# The Digital World Is Not Neutral

- Technology is woven into school, friendships, and identity
- Children face risks their parents never did at the same age
- Safety comes from **informed guidance**, not bans

**Key fact:** *Parental engagement is the biggest protective factor*



# How Modern Platforms Really Work



## Understanding the business model:

Most apps monetise **attention and behaviour**

Algorithms prioritise engagement, not wellbeing

## Features are engineered to:

- Encourage oversharing
- Prolong screen time
- Reduce friction to posting

Parents don't need to know every app, just how incentives work.

# Digital Footprints & Long-Term Impact

## Online actions, offline consequences

- Screenshots outlive deleted posts
- Images and messages can be redistributed
- Past content can resurface years later

**Parental role:** Teach pause and perspective, not panic



# Privacy, Data & Oversharing

## Children don't naturally grasp abstraction:

- Personal data feels harmless when shared gradually
- Location, routines, school names, uniforms add up

## Practical steps:

- Private accounts by default
- Location services reviewed together
- Regular privacy check-ups (not one-offs)

# Social Pressure & Emotional Risk

## Modern peer pressure is persistent:

- Group chats run 24/7
- Fear of exclusion is amplified
- Pressure can escalate quickly

## Watch for changes in:

- Mood
- Sleep
- Secrecy around devices



# Scams, Grooming & Manipulation



## Threats are more subtle than stereotypes:

- Grooming is about trust, not threats
- Scammers impersonate friends, brands, or support
- AI makes deception easier

## Red flags:

- Urgency
- Secrecy
- Requests to move conversations
- Emotional leverage (flattery, sympathy)



# Gaming Isn't the Enemy

## But it isn't risk-free either:

- Chat functions bypass social boundaries
- Virtual items have real-world value
- Livestreaming introduces public exposure

## Healthy approach:

- Shared curiosity
- Clear limits
- Conversations about behaviour, not just playtime

# Bans vs Boundaries

## Why bans usually fail

- Drive behaviour underground
- Reduce trust
- Remove chances to learn judgement

## What works better:

- Age-appropriate permissions
- Transparent rules
- Gradual independence

*Aim: Guided autonomy*





# How to Talk So Children Actually Listen

## Effective conversations:

- Ask more than you tell
- Stay calm, even when concerned
- Separate behaviour from character

## Try:

- “What do you think about this?”
- “What would you do if...?”
- “How did that make you feel?”

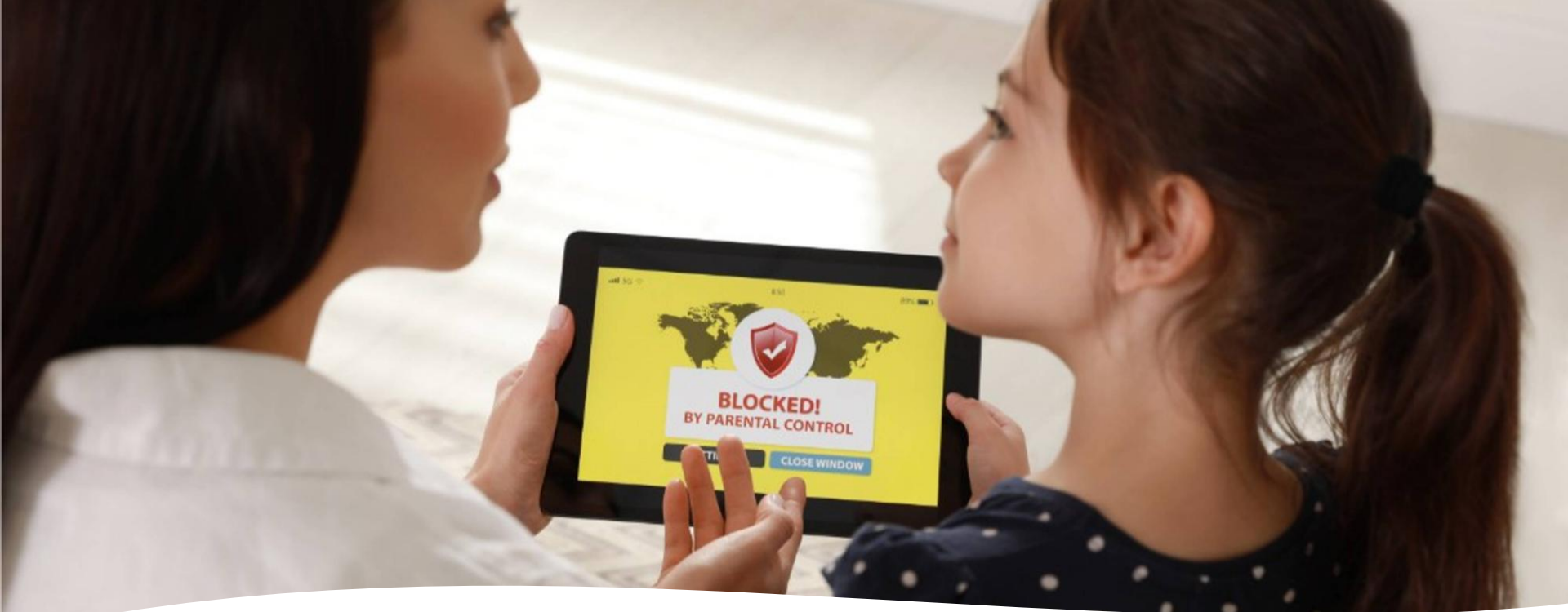
# If Something Goes Wrong

## Your reaction sets the tone

- Children fear device loss more than danger
- Calm responses encourage early disclosure

## Best response:

- Thank them for telling you
- Focus on safety, not punishment
- Solve the problem together



## Tools, Controls & Reality

### Parental controls are support tools, not solutions

- Useful for younger children
- Less effective as children age
- Cannot replace conversation or trust

Use controls as **training wheels**, not surveillance

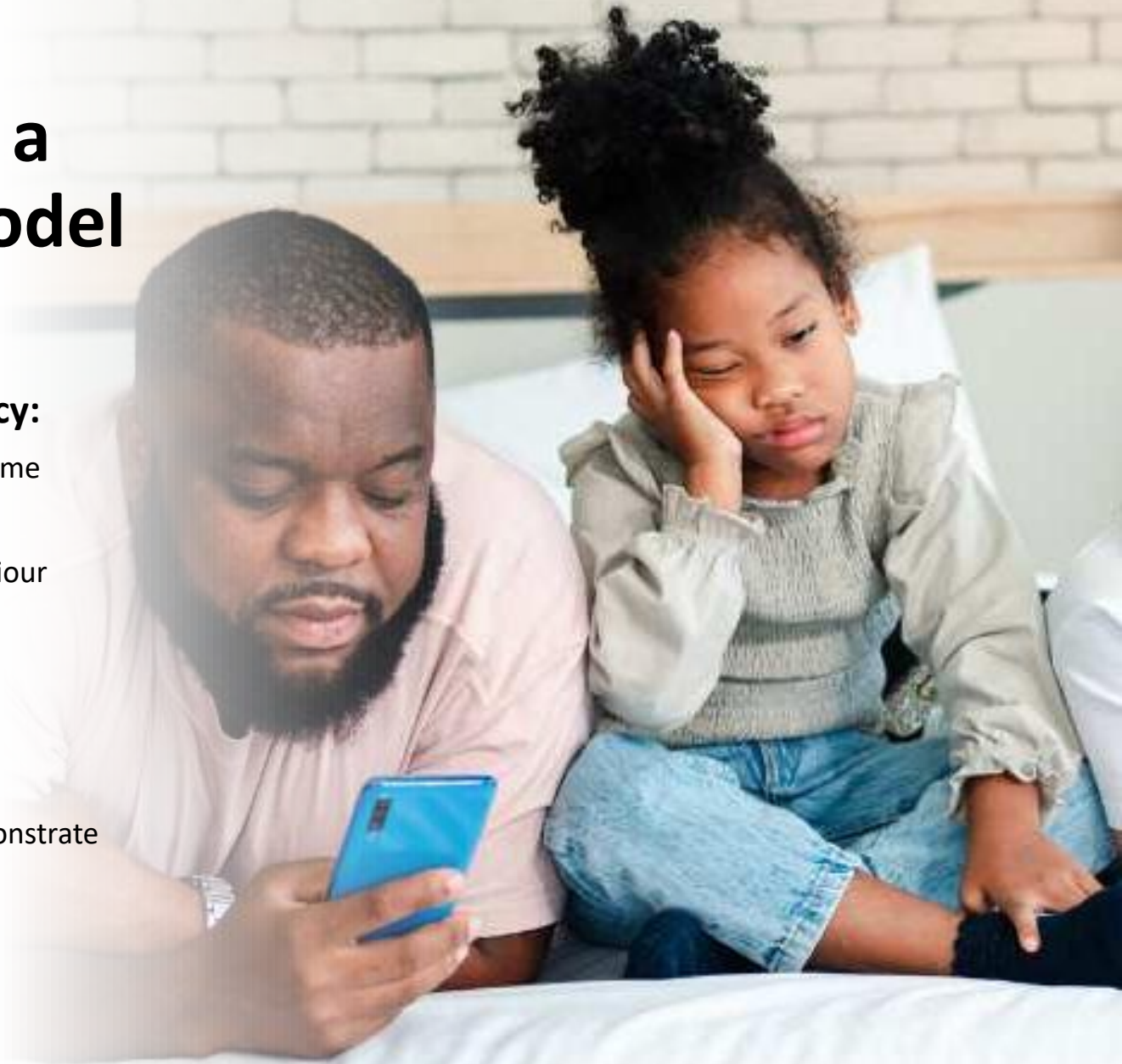
# Your Role as a Digital Role Model

## Children notice inconsistency:

- Device habits are learned at home
- Tone online matters
- Oversharing is modelled behaviour

- Screen use
- Online tone
- Boundaries you expect vs demonstrate

- Ability to walk away

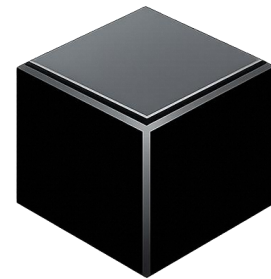
Safety isn't about perfect control,
