

NOTABLE MAY



Thomas J. "Stonewall" Jackson Lieutenant General (CSA) January 21, 1824 — May 10, 1863



On May 10, 1863, the Confederacy mourned the loss of one of its most formidable generals, 39-year-old Thomas J. "Stonewall" Jackson, who succumbed to pneumonia. His death occurred a week after he was mistakenly shot by his own soldiers during the Battle of Chancellorsville in Virginia. For the initial two years of the Civil War, Jackson had instilled fear in Union commanders.

Born in Virginia, in the mountainous region of Clarksburg (now West Virginia), Jackson experienced a childhood marked by poverty and the early loss of his parents. Raised by relatives, he developed into a reserved and solitary young man. Despite limited early schooling, he secured an appointment to West Point after another candidate from his district declined. Overcoming his initial academic disadvantages through diligent effort, he graduated 17th out of 59 cadets.

With the outbreak of war in 1861, Jackson was appointed a brigadier general, commanding five Virginia regiments in the Shenandoah Valley. His leadership at the Battle of Bull Run in July 1861 proved pivotal, as his attack secured a crucial advantage for the Confederates. During this battle, Confederate General Barnard Bee's attempt to rally his troops with the exclamation, "there stands Jackson like a stone wall," bestowed upon him a lasting and iconic nickname.

By 1862, Jackson had established himself as one of the Confederate army's most effective commanders. That summer, he orchestrated a brilliant Shenandoah Valley campaign, outmaneuvering three Union armies and providing critical relief to Confederate forces under pressure from George McClellan's army on the James Peninsula. Subsequently, he rejoined the Army of Northern Virginia for the Seven Days Battles, and his command was exceptional at Second Bull Run in August 1862. He soon became General Lee's most trusted corps commander.

At the Battle of Chancellorsville, despite facing an enemy force twice their size, Lee divided his army, sending Jackson to flank the Union troops – a strategic move that resulted in a significant defeat for the Army of the Potomac. As nightfall brought a pause to the fighting, Jackson ventured forward to scout the terrain for a renewed assault. However, on his return to the Confederate lines with his staff, they were mistakenly fired upon by Rebel soldiers. Jackson sustained three gunshot wounds, with one Southern bullet shattering his left arm, necessitating its amputation the following day. Shortly after the surgery, pneumonia developed, and Jackson's health rapidly declined. He passed away on May 10, 1863, uttering his now-famous last words: "Let us cross over the river and rest under the shade of the trees."

MONUMENT RESTORED IN SYLVA, NC: "BLACK LIVES MATTER" PLAQUE REMOVED FROM 'SYLVA SAM' CONFEDERATE MONUMENT



In April 2025, officials in Sylva, North Carolina, removed a plaque bearing the phrase "Black Lives Matter" from the Confederate monument known as "Sylva Sam." The decision reflects a growing effort within the community to preserve historical integrity and ensure public spaces remain free from politically charged messaging. The "Black Lives Matter" plaque was not officially sanctioned by local government and was installed as part of a broader activist campaign.

The plaque previously covered the "Silva Sam" inscription at the base of the monument. Along with the "BLM" plaque, officials also installed a plaque to cover the "our Heroes of the Confederacy" inscription. Many residents saw it as an inappropriate addition to a historical monument, asserting that such messaging—while important to many—does not belong on a statue meant to commemorate those who served in a specific historical context.

The monument, erected in 1915, honors Confederate soldiers and has stood for over a century as a symbol of local heritage. While some view it as a painful reminder of the past, others in Sylva argue it represents the town's history and the sacrifices of those who fought in the Civil War. Now the Confederate hero's message has been restored!

Supporters of the plaque's removal argue that politicizing historical sites risks rewriting history rather than learning from it. Sylva residents feel that public monuments are not billboards for current movements. They have said that there are better venues for community dialogue that don't involve altering historic landmarks. "We do not erase history..." has been the sentiment of supporters as towns like Sylva, NC grapple with how to handle monuments from a divided past. Many see this as a necessary step toward maintaining unity and respect for public spaces without erasing or distorting history.




LOW COUNTRY

















Bad company and Posse in Gettysburg




