# A new way to set Taxable Property Values in Nueces County

New state rules shake up Appraisal District Board

By Dale Rankin In the 2nd called Special Session of the 88th Legislature lawmakers passed an \$18.1 billion property tax cut that was placed on the November, 2023 ballot as Proposition 4 which passed by 84% of the voters. A little noticed item included in the new bill calls for the election of three new members to

the Nueces County Appraisal District (NCAD) Board of Directors to be placed on the ballot of the special election on Saturday, May 4 that will change the makeup of the board and ultimately the way taxable property values are set across the county.

The addition of the three new elected seats is part of a sweeping statewide shake up appraisal district boards in the 50 Texas counties above 75,000 in population that will change the number of seats on the county boards as well as how they are chosen bringing fundamental changes to the way property tax values are

# Spring Break 2024...so far

Attendance for the first week of Spring Break 2024 was tamped down by cool temperatures, especially along Island beaches where water temperatures in the low 60s kept spring breakers a bit on the chilly side. But police officers stayed busy taking up semi-permanent residence along the JFK Causeway and South Padre Island Drive. According to police reports a total of 470 traffic stops were conducted, 302 on the JFK Causeway alone, and 11 noise complaints were ticketed, with the majority of those east of the SPID corridor.

With one week of Spring Break 2024 still to go here is a look at the Noise Ordinance for the City of Corpus Christi.

(Ord. No. 027440, § 1, 10-9-2007) (a) The following acts, among others not hereinafter enumerated, are declared to be "noise nuisances," and are unlawful and in violation of the provisions of this chapter when such acts are done or accomplished or carried on in such a manner, or with such volume, intensity, or with continued duration, so as to annoy, to distress, or to disturb the quiet, comfort, or repose of a person of reasonable nervous sensibilities, within the vicinity or hearing thereof, or so as to endanger or in-

jure the safety or health of humans

## Pancho Villa Expedition Part 1



Dotson's Note: The Pancho Villa Expedition, now known officially in the United States as the Mexican Expedition, but originally referred to as the "Punitive Expedition, U.S. Army," was a military operation conducted by the United States Army against the paramilitary forces of Mexican revolutionary Francisco "Pancho" Villa from March 14, 1916, to February 7, 1917, during the Mexican Revolution of 1910–1920. Thanks to Mrs. Golvia E. Lewis, The First Cavalry Division, and Wikipedia, for the facts and photos contained in this report.

The expedition was launched in retaliation for Villa's attack on the town of Columbus, New Mexico, and was the most remembered event of the Mexican Border War. The declared objective of the expedition by the Wilson administration was the capture of Villa. Despite locating and defeating the main body of Villa's command who were responsible for the Columbus raid, U.S. forces were unable to achieve Wilson's stated main objective of preventing Villa's escape.

The active search for Villa ended after a month in the field when troops sent by Venustiano Carranza, the head of the Constitutionalist faction of the revolution and then head of the Mexican government, resisted the U.S. incursion. The Constitutionalist forces used arms at the town of Parral to resist passage of a U.S. Army column. The U.S. mission was changed to prevent further attacks on it by Mexican troops and to plan for the possibility of war. When war was averted diplomatically, the expedition remained in Mexico until February 1917 to encourage Carranza's government to pursue Villa and prevent further raids across the

Trouble between the United States and Pancho Villa had been growing since October 1915, when the United States government officially recognized Villa's rival and former ally Venustiano Carranza as head of the government of Mexico. The U.S. also provided rail transportation through the United States, from Eagle Pass, Texas, to Douglas, Arizona, to move more than 5,000 Carrancista forces to fight Villa at the Battle of Agua Prieta; Villa's seasoned *División del Norte* was smashed. Feeling betrayed, Villa began attacking U.S. nationals and their property in northern Mexico. On November 26,

1915, Villa sent a force to attack the city of Nogales and in the course of the ensuing battle, engaged with American forces before withdrawing.

On January 11, 1916, sixteen American employees of the American Smelting and Refining Company were removed from a train near Santa Isabel, Chihuahua, and summarily stripped and executed. Brigadier General John J. Pershing, commanding the district headquartered at Fort Bliss, Texas, received information that Villa with a new force was on the border and about to make an attack that would force the United States to intervene, embarrassing the Carranza government. Raids were so commonplace, however, that the rumor was not seen as credible.

However, at about 4:00 a.m. on March 9, 1916, Villa's troops attacked Columbus, New Mexico, and Camp Furlong, the U.S. Army post there, where four troops (about 240 soldiers) of the 13th Cavalry Regiment had been stationed since September 1912. Ten civilians and eight soldiers were killed in the attack, and two civilians and six soldiers wounded. The raiders burned the town, stole horses and mules, and seized machine guns, ammunition, and merchandise before fleeing back to Mexico. [10]

Villa's soldiers had suffered considerable losses, with at least 67 dead and dozens more wounded. Many of the casualties were inflicted when the machine gun troop of the 13th Cavalry led by 2nd Lt. John P. Lucas set up its Hotchkiss M1909 Benét-Mercié machine guns under fire along the north boundary of Camp Furlong, firing over 5,000 rounds apiece using the glow of burning buildings to illuminate targets. About 13 of Villa>s wounded later died of their wounds, and five wounded Villisca's taken prisoner by the Americans were tried and hanged for murder. Local lore in Columbus holds that the attack may have been caused by a merchant in Columbus who supplied Villa with arms and ammunition. Villa is said to have paid several thousand dollars in cash for the weapons, but the merchant refused to deliver them unless he was paid in gold, giving «cause» for the raid.

The next day, acting on the recommendations of the commanders of his cavalry regiments, Southern Department commanding general Frederick Funston recommended an immediate pursuit in force into Mexico. U.S. President Woodrow Wilson concurred, designating Pershing to command the force and releasing a statement to the press: "An adequate force will be sent at once in pursuit of Villa with the single object of capturing him and putting a stop to his forays. This can and will be done in entirely friendly aid to the constituted authorities in Mexico and with scrupulous respect for the sovereignty of that Republic.

Pershing assembled an expeditionary force consisting primarily of cavalry and horse artillery, the cavalry units being armed with M1909 machine guns, M1903 Springfield rifles, and M1911 semi-automatic pistols. On March 15, 1916, organized into a provisional division of three brigades (four regiments of cavalry, two of infantry, and 6,600 men), the expedition crossed the border into Mexico to search for Villa, marching in two columns from Columbus and Culberson's Ranch.

## Stuff I Heard on the Island

# Events in recent days sent me down a couple of memory lanes.

Events in recent days sent me down a couple of memory lanes.

#### Water restrictions

I was standing in the newsroom at KENS television one morning when all the phones in the place lit up at the same time. "There has been some kind of waterline break," a caller said. "Water is shooting up 100 feet in the air on the south side of town."

The city was in the throes of a months-long

drought with draconian usage restrictions and the thought of a broken waterline was a pretty good story.

An hour later I was circling the man-made geyser in the Chopper 5 helicopter showing the first pictures of it to the city via live television. It wasn't a waterline break at all it was a man-made artesian spring shooting straight up in the air out of a forty-inch line and there were two more just like it adjacent that were still dry. I landed and talked to the landowner who said he intended to use the water to raise catfish. The water shooting out of the ground was too hot to touch and he had drilled three such wells into the Edwards Aquifer and by month's end was using 45 million gallons of water per day, fully a quarter of the water needed to supply the city of then 1.2 million people to grow catfish to sell to HEB grocery stores until they found out about the source and cancelled the contract.

Citizens were aghast. How could such a thing happen!? People in toney Alamo Heights were watching their lawns die of thirst while this charlatan, this out of towner, this carpetbagger, this brigand wasted water at the rate that could supply 300,000 people per day. Talk of such a waste dominated the radio talk shows for days. Someone had to do something! Does any of this sound familiar?

The city's lawyers went digging through the city ordinances, the county attorney looked through statutes and water regulations in search of a law – there must be a law – to prohibit this person from doing such a thing. There wasn't. It never occurred to anyone that such a thing could ever happen so no law seemed necessary but the free right of water capture had run smack into the Law of Unintended Consequences.

A law was passed forthwith to stop further such drilling but citizens lined up along a county road to watch helplessly as their precious resource shot in the air only to run off into a giant pit while much of it evaporated into the mist. The catfish man was grandfathered as he had dug his well before the law forbidding it was passed. He was temporarily stopped when it was discovered he had no discharge permit to drain the catfish-dropping infested water into the Medina River.

Finally, in 2003, San Antonio Water Systems bought out the catfish farm and later all the water rights for a total of more than \$30 million. The incident spurred lawmakers in Austin to pass the water usage laws for the Edwards Underground Aquifer in

Editor's note: This is the latest in a series of stories based on the book Taming the Nueces Strip by Texas Ranger George Durham who road into the area between the Nueces River and the Rio Grande to confront bandits who had been raiding into downtown Corpus Christi and the King Ranch in the year 1875.

In what came to be known as the Las Cuevas War which began in the last installment the Ranger troop , lead by Captain L.H. McNelly, rode into Mexico and ambushed the cattle rustlers at their camp, killing more than fifty before running back to the south bank of the Rio Grande to take cover. Meanwhile, soldiers from the U.S. Army had violated orders to cross the river and help the Rangers. When we last left them the soldiers had raked the charging Mexicans with a Gatling gun, killing more than thirty of them along the shore including some wearing the uniform of the Mexican Army and the Mayor of the nearby Mexican town of Camergo.

The first thing that happend when the Rangers dug in along the riverbank is that the few bandits on the south side of the river left alive retreated. The second thing that happened is that the Captain commanding the U.S. troops crossed the river with a telegraph from his superiors. It was from Colonel Potter at Fort Brown: Advise Captain McNelly to return at once to this side of the river. Inform him that you are directed not to support him in any way while he remains on the Mexican territory. If McNelly is attacked by Mexican forces on Mexican soil do not render him any assistance. Let me know if McNelly acts on this advice. When McNelly finished reading the telegraph the Captain asked him, "What shall I tell him?"

"Tell him no," was McNelly's answer. "Anything else?"

"No. Plain no," McNelly said.

"The colonel won't like that," the Captain

"The answser is still no," was McNelly's final reply. He had come to Mexico with two things in mind; the first was to kill a Frenchman who had betrayed him and there was a good chance that the Frenchman was one of the fifty or so men who now lay dead on the Mexican side. The second thing was to return about 300 head of cattle that had been stolen and recently crossed into Mexico by the men McNelly had attacked. McNelly wasn't going back without the cattle.

### Mexican standoff

What they had now was a true Mexican standoff - in fact it may be where the term came from. The Rangers weren't leaving until they got the cattle but they didn't have enough men to go round them up while fighting Mexicans at the same time. On the other side, the Mexicans had the Rangers pinned down, at least for now, but didn't have enough men left to drive them back across the river. A few hours passed while McNelly went in search of food for his men which the Army provided.

Then a party of three riders appeared out of the prarie with a white flag held high on the end of a carbine and a letter pinned under the hammer. As the truce party approached three Rangers including Durham but not McNelly, went out to meet them. The leader of the bandits was a man listed in *The Book* - a list of those wanted in Texas for various crimes - as Doc Headly. He was said to be one of the leaders in the border gang. As he rode up he was drinking from a bottle of mescal. Behind his white beard his face was flush from the mescal.

"You're not McNelly," he said to the Rang-



Years later, after a career in law enforcement George Durham wrote: "I had learned another mighty good lesson that stood me in good stead in later years as a peace officer, and that was to get control of the leader when you had a mob or crowd to handle. Never kill the leader if you can help it. Take control of him, and do it in a way so he'll know he's been brought under control. That way one or two peace officers can handle a whole mob without too much killing." It was the origin of the mantra of the Texas Rangers that lives through until today. Like the Ranger said years later when he got off the train alone to squash a riot in an oilfield town. "Only one Ranger!? the town's Mayor croaked. "Well, you only got one riot," the Ranger said. One Riot One Ranger. The Las Cueves War was over.

Dotson's Note: Sergey Nazarovych Bubкаій (АКА:Назарович Бубка & Serhiy Nazarovych Bubka) was born 4 December 1963. He is a Ukrainian former pole vaulter. He represented the Soviet Union until its dissolution in 1991. Bubka was twice named Athlete of the Year by Track & Field News, and in 2012 was one of 24 athletes inducted as inaugural members of the International Association of Athletics Federations Hall of Fame. Thanks to Bill Morgan and Wikipedia for the facts and photos contained in this report.



Bubka won six consecutive IAAF World Championships, an Olympic gold medal and broke the world record for men's pole vault 35 times. He was the first pole vaulter to clear 6.0 meters and 6.10 meters. He held the indoor world record of 6.15 meters, set on 21 February 1993 in Donetsk, Ukraine for almost 21 years until France's Renaud Lavillenie cleared 6.16 meters on 15 February 2014 at the same meet in the same arena. He held the outdoor world record at 6.14 meters between 31 July 1994, and 17 September 2020 when Sweden's Armand Duplantis cleared 6.15 meters, though since adopting rule 260.18a in 2000 the IAAF regards the indoor record as the official «world record».

Bubka is Senior Vice President of the International Association of Athletics Federations (IAAF), serving since 2007, and President of the National Olympic Committee of Ukraine, serving from 2005 to November 2022. He is also an Honorary Member of the International Olympic Committee (IOC), having been involved since 1996. His older brother, Vasiliy Bubka, was also a medal-winning pole vaulter.

Born in Luhansk, Sergey Bubka was a track-and-field athlete in the 100-meter dash and the long jump, but became a worldclass champion only when he turned to the pole vault. In 1983, virtually unknown internationally, he won the world championship in Helsinki, Finland, and the following year set his first world record, clearing 5.85m (19 ft 2 in). Until the dissolution of the USSR in late 1991, Bubka competed for

The Soviet sports system rewarded athletes for setting new world records, and he became noted for establishing new records by slim amounts, sometimes as little as a centimeter higher. This allowed him to collect frequent bonus payments and made Bubka an attraction at track-and-field meets. By 1992, he was no longer bound to the Soviet system, and signed a contract with Nike that rewarded each world record performance with special bonuses of \$40,000.



From 2002 to 2006 Bubka was a member of the Ukrainian Verkhovna Rada with the Party of Regions group and until 2014 an advisor to Viktor Yanukovych. He was on the youth policy, physical culture, sport and tourism committee while a MVR.

Sergey Bubka-Pole Vaulter

On 5 March 2022 Bubka professed his love for his homeland after the 2022 Russian invasion of Ukraine, and declared: "Ukraine will win" Sergey Bubka started competing on the international athletics scene in 1981 when he participated in the European Junior Championship finishing seventh. But the 1983 World Championship held in Helsinki was his actual entry point to the world athletics, where a relatively unknown Bubka snatched the gold, clearing 5.70 meters (18 feet 8 inches). The years that followed witnessed the unparalleled dominance of Bubka, with him setting new records and standards in pole vaulting.

He set his first world record of 5.85m on 26 May 1984 which he improved to 5.88m a week later, and then to 5.90m a month later. He cleared 6.00 meters (19 feet 8 inches) for the first time on 13 July 1985 in Paris. This height had long been considered unattainable. With virtually no challengers, Bubka improved his own record over the next 10 years until he reached his career best and the then world record of 6.14 m (20 feet 1<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> inches) in 1994. He primarily vaulted on UCS Spirit poles throughout his

He became the first athlete ever to vault over 6.10 meters, in San Sebastián, Spain in 1991. Until January 2014, no other athlete on earth had cleared 6.07, indoors or outdoors. In 1994, he achieved his personal record with a vault of 6.14 meters, long after many commentators assumed the great sportsman was retired. Bubka increased the world record by 21 centimeters (8 inches) in the period from 1984 to 1994, more than other pole vaulters had achieved in the previous 12 years. He cleared 6.00 meters or better on 45 occasions. As of June 2015, 6 meters had been cleared by all athletes worldwide exactly 100 times.

Dotson's Other Note: Bubka officially retired from pole vault in 2001 during a ceremony at his Pole Vault Stars meeting in Donetsk. Despite his dominance in pole vault, Bubka had a relatively poor record in the Olympic Games. The first Olympics after Bubka's introduction to the international athletics was held in 1984 and was boycotted by the USSR along with the majority of other Eastern Bloc countries. Two months before the Games he vaulted 12 cm higher than the eventual Olympic gold medal winner Pierre Quinon. In 1988 Bubka competed in the Seoul Olympics and won his only Olympic gold medal clearing 5.90 m. In 1992 he failed to clear in his first three attempts (5.70, 5.70, 5.75 m) and was out of the Barcelona Olympics. At the Atlanta Olympics in 1996 a heel injury caused him to withdraw from the competition without any attempts. In 2000 at the Sydney Olympics he was eliminated from the final after three unsuccessful attempts at 5.70 m. Bubka won the pole vault event in six consecutive IAAF World Championships in Athletics in the period from 1983 to 1997. He has a son who was a professional tennis player, whose name is Sergei.



## You're Nuts

Upon being fined \$100 for his part in a "hotel episode" in Detroit, "Rube" Waddell said to a reporter, "You're a liar. There ain't no Hotel Episode in Detroit." He enjoyed wrestling alligators in the off-season, drank too much on occasion, and was fascinated by fire trucks and fires. He grew up across the street from a Fire Station and would wander over there almost everyday. Sometimes as a child, he would get caught sleeping at the station. At times, he drank so much, reporters sometimes referred to him as "souse paw" instead of "south paw" and he was known to leave the mound, while pitching, during a game, when he heard a fire siren. In the past, he once saved a woman from drowning, accidentally shot a friend through his hand and was bitten by a lion. He almost shot Manager, Connie Mack, in the head, when a pistol fell out of his pocket and fired off a shot in the team hotel. In 1903, he climbed into the stands to beat up a heckler and was suspended for five games. He also baffled his teammates, as he would sometimes leave a game early to go fishing. He was late to a game, on several occasions, because he was playing marbles in the streets with the local kids. Some said he could not remember how many women he had married and served time in jail for missing alimony payments. Teammates and opponents never knew what he would do next, but the fans loved him. Rube was showered with screams of "You're Nuts." Maybe he was. It was generally known that left-handed pitchers were the weirdest players on the field. He never really took his profession seriously. It was said that the site of a puppy would distract him while pitching, so opponents would hold up their pets in the stands. George Edward "Rube" Waddell was a farmer's son. He was born Friday, October 13, 1876, in Bradford, Pennsylvania. Friday the thirteenth should have been a clue. Catcher Jack Nelson gave him the nickname, "Rube," which was usually reserved for hicks. Rube grew up throwing rocks and killing crows trying to eat seeds as they were being planted. He played professional baseball for 13 years with the Louisville Colonels, Pittsburgh Pirates, Chicago Orphans, Philadelphia A's and St. Louis Browns. He owned a fine fastball, a fall-off-the-table curveball, and threw a screwball that few batters had ever seen. He led the American League in strikeouts for six consecutive years, and he may have been the strangest player to ever play Major League baseball. Back then players slept two to a bed when traveling to play other teams. Rube's roommate, Ossee Schreckengost, always complained that Rube ate crackers in bed so his contract included a clause that prohibited him from doing that. He wore red under his clothing in case a fire bell would ring. Rube once poured ice water on his left arm before he pitched. He said if he didn't he would burn up the catcher's glove. He often did cartwheels, walked on his hands, or turned somersaults all the way back to the dugout, after he had

won a game. On July 1, 1902, Rube became only the second pitcher in Major League Baseball history to strikeout three batters with only nine pitches. The first had been John Clarkson with the Boston Beaneaters, on June 4, 1889. It has now been done by 74 different pitchers, with Sandy Koufax being the only pitcher to accomplish that feat three times. From 1903-1907, Rube won 21, 25, 27, 15





and 19 games respectively, while pitching for the A's. In 1904, Rube struck out 349 batters in a single season, an American League record which stood for 60 years, until Sandy Koufax struck out 382 in 1965. In 1905, Rube won the Triple Crown of pitching with a 27-10 win-loss record, with 287 strikeouts and a 1.48 ERA. By 1911, Rube was drinking his way back to the minors. Eventually he was driven out of the big leagues and then the game. It was 1912 and he was living in Kentucky with friends, when a nearby dam burst and caused flooding. Waddell helped many people who would have drowned. While his actions were heroic, he developed pneumonia, which led to tuberculosis; and he never fully recovered. He was sent to live with his sister in San Antonio, Texas. Rube Waddell died on April Fools Day in 1914, at age 37, of tuberculosis. There is speculation that he may have suffered from autism or (ADD) attention deficit disorder. Waddell posted a career win-loss record of 193-143, with a 2.13 ERA. Rube had 2,316 strikeouts recorded. He was elected to the Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum in 1946 by the veterans committee.

Connie Mack once said, "Waddell had more stuff than any pitcher I ever saw." There's a funny story that has Rube Waddell winning the opener of a doubleheader, when Manager Connie Mack asked him how he felt about also pitching the second game of the afternoon. Rube responded, "I don't know, but I'll see by going down to the bullpen and warming up."

While the election for the three newly created seats flew under the radar of most voters in Nueces County it caught the attention of eleven candidates who have filed for the three new At-Large seats to be filled by a countywide vote in the May 4 election. But there is a wrinkle in the new bill; while each of the three new seats – Places 1-3 on the ballot – are countywide seats the winner of each seat must get more than 50% of the votes in their election and with four candidates in the races for two of the seats and three in the third race it is likely runoff elections will be needed, the date of which is yet to be set by county officials. So when the dust settles by the end of 2024 the NCAD board will consist of eleven members with seven appointed by taxing entities across the county, three elected At-Large and Nueces County Tax Assessor/ Collector Kevin Kieschnick who will switch from an Ex-Officio (non-voting) member to a voting member.

A change in the system

The CAD board of directors is responsible for the governance of the CAD, including the hiring of the chief appraiser, and adopting the CAD's annual budget and the board also choses the members of the Appraisal Review Board (ARB) which is the board which reviews property valuation appeals filed by taxpayers. The ARB is the board

which taxpayers face when they appeal their property valuations with its members currently chosen solely by a vote of the CAD board. The new system, as designed by the new bill gives the three new members elected by voters an outsized role in the choosing of ARB members because under the new rules two out of three newly-elected members must approve hiring of members on the all-important ARB.

Current Board members There are currently eight members on the NCAD Board of Directors: Three are appointed by the City of Corpus Christi; two by Corpus Christi School District; one by the cities of Port Aransas and Aransas Pass currently occupied by Leo Gonzalez; one by four small cities across the county; one by Nueces County, currently occupied by Island resident Gabriele Hilpold; and one by the Del Mar College District. The directors are appointed for staggered four-year terms. Candidates for new board seats

### ISAC Update+6

I promised you loyal readers a rundown of what's occurred as a result of the Island Strategic Action Committee over the past few years. I'll keep it simple; we worked on the rules for golf carts on the Island, updated the Area Development Plan, took on short term rentals (hey, we got the rules made, the rest of enforcement is up to someone else), we got the TIRZ #2 renewed (and a bunch of projects put on it), finally got some soccer goals at Billish Park, a beach maintenance facility built, Packery Channel dredged (again), and we got the Don Patricio bridge built. Of course, that's the short story.

Where are we going from here? That's more of what I want to talk about. We have a few projects currently in the hopper that we need to push up the last couple of stairs. While we voted for an increase in lifeguard pay, that seems to be caught in some red tape. The Riley P Dog Park/Site, Bond 2018 - JFK Causeway improvements, and "paper streets" are moving, however slowly. Need to continue to keep up with the Area Development Plan (ADP) which is the main goal of the Island Strategic Action Committee (ISAC). Development.

There are still some projects that are languishing without any progress in sight. The Packery boat ramps are still in need of correcting, and an ADA ramp still needs to be attached to one of the piers down there. I can't believe that the city is allowed to operate a public boat ramp leased from the TGLO without having an ADA ramp. The TIRZ #2 was created to ensure that the public amenities are constructed and maintained.

### Island Mobility Plan

The Island mobility plan seems to have hit a snag as well, and I'm not sure where. I met with Roger a couple weeks ago and gave him some "low-hanging fruit" ideas, but the big rub is that we're going to have to get TxDoT to the table, and you loyal readers know that they have pretty strict rules of what can and cannot happen within their right-of-way. Hopefully someone can dis-

cover some common incentives and goals with them. This is also the case with the JKF/Bond 2018 projects under the bridge, but as I announced at my last ISAC meeting, there has been movement on lighting and paving, and a perceived hurdle was removed (again).

I don't need to tell you loyal readers that esteemed colleagues and city staff are actually working on many of these projects already. Together with leadership from Councilman Dan Suckley, I like to think that the Island is gaining steady momentum, instead of the stop-and-start way things have come to us in the past. I will also iterate that I will work with the incoming ISAC Chair and Co-chairs (when they are elected at the next meeting), local/island developers, and city staff to make a smooth transition to keep the ball rolling. That's the purpose of ISAC, to get projects done, not to slow things down or create red tape. And I'm still here and working on projects.

### Get your bird feeders ready

Bird migration is slowly starting, with a few early birds showing up later in the week. Bird nesting season start is announced by the white wing dove calling out to each other, which is going to hit a cacophony in the coming weeks. I have three hummingbird feeders up, which are being visited by one buff belly as far as I can tell (besides the dang golden fronted woodpeckers). There might be a small fallout early next week, so keep your eyes peeled.

## The Sun and The Sea

She rises every day and her smile fills me with warmth. Her light gives keeps me safe from the darkness and opens my sight to the best things in life. The Sun kisses the sea at dawn, and sends him out under her watchful light.

Before the darkness they kiss again, so that neither of them forgets the day and sleeps unconcerned by the cold of night. The Sun and the Sea are trying to find their balance right now here along the water in the Coastal Bend. Life is jumping while the sun is out and her warm touch is making everything happy. Spring is here, reignite your life and love of both the Sun and the Sea and grab a pole and catch a fish.

#### Perfect conditions

Last week we had an incredible Prefrontal day catching trophy trout. The water temperatures were in the mid 70's and just before the front the winds laid down to perfect conditions. The water temps dropped ten degrees and fish were not very active until the water warmed up back to 70. Watching the water temps and lunar feeding tables will be important to catching great days on the water. When we get the cooler days move deep to the transition zones between 3-5 feet of water. Here the barometric pressure will not affect fish as much and they will enjoy consistent temperatures. Lures

We are using lighter jig heads and soft plastics when we are up shallow, 1/16-1/8oz. As we move deeper in the boat making drifts over the water that is too deep to wade fish we move to 1/8-1/4oz heads to keep our baits low and in the strike zone. Bright color plastics have shined at dawn and then natural colors with a chartreuse tail or dark colors after the sun rises up in the sky. Water quality is still stained in many places down in Baffin Bay because of a dredge that spread mud this winter. Fish are in the stained water but there are many more gamefish in the green waters as they migrate into the bays. This will eventually fix itself when we get a few more spring bull tides. Dirty water fishing can be good, use popping corks or larger baits with paddle tails to give gamefish more vibration to key in on. The East Side of the bays have been the best water quality and leeward wind shorelines are full of great fishing.

The cold wind and cloudy sky have kept the Sun and Sea from their best of days lately. The Sea needs her warmth and shine. He is the strongest force with her smile, and she is the most beautiful when her reflection lavs over the waves. Take some time to celebrate both of them and go fishing, walk the beach, smell the ocean. Dig your feet into the sand. Enjoy our Paradise here on Padre.

## The American Pika

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Spring is approaching and wildflowers are in bloom! In the mountains of the Western US, the American Pika is ready to feast on these flowers! The pika is a tiny creature, roughly the length of a standard #2 pencil. Their small bodies, short legs, and short round ears suggest a rodent-like appearance; however, pikas belong to the order Lagomorpha, making them relatives of rabbits and hares. The American pika, Ochotona princeps, is tailless with sharp claws that add agility when traversing rocky mountain terrain.

The pika uses its two sets of incisors, characteristic of lagomorphs, to cut off flowers, grasses, thistles, and weeds. This tiny florist has a taste for flowers like no other, as it gathers flowers during summer to bring back to its den. This practice of stashing meals for later is called having. They create a nest under rocks that is lined with edible plant materials to cozy up in and snack on throughout the winter. These collections of grasses and flowers can grow to be large enough to have more than enough food for the entire year! Toxic plants act as preservatives and slowly detoxify throughout the season, eventually becoming edible. When winter rolls in with bellowing winds, remaining vegetation dwindles, leaving minimal food such as lichen and bark to eat. The American pika, which does not hibernate in the winter, must find another way to keep itself warm and fed to survive these harsh conditions.

The cinnamon-brown coat of summer is transformed into a thicker gray coat to pair with furry feet. Lucky for the pika, it has been preparing for the chilled winter seasons since summer. The pika can now reap the rewards of its summer labors and cozy up in its edible nest, a warm and tasty pile of foraged summer treats. Uneaten food in

spring leftovers eventually decays, replenishing the ground with nutrients. American pikas are colonial which allows them to warn each other of predators. However, they tend to live separated lives within the colony, as they are territorial if others approach their den. They break from their solitude in spring when male pikas of adjacent territories call to attract the female pikas. In May, as the snow melts away, up to six blind pups are born, entirely reliant on their mother. At a mere four weeks of age, the pups are weaned and ready to live independently. A second litter is born in the summer. Due to the mother's energy being depleted from raising the first litter, the second litter usually does not survive. The IUCN Red List of Threatened Species categorizes the American pika as least concern, but high temperatures are one of the greatest threats to pikas, and this makes them highly sensitive to climate change. As yearly temperatures have a rising trend, American pikas may become restricted to cooler northern territories. If you find yourself taking a hike in alpine



terrain and hear a "meep," keep an eye out

for a tiny creature with a love for bouquets.

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## Going Native

## Tecoma stans or Esperanza or yellow elder or yellow trumpet flower

In the midst of our spring break hunker down, we entered Stage 2 water restrictions meaning no broadcast lawn watering except every other week on trash day before 10 AM or after 6 PM. The better news is that La Nina will bring us above average rainfall through spring and much of summer. Regardless, predictions longer term are for increasing likelihood of drought conditions. Good citizens on our island and throughout all of southeastern Texas should do what we can to reduce water use. One easy approach is to increase the use of native plants in our yards (you knew that was coming ... admit it). This will help wean the region off the archaic 1950's lawn concept of a few shrubs or flowers fronted by a spread of non-native (and in some cases, invasive) grasses. Policies that don't encourage this should be relegated to the trash where they belong.

Here's an update of native plants in my yard that did and did not survive this past winter. First, the bad news. Our beautyberry, wine cup, and firebush have not resprouted although I'm still hoping for recovery perhaps from root stock. But, my wild olive, hackberry, and Texas kidneywood trees have leafed out nicely. One of two coral beans have resprouted after the freeze. And, the shrub that will one day be the prettiest of all once it's larger, my necklace pod (genus Sophora for those wanting to look it up) didn't lose more than one leaf during this past winter's freeze. Further, my pride and joy, the skeleton daisy didn't lose a leaf either! All of these I've covered in past columns as drought tolerant, cold tolerant plants for your consideration to be included in your landscaping.

For those of you who want to liven up the color of your yard, I suggest Tecoma stans, common names Esperanza or yellow trumpet flower. This, however, is not listed by Diamond et al. (2017) as naturally occurring at the national seashore. It is, though, listed as native to southern Texas with wild stands in a variety of locations and habitat types. It's a bit tropical so even though it's

a small tree in Central and South America it'll likely be shrub size here. In particularly cold winters, it may die back to the ground but should recover from root sprouts in the Spring

It is very drought resistant and moderately tolerant of salt spray. Tecoma prefers full sun and well-drained soils. It is easily propagated from seed or cuttings. It's fast growing and seedlings may bloom within a couple of years. I've read it's roots have been used to brew beer, but haven't tried tha (I prefer stouts anyway). It produces very showy flowers in Spring and Summer and is generally considered evergreen or partially evergreen. And, one of the most important points, it's attractive to butterflies and hummingbirds. This could add nice shrubby touch of color to your yard and encourage you to keep Going Native.

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



## AUSTAL USA DELIVERS FUTURE USS KINGSVILLE (LCS 36)



Mobile, Ala. – Austal USA delivered the future USS Kingsville (LCS 36) to the U.S. Navy March 1, 2024. Kingsville is the 18th Independence-variant Littoral Combat Ship (LCS) delivered by the company and the first U.S. Navy vessel to be named after the Texas city home to Naval Air Station Kingsville and directly tied to the historic King Ranch. Delivery documents were signed on board

the ship and followed the successful completion of acceptance trials at the end of January during which the ship's major systems and equipment were tested to demonstrate mission readiness. The ship's pre-commissioning unit will now prepare

the ship for fleet introduction. "The delivery of this ship on time and on budget is representative of the pride and dedication on which Austal USA's shipbuilders have built their stellar reputation," remarked Austal USA's acting president, Michelle Kruger. "We are excited to provide Kingsville to the Navy to join her sister ships operating in the Pacific providing a critical capability to the fleet."



The LCS is a fast, agile, mission-focused platform designed to operate in near-shore environments, winning against 21st-century coastal threats. In November 2023 the Navy proudly reported it had six Independence-variant LCS deployed in the Pacific throughout 2023, including the record-breaking 26-month overseas deployment of USS Charleston (LCS18). The Austal USA-built LCS variant is also providing support to the Navy's unmanned programs with USS Oakland (LCS 24) operating as a mothership for the Unmanned Surface Division 1 vessels Ranger, Mariner, Seahawk and Sea Hunter and the large flight decks support unmanned drones, like the MQ-8C Fire Scout. Integration of the mine countermeasures (MCM) mission package placed aboard USS Canberra (LCS 30) signifies additional capabilities planned for Independence-class ships. Austal USA is constructing the Navy's final Independence-variant LCS, future USS Pierre (LCS 38), which is scheduled to be

christened later this spring.





I want to wish my favorite songwriter, Townes

Van Zandt a happy heavenly birthday. He would have been 80 on March 7. He is probably best known for his popular song, Pancho and Lefty which was recorded by Willie Nelson and Merle Haggard and reached number one on the Billboard Country *Charts* in 1983. Townes' influence is massive. Countless artists across many genres have recorded or performed his songs such as Steve Earle, Lyle Lovett, Jerry Jeff Walker, Guy Clark, Robert Earl Keen, Emmylou Harris and on and on. He was born into a wealthy family who are cited as one of the founders of Fort Worth. Between the years of 1968 and 1994 Townes recorded ten studio albums and released sixteen singles and twenty live albums. Back in the day I thought he was the gold standard and learned many, many of his songs on my little cheap guitar. I knew Townes in the 70's when he lived in Austin and I was bartending at the Texas Chili Parlor, which was next door to Castle Creek, one of the premier listening rooms in early Austin and showcased such talent as Little Feat, Doug Sahm, Lightening Hopkins, Leon Redbone, Jimmy Buffet, etc. Whenever Townes would play Castle Creek he would always grab up the Chili Parlor bartenders after they got off work and were loaded with tip money and take the party to his place in Clarksville to play craps. I remember one night when he was already done with his show at Castle Creek and was waiting for me to get off work and my pal, Andy Winnegar's car in front of the Chili Parlor and he got impatient. He beat on the door until the owner, **Phil Vetech**, let him in to pester me to hurry up. About then I heard Phil yelling at Townes to "give it back Townes." Apparently he had reached over the bar when no one was looking and snaked a bottle of booze and the owner saw it. Townes' reply was, "No way man. That bottle is mine. I stolt it fair and square." We had to wrestle it away from him and he grumbled about all the way to the crap game in which he won all our money, like he usually
