

Robrahn's Ramblings

"PUTTING YOUR YARD TO BED FOR THE WINTER"

With the fall now over halfway through, time to consider "putting your yard to bed for the winter". What do I mean? Care at this time of year can insure that your yard "blasts off" come March and you will look at your green lawn with confidence!

So with the cooler weather, have you given much attention to the care of your property? I don't mean just mowing, but "winterizing" your lawn with fertilizer and spraying for broad leaf weeds like dandelions and clover. How about the big "fall clean up"? I can hear you now, say what?

"Fall clean up" for me is an important consideration. I trim my bushes, clip down my decorative grasses. Nothing more irritating than "shredded pampas grass" with junk all over the yard! I have a number of decorative grasses and they get trimmed down. I clean up the annuals, clean the pots and put away most of them. Leaving them out can result in cracked or damaged pottery in the spring. Perennials are trimmed down. Put away lawn furniture, and scrub down the pads on those that have them. I mow my lawn until the first week of December, mainly to clean up leaves, but with a fertilized yard, I appreciate a freshly mowed lawn with Christmas decorations on it! Never mow your fescue short, however, leave it longer, it will handle the winter better. Wait until spring to mow it shorter and get rid of dead and brown grass.

But don't get in the mindset of "put it to bed and forget it". Your "winterized lawn" still needs attention. If dry, you will need to water trees and bushes during the winter and even water the yard (if we haven't had rain or snow). If your sprinkler system is shut down, you will need to use a hose and water the old fashioned way with a sprinkler. It makes a big difference come spring!

So when March comes and you mow your yard off, the payoff may be a fantastic green lawn, ready to go for another fantastic year ahead! You might have plans for new flowers and landscaping. Part of your spring success starts now!

Getting Your House Ready for Winter

We are heading into the end of fall with the cold days of winter knocking at our doors. Now is the time to get your house in shape for the Kansas winter, if you haven't done so already. Here are a few things to think about.

HVAC - have your furnace checked out by a professional, it has been sitting there dormant since early spring and you want to make sure the heater passes are in good working order. Also if your furnace has a humidifier it is time to change the water pad.





Fireplaces - if you have a wood burner you might consider having the flue cleaned out. For those with a gas burner it is definitely worth having a professional service it before using. They usually clean the entire system, put in new embers, check the seals and connections and do a sniff test to make sure no harmful gases are leaking into your living space.

Sprinkler system - this is a must in Kansas, just make sure your hire someone that knows what they are doing. There are a lot of jacklegs this time of year running around with compressors claiming to be sprinkler pros. I have seen damage to systems by these types and when you commission your system in the spring they are no where to be found for the needed repairs.



Spigots - you definitely want to protect them, either by using the insulated covers or shutting off the water at the manifold. I like to shut mine off and disconnect at the manifold, let the whole line drain down.

Door/window insulation - if you have any doors or windows that leak air and they are not used during the winter months you can seal them up tight with the DIY insulation kits. Easy to use and could save you big bucks in heating costs.






Crime Watch
