# North Dakota State Genealogical Society Minutes

Co President Daphne Drewello called the meeting to order at 1:00 PM on July 11, 2014. The meeting was held in the East Asian Room on the fourth floor of the UND Chester Fritz Library. Genealogical societies/club representatives present: Patrice Hartman, SWNDGS; Daphne Drewello, JRGC; Ron Baker, Barbara Knipe, Michael Swanson, Bernard Hoggarth, Minnkota; Glenn & Alice Ellingsberg, RRVGS. Guests: Dana Johnson, James Oakland and Sandy.

Michael Swanson, Assistant Archivist in the Elwyn B. Robinson Department of Special Collections gave a presentation on "What's so Special about Special Collections." The presentation provided an overview of the holdings in Special Collections, with special emphasis on the genealogical materials. This was followed by a tour of Special Collections.

The Orin G. Libby Manuscript Collection is the largest component of Special Collections and is comprised of about 1500 individual collections. This includes personal papers, organization and business records. Collections pertaining to local history, the Norwegian Consulate records and the E.J. Lander Company land records were mentioned. The University Archives contains about 130 record groups. Other collections include rare books, audio/ video, photographs, state documents, family history and maps. Unique categories are Grand Forks and the Red River Valley and North Dakota. They have city directories, World War II service records, Marriage and Coroner records, church records, tax assessment ledgers, Superintendent of School records and newspapers. For ND they have naturalizations for 9 area counties, Sanborn maps, town and county histories, WPA biographies, census, land tract and plat records and military records.

The Norwegian Resources include the ND American Lutheran Church Records, maps, Norwegian Telephone Directories, Norske Gaardnavne (i.e. Rygh), Norske Gardsbruk, dictionaries, general history books, immigration/emigration resources, Sons of Norway records and the Arne G. Brekke Bygdebok collection. The bygdebok collection is approaching 1500 titles. New books are being acquired from Norway with financial assistance from an endowment fund. He also mentioned several ways of presenting material online using Tumblr, Flickr, facebook and Google to name a few.

July 11, 2014: The UND Special Collections library hosted the Summer meeting of the North Dakota State Genealogical Society. Minnkota Genealogical Society President Mike Swanson gave a tour of the library, behind the scenes look at the archive area and made a presentation on the mission, purpose and focus of the library/archives, mainly Grand Forks, ND and the surrounding Red River Valley area. Mike is also the Assistant Archivist at the Special Collections. One collection of note is the Arne Brekke Bygdebok Collection, which is one of the largest collections of

Norwegian local histories in the United States with the volume count nearing 1,500 volumes.

August 09, 2014: Members of the Minnkota Genealogical Society took a road trip to Cavalier, ND. A tour of the Pembina County Historical Society museum, with an informative talk by PCHS Administrator Zelda Hartje, and the Heritage Center at the Icelandic State Park were given. Minnkota Genealogical Society member, Ron Baker, also led the group in a brief tour of the Vikur church and cemetery, and Mountain Community Center all at Mountain, ND.

September 09, 2014: Dr. Cynthia Prescott of the UND History Department gave a presentation on Pioneer Women as homesteaders and also their portrayal in various forms in statutes in different time periods around the United States. The presentation was in

#### **Chronicling America**

The National Digital Newspaper Program (NDNP), a joint program of the Library of Congress and the National Endowment of the Humanities, now has more than 8 million



historic newspaper pages published in 32 states and the District of Columbia between 1836 and 1922 now available on the Chronicling America website. The collection may be accessed at <a href="http://www.loc.gov/ndnp/">http://www.loc.gov/ndnp/</a>.

Two more states recently joined the program, Nevada and South Dakota. The number of participants now includes 37 states, one territory and the District of Columbia.

This is also a great website to determine what newspapers existed in the place and time period of your research along with holdings information for those newspapers that are not yet digitized.

#### **Church Records**

The New York Times recently had an article on two historians, James Fenimore Cooper Jr., a professor of history at Oklahoma State University and Margaret Bendroth, executive director of the Congregational Library, trying to persuade church leaders to turn over their records for digitization and preservation. The article may be viewed at

http://www.nytimes.com/2014/07/30/us/in-church-attics-private-life-of-early-america.html? r=1. They are focusing on Massachusetts congregational churches.

The Congregational Library & Archives, Boston, has a digital collection of colonial-era church records online at <a href="http://www.congregationallibrary.org/nehh/series1">http://www.congregationallibrary.org/nehh/series1</a>. Currently they have 20 Massachusetts church records and one Maine church record online. These records



not only include records of baptisms, marriages, and deaths, but also admissions, dismissions, disciplinary cases, confessions of sins, and letters of transfer to and from other churches. Personal conversion narratives, that were often required for full membership,

are also included in several of the collections, many in the congregants' own handwriting.

These records are currently not indexed, but clicking on the church of interest leads to a list of available digitized records with date ranges. A transcription project is also underway to transcribe the conversion narratives.

The Periodical Source Index (PERSI) is the largest subject index to genealogy and local history periodical articles in the world. It was created by the staff of the Allen County Public Library Foundation and Genealogy Center. Now FindMyPast is adding images to the index,

allowing easy access to articles, photos and other material. Searching is free at <a href="material-search-free">search-findmypast.com/search/periodical-source-index</a>. Access to articles requires a paid subscription.

# Free Family Record Forms from the Library of Congress Web Site by Dick Eastman

Long before the invention of home computers that could generate forms, many families recorded their important family events within their Bibles. Whether printed as part of the Bible or printed on separate paper forms that could be stored alongside the family Bible, these forms often were ornate with beautiful artwork. The Library of Congress has collected many of these forms and made them available online. Some are simple "fill in the blank" forms while others have space to manually paste in pictures. All of the forms are available free of charge.

Some of these forms are huge! Downloading them may take a minute or two on a slow to medium speed Internet connection. However, I will suggest the results are worth the wait.

You can download any of these old Family Records and Family Register forms and even print them on your own printer, then use them as you wish. Many of them are "oversized." If so, they cannot be printed on a normal computer printer that only handles 8½ by 11 inch paper. However, you can always save them to a flash drive and then have them printed on an oversized printer or plotter at FedEx Office (formerly called Kinko) or other service that has such hardware available. You can even send the print image to online


http://www.fedex.com/us/office/ and either pick up the finished printout in person or have it shipped to you. You will have to pay a few dollars for the printing and shipping, of course.

I've "rescued" an old photograph of J. C. THOMPSON which was taken at the A. J. Osborn Studio in Dickinson, ND. The photograph appears to have been taken in the 1890's with Mr. THOMPSON appearing to be in his 60's or 70's at the time it was taken. Based on limited research I was able to locate the following information regarding Mr. THOMPSON and his family:

J. C. THOMPSON was b. 1833 and d. 1905 and is buried in the Dickinson Cemetery in Dickinson, ND

Census records provide the following details:

1900 census of Dickinson, ND:

J. C. THOMPSON, age 76, born Feb 1824, married 49 years, born NY, parents born NY, a Postmaster Sarah J. THOMPSON, wife, age 62, born May 1838, married 49 years, 2 children/2 living, born NY, parents born NH/NY

Fred M. THOMPSON, son, age 39, born Aug 1860, born MI, an Assistant Postmaster

#### Citation Corner

We all use maps to locate where our ancestors lived. Maps help locate nearby cemeteries and churches. County or state boundary line and name changes can make locating your ancestor challenging. By comparing maps of the same location from different time periods it may help you locate your ancestor and find new records to investigate. But how do we cite a map?

Individual maps are cited like a book, except there is no page number and there may not be a cartographer to cite in the author field. So it would look like this: Rand McNally & Co.'s Sectional Map of the Dakota

and the Black Hills (Chicago: Rand McNally & Co., 1873); digital image, David Rumsey Map Collection (<a href="http://www.davidrumsey.com">http://www.davidrumsey.com</a> : accessed 12 September 2014).

An atlas is a book of maps, so it would follow the same guidelines, including a page number.
