemp rope or hair lariat, and a raw-



Island obituary

'Eugene (Gene) H. Koch

June 11, 1938 - December 18, 2023



Our home has a sign in the entry saying, "Life is about good friends and great adventures". My husband Gene and I have been fortunate to have both in our lives. Gene was born in San Antonio, Texas in 1938. After becoming an officer in the Navy, he fell in love with the sea. From the early days of our marriage in 1965 Philadelphia, we had dreamed of traveling on a boat. As we were raising our two sons, Gene Ill (Trey) and Scott Patrick, in San Antonio, we were also reading cruising magazines and listening to stories of other people who were living their lives on the

water. When Gene was offered a job in Corpus Christ, Texas, we moved one step closer to our dream as we lived on Padre Island with the Gulf of Mexico at our back door. The Kochs moved to Padre Island in 1982 and were some of the first residents at Commodores Cove. Gene was one of the founders of the Padre Island Yacht Club. He was an early commodore and was involved in the decision to build our club's building. After Trey graduated from college and Scott was well on his way to getting a degree, Gene retired from his job with Frost Bank and in 1994 we got aboard our boat, the Illusion, sailing away from home. Little did we know what we were getting into as we cruised the Gulf of Mexico from South Texas to the Caribbean, and then up the East Coast. On the way we met interesting people and visited large ports and small villages. Each stop had a special charm. For years we cruised from the East Coast to Philadelphia, Chesapeake Bay, the Bahamas, and then back to Texas. Visiting with cousins on the West Coast, we discovered Oregon and Washington and decided to have our boat trucked there.

As we visited new ports, Gene did the navigating and I planned the trips ashore, writing articles for the Padre Island Moon titled

Beyond the JFK. The articles encouraged other Padre Islanders to take short and longterm cruises. We spent seven years on a port in Vancouver Island. Several summers we cruised the Inland Passage to Alaska, not on a cruise ship, but on our own floating home. As our years on the water added up, our family continued to grow. Our son Trey married his wife Lisa, Scott married his wife, and we now have five grandchildren. We did not want to miss the special part of being grandparents, so we decided to move ashore. Our boat was requiring more maintenance and so were we. We chose Ashland, Oregon as our new home port. Gene had much more time to devote to family, friends, and the activities that were always going on. After more than fifteen years, our roots in the Ashland community are deep

forward.

Designers presented the 100% complete plans for the pier to the Nueces County Coastal Parks Board on Monday where it was approved and forwarded to the Nueces County Commissioners Court on Wednesday where it was given final budgeting approval allowing it to move through the bidding process and toward construction. The pilings on the new pier will be made of treated steel filled with concrete and will be surrounded by a protective sleeve made of ultra high molecular weight polyethylene (UHMW) which is designed to extend the life of steel pilings by 15 years, according to designers. The pier surface will consist of five by thirteen-foot wide wooden panels designed to pop off during high wave and water events which sit atop 33-foot long concrete support beams. The railings will be of wood construction at a height of threeand-one-half feet. The plans do not include benches or shade structures, but do include lighting under the pier. The plans call for two sets of public restrooms, one set is to be located in the free area of the pier, a second set behind a gate where a fee is required. It also includes a concession area which will

area of the pier where the structure will be located to be reinforced to allow for the addition of the building without further work. The design on the restaurant structure will move forward on a separate track in so as not to impede progress on the pier structure itself.

The plan approved Tuesday calls for a public space fifty-eight by fifty-eight feet which will eventually be included in the restaurant structure along with the only remaining piece of the former pier currently standing bringing the total restaurant space to 5000 square-feet.

The restaurant

The restaurant building, referred to as a Third Party Concession area in the plans, is estimated to cost \$2.5 million with \$1.5 million remaining from original funding. Commissioners on Wednesday announced that the Port of Corpus Christi has agreed to provide \$250,000 in 2024 and an additional; \$250,000 in 2025. In addition Precinct 4 County Commissioner Brent Chesney and County Judge Connie Scott allocated an additional \$500,000 from county funds provided by the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) to reach the \$2.5 million needed for construction of the restaurant structure. No timeline for design, bids, and construction on the restaurant structure was announced.

Pancho Villa Expedition Part 2

Dotson's Note: Pershing immediately sent the 7th Cavalry (seven troops in two squadrons) south just after midnight on March 18 to begin the pursuit, followed by the 10th Cavalry moving by rail two days later. From March 20 to March 30, as the 11th Cavalry arrived in Columbus by train from Fort Oglethorpe, Georgia, and then forced marched into Mexico, Pershing dispatched four additional "flying columns" through the mountainous territory into the gaps between the original three columns. Persistent winter weather through early April, particularly bitterly cold nights at high altitude, made both pursuit and logistics more difficult. An additional regiment of cavalry and two of infantry were added to the expedition in late April, bringing its total size to 4,800 men. Ultimately more than 10,000 men—virtually every available unit of the Regular Army and additional National Guard troops—were committed to the expedition either in Mexico or its supporting units at Columbus.



Maj. Gen. John Pershing of the National Army Because of disputes with the Carranza administration over the use of the Mexico North Western Railway to supply Pershing's troops, the United States Army employed trucks to convoy supplies to the encampment where the Signal Corps also set up wireless telegraph service from the border to Pershing's headquarters. This was the first use of truck convoys in a U.S. military operation

and provided useful experience for the future World War. During this phase of the campaign Pershing maintained a small mobile headquarters of 30 men using a Dodge touring car for personal transportation, to keep abreast of the moving columns and control their movements, employing aircraft of the 1st Aero Squadron as messengers.

His headquarters advanced as far as the 1st Aero Squadron's field at Satevó, southeast of Chihuahua City, before falling back at the end of April. Villa had a six-day head start on the pursuit, all but ensuring that his forces would suc-

cessfully break up into smaller bands and he would be able to hide in the trackless mountains. Nevertheless, he was nearly caught by the forced marches of the pursuing cavalry columns when he recklessly paused in his retreat to attack a Carrancista garrison. The Battle of Guerrero was fought on March 29, 1916, after a 55-mile night march through the snowy Sierra Madre by Colonel George A. Dodd and 370 men of the 7th Cavalry. 360 Villistas had remained in Guerrero celebrating the victory won over the Carrancista garrison and 160 more were in the next valley in nearby San Ysidro.

Dodd's force was unexpected by the Villista, who hastily dispersed when the U.S. troops appeared on the steep eastern bluffs overlooking the town. Dodd immediately attacked, sending one squadron west around the town to block escape routes and advancing with the other. A planned charge was thwarted when the fatigued horses were unable to attain the proper gait. During a

five-hour pursuit of fleeing Villista elements, over 75 of Villa's men were killed or wounded and he was forced to retreat into the mountains. Only five of the Americans were hurt, none of them fatally. The battle is considered the single most successful engagement of the expedition and possibly the closest Pershing's men came to capturing Villa. After advancing from Namiquipa on March 24 to San Diego del Monte, the 10th Cavalry became isolated from Pershing's headquarters by a fierce snow storm on March 31. A squadron of the 10th marched toward Guerrero after receiving reports of the action there and at midday April 1 a meeting engagement resulted with one of the retreating Villista groups, 150 strong, under Francisco Beltran at a ranch near Agua Caliente. Breaking up into even smaller groups and retreating over a wooded ridge, some of the Villistas attempted to defend themselves behind a stone wall, resulting in what was purported to be the first mounted cavalry charge by U.S. troops since 1898, led by Major Charles Young. The pursuit lasted until darkness and the Buffalo Soldiers killed at least two Villistas left on the field and routed the remainder without loss. The action also was the first time the U.S. Army used plunging fire by machine guns to support an attack. The columns pushed deeper into Mexico, increasing tensions between the United States and the Carranza government. On April 12, 1916, Major Frank Tompkins and Troops K and M, 13th Cavalry, numbering 128 men, were attacked by an estimated 500 Mexican troops as they were leaving the town of Parral, 513 miles into Mexico and almost to the state of Durango, following violent protests by the civilian populace. Tompkins had been personally ordered to avoid a straight-up engagement with de facto government troops to prevent war between the countries and so used a rear guard to keep the Carrancistas at a distance during a retreat to his starting point, the fortified village of Santa Cruz de Villegas. Two Americans were killed in the skirmishing, one was missing from the rear guard, and another six were wounded, while the Carrancista's lost between fourteen and seventy men, according to conflicting accounts.

Military opposition by Carranza forced a halt in further pursuit while diplomatic conversations took place by both nations to avoid war. Only four days earlier, on April 8, Army Chief of Staff General Hugh L. Scott had expressed to Secretary of War Baker that Pershing had virtually accomplished his mission and that it was "not dignified for the United States to be hunting one man in a foreign country". Baker concurred and so advised Wilson, but following the fight at Parral the administration refused to withdraw the expedition, not wanting to be seen as caving in to Mexican pressure during an election year. Instead, on April 21 Pershing ordered the four columns that had converged near Parral to withdraw to San Antonio de Los Arenales. TO BE CONTINUED

Stuff I Heard on the Island

As we often say in these pages the Large Print doth giveth and the small print doth taketh away. As we approach the election season a corollary of that is that it is the items at the top of the ballot that get the most attention while it is the races at the bottom of the ballot that we live with every day. Think of it this way; you are a lot more likely to end up in front of the Justice of the Peace than the President. With that said the races way down there on an upcoming May ballot that few voters will pay attention to could have the most profound impact on Island pocketbooks than any we have ever seen before.

Nueces Appraisal District

For the first time ever some members of the Board of Directors of the Nueces County Appraisal District are going to be elected. There are two boards that run the appraisal district, the Board of Directors currently has eight members appointed by the various taxing entities and primarily makes budget decisions. The second board is the Appraisal Review Board (ARB) and the one most of us are familiar with since it is the one we encounter when we appeal our property values and both boards are undergoing profound changes as a result of new rules that came out of the last session of the legislature.

Let's start with the Board of Directors. That board is going to be changed and will go from the current eight members to nine and while most of those members will still be appointed by the cities in the county and Nueces County Commissioners three will now be elected by the public. Until now that board has not appointed members of the Appraisal Review Board; instead members of the ARB have been appointed by a rotating and random list of District Judges who for the most part appoint ARB members recommended by the staff at the NCAD. But moving forward, at least as things now stand, members of the ARB will be chosen by the board of directors.

That is important because on May 4, barely a month from now, three of the members of the Board of Directors will be elected for the first time and there are a couple of wrinkles here that taxpayers need to know about because they will have a profound impact on our property values going forward.

Two powerful seats

Under the new rules appointees to the ARB must have the approval of two of the three new members of the Board of Directors who will be elected in May. That means that two of the three elected board members will have veto power over any new appointees to the ARB that actually hears cases. Those are two powerful seats.

Second, and this is crucial, the Board of Directors of the district are in charge of running the election for the three new members who are running for three separate seats that are being added to the current board. As you read this there is no requirement that the eleven candidates who have announced for those three seats must file any campaign finance reports. Think about

that. This smells like a power grab. In order to add members to the ARB two members of the Board of Directors who are elected must give their approval and we don't know who is backing them for office with their pocketbook. This is the only election like

As we sit here today Nueces County had to cut \$8 million from its current fiscal budget because of an appeal of property value filed by a local refinery and while the case is on appeal the refinery pays the lower appraised value, which is what led to the current county deficit. If a refinery or any other large taxpayer in Nueces County decides to throw money at the races for the three seats on the Board of Directors in order to get friendly faces there we will never know about it. If those two board votes place equally friendly faces on the ARB that board can hand out low property values to their backers and the only course of action left is through the courts if the Board of Directors decides to go that route. This will shift the tax burden in the county toward residential property owners. The current failure to require candidates to disclose their financial backers changes the game entirely and the Board of Directors has the power to require that they be filed but so far that has not happened and according to a White Paper from the Texas Secretary of State quoted in these pages last week they are not required to; that is up to the board in each appraisal district and so far ours has remained silent on the matter.

Realpolitiks

So where does that leave us as Islanders? In fact it leaves us in a very good position if we take advantage of it. As stated the eleven candidates running for the board are split into three separate races with four candidates in two races and three in the third. The new law requires that the winner in each race get a majority of votes and with those crowded fields there is almost certainly going to be three runoff elections in June. The last countywide May election was in 2022 when only 6412 of 211,321 (3%) registered voters in the county cast ballots and if there is a June runoff election it is quite possible the races for the three seats on the Appraisal District Board of Directors will be the only races on the ballot. If that is the case cut that 6412 number by at least half and all three seats could be decided by 1500 votes. As mentioned we have 8400 registered Island voters and if we all vote for the same three candidates in the three separate races then we would have sway over three seats on the Nueces County Appraisal District Board of Directors and two of them have to approve members of the ARB which hears the appeals of our property values. I like the sound of that.

The realpolitiks of why this system was devised in Austin remain opaque and really don't matter, what matters is that if Island voters pay attention we can fundamentally change the way our property is valued for taxation purposes. Instead of just complaining about how we are taxed on The Island we can actually do something about it.

That's a power grab we can live with.

trained as border fighters and not Army regulars their dress was up to each Ranger. As Hays and two companies rode into Puebla, Mexico Albert Brackett, a lieutenant in the Fourth Regiment of Indiana Volunteers wrote the following description:

They certainly were an odd-looking set of fellows, and it seems to be their aim to dress as outlandishly as possible. Bobtailed coats and "longtailed blues" low and highcrowned hats, some slouched and others Panama, with a sprinkling of black leather caps, constituted their uniforms; and a thorough coating of dust over all, and covering their huge beards gave them a savage appearance. Their horses ranged from little mustangs to large American full-bloods, and were every shad and color. Each man carried a rifle, a pair of pistols, and...two of Colt's revolvers; a hundred of them could discharge a thousand shots in two minutes. And with what precision the Mexican alone can tell. I watched them closely as they went silently by me, and could distinguish no difference between the offices and men. They carried no sabers.

Another member of the Indiana Volunteers, Lt. Colonel Ebenezer Dumont, was also there and wrote the following:

They rode, some sideways, some standing upright, some by the revers flank, some faced to the rear, some on horses, some on asses, some on mustangs and some on mules. Here they came, rag-tag and bobtail, pell-mell, helter skelter. The head of one covered with a slouched hat, that of another with a towering cocked hat, another bareheaded whilst twenty others had caps made of the skins of every variety of wild and tamed beasts...

A nobler set of fellows than these same Texans tetterdemalions never unsheathed a sword in their country's cause or offered up their lives on their country's alter. Young and vigorous, kind, generous, and brave, they have purposely dressed themselves in such a garb, as to prove to the world at a glance that they are neither regulars nor volunteers common, but Texas Rangers-as free and unrestrained as the air they breathe, or the deer in their own native wildwood. Many condemned them on sight, for the world is prone to judge a man by his coat. But by correct deportment and marked propriety during their stay at this place they won rapidly upon the esteem of those who had condemned them in advance. Don't throw rocks

But the Mexican population soon learned the Ranger were not to be trifled with. As they entered Mexico City they drew a crowd and a bystander decided to throw a rock at the Ranger column which knocked the hat of one Ranger to the ground. Retaliation was as instantaneous as the muzzle flash of a Colt pistol and the thrower fell dead. Without a word the Ranger leaned in his saddle and picked up his hat and continued riding. The lesson was slow to sink in and a few blocks later another rock was thrown with the same result. The eyewitnesses reported the only sound to be heard besides the two gunshots was the sound of horses hoofs on pavement and the creak of saddle leather. The Rangers had arrived. A Colonel in the U.S. Army who had seen the Rangers fight around Puebla wrote: Hays men entered the city of the Aztecs and approached the Halls of Montezuma... the subject of universal curiosity. The sides of the streets were lined with spectators of every hue and grade, from a major general of the North American Army to a Mexican beggar. Quietly they moved along. Not a word was spoken. They seemed unconscious that they were the observed of all observers. The trees in their own native forests would have attracted as much of their attention as they seemed to bestow on upon anything around them. They seemed to say "We have seen men, and have been in cities before." They became known as the Los Diablos Tejanos – The Texas Devils – and a correspondent from the New Orleans Picayune wrote:

As the gallant Rangers filed through the streets, covered with mud and dust accumulated on their long journey, it would have done you good to see the Mexicans stare, particularly when they were informed that these were the much dreaded Texans or Tejanos. Dressed as Rangers always are, in anything that comes to hand –some with blankets draped around them, and some in their shirt sleeves – but all well mounted and well armed, they presented a sight never before seen in the streets of Mexico, and the usually noisy leperos (beggars) were as still as death while they were passing. The gallant Jack hays appeared to be the object of peculiar interest, and the better informed class of Mexicans were particularly anxious to have pointed out to them the man whose name has been the terror of their nation for the past twelve years.

That same evening as several of the Rangers were filing into a theatre a thief ran up and stole a valued handkerchief from a Ranger pocket and met the same fate as the earlier rock throwers. Later they dined at the Inn of the National Theater and their waiter studied them carefully before asking from which part of the Estados Unidos they came from.

"Somos Tejanos," we are Texans came the reply. The waiter dropped his tray and ran from the room. As confrontations between the Texans and local citizens became more frequent Colonel Hays was called before General Winfield Scott, the top American commander.

"I have been informed, sir, since the arrival of your command in this city, two Mexicans has been killed. I hold you, sir, responsible for the acts of your men. I will not be disgraced, nor shall the army of my country be, by such outrages. I require you, sir, to say whether my information is correct, and if so, you will render me a satisfactory explanation," Scott said.

To which Colonel Hays responded, "Your information is correct, General, the Texas Rangers are not accustomed to being insulted without resenting it. They did kill two Mexicans as I entered the city, and I, sir, am willing to be held responsible for it." Hays the proceeded to give the General some background on why his men had volunteered for service in Mexico, covering the fall of the Alamo, the massacre of Texas troops at Goliad, and the execution of members of the Mier Expedition by the Mexican army who were forced to draw beans from a jar to determine who would live and who would die — a black bean meant the firing

Learning Without a Brain

You would think it's necessary to have a brain to be able to learn new things. But at least one brainless marine creature has shown scientist otherwise. For the first time, a jellyfish recently revealed its ability to learn from experience. Scientists shared their results of an experimen in which a Caribbean box jellyfish learned to identify and avoid obstacles.

Caribbean box jellyfish are tiny—one of the smallest jellyfish in the world. At barely the size of a blueberry, these cnidarians live among the mangroves of Central America and eat plankton. But they have remarkably sophisticated vision, with 24 eyes that help them maneuve the murky waters around mangrove roots to hunt their tiny crustacean meals. Their nervous system is dispersed throughout their body but they have no brain to process information received from their eyes and other sense organs.

Because these jellies are good navigators, scientists focused on this skill to see if they could apply knowledge from past experience to new challenge. The researchers decorated a round tank with gray and white stripes to mimic the look of mangrove roots. Then the scientist watched a Caribbean box jellyfish swim through the tank for 7.5 minutes. At first, the jellyfish repeatedly bumped into the gray stripes mistaking them for distant roots. But eventually, the jellyfish began avoiding the gray stripes. In fact, by the time the experiment ended it pivoted away from the gray stripes four times more often than it did at the start and it hit the wall half as often. This is known as associative learning, where animals link sensory experiences—in this case, visual and touch—to behaviors. These findings raise questions about what

Women's NCAA Tournament Will Outshine the Men

Dotson's Note: Thanks to Caitlin Clark and other women's star players and programs, NCAA tournament drama this March is decidedly on one end of the gender divide. One tournament is going to feature the NCAA's all-time leading scorer who shoots deep step-back jumpers like Steph Curry. The other tournament's main character will be a 7-foot, 4-inch center who has made one three-pointer in his entire career. One tournament is going to test whether this decade's dominant program can become a dynasty. The other is going to be a roulette wheel of flawed and undependable teams. One tournament is going to have an abundance of attitude, social media personalities and sideline fashion. The other will require a cheat sheet to identify most of the relevant players and coaches. Thanks to Dan Wolken, Bill Morgan and USA Today for the facts and photos contained in this report. Recently, Iowa's Caitlin Clark made official what has long been fait accompli: She's the greatest, most creative, most exciting and most prolific bucket-getter the women's college game has ever seen. And with March fast approaching, her milestone underscored what also should have been obvious. This year, the women's NCAA basketball tournament is going to turn the Madness on its head.



Three years ago, the NCAA took a boatload of criticism, much of it well-deserved, for treating the women's tournament as an afterthought. Now? The men might as well get used to being the opening act. Thanks to Clark and South Carolina, Kim Mulkey and JuJu Watkins, Angel Reese and Paige Bueckers, the star power and drama this March is decidedly on one end of the gender divide. Few events in sports can eclipse the spectacle of a men's Final Four. This year, it's almost certainly going to happen on the very same weekend. What's a more compelling story: Can Dawn Staley lead South Carolina to an unbeaten season, or can Purdue finally beat a No. 15 or No. 16 seed? What's a bigger draw: Watching Clark fill it up from anywhere on the court, or Zach Edey parking himself in front of the rim and seeing how many times he gets fouled? What's more made-for-TV: The garish Mulkey and her reality show of a basketball team trying to go back-to-back, or Dan Hurley and UConn suffocating opponents just like they did last year?

The men's tournament is going to be great. It always is. There will be upsets and dramatic finishes and new stars who emerge, like that little point guard from Kansas State last year. What's his name again? Admit it: It took you a second and maybe a Google search to come up with Markquis Nowell. The beauty of March is that there will be another Nowell type this year and the year after. Especially in this era, when college basketball's regular season appeals to a relatively small number of die-hards compared to what it used to be. The fun is in watching and discovering these teams when put under a totally different kind of pressure. Iowa's Caitlin Clark is transformative, just like

Michael Jordan once was. We learn as we go, and it all feels a little bit random. The college basketball experts will tell you they knew how good Florida Atlantic was last season, but let's be real: When the tournament began, most people who care about college sports couldn't have identified a single player on the roster or named the coach. Suddenly you look up, and it's playing in a Final Four.

That's great theater, and men's college

basketball really needs it. These days, the most-talented players are either playing in college for one year or not at all. Many who stay in college end up changing teams once, even twice. The superstar coaches who spent decades dominating the tournament, like Mike Krzyzewski, Roy Williams, Jim Boeheim and Jay Wright, have either headed to retirement or, in the case of John Calipari and Tom Izzo, aren't the forces of nature they used to be.

It's still a good product; it's just more emotionally disconnected from the average fan. The players are largely unknown and most of the coaches don't inspire strong feelings. Does anyone have a strong feeling, positive or negative, about Jon Scheyer or Tommy Lloyd?

This year, though, the women's tournament is serving up storylines on a silver platter. The friction, the controversy, the dynamism — it's so one-sided, CBS executives have to be a little bit jealous that their billion-dollar investment into NCAA basketball doesn't

even get the biggest stars of March on their

airwayes

Instead, ESPN and ABC will have the privilege of showing the country whether Clark can drag Iowa back to the championship game. And unlike last year, when it felt as if people were just learning about her or watching her for the first time, now she has a fan base, and haters, including former stars like Sheryl Swoopes. Whatever she does in the tournament, good or bad, is going to be talked about and covered this time like LeBron James trying to win his first title in Miami.

Dawn Staley, one of the most celebrated players and personalities in the history of women's basketball, already has two titles at South Carolina. She looked like a nearlock to get No. 3 last year until Clark's 41 points overwhelmed the Gamecocks in the semifinals. Now, South Carolina is again on the unbeaten track at 24-0 and blowing out pretty much everyone. Can it finish the job this time?

Besides Clark, the women's tournament is going to have another virtuoso performer in Watkins, who might be having the best freshman season in the history of the sport for Southern California at nearly 28 points per game.

UConn may have slipped just a bit, Geno Auriemma is title-less since 2016, but there's still a familiarity to seeing the Huskies in big games and a sense of real conflict with historic implications when they play the other superpowers. And then there's LSU, which on paper

should have been a better team this year than last, when the Tigers won a surprise title in Mulkey's second season.

Instead, LSU has had a weird year with Reese missing four games early in the season for unspecified off-court reasons, and a few surprising losses that have raised questions about whether this team came back with the right focus and intensity. Love her or hate her, though, Mulkey usually has her team ready to play in March, and will give us all plenty of sound bites and over-the-top outfits along the way.



Dotson's Other Note: These are all things we can look forward to before the bracket even comes out. Sorry, but the men's tournament this year just can't compete with that. It's been a good, long run of men's March Madness being the big show and the women fighting for scraps of attention. This year, the script is going to flip.

Spring Flow!

This week we received some big spring bull tides with Tuesdays Equinox. Our flow has been predominantly from the north and northwest, mid to late March this normally changes. When we start getting the northeast and southeast winds, we start seeing an influx of tide from the Gulf. This is when we start receiving the flow of tide, bait, and game fish from the south end of our fishery.

Land Cut

The Land Cut is a magical place far far away. It's a special channel that links the southern Laguna Madre with the Upper Lagoon. It is a funnel between two of the best bay systems on the entire coast. When we get our spring push it can be a highway of all things.

I love working the edge of the channel with soft plastics and topwaters, each cast could hook into a redfish, trout, flounder, even tarpon, Jack fish, and snook I've seen here. Monster trout cruise the beach in sight of us, while we try to make precise casts to these tailing giants. There are channel intersections and blow outs along the edge that attract gamefish to this structure. The piers and docks of the cabins are also some obvious but seldom fished target structures. Flounder will be rolling in in April and stay under these docks. The black drum are still in their high point of the spawn and very abundant here in the Land Cut but will be moving into the shallows in April. Anchoring up in the channel and casting to the edge of the channel along the grass is the most popular for most and for good reason. The flow of the channel makes a highway of gamefish. When winds are light one must move up and down the channel in small moves to surprise gamefish that are not moving but stationary.

29 Mar

Baffin Bay

The edges of Baffin Bay have been heating up with our flow of fish from the north the last two months and now from the south. These fabled waters are the destination of many spawning gamefish and bait species. They will move in with these big tides and spread out to all reaches of the back bays. With every warm day and southeast winds we take our steps closer and closer to summer time. I'm ready.

Live shrimp on the bottom along the ICW is an easy and very effective way to land yourself into good fishing. Spots along the channel south of the Whitecap canals where small channels empty into the channel have held all species of gamefish. Live shrimp under popping corks are the best for drifting over the spoil islands along the ICW south of Bird Island, use a 2-3' drop under the cork. There are still some great boat slips ready for you and your family to enjoy this year. Just step out of the car and into your boat and take off. 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Nature Notes

Rain make the flowers grow

It's springtime in Texas, which means it is time for spring flowers! We may not have enjoyed all the thunder and flooding of the past few weeks, but our plants will appreciate the extra water. With much of Texas in a draught the past few years, all this rain will not only help our aquifers but will also help our flowers, trees, and shrubs

Across the state we've already been seeing Indian Paintbrushes. Technically, the species we see is the Texas Indian Paintbrush, which is a member of the Figwort family. Figworts are commonly found in temperate climates, including tropical mountains. Some members of the Figwort family have medicinal uses, but the Texas Indian Paintbrush isn't known to be one of them. The paintbrushes are found in grasslands, open forest clearings, and roadsides.

The Indian Paintbrush is a unique plant called a hemiparasite or root parasite. Its roots grow until it reaches the roots of the surrounding plants, commonly grasses, and then it penetrates the neighboring roots with root tubes to obtain nutrients. Paintbrushes that have roots attached to another plant tend to grow better than one that grows on its own, which makes transplanting paintbrushes difficult. Instead, if you want to grow paintbrushes, plan to pick a dried paintbrush at the end of the season and shake the plant over a piece of paper; fine seeds will come out, which can then spread where you'd like them to grow. The seeds will grow in a variety of soils. If you aren't sure how to collect the seeds, head to your local nursery for advice!

While we don't see them as much here as we do in central Texas, we are starting to see Texas Bluebonnets emerge! The blue-

bonnet, which is actually a collective name for multiple species, is the state flower of Texas, and as most native Texans know, it is easily recognized and enjoyed. Texas Bluebonnets are commonly found along roadsides and in uncultivated pastures. It is a member of the Pea family, and tends to grow in clusters. I remember heading out each year as a child to take a picture in the bluebonnets with my brother. It was a yearly tradition, until we sat in a fire ant pile that was hiding among the flowers! Many garden clubs plant bluebonnets in neighborhood gardens and along highways, making them a highly visible and distinctive flower. In fact, bluebonnets have become a kind of floral trademark for Texas since two of the main bluebonnet species are found growing naturally in Texas and nowhere else. It grows incredibly well in well-drained soils, and in areas that do not receive an overabundance of rainfall. It also grows well in raised flower beds, hanging baskets, and wooden barrels, making it an excellent choice when adding a pop of color to your garden!

There are many other flowers that we see around Texas in the spring, but these two have always been my favorite. I've spent many springs away from Texas, and to me, nothing compares to a Texas spring. The abundance and diversity of flowers, from the paintbrushes and bluebonnets to Mexican Hats, Pinkladies, Bluebells, and Lantana and Verbena, is unique to Texas and a sight we cherish every year. I hope you are able to get out and enjoy the spring weather and flowers, and remember, leave no trace! Take only pictures, and make memories, but leave the flowers behind for others to enjoy.

National Puppy Day BBB Tip: Paws for caution – how to stay safe from online pet scams

As National Puppy Day approaches on March 23, many social media users can expect to see a near-constant stream of puppy pictures and videos to take over their news feeds during the day and adorable advertisements for all kinds of pet products. Many consumers may decide that now is the time to add a new furrppfriend to their family. However, not all sponsored advertisements are legitimate, and the puppy pulling on your heartstrings in need of a new home may not exist. Deciding to bring a new pet into your home

is a complex decision, and many people often spend hours of research to find the right breed for them based on all kinds of characteristics, such as temperament, size, and activity level. Whether finding their perfect pet at a local animal shelter, dog breeder, or online posting, it doesn't take long to form an emotional attachment with their soon-to-be best friend. Unfortunately, scammers are highly practiced in taking advantage of emotions, and online marketplaces are perfect for them to reach a broad audience.

"No matter the scheme, manipulating emotions is one of the hallmarks of a successful scammer," said Heather Massey, vice president of communications and community relations for Better Business Bureau serving the Heart of Texas. "They know the right picture to use, the right words, and the right trends to leverage throughout the year. They are also very attuned to consumer demand and know what dog breeds people are looking for and what they are willing to pay to get one."

Pet scams are among the costliest online purchases consumers report to Better Business Bureau, with many victims losing hundreds or thousands of dollars. Within the first two months of 2024, 33 BBB Scam Tracker reports of online pet scams Texas residents encountered totaled \$35,000 in losses. In most cases, complications arise after the pet's initial purchase while arranging for its delivery through a shipping intermediary. The fraudulent or impersonated shipping company may claim additional fees are required for crates, medications, vaccines, or insurance. Whatever they claim as a reason for the extra cost, they will shift to another the next time the buyer inquires about when they can expect their pet to be delivered. Frustrated with the situation, many consumers who attempt to walk away from the transaction are threatened with pet abandonment.

"Pet scams are one of those situations where two seemingly independent parties – the supposed breeder and shipping company – are actually working together to carry out the scheme," said Massey. "This creates a scenario where each one is pointall the fees. Which serves to only confuse and frustrate the buyer, who is often already emotionally invested in the situation and excited to greet their new puppy." To help prospective pet owners steer clear of online pet scams, BBB recommends:

· Research extensively. Take the time to delve into the background of potential breeders or adoption agencies. Ask how delivery is handled before purchasing the pet, and research the reputation of the breeder's shipping company. Use resources like the

Better Business Bureau (BBB) to check for complaints or negative feedback. Look for breeders with a solid reputation and a history of ethical practices. · Verify credentials. Don't be afraid to ask for documentation proving the seller's legit-

imacy. This includes licenses, certifications, and affiliations with reputable organizations such as kennel clubs or breed associations. Check with regulatory and licensing agencies for the state the breeder is in to see what requirements are in effect, such as the Texas Department of Licensing and Regulation. Verify this information independently to ensure it's not fabricated.

· Trust your instincts. Your intuition can be a powerful tool in identifying potential scams. If something feels off or too good to be true, don't ignore those feelings. Avoid any transaction that raises red flags, even if the seller seems persistent or persuasive.

· Insist on video calls. In today's digital age. video calls offer a valuable opportunity to assess a seller's legitimacy and the puppy's well-being. Request a live video call to see the puppy in real time and observe its behavior and surroundings. Legitimate sellers will be transparent and accommodating in providing this reassurance.

· Get everything in writing. Prevent being caught off-guard by undisclosed fees by ensuring the whole process, from the point of sale to the animal being delivered to your home, is included in a written contract. This should include information about the shipping company, expected pickup date, delivery date, and clauses for extenuating

circumstances. · Use protected payment methods. Be wary of any online seller that insists on payment through unprotected methods, such as gift cards or wire transfers. If using a peer-topeer payment app, take the time to understand what protection policies the platform has in place to prevent misuse by scammers Avoid sending money to anyone through these systems that require you to take specific steps to bypass protection policies. If you have been the target of a pet scam, report your experience to BBB.org/Scam-Tracker. The information you provide may prevent another person from falling victim to these impactful schemes.
