

Board Meeting Highlights

June Board Meeting: The board continued to review proposed new by-laws and covenants. By-laws have been finalized with attorney changes. The next regular Board meeting is in September so a special meeting will be held before the regular Board meeting that evening to vote on these changes. By August 15th, Amber will make sure the by-laws, covenant change, proxy form, and special meeting agenda are mailed to all residents.

Mark Egger announced that this years Family Fun Day will be held September 23rd to avoid the extreme heat of summer and fall after the state fair.

July Finance Committee Meeting: The committee reviewed all the financial reports and have determined with the increase in HOA dues, voted in this year, the increase in assessments generates an additional \$8K per year. This is a great start to getting our much needed playground equipment and also the other maintenance projects that need attention. Also discussed, we will continue to get three bids on landscaping (our largest expense) with plans to start that process this fall with a recommendation for the Board in November. The committee will meet again in August.

"MAKE YOUR LAWN AND LANDSCAPING A STANDOUT NO MATTER THE SEASON"

Great lawns don't happen by chance. It usually comes about gradually, the result of a "master plan" by owners who are into landscaping and have at least a mental concept of what they want their yard to look like long term. A mature lawn with color, interest and variety comes about gradually, with diligent owners adding each season so as to keep it an asset no matter what time of year.

What? You mean lawns and landscaping change? Absolutely!! A beautiful spring lawn may be full of annuals that provide color during the months of March thru May in Kansas. One can also purchase spring "perennials" (those that regenerate and come back year after year). Flowers and interesting landscaping need not fade as temperatures increase. A little planning can provide "summer annuals" like Vinca, Lilies, Marigolds, Zinnias and other summer perennials. Cannas and Dahlias (among others) provide awesome color, but the landscaper may have to dig up the bulbs come fall.

Don't forget the blooming shrubs! Spring isn't just for flowers... Rose of Sharon shrubs and their cousins, the Althea also bloom almost all summer. Also Crepe Myrtle shrubs provide excellent summer color. Nice to allow your yard to "shift" from spring to summer... to fall with a change up in blooming flowers and shrubbery. They can give your yard interest and curb appeal.

I personally really enjoy the south side of my home on Beretta Ct. A mix of Cannas and Zinnias. While Zinnias are considered "seed annuals", they love the location and I don't' ever have to reseed or replant and they look great from the end of June until October. So much you can consider to improve your yard with a huge amount of expense, if you are willing to do a little work to improve.

Making your yard a place of "changing interest" throughout the year will only add to the beauty of your home and make it more marketable when the time comes to sell.

NuStar Pipeline Remediation Update by

To assess the reliability of NuStar's water contamination testing, the HOA engaged its environmental consultant to collect water samples using a more reliable method. The consultant tested six wells using a weighted bailer that grabbed samples deeper within wells than Apex/NuStar had routinely tested. The HOA samples were analyzed by Pace Analytical Services LLC, Lenexa, Kansas. Of the six wells tested, four showed no contamination which correlated to NuStar's reports. However, the HOA's test showed Benzene and other analytes in two wells at higher levels than reported by NuStar. Because the HOA test was limited to a few wells, disparities may exist among other wells not sampled. The report is posted on the Quail Crossing website for residents' review.

On March 10, 2017, the HOA submitted its test report to NuStar and KDHE and requested NuStar use weighted bailers in the future to more accurately test and report the groundwater contamination levels. During the March 2017 testing, KDHE was onsite and assured the HOA that NuStar was using a weighted bailer for that testing event. The KDHE representative indicated test results will be reviewed and made no commitment whether NuStar would be required to continue to use weighted bailers in the future. The HOA is awaiting the March 2017 test results and response from KDHE as to future testing methods. Lastly, the HOA requested NuStar more accurately report the HOA's involvement in published reports. For example, NuStar has failed to report the HOA's strong opposition to the limited scope of the soil excavation in 2015. Further, NuStar has denied the HOA's previous requests for more reliable testing methods, additional testing and data collection prior to the excavation, and additional excavation photos to gauge effectiveness. Hence, the term "coordination" used by NuStar to describe the HOA's involvement is misleading. The HOA asked for more fair representation in the published reports.

The HOA Board will continue to monitor the gasoline contamination remediation and promote the best interests of the Quail Crossing neighborhood.

Crime Watch

Last month Andover fell victim to a large amount of vehicle burglaries in the Green Valley area. Majority of the incidents were vehicles that were left unlocked. At this time, we have a suspect due to evidence found at multiple scenes.

In an effort to deter vehicle burglaries in our community it is important to cover some crime prevention tips specific to vehicle burglaries. As mentioned in the last newsletter it is important to do everything we can to make ourselves a "hard target".

The following tips will assist in accomplishing that.

- Always lock your car doors and roll up your windows.
- Never leave your keys in the vehicle.
- Never leave valuables in plain sight.
- Never leave unoccupied vehicles running.
- Close garage doors.
- Increase lighting around property.
- Be familiar with your neighbors.
- Keep serial numbers of important items in a safe location.

With these tips in mind we must be vigilant and call in any suspicious behavior or individuals to the Andover Police Department at 316-733-5177 or 911. If you find your vehicle has been burglarized, please contact the police department as soon as it's discovered. Also, if possible, refrain from touching the vehicle, specifically door handles, glass, or the inside of the vehicle. This will assist officer's and investigators in possibly obtaining evidence that can lead to identifying the suspect. Once an officer is on scene be ready to assist the officer in determining if anything has been stolen and if so assist with make, model brand, and serial numbers if possible. Serial numbers increase the odds of identifying property and can also be submitted into the national database as stolen, as well as cross referenced with pawn shops. Remember these simple tips and together we can decrease vehicle burglaries and reduce crime in Andover.

Auto Burglary is a "Crime of Opportunity." There is a theft from a motor vehicle in Kansas every 41 minutes; often times involving an unlocked vehicle and valuables in plain sight. Almost 80% (24 out of 31) of the Auto Burglaries occurring in Andover in 2014 involved an unlocked vehicle.

Increasingly, thieves are using personal and financial information stolen from the vehicles to commit identity theft and forgeries. A garage door opener taken from an unlocked vehicle gives a thief access to your home.

By following the preventive measures outlined in this brochure, you are taking steps to protect your automobile, home, personal possessions and your identity!



What happens if I become a victim of a vehicle burglary?

If your vehicle has been burglarized, contact the Andover Police Department at 316-733-5177 or 911. Stay with the vehicle until an officer arrives. Refrain, if possible, from touching the handles or the inside of the vehicle. To assist investigators in identifying and retrieving your property, make a list of items you know to be stolen. If possible detail serial numbers, descriptions, makes, models, sizes, colors, brands, and estimated value.
