How We Use These Books

Each month explores topics connected to simple living, farm life, forest school, and homestead skills. Teachers will select **2–4 novels per month** to read aloud from the books listed under that month's topics, depending on class sizes, ages, reading levels, and student interests.

Our selections include:

- **Diverse novels** that reflect a variety of voices and experiences
- **Appalachian titles** that honor our regional heritage
- **Traditional and classic literature** that has shaped children's literature
- **Books in unique formats** (verse, letters, graphic novels, multiple perspectives) that supplement our English Language Arts lessons

Books written in experimental formats offer rich learning opportunities. For example, novels in verse teach poetry, rhythm, and expressive language, while epistolary novels (written as letters or diary entries) provide models for letter writing, reflective writing, and narrative structure.

All selections are appropriate for older elementary through high school students and support our mission of blending literature, hands-on learning, and cultural exploration in an outdoor setting.
