Had prayed and prayed for something special to end this March/Easter Beacon. Nothing from our library filled the bill. But as usual God heard and answered my clumsy attempt calling for help. This last time I quickly scanned a row of books and found a book by Catherine Marshall, The First Easter. Maybe something in it would satisfy my quest. Little did I know I would find what I thought worthwhile in the Introduction of the book!

At first reading, I was not going to include much of the author's introduction until I realized who this minister would be. So, Catherine Marshall begins by writing: For me the word "Easter" conjures up a procession of pictures. One of the most vivid is a scene from my Georgia college days. On a particular Easter Sunday, I was one of a group of girls who bumped along for fifteen miles on a slow streetcar to attend Easter service at the Westminister Presbyterian Church in Atlanta. The almost-square church with its high vaulted ceiling and huge stone pillars, was packed to the doors. The atmosphere was charged with expectancy interlaced with the heavy fragrance of Easter lilies. Through open windows crept a soft Spring breeze; for Spring came early to Georgia. The young man in the pulpit made us see and feel and smell the Spring. Even in his pastoral prayer, he spoke of balmy air, budding trees, and songs of birds. He referred several times to the azaleas –white pink, coral, magenta – and to the fairyland of dogwood blossoms and redbud out Druid Hill's way. Yet a crowed church at Easter, a whispering Spring breeze, poetic imagery in a prayer would scarcely have been enough to make a lasting impression on a school girl. To this service something extraordinary was added. What had happened in a certain Garden almost two thousand years ago was obviously real to this young preacher, Peter Marshall, and he seemed resolutely eager to make it as real to us who listened.

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"What do I mean by a resurrection?" he asked. He made it clear he did not mean "just the perpetuation of a dead man's ideas or influence." "This", he said earnestly, "is something we dare not water down by what we call 'spiritualizing' it. It must be so authentic that you and I can see it..." suddenly, at a given time between sunset and dawn... there is a rustling as of the breath of God moving through a garden A man rises up from the cold stone slab where He had been laid. We must see Him as He walks to the threshold of the tomb, stands swaying for a moment on wounded feet and walks out into the dewy garden, alive forevermore! We must be able to see in mind's eye the discarded graveclothes lying there, like a glove from which the hand has been removed, the fingers of which has been removed, the fingers that still retain the shape of the hand lying there, collapsed, a little deflated, because there was between rolls of bandages a considerable weight of spices. . . We must be able to hear it - catch a whiff of the strange scents that must have drifted back to the Man from that tomb of linen and bandages of spices – myrrh and aloes – and close air of blood. . ." We who listened were no longer in Atlanta. We were back in a Garden. What was this strange ability of the man in the pulpit to enlist not just our minds, but our imaginations and even our sensory perceptions? I didn't know. All I knew was that this was a new kind of preaching to me. And why was this young preacher so anxious to make this resurrection a reality to us? Why was he excited about it? He made the reason quite clear. . . Because of what had happened on the first Easter, we had a LIVING LORD. We could each have vital communion with Him right then, tell Him our problems, get His help and direction for our lives. Moreover – and here a note of exultation came into the preacher's voice – because we could prove Christ's aliveness for ourselves by our contact with Him, we could have the proof we needed of life after death. Not a one of us

need ever fear death again. That was good news, wasn't it? Then it was important that the good news get out.

We college students walked out of the church that morning aglow with concepts that had gotten through to us for the first time. Nor was the spell broken by the traffic on Ponce de Leon, nor by the rumbling old streetcar with its straw seats that carried us back to Decatur. Not Sunday dinner with chicken and grits, nor a history term paper to be written could break the spell. Else why would I remember the details of that Easter service even now?

I could not have known that my life was to be intertwined for all time with the preacher's, nor that I would hear a procession of his Easter services through the years to come. Yet no matter how many I heard – the glow, the excitement, the something special was always there. And apparently not just for me, but for many another.

I had a chance to glimpse another of Peter's Easter services six years later through the eye of someone else. This time the setting was the New York Avenue Presbyterian Church in Washington, D. C. where Peter and I had come in the Fall of 1937. A young women's life was changed that a.m., and this is the way she described it: "she would never be the same again." There was nothing stuffy about the Christianity found. In fact, it was as exciting as Peter had always found it himself. Joy returned to life, as the enthusiastic teen-age girl put it."... "Peter was nearly my idol and would have been if I hadn't seen him step out of the way and let me catch a glimpse of the Savior. I met Him through Peter Marshall."


In the years since Mr. Jones, Meet the Master was released, there has been a steady stream of requests for Dr. Marshall's sermon material. When I began seriously to consider what should go into such a book, I thought of the fact that to Peter, the compass needle of Christianity pointed inevitably and always, to Resurrection morning. Therefore his best thinking, most careful preparation and all his gifts for sermonizing he had lavished through the years on his Easter sermons. In those sermons his ability to paint a picture in words, to enable his listeners to see and hear and feel an incident, rose to its greatest height. I found in my possession 96 Easter manuscripts from 18 years and 4 months of preaching. In re-reading these sermons covering the events of Passion Week, I quickly found myself caught up in drama – sheer drama, engrossing, at times tender, at times terrible – and always and always I found myself moved by Peter's ability to enlist the emotions on the side of faith.

Thus, <u>The First Easter</u> unfolded itself. My only part in it has been to take from the many sermons Dr. Marshall's re-creation of each scene, as event followed event, and edit the material only where it was necessary to weave it together.

Here, then, is Easter seen through the eyes and described from the heart of one man. (Washington, D.C. October 19,1958 – Catherine Marshall)

What is this mysterious, strange, joyous influence that seems to permeate everything at this time of the year. . .that lingers, like a sweet perfume, delicate and clean, to touch us all with its magic? It is an intriguing thing . . . intangible, yet real. We feel it. . . sense it. . .thrill to it. There is more to it than bunny rabbits and colored eggs and gay, new clothes. Easter is more than a celebration because the sap is rising in the trees. . . and the bare branches are slipping bright green rings on bony fingers . . . and blossoms are turning wood and garden into

fairyland. Easter is more than a Spring festival. So far as the church is concerned, the message of Easter is contained in the declaration "CHRIST is RISEN!"



Peter Marshall ~~ May 27, 1902 – January 26, 1949~~An American Preacher at New York Avenue Presbyterian Church in Washington D.C., and Chaplain to the United States Senate.

A Man Called Peter – 1951 biography by widow Catherine and 1955 film of the book, was nominated for an academy award for its cinematography.

He was born in Coatbridge, North Lanarkshire, Scotland, a poverty-stricken coalmining community, where he was reared by his mother and step-father. From 1916-1921 he studied electrical engineering at Coatbridge Technical School. He enrolled in evening classes to study for the ministry, while working in the mines by day, but his progress was slow. In 1927, a cousin paid for him to study for the ministry in the United States. He graduated from Columbia Theological Seminary 1931. His first church was First Presbyterian Church, was in small, rural Covington Georgia. After a brief pastorate, he accepted a call to Atlanta's Westminister Presbyterian church in 1933.

In Atlanta, he met his future wife Catherine Wood who was a student at Agnes Scott College. Married November 4, 1936. (One son, Peter John Marshall January 1940 – September 2010.)

Peter Marshall died of a heart attack January 4, 1947 at age 46.

Other information: Bethlehem United Presbyterian Church was organized in 1950 by the Presbytery of Wheeling following a house-to-house survey conducted in Bethlehem by the Greater Wheeling Council of Churches.

The first organized Sunday school work took place in the Village of Bethlehem back in 1876. Bethlehem Union Sunday school began in 1905 and Bethlehem Union Chapel, which still stands today, was dedicated in 1914.

Today the Bethlehem Presbyterian Church is proud of its music program under the direction of Bryan Sable and organist Cheryl Dougherty. The Calvin Choir and the ROHO Ringers (Ringing Our Hearts Out) Bell Choir, both give much inspiration during worship services.

This past fall the bell choir, which was formed in 1995, held a fund raiser for the purchase of choir robes. The drive was launched in late October 1999 during a congregational dinner. With hopes of a delivery date by January 2000, the choir had its work out out for them. The first collection was taken during the congregational dinner and by that very evening a phone call was received with an offer to pay for the entire purchase of the new robes. The robes arrived with not one day to spare, just in time for Christmas Eve candle-light services.
