GRAVE CONCERN ON THE RED RIVER

One of the members of the Williams County Genealogical Society has a son who is taking Geology Classes @ North Dakota State University in Fargo. The class visited the area along and above the Red River, now called Trollwood Park. This is the site of the early Cass County Cemetery, often termed a 'Pauper's' Cemetery.

Maps show about four burial sites there. A few years ago, the area was eroding to a point where at least one site was removed from Trollwood into the Springvale Cemetery. It is believed some graves were left, unmarked and unmaintained.

This was confirmed by the NDSU class as they evidenced bones and parts of decomposing coffins sticking out of the clay of the undercut bank. Since the flood of 1997, the banks are caving in again, exposing more unmarked graves.

What started as a field trip developed into a quest for a solution and the class has contacted several organizations hoping something can be done about the grave sites.

According to the instructor, this bank will cave in just as soon as the thawing process starts this spring, and the graves will be in the River.



In its 2nd edition (1996), it is published by McGraw-Hill (ISBN 0-07-014754) and is helpful as actual pictures of what you see on the computer screen are printed in the book and explanations made by the author. She includes interesting background information, shares success/failure stories and presents the material in a conversational tone... 
