From the Desk of the National Copperheads Chief of Staff (Gunny)

#### November 4, 2023

Greetings Brothers of the National Copperheads. The holidays and Winter with colder weather are closing in on many of us and unfortunately many of us will not be riding as much as we have been. With the New Year right around the corner, now might be a good time to reflect on what we've been able to accomplish as a brotherhood in just eight months. As we look back at what we've done, we are constantly looking to the future. The future of the Copperheads is in the hands of each one of us.

Reflecting for just a moment, we have now attained the somewhat magical number of 100 Copperheads. Truly, there is an abundance of great news. Our counterparts in the Ladies of Liberty already number 25 with 15 more sisters waiting in the wings to join. Today, we have a Copperhead presence in nine States.

As our numbers grow it will become important that we manage the Copperheads in a business-like manner. Once a State has 30 Copperhead members that will trigger a series of events regarding our business organization. One important ingredient to organizational management will be an individual state's designation as a non-profit corporation in the relevant State of origin. Once incorporated at the State level, the next critical step is to request tax exempt status from the Internal Revenue Service (IRS). Next the unit will request its own Employer Identification Number (EIN) which is required to establish a business bank account. Worry not! When the time comes, Headquarters will be there to help you and lead the way.

These efforts to properly organize yourselves as a business will cost money. The cost to do this will vary from state-to-state. Here in North Carolina, forming the corporation will only cost \$60. However, the filing fee to be recognized as tax exempt by the IRS will cost each State \$275. For planning purposes, I would advise each State to plan on expending no more than \$1,000 to become a fully functional, tax exempt, non-profit corporation.

Now would be good time to ask the question. Why bother with these administrative and business details? First and foremost, organizing your unit as a corporation in your State gives your entity "perpetuity". Once incorporated, no single person "owns" your corporation and no one person totally controls it. Once incorporated, the business is managed by a Board of Directors who are accountable to the membership. If people come and go or even pass away, the corporation lives on. Becoming incorporated demonstrates to others that you just don't belong to a "club". In fact, each of you are a part of a corporation that manages its own finances and affairs in a true businesslike manner. Once recognized as a tax exempt, non-profit agency by the IRS, donations to your organization are tax deductible by the contributor. It is your tax-exempt status which will allow you to go to Lowes for example and convince the store to donate items to your unit that you

can subsequently sell raffle tickets to win. That item that Lowes "donated" to you can be writtenoff by Lowes as a charitable contribution. Each raffle ticket sold is also tax deductible for the person purchasing that ticket. In simple terms, it's your business organizational structure that will greatly assist you in raising funds that are necessary to any business organization.

Today, the National Copperheads (HQ) is a registered as a non-profit corporation in the State of Maryland and it has attained tax exempt status from the IRS. But I believe that 2024 will truly be a "breakout" year for the Copperheads across this nation. I see several State organizations becoming incorporated in their home state as becoming tax exempt by the IRS.

Next month I will attempt to specifically address the various methods that I have seen used effectively to raise funds by a tax-exempt organization like the Copperheads. Remember, when you see other organizations such as the Veterans of Foreign Wars, the American Legion, Shriners, or the Moose Lodge holding a fund-raising event of their own, we can do the same thing once incorporated and designated tax exempt. Organizations such as those have been raising funds for years as non-profit organizations. The Copperheads can use the same methods. But how you raise money to begin with is only part of the equation. How you spend it and account for your funding is just as important. Always remember, that the Copperheads will always seek accountability and transparency when it comes to our financial operations.

We're heading into the season where you remind yourself of what you're Thankful for. What are the Copperheads thankful for from the Founders point of view?



#### Virginia State Captains Report



# WHAT WAS THE FOUNDER'S INTENT IN SECEDING FROM THE BRITISH EMPIRE?

Even historians make errors. Last month, I reported to the membership: "Two Documents. Just two documents survive giving the Founder's intent and context in seeking secession from the British empire." Those TWO documents I identified included the <u>"Declaration of the Causes and</u>

Those TWO documents I identified included the <u>"Declaration of the Causes and</u> <u>Necessity of Taking Up Arms"</u> and the Declaration of Independence. Well, there is more.

Several documents, ranging from State and Congressional resolutions and declarations, survive supporting the argument that the Founding Father's intent of leaving the British Empire was independence rather than protecting the institution of slavery as the 1619 Project <u>claims</u>:

"Conveniently left out of our founding mythology is the fact that one of the primary reasons the colonists decided to declare their independence from Britain was because they wanted to protect the institution of slavery." And not just independence but forming alliances with foreign nations and creating a new national government through a confederacy of States, or selfgovernance.

What is one of those documents? Let's look at that. THE HALIFAX RESOLVES

On April 12, 1776, the Fourth Provincial Congress of North Carolina empowered its delegates to vote for independence from Great Britain in the Second Continental Congress, along with other actions including support for foreign Alliances and forming a new Constitution.

"Resolved that the delegates for this Colony in the Continental Congress be impowered to concur with the other delegates of the other Colonies in declaring Independency, and forming foreign Alliances, resolving to this Colony the Sole, and Exclusive right of forming a Constitution and Laws for this Colony, and of appointing delegates from time to time (under the direction of a general Representation thereof to meet the delegates of the other Colonies for such purposes as shall be hereafter pointed out." This resolution, known as the "Halifax Resolves," carefully outlined North

This resolution, known as the "Halifax Resolves," carefully outlined North Carolinian grievances against the British Empire, including the Crown's support for slaves to rise up and kill their Masters throughout the Colonies. "That Governors in different Colonies have declared Protection to Slaves who

"That Governors in different Colonies have declared Protection to Slaves who should imbrue their Hands in the Blood of their Masters." North Carolinian's fear of slave revolts was a justified one. On November 7,

North Carolinian's fear of slave revolts was a justified one. On November 7, 1775, Virginia Governor Lord Dunmore signed a proclamation encouraging slaves to fight for the British Crown in exchange for freedom. As a result, hundreds of slaves across the Colonies fled to British lines and picked up a musket.

What other grievances did the North Carolinians list? The seizing of colonial ships is another:

"That the Ships belonging to America are declared prizes of War and many of them have been violently seized and confiscated in consequence of which multitudes of the people have been destroyed or from easy Circumstances reduced to the most Lamentable distress."

During the American Revolution, the British Royal Navy seized colonial vessels as part of their naval blockade and enforcement of trade restrictions. This was one of the strategies used by the British to exert control over the American colonies and disrupt their trade and supply lines. This policy contributed to the unofficial policy of 'War Famine' on both sides.

Denouncing 'War Famine' was also mentioned in the Resolves.

"War famine as a policy" refers to a situation in which a government or military deliberately uses food scarcity as a strategy during a conflict or war to weaken an adversary or achieve specific objectives. This policy involves manipulating the availability of food and resources to create hunger and suffering among the civilian population, which can, in turn, have various effects on the enemy's ability to fight or maintain public support.

War famine as a policy can involve several tactics:

 Blockades: The enforcing party may blockade ports or supply routes to prevent food and other essential supplies from reaching the affected region. This tactic can lead to food shortages and malnutrition among the population.
 Scorched Earth: The deliberate destruction of crops, livestock, and food storage facilities in enemy territory to deny sustenance to the opposing army and induce famine among civilians.

**3. Forced Relocation: Forcing civilian populations to move from their homes, making it difficult for them to access food and causing displacement-related hunger and suffering.** 

4. Seizure of Food: Confiscating or requisitioning food from the civilian population to feed one's own troops while leaving the local population hungry.
5. Economic Warfare: Implementing economic policies or trade restrictions that hinder the ability of a nation to import or produce sufficient food.

The British Royal Navy not only seized colonial ships but also captured their sailors. Captives had two choices: Serve the Empire in His Majesty's Royal Navy or die. The Declaration of Independence refers to it as one of the reasons for leaving the British Empire.

The practice of impressment, which involved forcibly conscripting individuals into the British Royal Navy, was a common practice during the 18th and early 19th centuries, particularly during times of war. It was a controversial and often resented practice that played a significant role in British naval manpower recruitment.

Impressment involved the seizure of men, from various locations, including merchant ships, coastal towns, and even foreign vessels. The British Navy used impressment as a means of maintaining an adequate number of sailors, especially during periods of conflict when the demand for naval manpower was high.

Benjamin Franklin compared the practice of impressment to slavery. In the end, perpetuating or protecting slavery wasn't provided by the North Carolinians as a reason for colonial independence other than addressing the reality of slave insurrections.
